Agricultural Eleven Runs Wild In Beating Carolina, 32-0

ATLANTA, Oct. 26.—(INS)—Clemson College, the famous seat of agricultural learning in a the South Carolina hills, stood at the front of the Southern Conference today after wrecking the undefeated South Carolina eleven 32-0.

It had been admitted by most observers that Clemson might get a victory over the competitors of Chicago, Virginia and Maryland for no easy feat had yet stepped across the Clemson goal line. But the fury of the Tiger attack smashed every most radical prediction.

Head Coach Josh Cody, former Vandy star and assistant to Don McGiffin, has in two years yanked Clemson out of "the cellar" of conference football into a commanding position.

And from this point on the Clemson Tiger must be favored in most of its conference games. The Tiger now looms far stronger than Ole Miss or V. M. I. their next two foes. A battle royal certainly will develop later on at Tampa when Clemson meets the vigorous scoring machine from University of Florida November 17. Ole Miss, it is said, unless Florida can halt them, the Tigers are just about due to finish with a perfect conference record.

Clemson leads Southern Conference teams now in point of season record with six victories and no defeats. Vanderbilt, Tennessee, Georgia Tech, Florida and L. S. U. have not tested their strength in any of their conference games. On a rating strictly with conference teams, Tech, Clemson, Tennessee, Kentucky, Florida, Vanderbilt, V. M. I. and L. S. U. have a perfect record. Georgia plays its first conference game Saturday against Tulane.

Frank Miller gives it as his firm belief that the city tax millage will be lowered to twenty in the next budget while the assessed valuation will also be reduced. Mr. Miller is a smart man and probably figures better than some of us do, but we hope he is right.

The primary object of most of the political speakers we have heard seems to be to tell as many lies about the other candidate as possible. Both Smith and Hoover seem to be presidential timber, and they would not have been nominated, and it is hard to believe that either of them could be an low-down, cunning, mean and sneaky as everyone says they are.

There seems to be an epidemic of hydrophobia going the rounds of canine and feline Florida. Jacksonville, Tampa, and Miami have all had their mad dog scares within the past ten days. There is no need to worry about your stand, but here and out of their way, don't get bitten. If you do, consult a doctor. If you have a pet, showing really love, keep him off the streets.

Our Reputation At Stake

Among all the states of the Solid South, the two which are attracting most attention as likely to go for Hoover are North Carolina and Florida. North Carolina, because of the large number of Republicans there, and Florida, we regret to say, because of the religious element of the campaign.

Florida normally is at least two to one Democratic. Although a great many northerners have moved to this state within the past four years, this ratio could not have been greatly reduced as almost as many Georgians and Alabamians have also come here. Though the population may reach two hundred and fifty thousand over twice as many as in 1924, there should be twice as many Democratic votes as Republican.

If there are not, we in Florida will know there are several reasons, or a combination of circumstances, which deflected many Democrats from their custom of voting the straight Democratic ticket. We will know at least we will believe that Al Smith's stand on prohibition, his attitude toward immigration, and his selection of the wet Republican Raskas as his national committee chairman, had as much to do with his religion to do with his deflection.

Winter visitors to this state, northern capitalists, political writers, and Republican leaders will not know this at least, they will not admit it. In the private conversation of all the big men of the country, in the talk on the sidewalks of the cities, in articles in all the newspapers in the North, in the magazines of the country, it is a broadside that Florida bolted her party because of the religious prejudice and intolerance of her citizens.

We can think of no black eye, which, the comeliness of her beautiful but battle-scarred visage might receive, that would react more strongly against her. The salt days of the boom and the crashes of the bust, the big blows of 1926 and 1927 with all the deaths and devastation that they caused, are all the unfavorable publicity which she put out over the country following these events, would have nothing to compare to the disgraceful stigma of religious intolerance.

It would be as if Florida, progressive Florida, ahead of the rest of the country in most things, had suddenly gone back three hundred years to New England's intolerant days of witchcraft trials when persons who acted "peculiarly" or who smiled on Sunday, were burned at the stake. It is incredible that our people could vote against Al Smith because he worshipped his God as his mother taught him.

They may say they will now, but when they go into the booth to mark their ballots, we do not believe they will allow Al Smith's religion to stand between them and their party.

Navy Day

Today is Navy Day and while no local celebration will commemorate the date, many of the larger cities throughout the country will join in observance of a day that has been set apart to praise our fighting forces and the record they have made over a period of a hundred and fifty years. Most of us know in a general way that Uncle Sam has one of the most powerful navies in the world but that is practically the extent of our knowledge.

Since so many of us have only a small conception of the historical facts forming the colorful background of our navy, perhaps it would not be amiss at this time, when we should be giving some thought to the subject, to recall a few of its triumphs. For instance, how many of us know that the United States Navy has had only four fleet actions, and in each has captured and destroyed every enemy ship. Few, too, we believe, recall their history sufficiently to remember that the American navy is the only navy in the world that owns a royal standard by capture, taken at York, Canada, by Commodore Chauncey.

No United States naval ship has ever been in the hands of mutineers, while in other navies whole squadrons and fleets have been thus commandeered. In the war of 1812 the Navy captured or destroyed every ship put in the Great Lakes by Great Britain. Another notable achievement of that during the same war the U. S. Constitution captured a total of eleven hundred prisoners, which are more than the entire American navy lost for the duration of the war. Interesting, too, is the record which our Navy holds for the capture of seventeen British ensigns in one day in the battle of Lake Champlain.

Navy Day commemorates the passage of the first appropriation of \$100,000 for the American sea forces by the Continental Congress in 1776. By coincidence the date is also the anniversary of the birth of Theodore Roosevelt, whose appreciation of the American navy as a protector and defender of our interests here and abroad was reflected in frequent public utterances. His memory and thoughts of the glorious history of the Navy should on this occasion arouse within us a deeper sense of patriotism.

SMITH ON TARIFF
