#### 'Boil water' order lifted

MIDWAY - Local residents can drink fresh tapwater again today.

Wednesday, the Seminole County Public Health Unit removed a nearly three-week "boil water" order made after road crews turned off the community's water system Nov. 6. Health officials feared harmful bacteria could escape into the main water line along State Road 46 through leaks. The leaks were repaired last week by road crews paid by the Florida Department of Transportation.

John Cochrane, director of the environmental health section, said eight water samples retrieved from Midway between Monday and Tuesday showed no contamination Wednesday. As a result, the boil water notice was lifted immediately, he said.



SANFORD - Award-winning artist Bettye Reagan will team up with her husband, Don, for the First Street Gallery's first duo-exhibit. The display is in keeping with the tradition of the St. Lucia Festival.

The exhibit, called "Tandem, Times and Turning," will be dedicated on Dec. 6, from 5 to 8 p.m., then be open to the public the following week.

SANFORD - The cafeteria at the Crooms School of Choice was alive with activity Wednesday afternoon.

Staff members bustled from the kichen to the serving line with food, others filled Styrofoam plates with turkey and ham, green beans, collard greens and cranberry sauce. Bread overflowed from baskets and cakes and pies were plentiful.

Students eagerly waited to serve the 700 guests who were

## Expressway: Judge rules state liable for damages

SANFORD - The Seminole County Expressway won an important decision from Seminole County Circuit Judge C. Vernon Mize Jr. this

Mize ruled Tuesday the authority would not be liable for any damages caused property owners by their land reservations placed on their property by the authority in October 1987, said expressway attorney Lonnie Groot. Mize, in an oral ruling, decided when the state took over control of the 12-mile tollroad project earlier this

year it also took over any liabilities, Groot said. "We'll get to keep our furniture," said a jubilant expressway director Gerald Brinton. arms upraised.

#### FHP predicts 42 traffic fatalities

TALLAHASSEE — The Florida Highway Patrol has predicted that 42 people will die in traffic accidents during the long Thankagiving holiday weekend that began Wednesday.

That would mean an average of one traffic death every two hours and 26 minutes over the holiday period, which ends Sunday at midnight.

Last year, 47 people died in 41 accidents during the Thankagiving weekend.

Most of the drivers and passengers killed last year — 50 percent — were not wearing seat belts, according to Bobby

Given the lifesaving potential of safety belts, many of the holiday tragedies could have been prevented simply by buckling up," he said.

#### Cop pleads guilty to leaser charge

JACKSONVILLE — A former police officer, who was charged with raping a handcuffed woman last December while to her to the Duval County Jail, has pleaded guilty a count of unlawful compensation.

Mark James Purcell, 28, was sentenced to four months in the county jail, ordered to perform 50 hours of community service and pay court costs, said Assistant State Attorney Anthony Berry. Purcell also will be on probation for 18 months.

Prosecutors agreed to drop the rape charge because of several conflicts in testimony from Purcell and the 24-year-old victim.

"We were afraid consent would become an issue at trial,"

The yietim, who was suffering from health problems, agreed with the state's decision to prosecute Purcell for violating the public's trust, he said.

#### Santa Rosa to sue state over growth law

MILTON. Fig. — Santa Rosa County commissioners have voted to file a lawsuit today to challenge the constitutionality of several key provisions of Florida's 1985 Growth Management

The suit, approved by a 5-0 vote Tuesday, also would challenge rules adopted by the Department of Community Affairs to implement the act and ask the court to suspend administrative hearings on Santa Rosa's land-use plan that has been rejected by the agency.

Those hearings are set for January. "We are moving ahead without regard to what happens in the next few weeks to Santa Rosa's plan." Commissioner Millard Adams Jr. said of the lawsuit. "This is not a bluff."

The commissioners in the Florida Pauhandle county directed staffers to invite the other 25 members of a small-county coalition to join in the lawsuit. Santa Rosa organized the coalition to fight the DCA.

#### AIDS tests up after Magic Johnson case

TALLAHASSEE — Since basketball star Magic Johnson announced two weeks ago he has the virus for AIDS, Florida health officials say they've seen a surge in the number of people seeking information and getting tested.

The state laboratory performing lests for most Florida counties has seen a 20 percent increase in tests.

Some of that increase can be traced to a speci-I testing project in Fort Myers, according to officials with the state Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services. Much of it, however, can be traced to the intreased public awas need brought on by Johnson's announcement, they said.

## \_aw can't harm inmates' clemency

TALLAHASSEE - A change made in October 1986 to state laws can't be used retroactively to hurt the elemency chances of many prisoners sentenced to life before then, the Florida Supreme Court ruled

Wednesday.
"It doesn't guarantee clemency," said

Peter Sleasman, an attorney with the Florida Institutional Legal Services Inc. in Cainesville. "It's an ability to be considered by the governor and Cabinet for elemency."

The court, in a 5-2 decision, and the law passed in 1986 was improperly applied after the fact to immate Jimmie Williams, a convicted murderer, and other inmates serving life sentences before that year.

Williams was sentenced to life — with a minimum of 25 years — in 1978 after

plending guilty to a Hardee County staying. At the time, the law required the Department of Corrections to recommend clemen-cy for any prisoner serving a life sentence who has finished 10 years with "no charge of misconduct."

Such a recommendation only gave the prisoner a chance to obtain a reduced sentence from the governor and Cabinet. which is the executive elemency board. It didn't happen that often.

But in 1986, the law was changed to

exclude inmates convicted of capital felonies, such as Williams, from getting the department's recommendation. New, tougher rules made it more difficult for such inmates to even get on the elemency board

Williams filed a lawsuit, arguing the changes were unconstitutional because the law improperly applied retroactively.

The court agreed, saying in an unsigned opinion that Williams would have enjoyed a "substantial advantage" under the law in effect when he was sentenced. Under the present situation, he would have virtually no chance of a clemency hearing, the

Department of Corrections officials and legal services attorneys were unsure Wednesday how many inmates the ruling would affect, mainly because it is not clear how many have clean prison records for 10 or more years. Things are further complicated because the entire law was repealed

But either way, Sleasman said the decision should not be interpreted as a way for thousands of inmates serving life sentences to suddenly obtain wholesale release from

#### Pastor charged with molesting teenage girl

AVON. N.Y. — A minister accused of molesting a member of his former congregation in Florida says he plans to continue preaching while he is free on bail.

The Rev. Dexter L. Brewer. pastor of Dayspring Christian Ministries in Avon, was arrested last weekend in Florida and charged with molesting a

teen-age girl several years ago. Brewer, 35, was an associate minister at Faith Community Church in Largo, Fla., until he moved to Avon eight months

Terry Garrett, an assistant pastor at Dayspring, said Brewer's congregation in the Livingston County town knows about the charges and has dis-cussed them. The congregation of the non-denominational church has expressed confidence in Brewer, he said.

"We love our pastor very much and we're standing with him." Garrett said. "This matter will be handled under Florida law and there's nothing that we can do here in New York except

## Researcher finds alternative to silicone breast implants

TAMPA - A University of South Florida medical researcher has patented a material that could be an alternative to allicone breast implants.
Stephen Kovacs is touting

vivathane, a plastic polymer he developed to make artificial heart valves and for which he won a U.S. patent, as superior to allicone when used as breast

implants.
"Vivathane is eight times less capable of leakage than silicone." said Kovacs, a cardiovascular researcher at USF's College of Medicine.

The safety of silicone-gel breast implants has generated heated debate among women and medical professionals. The risks include hardening of

tissue surrounding the im-plant, infection, bleeding. rupture of the implant and leakage of silicone into the

Questions have been raised about whether the implants can cause autoimmune disorders or cancer and whether they interfere with mammography tests.

A Food and Drug Administration advisory committee this month recommended that silicone-gel breast implants be allowed to remain on the market while studies continue to determine their safety.

Kovaca saids the biggest advantage of vivathane as a breast implant is its translucency in X-rays, which would help early cancer de-tection. Existing breast im-

plants are opaque and could hide small tumors from view in a mammogram.

A breast implant made of

vivathane and filled with vivathane gel also discourages bacteria build-up, won't clot. leak or lose its shape, Kovacs saids. Kovaca expects it will take at

least three to four years to obtain FDA approval for his invention, a key step toward commercializing the product. "We will have to do carefully

controlled animal experiments to study long-term effects," Kovaca saids. "We will have to do many pathological and mammogram studies." A trained engineer, Kovaca

received a U.S. patent for the plastic polymer vivathane last year. His work on vivathane is a spinoff of his heart research.

# Liberace's ex-lover shot

JACKSONVILLE - A 25-year-old man was arrested Wednesday on charges of attempted murder and armed robbery in the Nov. 20 shooting of the lover of the late entertainer Liberace.

The suspect. Melvin Jerome Owen, was arrested Wednesday morning in Macclenny, said Sgt. Gus Carlson, a spokesman for the Jacksonville Sheriff's Office. Owen has a felony record

dating back to 1987 ranging from a forgery arrest to convictions for possession and sale of crack cocaine. The victim. Scott Thorson,

was listed in critical condition Wednesday in a Jacksonville

hospital. Police asked that his location not be disclosed. Thorson was shot three times, at least once in the chest.

Thorson's attorney, Joel Strote, said his client also goes by the name of Jess Marlow.

Witnesses identified Owen as the man they saw running from a Howard Johnson motel after the shooting took place. Witnesses also told police that Owen had talked about committing the offense, the warrant stated.

Robbery is believed to have been the motive, Carlson said. but evidence of drug use also was found in Thorson's room.

Thorson, 32, gained notoriety in 1982 when he filed a \$12 million palimony suit against AIDS-related illness. The suit was settled out of court.

He is the author of a kiss-and-tell book on Liberace's life, "Behind the Candelabra: My Life With Liberace."

Another man, Maurice Harris, 25, was being held for driving Owen away from the scene of the shooting.

Thorson was placed in the federal witness protection program after he testified for the prosecution in a 1988 quadruple-slaying trial in Los Angeles and a second trial involving the same case last year.

Thorson was later expelled from the witness program, but police would not say why.

## votes to close Escampla down the county hospital

PENSACOLA - Escambia County commissioners have voted to close county-owned University Hospital as a costcutting measure and turn over responsibility for indigentpatient care to two private reigious hospitals.

The 4-1 vote came after a three-hour meeting Tuesday marked by cheers, jeers and

University hospital employees, who also picketed outside the Public Health Auditorium where the commissioners met, pleaded with the panel to preserve their jobs and the hospital's role in providing services to the needy.

Others voiced support for the plan to turn over that responsibility in January to Baptist and Sacred Heart hospitals, the latter operated by the Daughters of Charity, a Roman Catholic order of nuns.

"If the Daughters of Charity cannot be relied upon to care for the poor, then we as a society have failed," Pensacola busi-

eman Marvin Kaiman told the commissioners.

Susan Bane, director of physical therapy at University Hospital, said the larger private hospitals may allow poor patients to fall through the cracks.

"I work with people every day who are sent from other hospitals because they cannot pay." she said.

State figures, however, show Baptist and Sacred Heart already provide the bulk of services to the poor in Escambia. In 1990, the two hospitals were responsible for 77 percent of the health care given to county residents unable to fully pay

The two private hospitals have agreed to hire most of University's staff and pay the county \$485,000 for the public hospital's 130-bed authorization. They will use the authorization for a 40-bed expansion and cancel the other 90 spaces.

For the commissioners, the decision was a financial one. They contended they couldn't and military retirees.

afford the \$2 million annual subsidy needed to balance the public hospital's budget unless taxes are increased.

Under the agreement with the private hospitals, the county will pay them only \$300,000 a year to take over primary care clinica that will remain open at University Hospital and in Century.

The two hospitals, in return. have agreed to provide free care to indigent patients who need hospitalization. The hospitals estimate that care would be worth \$21 million over the next five years.

University has been providing inpatient care for about 2,700 indigents annually and outpatient services to about 5,500 at its clinic.

The only other hospitals in Pensacola are the West Florida Regional Medical Center, a profit-making facility operated by Hospital Corporation of America. and a Navy hospital that serves four Pensacola-area naval bases

## Down and out

In October, Vice President Dan Quayle told the country that people "need to be more upbeat, more positive."

Then at the end of the month, the U.S. Department of Agriculture reported that 3 million more Americans were receiving food stamps in August than a year earlier. In all, a record 23.6 million citizens, or nearly one in 10 Americans, now accept government help to feed themselves and their families, and an equal or larger number of people are eligible for aid but don't currently receive it. Those are not numbers that leave most ordinary people feeling very upbeat.

In good times, conservative politicians try to score points with a cartoon image of the food stamp recipient as someone who drives to the grocery store in a Cadillac, plunks down food stamps for potato chips and uses the change to buy a bottle of beer. That's an image hard to sustain in bad times like these. when events daily remind everyone how close to the economic precipice most working Americans live.

In the lines applying for food stamps today are the same kinds of people who have always been there: the newly divorced woman who's not getting her child support: the young unmarried mother balancing child-raising, a part-time waitressing job and classes at a community college: the low-skill worker whose minimum wage job won't put enough food on the table for his children.

But this year, they have been joined by those who used to consider themselves the middle class. The number of households receiving food stamps in affluent states has soared: 33 percent in Connecticut, 50 percent in New Hampshire. 17 percent in New Jersey

At the welfare offices there are men in work histories, engineers and technicians and clerical workers who have exhausted their unemployment benefits.

Their need only underlines again how precarious life has become for tens of millions of working Americans, whose real wages haven't grown in two decades.

### Hostages freed


It would be nice to think that Terry Waite and Thomas Sutherland, two of the Western hostages held in Lebanon, were released recently because their terrorist captors developed a conscience.

After all, these were not the kind of men that any civilized country would want to see hurt. Imposing but soft-spoken. Waite disappeared in January 1987 while trying to negotiate the release of hostages. He was the British envoy of the Archbishop of Canterbury. Thomas Sutherland, who was kidnapped June 9, 1985, was the dean of the agriculture school at the American University in Beirut.

But the fact that a Shiite Muslim group released them has more do do with changing Middle East politics than with humanitarianism. Iran and Syria, which have ties to Muslim extremist groups in Beirut, want to improve their relations with the West. The hostages in Lebanon became an embarrassing obstacle.

Meanwhile, the U.S. rhetoric of "no deals with terrorists" died down, Israel was willing to release some of its Arab prisoners and U.N. Secretary General Javier Perez de Cuellar began working hard to negotiate the freedom of the Westerners.

Having said that, we must note that Perez de Cuellar's mission isn't finished. Three other Americans are still in the hands of the terrorists.

Executives blame woes on Washing-ton." a Wall street Journal headline reported, five days after that fateful Friday fall. A survey showed leading corporate executives exasperated with Congress and disgusted with President Bush for the way the economy is performing.

The story quoted Bush explaining in an interview why we aren't in a recession: "You see, there's some fairly good fundamentals getting out there. Inflation is down. Personal debt is down.

Inventories are down. Quality - competitiveness - quality is going in the right direction, up, and exports are up. So it's not like we're dealing with a totally bad economy."

No, there aren't great parallels to be drawn between our economic recession in 1991 and our depression in 1931; the perils aren't as profound. But, sadly, there are great parallels in the style and substance of our presidential leadership in 1931 and today. Indeed, historians can make a strong case that we saw more leadership from Hoover than we are seeing from Bush.

Hear this: "We are on automatic pilot," complains none other than Bush's own Secretary of Housing and Urban Development. Jack Kemp, a conservative economic thinker, First, he tried voicing his advice and criticism in the privacy of Bush's Cabinet meeting - but that only provoked an attack and lecture on the value of loyalty from John Sununu, Bush's chief-of-staff-deportment. Kemp then aired his complaint in front of TV cameras.

The president likes to say that he has already sent his "growth package" to Congress - but it was no package at all, just a few proposals, sent separately, with no fanfare: his

capital-gains tax cut for the well-to-do, a highway bill, a banking bill. No bully pulpit for this president - Bush won't even go on prime-time TV to discuss the plight of our economy and his plan for its recovery.

Bush may be in peril when he goes to his Republican National Convention in Houston - not in danger of losing the nomination to a right-wing challenge from Pat Buchanan. but in danger of losing face because of a Freudian slip.

## **Becoming hard** to give thanks

WASHINGTON - America means abundance. Our national holiday of celebration for the pilgrims' landing revolves around the dinner table, spilling over with food. Today, we give thanks for abundance. We're thankful for everything we deserve as citizens of the richest nation in the world.

Yet, there is a pall hanging over this Thanksgiving. In many families that gather around the turkey today, the person doing the carving is unemployed. Setting out a full meal required a financial stretch, maybe even some ill-advised buying on credit to meet the

demands of tradition. Those who are employed will pause rumors of layoffs and may even warn the children that Christmas will be simple this year. The newspaper, fat-with Christmas ads heralds to norrow as the biggest shopping day of the year. Some will read the ads. pick up the phone and call extended family members to say this is the year to

stop gift-giving. Millions will give thanks that they have lived another day without serious

accident or illness because they have no health insurance. Some will give thanks for welfare, food stamps, a soup kitchen, a homeless shelter and the fact that David Duke can't get elected. Welfare gets no respect, especially in a recession coupled with a presidential election. Politicians like Duke, or even Ronald Reagan, strike a resounding chord when they criticize welfare. This, after all, is the country built on the backs of immigrants who came with nothing and asked for nothing except a fair shake. Today's stereotype of welfare recipients is gainfully unemployed layabouts who ask working stiffs to subsidize them so they can drive Cadillacs and pop out more babics.

The House Select Committee on Hunger says it isn't that simple. The average family of three needs \$823.75 a month to eat, clothe itself and maintain shelter. But, according to the committee, the maximum welfare benefit in 36 states is less than half that. It doesn't pay for the gas in a Cadillac. There may not even be enough "discretionary income" for a bus ticket.

The typical welfare recipient is not an able-bodied man with a beer in one hand and a remote control in the other. It is a very old person, or a young child, or a woman who is the sole support of her family, not able to earn enough money to pay a baby sitter so she can go to work. Perhaps she is living with the consequences of past bad choices. Whatever the past, the present reality is that she needs help from a society that prides itself on its abundance.

Rep. Tony Hall, D-Ohio, chairman of the Select Committee on Hunger, has testified before Congress that "programs alone cannot lift poor people out of their conditions of poverty." The millions of tax dollars spent today on welfare programs simply get the recipients through until tomorrow. They do not make poor people into solvent people.

Too much of what Uncle Sam gives to the poor comes with strings attached that keep them poor. Hall notes the case of an lowa woman on Aid to Families with Dependent Children. The AFDC rules say that anyone who has assets of more than \$1,000 is dropped from the program. The lowa woman figured she could work her way gradually out of welfare by starting her own at-home medical-billing business. But as soon as she bought a computer, she was dropped from AFDC before she could pay her own way because her computer was worth more than





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

## Sprinkle earns top player honors

ALTAMONTE SPRINGS - Whatever the Lake Brantley High School football team has needed to have done this season. David Sprinkle has stepped forward

That alone would justify his selection as the 1991 Sanford Herald Player of the Year.

Sure, he led Seminole County in rushing. He also tied for county lead in scoring with 11 touchdowns. As the focus of Lake Brantley's option attack, Sprinkle has not rushed for less than 90 yards in any game this season.

But what stands out is that every opponent that Lake Brantley has faced this season has expected Sprinkle, a 6-foot, 2-inch, 215-pound senior, to do just that. And yet, even with the added defensive attention, he did it

"David has taken a pounding," said Lake Brantley coach Fred Almon. "He really deserves all the credit he gets. He's been beat up and banged up.

"I've had a lot of good runners over the years, but David has good quickness and he runs with power."

He also has heart, something he showed when he and his family agreed to take on the legal fight with the Florida High School Activities Association over the forfeiture of a pair of Lake Brantley victories, including a crucial district win over Lake Mary.

## Peters picked as top coach

LAKE MARY - When Doug Peters took over as the head football coach at Lake Mary High School three years ago, there were those who questioned the wisdom of the move on both his part and the school's.

After all, Peters was (and is) a very successful wrestling coach, having led the Lake Mary Rams to eight consecutive conference, district and regional championships. Why take on the added headache of being the head football coach as well?

As far as Lake Mary was con-

cerned, it had to be considered a gamble of some degree. With a very active and demanding following in the community that doesn't respond well to losing, handing the program over to someone still in his

early 30s was a gutsy move.

"Some people may have looked at it (hiring Peters) as a gamble," said Lake Mary principal Don Smith. "But he had demonstrated his dedication, his enthusiasm and his work ethic. He built and maintained a very successful wrestling pro-

This year's Sanford Herald All-County Football Team should provide plenty of fodder for debate. In a conference as competitive as the Seminole Athletic Conference, picking just 24 football players is almost an impossibility. You could probably put together at least one other set of 24 players from those passed over that

would be as strong as the first. Then how did we come up with this elite 24? Some. like Lake Brantley's David Sprinkle, Lake Howell's Ken Times and Seminole's Carlo White, were obvious choices. Others were matters of opinion. Some were

The last two years, the All-County teams might be considered neo-classic, featuring a strong passing attack, the nation's top prep running back and an aggressive, gambling defense.

But this year, the schools in Seminole County went back to basics. On offense, the run became the primary weapon, mainly because the defenses became so stingy. Where offenses used to eat up large tracts of real estate at a time, making a first down became an accomplishment.

The 1991 All-County team is a reflection of those trends. Led by Sprinkle. this year's Sanford Herald Player of the Year, the offensive unit is geared toward ball control. With White and Times et. al., the defense is the ideal mix of strength and quickness.

Enough with the preliminaries . . . let the debates

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



DEAR READER: Histal hernia is a weakness of the ring of tissue where the esophagus joins the stomach. Ordinarily, this ring prevents backwash of irritating stomach acid into the

esophagus.
In patients with histal hernis, gastric acid enters the esophagus, causing heartburn, indigestion and gas. This backwash is called reflux; it is a common condition in older pa-

Antacids, by neutralizing stomach acid, often help symptoms. Other therapy includes changing eating patterns (remain upright for at least 30 minutes after eating and eat smaller, more frequent meals).

Also medicine auch as Also, medicine - such as

Tagamet and Zantac suppresses the production of acid, thereby relieving indigestion. In extreme cases, doctors may have to consider surgery to repair the hernia. However, non-surgical treatment is usually satisfactory and opera-tions for histal hernia are rarely performed.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My 6-year-old has had strep throat twice in six months. She gets swollen neck glands with it. Our doctor did a mono test and CBC. Her white count was high. Are these typical with strep?




