Trapped Gas Poses Explosion Threat

County fire officials, two state agencies and the Winter Park Telephone Company are dealing with a potentially explosive situation in which an undetermined amount of gas from an underground source is trapped underground on State Road 43 just east of West Lake Bentley Road.

The gas is concentrated in an area under the Bay Service Station driveway and gas pumps extending into State Road 43.

The hazardous situation was discovered by the telephone company when gas vapors were detected in its conduit, which runs underground between the road and the service station, according to Gary Kaiser, Seminole County director of public safety.

County officials began an investigation of the gas odor

and called in the state fire marshal's office; the department of transportation; and the public service commission.

"As long as the gas remains underground, it does not pose an immediate danger, according to state and local officials. However, if it mixes contact with oxygen and an

approach, noted Nelson, is that eventually the gas may rise through the ground and pose an immediate threat of explosion.

On the Bay Service Station land are three underground gasoline tanks with a capacity of 22,000 gallons. There are also above-ground tanks.

Kaiser has classified excavating as a last resort.

"It's not a case of procrastination," declared Kaiser. "It's just a process of eliminating the various alternatives so we maximize the chances of making the right decision. The state fire marshal's office has suggested we excavate the ground, but I have told them that is totally unacceptable at this point."

Kaiser explained the excavation would create a dangerous possibility of an explosion.

"We could seal up the conduit," said Kaiser, "but the problem would only prolong the problem."

6-Month Manhunt Nets Pfeil Slaying Suspect

Terry Michael Sims, the man who allegedly fired the shots killing sheriff's department reserve deputy George Pfeil, has been arrested in San Diego.

The two men already in custody for the robbery-murder have pleaded guilty to lesser crimes in exchange for giving testimony in the case.

They are: Curtis Thomas Baldree, 46, who was in back of the Longwood Pharmacy filling a pillowcase with drugs when Sims, at the front of the store, allegedly shot Pfeil; James Anson Halseil, 23, who provided a getaway car used after the murder.

Baldree pleaded guilty April 18 to charges of reckless display of firearms and attempted grand larceny and was sentenced to two years in the Seminole County jail.

Halseil pleaded guilty May 1 to robbery charges and sentencing was deferred while he remains in the custody of the

sheriff's department at the jail.

Pfeil had just completed patrol of an Altamonte Springs community where he was employed by the homeowners association and was still in uniform as he stepped into the pharmacy.

Four shots were fired, two by Pfeil and two by his murderer, according to police. Pfeil was shot in the heart and the face. Baldree and Sims, according to the sheriff's department, left the drugstore and stole a car, driving and abandoning it at the rear of nearby Springwood Village Apartments.

The pair fled on foot to a waiting car and escaped from the area despite an intensive search by more than 300 law enforcement officers representing agencies throughout Central Florida.

'Abuse' May Be Key In Slaying Trial

Friends of Eloise Warren recall violent beatings the woman received at the hands of her husband for 19 years — Eddie Ray Warren.

And at a preliminary hearing, the 26-year-old woman's attorney, Jack Bridges of Sanford, indicated the pattern of wife abuse in the Warren household will play a main defense role if Mrs. Warren stands trial for the June 16 slaying of her husband.

Evidence of wife abuse in murder cases has resulted in several women being acquitted. In recent years these cases have drawn nationwide attention.

In South Dakota, Orlando Hoon Eagle got into an argument with his wife Marlene, who was seven months pregnant. He picked up a broom handle and as he was about to hit her, she picked up a butcher knife and stabbed him. She was acquitted.

In Lansing Mich., Francine Hughes claimed that years of physical abuse by her four-year-old son resulted in her sleeping ex-husband and light. A jury acquitted her on grounds that she was temporarily insane.

In Chicago, Juan Maldonado had been drinking when he began beating his eight-year-old son with a shoe. His

wife Gloria shot him three times. The state attorney ruled there was insufficient evidence to prosecute the case.

In California, Evelyn Ware pleaded self-defense after shooting her ex-husband five times. Accepting her evidence of habitual beatings, a jury found her not guilty of murder.

"He used to enjoy pounding on her for no reason at all," said Caroline Hays, a longtime friend who worked with Mrs. Warren at the Lahrview Nursing Home in Sanford.

Mrs. Hays said Mrs. Warren worked at the nursing home for a year and she recalls the day the Sanford native was fired for not reporting to work.

"I saw her coming up the driveway. Her eye was badly bruised," Mrs. Hays said. "She didn't want to go in, she was crying."

"I don't want to go in and let them see me like this," Mrs. Hays quoted her as saying.

"We've been together several times and he'd begin hitting her for no reason," Linda Dennis, who has known Mrs. Warren for nine years, said. "He was jealous, he didn't want her to have any friends. He wanted her to stay home," she said.

Ms. Dennis said the beatings have been going on for as long as the two women have been friends. The beatings would usually result in black eyes and facial bruises, but on one occasion several months ago it was more serious, Ms. Dennis said.

"She had a big lump with a hole in it from when he beat

her for no reason at all!

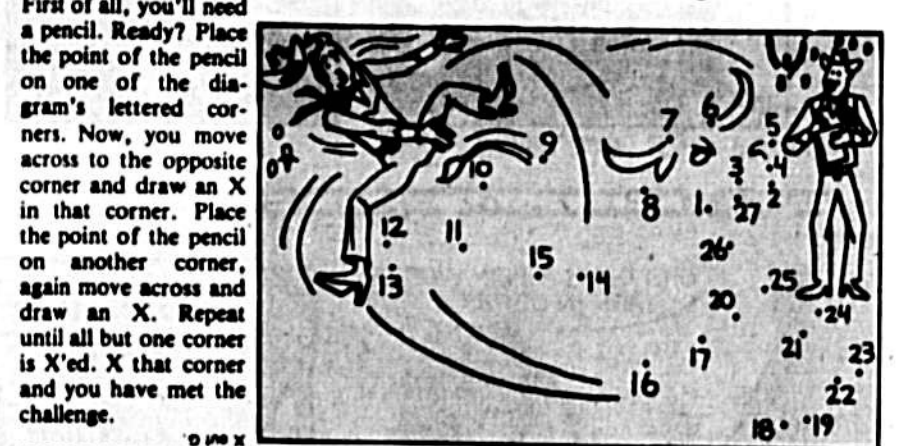

Fired Building Officer: Helpful Or Not?

Lake Mary Zoning Administrator and Building Official Francis Jenior, fired by the city council last week effective July 6, was on the job today as usual.

"I told the council I would stay through the notice period," said Jenior, who has been employed by the city for the past four years and receives an annual salary of \$11,730.

Jenior was fired Thursday on a 4-1 vote after Councilman Pat Southward accused the building official of helping some citizens and not helping others.

Meanwhile, Carl Nice and Ralph Neff, whose names were

used by Mrs. Southward in making the motion to fire Jenior contending that the building official was very helpful to Nice and less helpful to Neff, said today Jenior is not the focal point of the problems within the five-year-old city government.

"Francis is not the problem," said Nice. "I don't know whether the problem is the inexperience of some of the council members or whether some councilmen just want to bulldoze their way through. Some just don't like the way Francis operates, want him to bend the rules and he won't. He has the code to enforce and he does enforce it."

"Francis won't do anything that is against the law," said

Neff. "I'm not saying the others would, but I do know there was a discrepancy about water on Linda Lane and that Francis wouldn't approve it. The city council was not happy about that."

"The city is a headache. I wish I knew what to do," said Neff. "Since I don't know what to do, I just live in the city and go along with it. I'm not proud of that," he said.

The Linda Lane problem, according to Mayor Walter Sorenson, involved a private utility, Utilities Inc., which installed a water line to two houses on Linda Lane "without so much as a by-your-leave from the city. The utility did ask Councilman Harry Terry (utility department commissioner) and he said he didn't care. It was only Terry's personal view. Francis decided that was not permission for the company to proceed."

"The company knew damn well that Terry's remarks did not constitute authorization to do anything," said Mayor Sorenson. Sorenson said the problem was resolved when Jenior refused to issue a certificate of occupancy for a new house on Linda Lane and the utility requested and received from the council a certificate of convenience to operate within the city limits.

Nice said that Jenior showed him no favoritism. "He has been nothing more than help-

'Francis is not the problem...'

Leftist Bomb Ruins Millions In French Art Treasures

VERSAILLES, France (UPI)—Leftist terrorists today bombed the Versailles Palace, destroying millions of dollars of irreplaceable art treasures on three floors of France's most famous landmark.

Police said two radical leftist groups claimed responsibility for the bomb, made of several pounds of dynamite or plastic explosive and planted on the ground floor Gallery of Stoves during a public fireworks display Sunday evening.

Worst hit was the Gallery of Battles—a monumental colonnaded hall with dozens of

oversize murals depicting famous battles in French history from the days of the Roman conquest to Napoleonic times.

The explosion ripped a 30-foot wide hole in the gallery's ceiling, wrecked all its crystal chandeliers, shredded seven large murals, and made splinters of priceless antique furniture. One night watchman was slightly injured.

The concussion also ravaged seven Empire rooms reopened recently by President Valery Giscard d'Estaing in the left wing, and cracked walls and ceilings on the second and

third floors of the white stone 17th century palace built by France's Sun King, Louis XIV, and greatly enriched by Napoleon.

"This is a crime... a frightful thing. It is a great loss," said Gerald Van Der Kemp, chief curator of the palace.

"Damages are very, very heavy... perhaps going into the millions of francs," one police official lamented.

One guard told police the gate bell rang about an hour before the 2:00 a.m. blast. He said no one was at the gate, but saw the dark figure of a man in the distance standing

motionless, gazing at the palace before disappearing into the darkness.

The chief custodian of the palace — France's No. 1 tourist attraction — said at first police officers on duty at first didn't believe him because there had been so many crank calls in the past.

Two clandestine leftist groups — the "International of Unemployed" and the "Revolutionary Workers Group" — claimed in telephone calls they had planted the bomb.

The attack coincided with mounting tensions between French leftists and rightists on the eve of "Euro-Right" conference of

leaders of rightist factions from France, Italy and Spain, all opposed to Marxism.

An anonymous telephone threat to police at 9 a.m. (3 a.m. EDT) today warned a time bomb would destroy the Grand Triumphant palace — a red marble palace built by Louis XIV in the park of the Versailles castle.

Police searched for visiting chiefs of state, but found no explosives.

Hours after the Versailles explosion, armaments tried to set fire to La Madeleine Hall, where "Euro-Right" leaders were to hold a rally Tuesday.

The 39-year-old Warren called police himself to report the stabbing at 11:30 p.m. on Thursday.

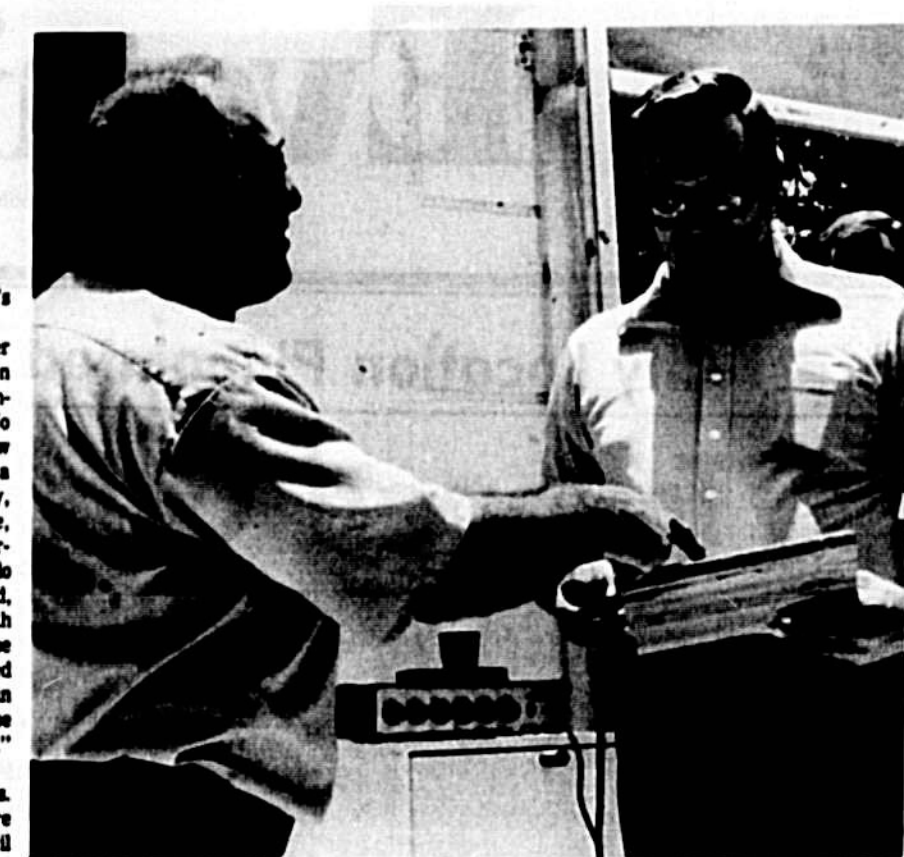

Nazis March, But Militants Stand 'Em Up

CHICAGO, Ill. (UPI) The Nazis held another rally Sunday, but nobody came.

Frank Collin's band assembled under heavy police protection at its South Side headquarters, bracing for an expected confrontation with the militant Jewish Defense League, none showed.

The brown-shirted Collin stood outside the door to his headquarters, scratching his balding head.

Twenty miles away in the village of Skokie, about 300 Jews and Christians gathered to pay tribute to victims of the Nazi Holocaust in World War II.

Collin's Nazis had threatened to demonstrate in front of the Skokie village hall on Sunday, and up to 50,000 counter-demonstrators were expected to confront them.

At last, the Nazis are marching, whether we are caught in the "Holocaust or not," said Rabbi Maurice Lamm of Los Angeles.

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No Faith
In President?

It is a disquieting sign of our times that some of our congressmen and senators should suggest more credence for Fidel Castro's denial of Cuba's role in the invasion of Zaire than for the President's word to the contrary.

This is not to say that President Carter should go unquestioned about foreign policy or anything else. But we find it not only ridiculous but damaging that congressional critics of the administration's toughening response to Communist aggression in Africa should deny overwhelming evidence and dispute Cuban complicity in the Shaba province bloodshed.

It is ironic that these critics are mostly Democrats. During his June 14 press conference, President Carter patiently explained the basis for U.S. criticism of Cuba, as he has done on several previous occasions.

He simply pointed out that Angola, whence came the invaders, is a vassal state over which the Cubans exercise military and political control.

There are, he indicated, more than 20,000 Cuban troops occupying Angola with about 4,000 of these based in the invasion staging area. Mr. Carter pointed out that Mr. Castro, by his own admission, knew of the invasion beforehand and failed to stop it, as he could easily have done, and he failed to warn Zaire and other nations.

None of these factors is in dispute. The decisive fact is that the Katangans could not have mounted such an invasion without training, supplies—and consent—from the Cuban high command in Angola.

Nevertheless, Cuba's altogether-expected-denial was enough to send Congressmen Anthony Beilenson, D-Calif., and Stephen Solarz, D-N.Y., scurrying to Havana for a seven-hour personal interview with Fidel Castro.

"President Castro makes a very compelling case," Congressman Solarz proclaimed upon returning to this country. U.S. evidence "is not compelling and certainly not conclusive," said Congressman Beilenson.

We are reminded of a recent headline in an Eastern newspaper, "Pravda, McGovern Betrays Brzezinski About Africa." This capsules the role of Sen. George McGovern, D-S.D., as a leading critic of administration foreign policy in the Senate.

If these Democrats and others on Capitol Hill have no faith in their president and must seek information from abroad, one wonders why they don't consult Free World allies instead of Communist defendants.

For example, the French ambassador to the United States, Francois de Lauboulay, said recently that France has direct evidence of Cuba's involvement in Zaire by way of captured Cuban weapons.

The Beilenson-Solarz-McGovern muddying of waters, which Soviet and Cuban propagandists is exploiting worldwide to our disadvantage, is another painful example why Congress should stick to its constitutional role of advice and consent in the making of foreign policy.

Liberals Warn Carter

WASHINGTON—There was a familiar ring to the warning from Democrats for Democratic Action that President Carter faces the loss of liberal support for 1980 unless he shifts leftward over the next two years.

Back in April, 1977, the ADA convention issued a similar ultimatum to President Lyndon B. Johnson over the war in Vietnam, a warning LBJ ignored. Within a year, opposition to the war had reached such a pitch that Johnson withdrew from the 1968 presidential race.

Liberal disenchantment with Carter has been sharpened by the president's recent embrace of Cold War rhetoric and return to fiscal conservatism in the wake of passage of Proposition 13 in California.

In fact, only the restraining influence of ADA national leaders—including outgoing chairman George McGovern—kept the convention's final resolution phrased as a mere warning. Some delegates had wanted to press for adoption of a "dumb-Carter" resolution, even though it is still more than two years to the next presidential election.

ADA Vice President Joseph L. Raab Jr., a Washington lawyer and civil rights activist who has consistently been one of Carter's harshest critics, argued it is too early to write Carter off as a dead loss to liberals.

"Harry Truman swung sharply to the right after the 1948 Republican landslide and stayed there throughout 1947. But in 1948, he moved left again. Carter may yet do the same thing," Raab said.

Unless Carter starts fulfilling some of his liberal campaign promises, however, Raab and other ADA leaders predicted that a "Draft Kennedy" effort will develop by the time next year. "If there isn't, we'll have to have our own convention last weekend. Teddy Kennedy would have won overwhelmingly," he said.

Republican hopefuls, meanwhile, continue to jockey for position in 1980. Raab, along with one eye for Carter and the other on the mounting list of contenders within the GOP.

Bush has already traveled to some 30 states, and will no doubt visit more between now and the November congressional elections. He makes no bones about his presidential ambitions, although he stops short of an outright declaration of candidacy. "I know inside what I want to do but it's too early to make a decision," he said during a recent trip to Washington.

Carter insists his determination, expected to come either late this year or early in 1979, will not be affected by the plans of other Ronald Reagan or Gerald Ford.

"My chances might not be unaffected by their actions, but my decision will," he said. Another GOP presidential prospect, Sen. Howard Baker Jr., is taking in candidates for his Tennessee reelection campaign from a lot of "heavy hitters" of earlier Republican campaigns.

Whistleblower's Case Finally Closed

WASHINGTON—The curtain has finally come down on a drama that began nine years ago in a small Pentagon office. The FBI acted out the final scene, which ended in an abortive investigation of one of the Air Force's favorite generals.

The drama began in the bureaucratic cubicle of Ernest Fitzgerald, an indefatigable efficiency expert, who exposed Air Force cost overruns totaling billions of dollars. The Air Force was not grateful; it reacted by firing Fitzgerald.

The lonely guardian of the taxpayers' money sought a hearing in Capitol Hill. Suddenly, the vast powers of the Pentagon were mobilized to discredit his testimony and to destroy his reputation. False, scurrilous rumors about him were circulated by the Pentagon in the press galleries and Capitol corridors.

The information for the smear attack came from anonymous informants identified only as T-1, T-2, T-3 and T-4. The mysterious T-1, we can venture, was Col. Hans Drismack, a tall, distinguished-looking officer with light, cropped hair. His friends called him "Whitney."

For the next several years, Fitzgerald fled in the courts for reinstatement, and Drismack moved into the military firmament. The conscientious whistleblower who was tried, cost-cutting court battle. The man who tried to ruin him

became a general, now awaiting his third star from the Senate Armed Services Committee. The promotion was held up, we have learned, pending the outcome of an FBI investigation. The FBI examined allegations that Drismack committed perjury four years ago when he got his first star.

Then-Sen. Harold Hughes, D-Iowa, demanded that Drismack clarify his role in the Fitzgerald case before the Senate would approve his promotion to brigadier general. In a sworn affidavit, Drismack stated: "Beyond my role as an Office of Special Investigations (OSI) interviewee, I played no part in any OSI or other investigation of Fitzgerald. I had absolute no connection with any effort to terminate Fitzgerald's position."

Source close to the FBI investigation tell us that the affidavit did not appear entirely with the facts. They claim that Drismack had actually initiated the investigation by falsely charging Fitzgerald with a conflict of interest.

As a defendant in a lawsuit Fitzgerald filed against his Air Force oppressors, Drismack acknowledged that he "was aware" of two other sources who actually drew one of them, a Pentagon worker named John Rodin, to the OSI office for questioning.

This would seem to contradict his sworn Senate statement. Apparently, Drismack must

Too Much Oil For Awhile

The good news is that the price of oil on the world market is going to remain at \$12.70 a barrel for a spell.

That is about five times what it was five years ago when the oil producers liberated pricing from the restrictions of supply and demand.

The not-so-good news is that price stabilization is only temporary. It could last out the year, but certainly not much longer.

The Organization of Petroleum Exporting Countries concluded its recent Geneva pricing session with good guys—in the Western point of view—Saudi Arabia and Iran carrying the argument for a price freeze.

Travel agencies should take care of the argument for a price freeze. Iraq, Libya and Algeria, among others, had pushed for an immediate boost to counter the erosion of oil income which is a result of continuing depreciation of the dollar—a situation, it should be noted, to which ever-higher oil prices have made their very substantial contribution.

Something more than Western interests is involved in Saudi and Iranian caution, however. There is currently a glut of oil on the world market, and a buyers' market as to time to try to squeeze more out of a buyer.

The Saudis are reported to believe that curtailed production should take care of the surplus problem in six months or so. Once supply and demand are back in balance, consuming nations can be confronted with an offering price they'll be in no position to refuse.

The reason for the current oversupply is in part OPEC overproduction, but also in significant part the coming out of the market of increasing quantities of oil from other sources—principally Alaska and the North Sea.

This is Western oil, and should improve the West's position in dealing with OPEC. It is also very expensive to produce. It is economic in very great part because of the artificially high price the OPEC countries have set for their product.

If OPEC is in a situation to raise prices when supply and demand are in balance, it conceivably could also drop them in a price war that the new Western producers would quickly lose.

It is a situation fraught with possibilities, none particularly encouraging for Western economies.

An incident made some news pages a few months back concerning a Saudi prince who transgressed Moslem prohibition of extramarital love affairs. She was stoned and her lover beheaded.

More recently, the story came out of a U.S. businessman who fled Saudi Arabia in disgust after having been fined \$2 million for violating extramarital prohibitions with a Saudi woman.

And just the other day was a brief item on two employees of a Los Angeles engineering firm who were fired by Saudi keepers of the peace and public morals. They were guilty of cooking up a little home brew, a violation of the Moslem ban on alcohol for which each reportedly received 70 strokes of a cane.

Mrs. Dancy Facing Airing On Murder

Jacqueline Ann Dancy, 20, faced a first court appearance today at 1:30 p.m. at Circuit Court in the Seminole County Courthouse Annex. Mrs. Dancy was booked in to the Seminole County Jail Sunday for first degree murder.

SHE was brought back to Seminole County after waiting extradition procedures in Biloxi, Miss., where she was taken into custody Thursday. Mrs. Dancy, formerly of Fern Park, is being held in connection with the New Year's day shotgun and strangulation murder of her 29-year-old husband, Coast Guard Petty Officer Edward Dancy. Also being held in connection with Dancy's murder is 36-year-old Charles Ira Hackett, formerly of Longwood.

According to investigators, Mrs. Dancy and Hackett were lovers who plotted to kill her husband and two motorcycles and \$25,000 in insurance money. Despite a change in her hair, detectives in Biloxi spotted her picture among several identification cards for persons working in the Longwood entertainment field. Mrs. Dancy was working as a dancer at the Sahara Lounge in Biloxi. Mrs. Dancy, who confessed to murdering her husband alone in a letter first revealed in the Evening Herald, has returned to the Seminole County area for a fraudulently leasing respiratory equipment.

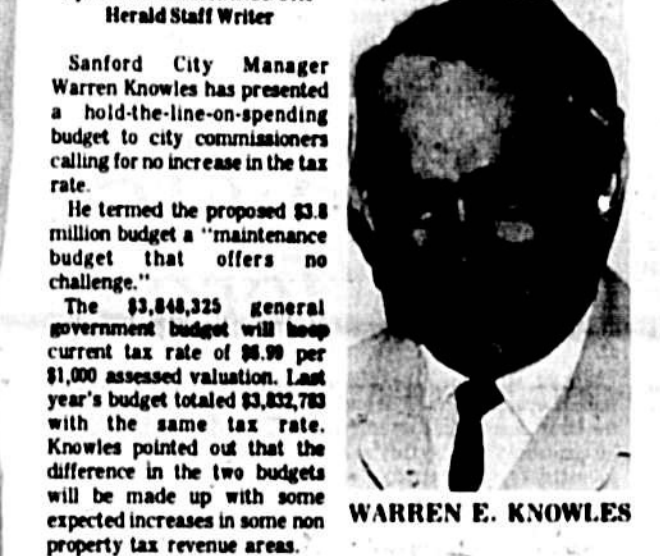

78-79 Sanford City Budget: No Tax Increase Proposed

Sanford City Manager Warren Knowles has presented a hold-the-line-on-spending budget to city commissioners calling for no increase in the tax rate. He termed the proposed \$3.8 million budget a "maintenance budget" that offers no challenge.

Other anticipated revenues are for the proposed general budget: real estate \$962,000 down from \$1,027,461; utility service tax \$833,000 down from \$901,000; interest earned up from \$4,000 to \$18,000; refuse collection down \$50,000 up from \$17,500; Marina franchise \$4,500 up from \$6,000; motel tax refund \$13,000 up from \$13,500 and telephone franchise \$20,000 up from \$19,300 and penalty and interest on delinquent taxes \$1,000 up from \$50.
