WASHINGTON (UPI)—The witnesses said most states have lifted the starting salaries for such teachers to maybe \$3,500 or even \$3,800 a year. Though they didn't say so, a congressional page is paid at the rate of \$4,047.

Group Okays Hike In Drivers' Fees To Finance Safety

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The Legislative Council has endorsed a package of highway safety bills, which included increases in drivers' license fees to foot the bill.

The legislators — on record against new taxes—said they did not consider the proposed driver license fee raise to come in this category—although all admitted it amounts to new taxes.

A majority indicated they would not support the raise unless it is tied to supporting additional highway patrolmen, driver education programs and other highway safety measures.

The package of bills is designed to cut down on Florida automobile liability rates by decreasing traffic accidents, according to Sen. Joe Eaton of Miami, chairman of the council's Highway Safety Committee.

One bill would increase the general fee for a driver's license by 50 cents a year—to \$1.75 a person. The additional 50 cents would go to support a driver education course in every high school.

The course would have to be offered, but students would not be required to take it. However, no driver under 18 could be licensed without passing it.

An additional 25 cents per person for delinquent licenses and a new \$3 charge for taking the driver's examination would go to finance a proposed increase in patrol strength of 200 troopers and 60 license examiners.

Bull Run All Over Again: No Shooting This Time

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The latest Battle of Antietam, now under way in Congress, starts out more like a peace parley. At the opening engagement, in the hearing room of the House Interior Committee Thursday, not a shot was fired.

More than a dozen invading witnesses contended Lee's defeat by McClellan on the banks of Antietam Creek at Sharpsburg, Md., probably determined the course of the war and thus the fate of the Union. They said more Americans fell there Sept. 17, 1862 than in any other single day of fighting in American history.

All they wanted, they said, was \$300,000, to start turning the 1,800-acre battlefield into a national park instead of a proposed subdivision, with gas stations, bill boards, and maybe juke joints.

They thought they had won this battle last year. But the interior committee, for reasons unstated,

laid their battlefield bill quietly to rest. Now they were back, with fresh troops.

The subcommittee, under chairmanship of Rep. Gracie Post, whose home state of Idaho hadn't quite achieved territorial status when North met South at Antietam, obviously had conspired to disarm the attackers with kindness.

Mrs. Post greeted each witness like a returning hero. Rep. Gardner Withrow (R-Wis.) let it be known he loved both the Blue and the Gray, who together at Antietam suffered 28,000 dead and wounded.

The nearest thing to a military maneuver, on either side, came when LeRoy Metz, speaking in support of the bill for nine posts of the American Legion, stepped up in a blue overseas cap and delivered a snappy salute. It wasn't returned.

There were helpful questions all around, although Rep. Glenn Cunningham (R-Neb.) did pose a disquieting one. "You don't suppose, do you, that this might precipitate another bloody battle, on the floor of

the House?" he asked Conrad Wirth, director of the National Park Service. "You know feeling these days runs pretty high."

Wirth, who thought he detected that this was a jest, said solemnly he was sure the North-South contest could not at this late date, be resumed.

Wirth took up arms in support of the bill alongside spokesmen for historical societies, Civil War roundtables, civic groups, and the Hagerstown, Md., Chamber of Commerce, 8 per cent of whose members in a poll had said this was one federal outlay they favored.

That's No Banana, It's Deadly Snake

Sanford yesterday had a rare visitor—a deadly South American snake—found in a bunch of bananas at the KW Fruit Co.

The snake was identified as a poisonous Fer-de-Lance by a Seminole High School biology student, Charles Fox, who said the 18-inch specimen would attain a length of six or seven feet when fully grown.

Greatly feared by workers on banana plantations in Central and South America because of its poison, the Fer-de-Lance is a close relative of the North American rattlesnake.

Snakes frequently are shipped covered and killed while banana boats are loading or unloading. The appearance of the Fer-de-Lance as far inland as Sanford is considered extremely rare.

The snake is on display in the Biology lab of Seminole High School.

Search Is Pushed For Bodies Of Two

FREDERICKSBURG, Va. (UPI)—Police gave up hope today that two missing members of a family could still be alive and fanned out from the sadist plot where a father and his young daughter were found dead in an intensive hunt for the other bodies.

Still not found more than 24 hours after the pit yielded the decomposed bodies of Carroll V. Jackson, 29, of Mineral, Va., and his 18-month-old daughter, Janet Carol, were Jackson's 27-year-old wife Mildred and their other daughter, Susan Anne, 8.

The family disappeared almost eight weeks ago. Discovery of the bodies of Jackson and the little girl led to the belief here that a sadist had kidnapped the peaceful couple and two little girls and killed them.

Boat Capsized, 3 Workers Drowned

PANAMA CITY (UPI)—Three construction workers drowned Thursday when rough waters capsized their small boat while they were anchoring pipe line buoys in St. Andrews Bay.

However, a fourth man, Anthony Dutton of Foley, Ala., managed to swim to safety.

The men were members of a construction dredging crew working on a five million dollar bridge.

The victims were identified as A. Q. Lassett, 21, Panama City, Fred Nobles, 36, Pensacola, and Shirley Hollingsworth, about 35, also of Pensacola.

Bridge Superintendent Victor Coates said they were working about 100 yards off shore when a combination of high winds and seas caused the 16-foot boat to turn over.

U. S. Policy Hit In 'Mix' Hearing
NASHVILLE (UPI)—A member of the county school board at Clinton, Tenn., said of rioting and a school bombing, told the U. S. Civil Rights Commission today that policies of federal court orders to integrate schools is a federal responsibility.

R. G. Croson made the statement at the first conference on the problems of school desegregation ever called by a federal-level agency.

Croson also said the bombing of a school should be a federal offense and that bombed schools should receive financial aid from the federal government.

There is no "consistency" in federal court orders to integrate schools, he said. "If segregated schools are wrong in Anderson County, they are also wrong in the other 152 school systems in Tennessee."

"I want to make it plain that we don't want a reward for obeying the order, but the federal government has shown an indifference to school systems that have tried to comply."

W. R. Oliver, superintendent of Nashville schools, told the commission Thursday the one big problem in desegregating schools is that it is contrary to the will of the majority of the people.

He said Negroes were "not interested in complete integration, not do they desire it."

Ike, Congress 'Firm' On Berlin

Con Kidnaps Four In Freedom Flight

BIRMINGHAM, Ala. (UPI)—A long-term convict who kidnaped four persons in a flight for freedom abandoned his hostages and his stolen car today and police called bloodhounds and a helicopter to the search.

The Alabama highway patrol said the car driven by 36-year-old William Smothers, who was serving sentences totaling 108 years, was found near a ferry landing just across the state line in Tennessee. He was believed trying to reach Chattanooga, Tenn., where he has relatives.

The Alabama patrol ordered all available units in North Alabama to the scene. Bloodhounds from the Chattanooga division of the Tennessee patrol began tracking Smothers, and a highway patrol helicopter flew to the area from Nashville.

The convict, armed with a patrolman's revolver and described as "dangerous," took a veteran patrolman transporting him from Kilby prison, Montgomery, Ala., to Birmingham for trial, a trusty, and a married couple as hostages Thursday.

Patrolman Otto Dees, 55, Mr. and Mrs. Noah T. Keith of near Birmingham, and the trusty, Ted Easley, were released at Flat Rock, in northeast Alabama, about 3 a. m., after more than 12 hours in Smothers' custody.

Mrs. H. H. Tidwell of Flat Rock said the four reached her house about a half hour later "cold, scared and exhausted. They were too nervous to eat but they did drink some coffee."

La Paz Was Quiet, Sanford Man Says
The city of La Paz, Bolivia, was quiet last week, according to Fred Wilson, local attorney, who had visited his daughter, Mrs. William Leary, at her home there.

"I saw no signs of anti-American feeling while I was in La Paz," Wilson said. "I met a delightful lawyer and doctor who were very friendly. Of course, I wouldn't have understood if people had made anti-American remarks."

Rioting broke out in La Paz after Wilson had returned to Sanford.

Wilson said he felt the situation couldn't be "too serious," as his daughter and her husband left unharmed for Asuncion, Paraguay, during the days of demonstration. Leary is an engineer, and went to Paraguay on business.

During his South American visit, Wilson journeyed to Cochabamba, former home of the Learys, and flew to Santa Cruz. Mrs. Leary is the former Frances Wilson of Sanford.

2 Students Chosen For Talent Search

The boys were selected when they demonstrated exceptional ability during a national science talent search. They will present oral reports before a jury of representatives from institutions of higher learning in the state.

During the last day of the meeting, Dinkins and McKibbin will be informed of fellowships, scholarships and assistantships available to them in the represented institutions.

15 Persons Killed In Airliner Crash
MANAGUA, Nicaragua (UPI)—A British-made prop-jetliner crashed near here Thursday, moments after takeoff, killing 15 of the 19 persons aboard. Four of the dead were American.

Two American stewardesses, Nancy Niegoda, of Mannington, N. Va., and Laura Hirono, a naturalized American from Hamilton, Ont., escaped serious injury but were hospitalized for treatment of extreme shock.

The four injured Viscount was outbound from Managua to Honduras and El Salvador at the time of the crash.

The pilot, the copilot and two passengers—all killed in the crash—were identified as Americans.

They were Capt. Alfred M. Vint, Memphis, La.; second pilot, Marcus Daler, (address unavailable); Kenneth Kilpatrick, Luckey, Tex.; and Joseph Rhodes, Gastonia, N. C.

Cleveland Given Committee Post

Train Bears Down, But He Can't Win
GAINESVILLE, Ga. (UPI)—The train was bearing down on A. Z. Armour, 33, decided to take leave of his automobile.

Nikita Determined To Run West Out, Diplomats Declare

LEIPZIG, East Germany (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev's postponement of his May 27 deadline for the West to quit Berlin merely postpones the Berlin crisis and does not ease it, Western observers said today.

Observers who heard him speak Thursday got the impression he is in deadly earnest about forcing the West out of Berlin. They saw nothing in what he said to indicate any new prospect of a cold war agreement on anything but his own terms.

In his second Leipzig speech Khrushchev offered to postpone beyond May 27 his plan for turning over control of West Berlin's lifelines to the East Germans if the West is "negotiating sensibly" by then—possibly through a foreign ministers conference.

But behind his speech was as tough and uncompromising a cold war challenge as he ever delivered.

He warned the West that if it continues rejecting his own terms he will go ahead and sign a separate peace treaty with Communist East Germany and told the West not to consider using force in the Berlin crisis.

Once the Soviet Union signs a peace treaty with East Germany the West will have no more legal right in Berlin, he said. The 1945 Potsdam agreement on Berlin's occupation rights will no longer be valid, he said.

Eight Marines Die In Crash Of Plane
CHERRY POINT, N. C. (UPI)—A Marine Corps flying boat crashed and burned early today while trying to make an instrument landing during a violent rainstorm. Eight of the nine men aboard were killed.

The plane, whipped by heavy winds and blinding rain, crashed into a dense swamp only a few yards from a busy highway.

Names of the eight victims were withheld pending notification of next of kin.

The lone survivor was identified as Sgt. Ralph Mauro Jr. of Ipswich, Conn. He was a radio operator in the crew of six aboard the transport plane which also carried three passengers.

Mauro was listed in "critical" condition of injuries suffered in the crash.

If the band receives "superior" in the concert and no less than excellent in marching and drill, it will qualify for the state contest.

Juveniles To Get Blaze Jury Trial
Four Negro juveniles who confessed to setting an abandoned cinder block house on fire will have a trial by jury next week.

Judge Wilson Alexander said that after a hearing yesterday the two younger boys (both nine) were sent home in the custody of their parents.

The others (11 and 12) were sent back to the county jail until next week.

Eisenhower Given Pledge Of Support

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Eisenhower gave congressional leaders of both parties a 90-minute fill-in on the Berlin crisis today and received a pledge of united support for his firm stand.

"The upshot is that we are united," Speaker Sam Rayburn said after the White House conference. "We don't have parties in this thing."

"We think with the President that we must be firm and remain so," Rayburn said.

Rayburn, Senate Democratic Leader Lyndon B. Johnson, Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen and House Republican Leader Charles A. Halleck conferred with the President.

Endorsing Rayburn's comment, Halleck said that while this nation is going to remain firm in the Berlin dispute, "every honorable avenue for peace will be explored."

Johnson said, "It would be foolish to pretend that we do not regard it as a matter of concern." Johnson also said the Communists will discover that the U. S. is "determined to preserve the free world."

He said there is "no thought of yielding to pressure," but that this country is willing to negotiate with the Soviet Union about the future of Germany.

Eisenhower conferred with the congressional chiefs after the White House announced that he and British Prime Minister Harold Macmillan would meet here March 20 to discuss the Berlin problem. Macmillan has just ended talks with Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev.

Track Fan Charged In Ticket Change
An Orlando man was charged with forgery yesterday when two cashiers at the Sanford Orlando Kennel Club accused him of changing numbers on pari-mutuel tickets.

Broadus R. Swafford posted \$50 bond after affidavits were filed with Judge Wilson Alexander by Charles H. Pearson and Don T. Reynolds.

The two said Swafford changed the numbers on two tickets Wednesday night, and tried to collect \$128 on them. The cashier noticed the tickets had been altered. He called a deputy sheriff when Swafford walked away from the window after being asked to "wait a minute," according to Judge Wilson Alexander.

John Frazier Dies In West Virginia
John W. Frazier Sr., 63, died at his home in Belle, W. Va., Tuesday morning after a short illness. He was a member of the Church of Christ, veteran of World War I, and a frequent visitor in Sanford.

Survivors include his wife, Mrs. Georgianna Frazier, Belle; two sons, John W. Frazier Jr., Sanford; Wendell D. Frazier of Los Alamos, Tex.; two daughters, Mrs. Jean Morris, Belle; Mrs. Shirley Stone, Sanford; three brothers and two sisters.

Funeral services will be at 2:30 p. m. Sunday at the Church of Christ on 2nd and Elm Ave. The Rev. George Yates will officiate. Burial will be in Oaklawn Memorial Park. Henson Funeral Home is in charge of local arrangements.

Public Complains About Quiz Calls
Complaints have been pouring into city offices and the Chamber of Commerce about a local telephone gimmick.

Residents are protesting the "Tel-O-Quiz," a game where easy questions entitle the answerer to purchase \$50 worth of merchandise certificates for \$3.00.

The \$30 is a "service charge." The \$50 in merchandise, passes and service contain items like "one flat tire repaired free" and "one spaghetti dinner free with the purchase of another."

The certificates are legal, the advertising agency legitimated, but City Manager W. E. Knowles said, "We don't approve of the methods of selling, but the operation is legal. People have to use their own common sense. If someone tries to sell you the Brooklyn Bridge, you should buy it."

Police Chief Roy Williams remarked, "We have received many complaints about the Tel-O-Quiz. There seems to be misunderstandings about the merchandise offered, and people are confused and annoyed."

Knowles said the Adkins Advertising Agency, conducting the quiz, is licensed to operate only within the city limits.

'Clean' Taxpayers May Be 'Cleaned'
CROSSVILLE, Tenn. (UPI)—Attorney J. B. Redmond wants nothing to be taxed so a pension can be provided to all Tennesseans over 60 years of age.

Redmond announced Thursday he has asked State Sen. Halley Boehman to introduce a bill which would call for a yearly levy of \$5 on all bathubs, showers and even half-baths.

Proceeds from this tax on cleanliness would be paid out in pensions to persons who have lived in Tennessee for 60 years, taken baths in the state for 40 years and paid taxes for the preceding 20 years.

Persons owning property valued at more than \$50,000 would not be eligible.

Redmond admitted that he drew up the proposal in anger. It is his way of protesting new legislation that would extend the retirement benefits of judges to their widows.

Shad Seine Seized By State Officers
An illegal shad pocket seine was discovered at 1 a. m. today in Mullet Lake Park.

Wildlife officer Harry Hervish and conservation agents C. A. Willis and C. V. Holland converged on the seine at the same time, as all three patrolled the waters.

The 125-yard net was confiscated by the State Board of Conservation agents, after the few shad captured had been released. The seine apparently had just been set. It was unattended.

Holland said the patrol was part of a routine check.

Literature Postmark

Is Hurting Sanford

Sanford and Seminole County spend a great deal of money to build a good reputation. The city and county advertise advantages of the area in national publications. New industry is being sought to provide more jobs for our people, more payrolls for our merchants. Retiring citizens and tourists are sought. Such efforts can be destroyed, however, by seemingly "small" things. There is no doubt that Sanford is being hurt at present by a postmark on anti-integration literature mailed to heaven knows where. Cartoons, depicting the "inevitable result" of school integration, are going through the mails. Envelopes have no return addresses, the literature, naturally, is unsigned. The envelopes, however, are postmarked "Sanford, Fla." Most local residents have thrown the literature in the waste basket without hesitation. Yesterday, however, two students from Florida State University, Tallahassee, visited The Herald in an effort to find the source of the literature. Some 30 to 40 sheets of the cartoons had been mailed to a fraternity at FSU. One student said that FSU students did not view the literature favorably, so far as Sanford is concerned. Since it carried a Sanford postmark, they concluded that Sanford is a headquarters for such rabble-rousing. The students were unable to determine the source. They said the local post office was unable to help. In their opinions, Sanford is getting a bad name, unjustifiably, from such actions. It is probable that the sender of such trash viewed his actions as education, and in behalf of segregation. He probably never thought of the possible damage. He couldn't have thought too much of his work, however, had he, there would have been a name and address attached. An interesting sidelight to the literature: it was printed by a firm in New Jersey. Good, solid Southerners, no doubt.

Growing Pains Again

Another of Seminole County's industrial firms is planning an expansion. York Manufacturing Co. will break ground March 14 for a new building. When the company occupies its new quarters, the employe total will be increased. York has brought, and is bringing, world-wide publicity to Sanford. It manufactures fish landing nets, television antennas and aluminum display racks. Sanford and Seminole County are exhibiting that industry is welcome. York is another prime example of the opportunity available in this area for new plants. Success stories are the rule.

Local Control Asked In Mix

ST. AUGUSTINE (UPI)—A former state educational policy official today called for local control of Florida's public schools to enforce segregation without complete shut-down of classrooms.

Fred H. Kent, Jacksonville attorney, said if this procedure were followed, only those counties directly involved in integration litigation would have to close their schools to prevent desegregation.

He said state control of education might mean closing all schools in Florida if one county decided it should shut down to prevent racial integration.

Addressing the local Rotary Club, the former Board of Control chairman condemned the so-called "Daytona Beach Manifesto" in which several key legislators resolved to enact a law to shut down all state schools in the event of court-enforced integration.

"No such bill should ever be enacted into law in Florida," Kent said. "This is exactly the type of law which brought integration to Virginia," he said.

He also said the bill would be unconstitutional and "the state courts themselves" would throw it out. "Such a law would play right into the hands of the NAACP," he said.

Kent, who has been mentioned as a possible candidate for governor in 1960, also criticized Gov. LeRoy Collins for failing to "exhaust all of the legal remedies at his disposal for maintaining segregation before permitting integration at the University of Florida."

The veteran attorney said the Legislature also should broaden its pupil assignment law and initiate a tuition payment law "along the lines suggested by Attorney General Richard Ervin."

He said he considered two recent speeches on the matter by Asst. Atty. Gen. Ralph Odum "the finest exposition of the law on that subject which I have read."

At Cascade, Wis., a snow-laden tavern roof collapsed Sunday night after 800 persons attending a 50th wedding anniversary celebration fled out of the building unhurt.

Witnesses said a rumbling overhead gave warning to evacuate the Sheboygan County building.

The heaviest snow Sunday night and early today occurred in upper New York near Lake Ontario, where both Buffalo and Rochester reported two inches of new snow.

Forecasters predicted snow or snow flurries from the Dakotas eastward across the Great Lakes to southern New England, with three to six inches expected to accumulate in upper New York.

The rain coincided with a warming trend which boosted overnight readings from 10 to 20 degrees from the Gulf states into the Ohio Valley and the lower Great Lakes. Generally fair skies prevailed in the West.

Produce Man Dies In Shotgun Ambush

TAMPA (UPI)—A 40-year-old Tampa produce man was shot to death from ambush early today as he walked toward the front door of his home.

Police said Bennie Lazzara was killed instantly from approximately five shotgun blasts. His wife, who was at his side, was not injured.

Officers said they could find no motive for the gangland-style slaying. Lazzara, they said, was not known to be connected with any underworld activities and was a respected partner in the produce firm of Lazzara and Valenti.

Mrs. Lazzara said she and her husband arrived home early today after visiting with friends Sunday night. She said they had not stepped from their car and were walking up the sidewalk when the gunfire began.

Lazzara slumped dead on the lawn. Police said the gunman apparently sped off in a car parked in a nearby alley.

13 Cubans Given Castro 'Justice'; Total Now Is 416

HAVANA (UPI)—The execution of 13 war criminals over the weekend increased the unofficial toll of Cuba's revolutionary firing squads to 416—16 more than the 400 premier Fidel Castro had estimated as the maximum.

Four men were executed in Palma Soriano, three each in Santa Clara and Pinar del Rio, two in Holguin and one in Camaguey.

In the eastern provincial capital of Santiago, 43 firmen acquitted of "genocide" last week were sentenced by a special military tribunal to prison terms ranging from 2 to 30 years.

Nineteen pilots were sentenced to serve 30-year terms, 10 gunners were sent to prison for 10 years each, and 14 gunners drew 2-year terms.

Ex-Resident Jailed For Stealing Auto

Glenn Lavone Spivey, 31, was arrested by Sanford police yesterday and turned over to Sheriff's authorities.

Officers said the former Sanford resident had stolen a car in Covington County, Ala. Warrants are being sent for grand larceny and forgery from Sheriff M. E. Meredith of Covington County.

Winter Flexing Muscles Again In North And East

Winter flexed its muscles again today with snow squalls swirling across the already overburdened Great Lakes region and a warning of heavy snow in upper New York state.

South of the snow, rain fell during the night from Mississippi north to Illinois, the Ohio Valley and the lower Great Lakes.

The new snow, generally light, came on top of one of the worst late season snowstorms in decades in parts of the Midwest. The storm last Thursday and Friday dumped up to 30 inches of snow across northeast Iowa, Wisconsin and Michigan's upper peninsula. At least 46 deaths were blamed on the storm.

Many secondary roads in the storm area remained blocked by giant drifts, but most main arteries were open at least in one-way traffic.

At Cascade, Wis., a snow-laden tavern roof collapsed Sunday night after 800 persons attending a 50th wedding anniversary celebration fled out of the building unhurt.

An Editorial
The Florida Symphony Orchestra will present a concert in the Sanford Civic Center tomorrow night.

A count of the tickets sold reveals that the 80 persons in the orchestra might outnumber the persons attending.

The City Recreation Department isn't too worried about the financial success. The sale of patron tickets, the \$500 for the free children's concert, underwritten by Odham & Tudor, and the programs assure officials that proceeds will be within about \$100 of expenses.

However, many of the purchasers of patron tickets do not plan to attend. Sales of tickets for the general public have been almost nil.

The Florida Symphony plans to present a program of popular music, for the first time in its history. Selections will be rendered from "My Fair Lady," "Oklahoma," "South Pacific" and other popular shows.

For those who like it on the "heavier" side, it will be available.

The Civic Center auditorium seats 1,500. If the Florida Symphony is faced with 1,200 or more empty seats, Sanford will suffer a cultural blight of momentous proportions.

More than 1,000 empty seats will be very hard to explain.

West Will Lose, Khrushchev Says

BERLIN (UPI)—Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev predicted today the Western allies soon will lose their rights in Berlin and that communism will defeat capitalism "without war, without war."

Khrushchev made the confident predictions during a brief courtesy visit to East Berlin's Communist-run City Hall where he scribbled in the guest book "I express the belief that in no distant time all Berlin will be free of the remnants of the occupation regime."

Then in a short formal speech he predicted the eventual triumph of communism "without war." He had called a few hours before for "peace, peace and again peace," but it was a peace on his own rigid terms.

Informed Communist sources said the Soviet leader would present his plan for peace at any future East-West conference on Berlin—but that he would not back down in his determination to turn West Berlin's access routes over to the East German Communists.

Khrushchev met today with Erich Ollenhauer, leader of the West German Socialist Party in an apparent attempt to win him over to the Soviet viewpoint and to undermine the authority of West German Chancellor Konrad Adenauer.

Ollenhauer has opposed many of Adenauer's policies in the past but has sharply rejected Khrushchev's views on making West Berlin a "free city" surrounded by Communist territory.

Arnold Probst Sr. Succumbs At Home

Arnold William Probst Sr., 78, died Friday afternoon in his home at Cowan-Moughton Terrace.

Mr. Probst was a retired mill worker, and came to the Sanford area from Cleveland, O., in 1951. He moved to Cowan-Moughton Terrace in January from West First St.

Probst, Sanford; one son, Arnold Probst Jr., Fairview, O.; three daughters, Mrs. Kathleen Bueck, Parma, O.; Mrs. Caroline Humble, Homestead, Fla.; O., and Mrs. Ruth King, Berea, O.; two brothers, John Probst, Sanford, and Fred Probst, Columbia Station, O.; one sister, Mrs. Emma Colten, and several grandchildren.

Air Alert Slated When It's Needed

WASHINGTON (UPI)—The United States will put atomic bombs on continuous airborne alert as soon as the Soviet missile threat requires it, a high administration source said today.

On such an alert a certain number of Strategic Air Command jet bombers armed with nuclear weapons and guided missiles would be in the air at all times.

The purpose would be to prevent the planes from being targets for destruction on the ground and to be in the best position to react to attack, thus increasing the deterrent to war.

Gen. Thomas Power, SAC commander, touched off a controversy when he told the Senate preparedness investigation in January that he would like to get an air alert going as soon as possible. The Defense Department denied a report that Power had been turned down to save money.

Sen. Stuart Symington (D-Mo.) and Rep. Daniel J. Flood (D-Pa.) later demanded that SAC keep some of its planes in the air at all times. Power had warned that with the "zero warning time" of a missile attack Soviet rockets might destroy his planes on the ground.

Like several military leaders who were consulted, the administration source has no immediate need for a large-scale around-the-clock bomber patrol. He said it might not be needed for a year or more.

Civil War Flares After Overthrow

BEIRUT, Lebanon (UPI)—Civil war erupted today in Iraq between a heavily armored revolutionary army regime and the leftist government of Premier Abdel Karim Kassem.

The government forces sent a fleet of bombers against the revolutionary headquarters of Col. Abdel Wahab Shawaif in the northern Iraqi city of Mosul and the rebels began a march on Baghdad.

The exploding crisis turned into open warfare 24 hours after Shawaif proclaimed a revolutionary command in Mosul, 250 miles north of Baghdad, aimed at deposing the "traitor Kassem."

Kassem's regime has strong Communist support and the new Middle East blowup could involve both East and West.

Mosul radio, mouthpiece of the army revolt in north Iraq, announced that "aircraft of Kassem are flying over the city of Mosul and bombarding it."

It announced at the same time the revolutionary forces are heading for Baghdad and said the rebels were picking up strength along the way. The rebels were known to have one of the strongest army units in Iraq.

The rebels appeared to be gaining ground in the north, the oil-producing center that supplies much of the world's oil.

The radio transmitter at Suleimaniyah, 200 miles east of Mosul, went on the air in the insurgents' support calling for another march against Baghdad. Kirkuk, center of the vast oil fields, lies midway between Mosul and Suleimaniyah.

Baghdad radio announced early today the revolt had been "crushed" and Shawaif shot by one of his own men but the broadcast apparently was erroneous.

Judge Is Witness To Traffic Crash Of Rare Vintage

The city judge witnessed an accident at 25th and French this morning and rushed the injured to a local doctor's office for emergency treatment.

Two women and a baby were riding north on French Ave. when another vehicle attempted the crossing. The cars collided, one was knocked into the front of a tractor-trailer on the east side of French Ave. The truck bed fell from the struck car, spilling a five full of bees. Few escaped, however.

The women were identified as the wives of Milford Lettys Calhoun and Harry H. Calhoun, of Warren, Pa. Their husbands are in the city jail for stealing a golf bag from the Mayfair Inn.

The five-bearing car was driven by Thomas Russell Alford, an ACEI employee from Sanford. Charles Smith Jr. W 118 St. was the driver of the tractor-trailer. Smith was waiting to cross west on French when the accident occurred.

Alford was charged with failure to yield the right of way. Police officers said a request had been made repeatedly to the State Road Department for a light at the dangerous intersection.

Trial was held for the Calhoun brothers Friday afternoon under Judge Ambrose Oliff, who will sentence today's accident. The men were fined \$227 each or 60 days in jail.

The doctor's examination revealed no serious injuries. The baby suffered a few bruises, and the women were "shaken up," police said.

Aiken Gets Calls Meant For Adkins

Among those receiving protesting phone calls about the Adkins Advertising Agency is a local advertising man.

Dick Aiken, of the Aiken Advertising Agency, said that people were calling him, thinking his firm was the one calling local residents in a merchandising gimmick.

Aiken said, "Although there is some similarity in names, there is no connection between our agency and that of Adkins. We are a local firm. They are from out of town."

The Herald received a protest from J. Adkins of the agency conducting the "Tel-O-Quiz," after an article in Friday's paper. Adkins and he had a license to operate in this county, the county and the state.

The article stated that the agency was licensed to operate only in the City of Sanford. A license for the Adkins Advertising Agency was not on file this morning at the county tax collector's office.
