Split decision

State Supreme Court calls for recounts; Seminole, Martin absentee votes stand

SANFORD — A day of legal roller-coaster rulings breathed new life into Vice President Al Gore's hopes of capturing Florida's 25 electoral votes Friday and set the stage for another showdown between Florida's high court and the U.S. Supreme Court.

By a vote of 4-3, the Florida Supreme Court overturned a ruling by Leon Circuit Judge N. Sanders Sauls denying a manual recount sought by Gore in Palm Beach and Miami-Dade counties.

The court ruled that an immediate recount of some 14,000 votes in the two counties should begin. Justices further ruled that manual recounts could be conducted in any Florida county where undercounted votes were an issue and issued a third ruling that 215 votes picked up in Palm Beach County by Gore after

certification deadlines and another 168 votes from a partially completed recount in Miami-Dade County should be added to Gore's total, leaving him just 154 votes short of overtaking George W. Bush.

Bush's attorneys immediately filed papers with the U.S. Supreme Court, asking the nation's high court to stay the

Florida Supreme Court decision. Their suit will challenge the Florida court ruling on the basis it changed election law following the November election and has no legal controlling authority to order a manual recount.

The day's volatile court rulings began at 2:15 p.m. Friday. Leon County Circuit Court Judge Terry Lewis, who presided over the Martin County absentee ballot case, and Judge Nikki Clark, who presided over the Seminole County absentee ballot case, issued a joint ruling.

Publix withdraws request for incentives

Company dislikes Lake Mary's offer for annexation

LAKE MARY — PublixDirect, an Internet distribution business, has indicated it will withdraw its application for economic incentives to locate in the city.

City Manager John Litton informed City Commission Thursday the company decided to withdraw its application based on the city's request to annex the Lake Mary Village shopping center. However, the city manager said, "a set of plans has been submitted for review for the same piece of property, which is basically a footprint of what Publix had been discussing."

"They are just not willing to include the annex," Litton said.

In November, a delegation from Publix approached City Commission about a proposed distribution and fulfillment center to be constructed in Northpoint Technology Park off of Skyline Drive. The planned facility includes a 140,000 square foot distribution center and, if built, will have an estimated capital investment of \$17.3 million and create 277 jobs over four years with an average salary of \$31,000.

The company asked Commission to consider an eco-

Conference center tops county agenda

Commissioners may decide how much funding to set aside

SANFORD — The Board of Seminole County Commissioners Tuesday will consider partnering with the city of Sanford in the development of a Conference Center project on the city's

Riverwalk.

If the board approves the idea, steps to develop a formal Request For Proposal would begin.

On Nov. 14 the city of Sanford outlined its formal proposal to the county. Included in Sanford's part of the package would be a provision for 7.9 acres of land on the city's waterfront valued at \$2.7 million for a Conference Center site. The city would also design and construct

a number of public improvements to attract developers, including design and construction of a \$3.4 million Riverwalk, improvements to Ft. Mellon Park, and streetscape linkages from the Riverwalk to downtown Sanford.

The city currently has \$500,000 in this year's budget for design of the improvements and another \$190,000 to start Park improvements and streetscape linkages. Another

\$2.9 million in Riverwalk construction funds would be available in 2002/2003 from the Florida Department of Transportation. However, the City has said it would be willing to start improvements in Fiscal Year 2001/2002 and accept reimbursement from the Department of Transportation in later years.

If the county agrees to the

Sanford businessman John Daniels dies

SANFORD — John F. Daniels, Jr., educator, community leader and local entrepreneur, died Monday, Dec. 4.

Mr. Daniels was looked upon as one of the most respected leaders of the Sanford and Central Florida communities.

Born May 22, 1922, in Sanford to the late John and Rose Daniels, he received his high school education at Crooms Academy.

Daniels furthered his education at Florida A&M University where he received a Bachelor of Science Degree in agriculture. After serving in the U.S. Army in World War II, he returned home from the invasion of Iwo Jima. After his military experience he taught and worked for the State Department of Education, as well as the Orange County School Board.

Daniels desire to become a businessman led him to attend the school of automotive engineering in Talladega, Ala., where, after completion, he opened his own businesses on West 13th Street, including Daniels Standard Service Station, Home

Fuel Delivery, Laundromat, Daniels Real Estate, Rental-Sales. The home fuel delivery service continued even after he retired. When he was unable to work daily, he often spent time downtown, where he was seen by many of the citizens still taking care of his business with his lovely wife of 56 years, Jeanette Miller Daniels by his side.

Daniels will be missed in the community of Sanford, but his lovely pleasant smile, his always helping hand and the desire to make Sanford a better and more

Election 2000 provides youth with first taste of political activism

TALLAHASSEE — Maurice Brown won't quickly forget the 2000 presidential election.

Never mind the controversy surrounding the outcome, for Brown the Nov. 7 election marked the beginning of his civic activism.

Like many of his generation, Brown hadn't bothered to follow politics or the issues of the day. His interests were focused on good times and fast cars. That began to change in March. As his 26th birthday approached, Brown set career goals and realized there were bigger issues to ponder. On Nov. 7 he cast his first vote, and Wednesday he participated in his first political rally at the state capital.

"I'm never going to forget this day," Brown said on the bus ride back from

Tammy Coleman and her husband, Jeff, have opened Tammy's Custom Bakery at 202 S. Sanford Avenue.


A Volusia County resident, Tammy's been in the business for 20 years, and she chose Sanford over Mt. Dora.

Why Gore should continue the fight

The call for Al Gore to concede is likely to rise to deafening levels. Enough already, people will cry. Let's move forward. We're sick of court briefs and chad and ballot irregularities. Gore ought to acknowledge he lost, quit trying to steal the presidency and salvage at least some last shreds of dignity and honor.

We are a nation that shouts at a microwave oven to hurry up. We're like great white sharks that die if they don't keep moving. But if there has ever been a time for patience, it's now. We need to play this string to the end, not only because it is Gore's prerogative but because exhausting all legal options is the best way to bolster the fragile legitimacy of George W. Bush's presidency.

Gore truly believes he won this election. He won the national popular vote. He knows that a number of Florida's votes have not been counted and that those votes would swing the election in his favor. His belief was reinforced over the weekend by an analysis commissioned by the Miami Herald. The study said that Gore would have won Florida by 23,000 votes if the state had counted all ballots that were discarded because they showed no vote for president or more than one vote for president.

Stephen Doig, the Arizona State University professor who conducted the analysis of voter patterns, said even if 90 percent of the uncounted ballots were excluded on the assumption that those voters were voting only for state and local offices, Gore would still have won by 1,443 votes.

How can Gore let go of something he believes is rightfully his? And wouldn't he be betraying a commitment to his supporters if he didn't contest the results as vigorously as possible?

In researching his book "The Prince of Tennessee: The Rise of Al Gore," co-author David Maraniss asked the vice president what he learned from Bill Clinton. Never give up, Gore said.

"It really is what he learned," Maraniss said yesterday from his Washington, D.C., home. "But he's not Clinton. He doesn't have Clinton's luck or fluidity or skill at negotiating these sorts of political events. That combination will end up doing Gore in."

Maraniss is surely right, but Gore will keep fighting. Politically, there is little if any advantage in conceding now. He has nothing to lose. This is his one shot at the presidency. He will never again be nominated. He was a poor candidate who turned off even some staunch Democrats with his slippery, condescending manner and Zelig-like incarnations. If he couldn't decisively beat a lightweight like George W. Bush in a time of great national prosperity, he's probably not the strongest possible candidate for president in 2004. He didn't even carry his home state of Tennessee!

"He knows this is his one and last chance," Maraniss said.

Bush's running mate, Dick Cheney, has already called on Gore to concede. He said history will regard Gore "in a better light if he were to bring this to a close in the very near future." History has never been very kind to runners-up.

Whether Gore concedes now or in two weeks will make no difference to historians. But it could make a difference to Bush. If Gore concedes before the courts settle the ballot disputes, Bush might be viewed forever as someone who slipped into the White House through the back door. At least if all the legalities are settled, no one can dispute that Bush is the legitimate winner.

So let's be patient. We can tolerate another few weeks.

Courtroom is no place to honor heroes

Even as we commemorate the 1941 entrance of America into World War II this month, a few malcontents are keeping this country from saying a long-overdue thank you to the World War II generation. On Nov. 11, even as Americans gathered to break ground for the much-anticipated National World War II Memorial on the Mall in our nation's Capitol, some ungrateful people made plans to disrupt work on the project. They sued to delay construction, after seven years of thought and planning for the memorial.

The decision-making process encompassed 18 public hearings over the last five years, more than enough time for a good decision on the design and location. Opponents of the site and design were heard at every step. The process was fair. It's ungrateful to ask the courts to undo what a fair, open and lengthy process has determined - that there is no better place than the Mall to honor the generation that preserved our freedom.

When completed, the

memorial will be a lasting tribute to an entire generation which drew strength from the very same values that inspired the colonial citizen-soldiers. The cause of democracy prevailed as a result of the unflinching courage of 16 million World War II GIs - 400,000 of whom gave their lives in military service.

The American Legion and its affiliated organizations - the American Legion Auxiliary and the Sons of the American Legion - donated about \$4 million for the National World War II Memorial. The American people exceeded the fund-raising goal by a long shot, which demonstrates the people support the design as well as the Rainbow Pool site on the Mall.

The memorial's design and location are appropriately first rate. Not only will it permanently recognize the entire World War II generation that saved the world from tyranny, but it will also be a reminder of one generation's exemplary devotion to principles of freedom, justice and equality.

By its completion date, this memorial will have taken more than twice as long to create as it took U.S. and allied forces to win the war. It will have taken from 1993 to 2003. That is, of course, if the project is not mired in courtroom battles.

We have taken too long to memorialize our fallen World War II heroes and we have certainly waited far too long to say "thank you" to the men and women of our greatest generation.

Millions of our World War II heroes have already passed on, and we lose more each day. It's time for protesters to leave the courtroom and to join hands and hearts with the millions of their fellow Americans to pay homage while we still can. Let's emblazon our gratitude with a thank you note in stone.

nomic incentive package totaling \$166,200 with annual disbursements of \$41,550 given to the company during a four-year period beginning in FY 2003. According to Tracy Grygiel, who serves on the state's Economic Development Commission, PublixDirect was seeking a local incentive to help the company offset start-up expenses and improve their cost benefit analysis.

She also said other sites were being considered for the facility, which would basically serve as a warehouse distribution center for people ordering groceries over the Internet, including Dade County and Tampa. Although the city's economic development incentive policy has expired, City Commission said it would discuss establishing a new program and consider PublixDirect's request. The company was also advised the

incentive award would be approved on the condition that Publix officially supports the annexation of its Lake Mary Village store. Although PublixDirect refused to support the annexation and withdrew its application for an economic incentive award, Litton suggested Commission discuss developing a new policy in an upcoming work session.

joint venture, Sanford would retain the services of Hunter Interest Inc., to assist in the Request for Qualifications/Request for Proposal process. That process would include the generation of as many responses possible from the local and national market, assistance in eliminating unqualified responses, site visits to examine similar projects developed by qualified companies, drafting a comprehensive Request for Proposals document for candidate developers to respond to, reference checking, and negotiating development agreements which could be transformed

into binding contracts. In addition to a funding commitment from the commission, the city would also be looking for input decisions and refinements on the conference center's size and level of amenities. County Tourism Director Jack Wert will make a staff presentation to the commission, outlining option levels for the board's consideration. "County staff will be looking for some direction on how the commissioners want to go on this proposal," said Wert. "If no decision comes from Tuesday's meeting at the least we hope to have a firm direction of where we are going on the conference

center." Sanford is seeking a commitment of about \$600,000 per year to help get the center built and running. Wert said one of the options presented to the board Tuesday will be a commitment of \$400,000 per year. "That \$600,000 level represents a pretty negative hit on our source of funds for tourism advertising and marketing," Wert said. "The \$400,000 level would be less of an impact on our future resources." Without county participation and funding at some level, it is unlikely Sanford would move ahead with a formal Request for Proposal.

Wild animals help teach middle school students about environment

Can we save the endangered species of the world? It has happened before. The American alligator was the first endangered animal to be taken off the endangered species list. But it didn't happen overnight. And, it didn't happen without educating the public.

That's what Bonnie Rainbow and Joan Buccì do. As part of the Florida Outreach Program, they educate the public about one of the most endangered species in the world — the Florida panther.

Unless you have been close to a Florida panther, you cannot imagine how beautiful they are — and, how familiar. A panther sounds more like a large house cat. It is the only member of the large cat family that purrs.

Bonnie and Joan brought a Florida panther named Venus to meet the seventh-grade students at Greenwood Lakes Middle School. As much as the students wanted to, petting Venus was not allowed. It is important to remember that all wild animals can be dangerous.

A Florida panther can jump 10 to 12 feet high. They can run up to 38 miles

per hour and are 8 to 10 times stronger than a human. Even with all that strength and the way humans have encroached the panther territory, there has never been a recorded instance of a Florida panther attacking a human.

The Florida panther is actually a subspecies of mountain lion. Although similar, each subspecies is genetically unique. There are more than 20 subspecies of mountain lion.

The South American puma is closest genetically to the Florida panther. The western cougar is next genetically and there have been attempts to cross breed the Florida panther with the Western cougar, but cross breeding actually produces a new subspecies, not a Florida panther. Artificial insemination has been tried, but for unknown reasons, that has been unsuccessful.

What we can do is preserve the habitat where Florida panthers live. They no longer roam the whole state. Fewer than 50 are believed to live in the wild. There hasn't been a sighting in Lake Mary in almost 30 years.

At birth, a Florida panther will weigh about 12 ounces. He's blue eyed and spotted with 5 rings around his

tail. As he grows, the spots will disappear, the eyes will turn brown and the rings around his tail will turn into a black tip. And, although people have reported sighting black panthers in Florida (as have reported seeing the swamp ape) the Florida panther cannot produce black cubs because they do not have the genes for it.

Bonnie and Joan brought other friends for the students to meet.

One friend was Squiggy. Squiggy is a two and a half-year-old American alligator. Bonnie pointed out Squiggy's webbed feet. The webbed feet are actually to help the alligator walk on land.

Even a small alligator such as Squiggy could take off your little finger. They have an incredible amount of power in their jaws. And, if you feed an alligator, they don't think "Wow, people are nice, they give me food." They think people are a source of food and therefore edible. That's why it's illegal to feed alligators. Alligators who are not fed by humans are afraid and will avoid them. And, alligators are good for the environment. Like snakes, they eat a lot of rodents.

Speaking of snakes, Bonnie and Joan also brought in one of those. Fire is the name of a red rat snake.

Rat snakes eat rats and eggs (they

can swallow something three times the width of their mouth). They can be found in trees or on the ground. Red rat snakes are very good snakes, so they should be left completely alone.

The venomous snakes in Florida are the rattlesnake, the pygmy rattlesnake, the cottonmouth (or water moccasin) and the coral snake. Bonnie showed the students a picture comparing the similarities between the king snake — a very good snake to have around — and the coral snake.

Bonnie said the best thing to do is to leave all snakes alone. You can't be too careful. All venomous snakes are poisonous from birth. Rattlesnakes can reach out half their body length to strike you. And, snakes do not have to be coiled to strike. Just leave snakes alone, they're good for the environment and if you don't bother them, they won't bother you.

Bonnie also introduced the students to Fred. Fred is a squirrel Bonnie rescued after he fell from a tree. Bonnie will release Fred back into the wild after he has fully recovered.







St. Johns may impose strict water restrictions

SANFORD — As if we didn't already know it, officials from the St. Johns Water Management District are warning that Central Florida is short on rainfall.

From November 1999 through October 2000, Sanford has had only 33.32 inches of rain. This is 15.49 inches below the normal amount. St. Johns' officials say this shortfall only happens once in 50 to 100 years. DeLand is short by 20.14 inches of rain, which is listed as once in 100 to 200 years, but Daytona Beach is only 4.96 inches short of the average.

If rainfall doesn't begin to increase, SJWMD says the watering restrictions will have to be increased.


"We are in a serious drought," said Hal Wilkening, director of the District's Department of Resource Management. "Rainfall deficits, like we have in the Central Florida area, typically are only seen once every 100 to 200 years. Many lakes depend on rainfall as their sole source of water. Others are connected to the aquifer (groundwater source) and are therefore declining along with the groundwa-

ter." The low water level is not only in small lakes, but can be easily seen on Lake Monroe, where the marks caused by average water levels are well above the actual lake level, seen on the breakwalls along the Sanford waterfront.

"Water use increases and groundwater levels drop during the spring and summer due to landscape irrigation," Wilkening said. "Last summer, more than 20 sinkholes developed in the Central Florida area, and drop pipes and three pumps had to be added to private wells. We anticipate even lower groundwater levels for the spring of 2001. By issuing a water shortage order before we enter the time of peak water use, we hope to avoid these problems before we start."

At the present time, the SJWMD rules call for no landscape irrigation for golf courses, agriculture, and commercial, industrial and residential water users.

If it is determined to be necessary, a water shortage order is expected to be issued, possibly by next month. All categories of water users will be considered for water shortage restrictions.



The low water level in Central Florida, due to the lack of normal rainfall, can readily be seen by water lines along the Sanford shore of Lake Monroe. Water levels have been lower during the past months and years, but not for the present length of several months at a time.

This would add restrictions to landscape irrigation for golf courses, agriculture, and commercial, industrial and residential water users.

At the present time, Sanford Project Administrator Bill Marcus says users of city potable and reclaimed water may irrigate only Monday, Wednesday and Friday, if their residences have evenly num-

SJWMD restrictions. No irrigation may be done on Sundays.

Currently, the Southwest Florida Water Management District, also undergoing a severe rainfall shortage, allows watering only one day per week, and even they are considering more severe restrictions. In Central Florida, the SJWMD is considering similar changes to once per week.

Wilkening said lawns need watering only twice a week in warmer months, and only once every two weeks in the cooler months. "Two-thirds to three-quarter inches will foster deep root growth," he explained, "which will prepare the lawn for drought conditions."

District hydrologists are expected to call for new restrictions within the next few weeks, if there is an increased likelihood that there will not be enough water available to meet anticipated demands or to protect the water resources from serious harm.

Public Notice is hereby given for implementation of the County Environmental Assessment, which was originally approved on October 21, 1987 and revised on September 19, 1993 by the Federal Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The description of activities to be undertaken during fiscal years 2001-2005 is as follows:

Eligible activities covered by the FONSI for fiscal years 2001-2005:

1. Countywide eligible projects, activities and capital improvements for the replacement and installation of equipment, building renovations, installation and rehabilitation of existing drainage, water and sewer connections, and development of new facilities where applicable and in CDBG/designated low income target areas.
2. Countywide HOME related activities, these activities are involved in the delivery of safe and decent housing units to eligible very low and low income residents. Also, to provide counseling and outreach programs. Acquisition, demolition, housing replacement emergency repairs, rehabilitation and new housing construction activities.
3. Countywide ESG homelessness prevention activities and homeless shelter assistance. These activities are involved in the delivery of emergency, transitional and/or permanent shelter, outreach and homelessness prevention activities.

FINDING OF NO SIGNIFICANT IMPACT (FONSI)

It has been determined that these programs, projects and activities will not constitute an action significantly affecting the quality of the human environment. Accordingly, Seminole County will not prepare an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) under the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) of 1969. Such a statement will not be provided for the following reasons:

2. The County has reevaluated its Environmental Review Records and it has determined that the respective surrounding environments will not be impacted by the approved 2000-2005 Consolidated Plan. No substantial changes have been made in the above Environmental Review Records. Moreover, there have been no changes in the proposed program planning and development phases as already documented in Format II, Environmental Assessment checklists that were prepared in previous years.

3. The proposed programs, projects and activities will conform to all Federal, State and local land development regulations, including the National Environmental Policy Act of 1969, as amended.

4. Environmental Review Records on the above mentioned programs, projects and activities have been prepared by Seminole County which documents the environmental review of the proposed activities and fully sets forth the reasons why an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) is not required for the above programs, projects and activities proposed within the 2000-2005 Consolidate Plan.

The above mentioned environmental review records are on file and are available for public examination. Copies may be obtained via writing a request to Room 3301 of the Seminole County Services Building 1101 East First Street, Sanford, Florida 32771, between the hours of 8:30 AM and 5:00 PM, Monday through Friday, except on legal holidays.

Further, Environmental Assessment Checklists, Environmental Review Records and/or Environmental Impact Statements of such activities might be proposed and/or conducted prior to the request for the release of Federal funds as necessary for compliance by Seminole County with NEPA and all related laws and authorities cited in 24 CFR Part 58. Moreover, environmental reviews will be made for activities with unspecified sites such as housing related activities, activities having an emergency need and/or activities having any alteration of existing environmental conditions, or the creation of a new set of environmental conditions.

The Environmental Review will consist of a review of the strategy statement and completion of an environmental checklist that will work in tandem with a review of the environmental impact of each activity selected, as described in 24 CFR 58, Environmental Review Procedures for CDBG and Housing Programs.

Activities not for compliance with the environmental checklists, the National Environmental Protection Act, and other related Federal, State, local environmental laws and authorities, shall not commence until an Environmental Assessment is prepared and a Finding Of No Significant Impact (FONSI) and Request For Release Of Funds (RROF), are executed.

All interested agencies, groups and persons disagreeing with this decision are invited to submit written comments for consideration by the County to the Seminole County Planning and Development Department, Community Development Office, located at 1101 East First Street, Room 3301, Sanford, Florida 32771. Such written comments shall be received at the above address on or before January 2, 2001. All such comments received will receive a written response.

This Notice is intended to meet a procedural requirement: a Finding Of No Significant Impact (FCNSI) for the 2000/2005 Consolidated Plan.

All interested parties and citizens disagreeing with this action may submit written comments to the above County address or by mailing written comments and objections directly to HUD at: Regional Environmental Clearance Officer, Room 500, Department of Housing and Urban Development, Atlanta Regional Office, 75 Sprint Street, SW Atlanta, Georgia 30303-3388.

HUD will not consider any objections to the Finding Of No Significant Impact (FONSI) on the basis other than those stated above. HUD will not consider objections after fifteen (15) days from the date of this Notice or after January 2, 2001.

stating that the sanctity of ballots had not been impugned by the actions of GOP representatives in either situation.

Legal challenges in Martin County were mounted after discovery that Republican representatives had inserted missing voter identification numbers on 10 thousand absentee ballot requests. The Seminole County absentee ballot case, involving 15,000 ballot requests, was similar in nature. Longwood personal injury attorney Harry Jacobs filed suit, charging Supervisor of Elections Sandra Goard and the GOP of voter fraud and collusion by allowing GOP workers to use the election office to likewise complete absentee ballot requests by inserting missing voter identification numbers. absentee ballots, which would have resulted in thousands of Bush votes being tossed, more than enough to swing the election to Gore.

Both judges ruled that while irregularities occurred

in the handling of the absentee ballot requests, the voting ballots themselves were not materially affected.

Moments after the joint ruling, Jacobs said he was not sure where his suit would possibly go next, or if he would appeal.

"Of course, we're disappointed about the decision," Jacobs said immediately after the circuit court rulings were announced. "I think we will appeal, but right now we're reading the opinion. We're not sure what our next step will be at the moment."

Appeals to either the Martin or Seminole County cases would be heard before the Florida Supreme Court, which handed Gore his most significant victory late Friday afternoon.

While both Gore and Bush

reeled from the mixed rulings, literally across the street in Tallahassee, the Florida General Assembly was gathering to begin a historic special session to select the state's 25 electors.

With a December 12 elector certification deadline fast approaching, House Speaker Tom Feeney and Senate President John McKay were preparing a resolution in both Houses for an anticipated Wednesday vote that would select a slate of electors to cast Florida's 25 votes for Bush on December 18.

While many Democratic faithful stuck by Gore's side during the month-long legal skirmish following the November 7 election, many were privately saying Gore should concede if handed defeats in the Florida cases.

The favorable ruling by the Democratically flavored Florida

Supreme Court virtually guarantees the fight for Florida's electoral votes and the nation's 43rd presidency are far from over.

With the December 12 clock ticking on the certification date for Florida's elec-

toral votes, the possibility exists the state could have two conflicting sets of electors, thus throwing the ultimate decision on who gets Florida's electoral votes and the next presidency squarely in the hands of the U.S. House of Representatives.

On Monday of this week the U.S. Supreme Court vacated the Florida Supreme Court's decision last week that extended the state deadline for election certification and allowed hand counting of some ballots that cut Bush's election night total lead from 930 votes to 537 votes. As the weekend unfolded it appeared likely the U.S. Supreme Court would again review and possibly over rule the latest actions by Florida's high court.

Kids test skills driving after bad guys

SANFORD — Sony's PlayStation 2 may be among the hottest kids Christmas gifts this year, but it pales in comparison to the video reality experienced recently by Hamilton Elementary 4th-graders Sarah Garcia and Tyler Groves.

The pair of precocious 10-year olds climbed behind the wheel of a Driving Test Simulator during training sessions at the Sanford Police Department.

With sirens wailing and lights flashing, they tried their collective hands at chasing bad guys in scenarios ranging from hit-and-run accidents to putting the pedal to the metal while going after convicted felons armed with hand guns.

"It felt like I was really driving," smiled Garcia after ditching her patrol vehicle in a grassy field with a blown out tire.

"It's far better than a video game," said Groves who had a tough time avoiding oncoming traffic while in pursuit of a hit and run driver.

While the video simulation was fun and games for the Hamilton students, the week-long session at the Sanford police department was all business for the men and women in blue.

Using a three-dimensional system designed by En-Mark Inc., the driving simulator provides officers with a wide range of behind the wheel training situations. At a hefty price tag of \$100,000, the driving simulator is too expensive for most municipal police departments to purchase, so En-Mark leases it to police agencies on a weekly basis for training purposes.

The company has also developed training video training simulators for field firearms training and is also in the process of engineering a fire fighting simulator.

Public Information Officer Cleo Cohen explained the driving simulator is mainly for liability protection.

"Officers cannot use their vehicles for 'practice' emergency situations. The simulator is the only way to react correctly while driving in adverse or dangerous driving conditions."

Some features that can be programmed into the driving simulator via a software package include adjusting the program for day, night, dusk and dawn conditions; icy roads and rain-soaked conditions.

While one officer trains behind the wheel, another can program the simulator to throw any number of variables at the driver,

including tire blow-outs, low oil pressure, high engine temperatures, merging traffic situations, sudden stops by other vehicles, and position oncoming traffic to veer into the path of traveling patrol cars.

Part of the "reality" of the simulator experience is that the video trainer is configured to provide the driver with a field of view of 260 degrees, forcing the driver to use both side mirrors and rear view mirrors to monitor road conditions and traffic.

The experience is so real that

several officers experienced slight cases of vertigo while rounding corners at high speeds and spinning out.

Following practice test drives under ideal conditions, Sarah and Tyler then got to chase after a "bad guy" who left the scene of a hit-and-run accident.

Their job shadowing experience with the Sanford police department came as a result in the participation of Hamilton Elementary's BESTT Program, an acronym for Business-Education Sharing-Thought-Talent.

Police investigating jewelry heist at mall

SANFORD — Sanford police continue their investigation this weekend into a smash and grab jewelry heist Thursday at the Seminole Towne Center Mall. The robbery netted five thieves more than \$135,000 in men's and women's watches.

Shortly after 6 p.m. Thursday four suspects described as young black males wearing gloves, hooded jackets and sun glasses entered Mayor's Jewelry Store at 141 Towne Center Circle. They proceeded directly to a glass case containing Rolex and Omega watches and began

smashing the case with hammers. Two of the suspects then began removing watches. A customer inside the store began to yell, "Help, police robbery," when one of the suspects shouted to the other robbers, "Just shoot him."

According to investigators the suspects then exited Mayor's and ran back toward Parisian where a mall security guard gave chase aided by an employee from a nearby store. The four suspects then entered a white 2000 Nissan Maxima driven by a fifth man. As the suspects were entering the car the security guard grabbed one of them by the shirt when another suspect

again shouted, "Just shoot him."

The five men made their get-a-way in heavy mall traffic. Investigators quickly determined the get-a-way vehicle had been stolen earlier from a Sanford residence. The car was found abandoned Friday morning about 5:30 a.m. in the parking lot of Deltona High School and has been impounded by the Florida Department of Law Enforcement in Daytona Beach for crime processing.

"They were pretty brazen. It was an unusual time of the day," said Sanford Police Public Information Officer Cleo Cohen. "It's a risky situation when robbers are armed with hammers at

the very least and its likely one of them had a handgun according to the statements taken from one of the security guards."

Cohen said a statewide bulletin has been issued and police are processing video from a Parisian security camera as well as processing other evidence from the crime scene and impounded vehicle.

The Seminole County Sheriff's department has issued an advisory notice to local pawn shops to be on the lookout for attempts to convert the watches to cash. Investigators, working with Mayor's managers, have a list of the serial numbers on the stolen watches.

Pulitzer nominee speaks to Historical Society

SANFORD — Pulitzer Prize-nominated author, Patrick Smith, held the audience spellbound as he related his experiences to more than 100 members and guests of the Sanford Historical Society.

The event was held at the Sanford/Seminole Chamber of Commerce building and was co-sponsored by the Seminole County Historical Society.

Douglas Stenstrom expressed the opinion of all by saying, "He spoke for over an hour and I enjoyed every minute."

Smith began by stating that even though his characters and locales were composites rather than real people and places, people continually tell him that they recognize themselves, a relative or a place. He gave humorous examples of this to the delight of the audience.

Florida, according to Smith, was this country's first frontier, beginning with the exploration of the Spaniards in the 1500s. It was also the most hostile, with such things to overcome as snakes, mosquitoes, bears, heat and swamps. It could also be said to be the last frontier as it didn't really begin to be settled until the 1860s.

When discussing his writing, Smith said that a person has to begin with what he is familiar with, which he called his sense of place. His first two novels had their setting in his home state of Mississippi.

When he moved to Florida in 1966, he had to do research to find his sense of place here.

He wasn't a stranger to the state, though, as he had traveled the state in 1933. He related his experiences in places through-

out Florida. In Destin, he found only one small store with probably only three inhabitants, miles of uninhabited beach in the panhandle, shuffleboard courts in St. Petersburg, royal palms in Fort Myers. Naples was a fishing village of 300 population and the cypress swamp nearby was like entering another planet.

From Collins Avenue in Miami Beach, he could actually see the ocean as there were few hotels, Cocoa Beach had a population of 25 and New Smyrna Beach was then named Coronado Beach.

His most beloved novel, "A Land Remembered," took place during 1858 to 1968 and required two years of research. The first year he just read books about the state, took notes and decided what events to cover. He planned to tell how these events affected people and what brought the people here.

The next year he talked with old timers, sometimes having to drink their cracker coffee or moonshine and even chew their tobacco so they would open up to him. He also went to live among the Seminole Indians. He was never able to get this first group to even talk to him although he lived and worked with them for several months. He later was fortunate to find who he called a soul mate in Billy James, later to become the leader of the Seminoles, from whom he learned a great deal about Indian life.

The book was rejected by many publishers, but since has been published in almost every country in the world.

For his novel "Angel City" he actually passed himself off as a migrant worker and lived and worked in a migrant camp for

several months. This novel was made into a television movie which prompted the state of Florida to pass laws that improved the lives of these people.

Smith explained that writing is not a glamorous profession as it is usually just you and a typewriter. It is a lonely life with many frustrations. But mail from fans and interacting with people who enjoy your work are the rewards. He closed by sharing a few of his favorite letters which come from all over the world.

Following his presentation, he sold and autographed books for a large number of attendees.

During the Sanford Historical Society's meeting held before Smith's presentation, the officers for the year 2001 were elected. These are Christine Kinlaw Best, president; Carlton Jay Jacobs, vice president; Barbara Flint Ray, secretary; Joe Hunt, treasurer; Grace Marie Stinecpher, membership secretary; Bette Peacock Skates, director; and Patty Johnson Swann, director. Charlie Carlson and Dr. Varn

Parker have one year remaining on their two-year term. These officers will be installed at the January meeting.

Upcoming events were announced which included an Open House at the former Ben Flitt home on Cameron Avenue on Dec. 1, the Society's Holiday reception to be held Dec. 7 at the Sanford Museum and the St. Lucia Observance for Sanford's pioneer Swedish families on Dec. 9 at the museum of Seminole County History.

It was announced that calendar sales were going well and that they and several Society books had been sold at the recent Heritage Festival and also at a Tuesday Farmers' Market.

A new book, "A History of Monroe," published by the Society and written by Charlie Carlson and Christine Best, would be available in a few days and could be purchased at the Sanford Museum.

The Social Committee, chaired by Helen Brown, provided delicious refreshments for the large, enthusiastic crowd.

Tallahassee. "From this point forward, I'm going to be involved in my community."

Brown was one of 200 citizens from Sanford who made the 5-hour trip to Tallahassee to voice their concerns about uncounted votes and allegations of racial profiling at election precincts across the state. Many who made the trip, like Sanford City Commissioner Velma Williams, were veterans of civic activism, both on the

civil rights front and in political campaigns.

A large contingent of the Sanford delegation, however, were young men and women in their 20s. They took time off from work or classes to voice their concerns about their community.

Partisan politics was one reason they joined in the rally. Overwhelmingly those making the trip voted for Vice President Al Gore. But Mason Moton echoed the opinion of many when he said the primary issue was right and wrong.

"I just wanted to stand up for what I think is right," Moton

said. "We should all be willing to do that when the time arises."

Moton fears a Gore defeated could hamper efforts to increase voter turnout.

"If Gore doesn't win, people are not going to vote," Moton said. "First-time voters are going to look at this election and say 'Why bother.'"

Brown disagreed. "Whether Gore wins is not the issue," Brown said. "The issue is that this should never happen

again. Everybody needs to be on their P's and Q's from here on out. I think this is going to bring more people out to vote."

Henry Sweet, a Sanford native who returned to the Celery City after a career in the U.S. Navy, agreed with Brown that citizens, particularly young people, need to be more diligent about their involvement.

"You have to educate the masses and get those people involved in their communities," Sweet said. "Trying to undo things after the fact is problematic. You need to have a good plan

before hand. This election should show the need to be politically active."

The allegations of voting irregularities in minority precincts was a major issue for Moton, Brown and Sweet, and they want answers to those issues. More importantly, however, Moton said he wants to ensure all voters are equal in the voting booths.

"I feel like it's a lower class thing rather than a black-white thing," Moton said, "because whites voted for Gore, too. I think there's a feeling that if you ain't got it, you ain't going to get it, so we need to make sure everybody's vote counts: black, white, rich and poor."

"The cornerstone of democracy is that every vote counts," Sweet said.

Commissioner Williams said she was encouraged by the large youth presence at the rally.

"I think it's a very positive thing that young people became interested in the political process in their community," Williams said. "I got the feeling that these young people didn't have negative attitudes, but rather they wanted to get a better understanding of what is going on in their country."

"This opened their eyes, and they realized that their vote does count," Williams said. "I expect that in the future they are going to be willing to get involved, either because they are asked or because of their own concerns."



Thousands jammed the plaza between the Old Capitol Building and the new Capitol Building Wednesday to demand that every vote count. Among the speakers at the rally were the Rev. Jesse Jackson; Patricia Ireland, from the National Organization for Women; and AFL-CIO director John Sweeney.

If statistics were ever misleading, the women's game was it.

The Eagles (ranked No. 6 in the state poll) took a 15-10 lead before the Raiders (ranked No. 5) went on a 12-0 run behind Gabrielle Blankenfeld to take a 22-15 lead.

That advantage quickly disappeared as TCC took control behind Tai Wilson to take a 39-33 lead at intermission, an amazingly close score considering how badly SCC played in the first half.

Part of the disorganized play of the Raiders was caused by serious foul trouble, especially at the guard position, as Brandi Davis (four fouls), Sheketa "Kiki" Kindred, Sheri Harrison and Nary Bergeren (three fouls each) and Sue Gyafas and Ovidio's Shannon Cotton (two fouls each) were all on the bench when the half ended.

The fouls and turnovers continued to come in the second half as the Eagles built leads of as many as 18 points (59-41).

But then the SCC press started to take effect and TCC started to foul and it suddenly became a game as Blankenfeld continued to have an outstanding game for the local squad.

from Buffalo AND Miami.



Enjoy your football this weekend and remember, everything else can wait!





After going on the tour, many people indicated they were interested in Sanford as a place to live, Daniels said.


Daniels also said the other sponsors were very pleased with their events. The Historic Trust, he said, will be meeting in the near future to discuss plans for next year's Christmas celebration.

The family prayed that God would give us all: "Grateful hearts and keep us mindful of the need of others for if we pause to think, we'll have cause to thank."





Divorce not an easy solution

Are we changing our views on what divorce does to children? If so, it will come too late for many a divorce-orphaned child to whom the harm has already been done.

The effects of divorce on children have been glossed over in the last 25 years by such glib cover-ups as, "Sure, divorce can be hard on children, but they get over it."

Ask almost anybody whether a couple whose marriage is floundering should agree to stay together for the sake of the children and you will be told, "Absolutely not."

Now, a new study titled "The Unexpected Legacy of Divorce," by Judith Wallerstein, Julia Lewis and Sandra Blakeslee, makes us, in the words of a New York Times book reviewer, "face the truth that a divorce can free one or both parents to start a new and more hopeful life and still hurt their children."

It's still the children who pay in divorce, says the review, "and they go on paying well into adulthood."

This latest research is not the first to have reached the new book's conclusions.

David Goodman, a child psychologist and author of "Parent's Guide to the Emotional Needs of Children," remarks how

often a husband and wife, weary of contending with a loveless marriage or incompatible mate, will ask a counselor: "Would it matter much to my children if we get a divorce? Wouldn't they be better off to have two separated parents than two parents who stay together but cannot love each other?"

What these parents want

to hear, says Goodman, is: "No, it really wouldn't matter. Go ahead with your divorce. Your children will get over it. There are millions of children of divorce in America. They all get over it in time."

But the wise counselor won't tell them this, says Goodman, because he has seen "too many of these children putting up a brave front of sophistication but never really losing the look of irremediable grief in their eyes."

Goodman says, "Nothing which you can give a divorce-orphaned child can make up to him what he has forever lost." Down deep he believes that "his parents rejected him, despite their assurances that 'Mommie and Daddy both love you very much.' He knows they did not think enough of him to reconcile their differences and make a marriage — and a home for him."

Goodman says he hopes the day will come when there will be a children's advocate in every divorce court to defend the rights of children.

Such an advocate may demand, says Goodman, "that, in spite of all the evidence, the divorce should not be granted because there is equally valid evidence that the child loves — and needs — both parents."

The most pervasive fact to emerge from the Wallerstein study was the enormity of the grief all the children felt over their parents' divorce. They were "sad beyond measure." The pain was there, hard and hurting, in every one of the children studied.

the Art of using Herbs

People should eat because they enjoy the flavors of good food, not just because they must fill their stomachs to stay alive.

Appearance, texture, and nutrition are important, too, but good taste is the first mark of good cooking. Enhancement and adjustment of flavors is one of cook's most critical tasks — a task requiring experience and judgment. Unfortunately, the fine art of seasoning and flavoring is too often one of the most abused.

The most important flavors of a particular preparation are the flavors of its main ingredients. Roast beef should taste like roast beef, green beans like green beans, sole stuffed with crabmeat like sole stuffed with crabmeat. It is a fact of life, however, that plain foods generally are a little bland to most palates, so the cook's job is to perk up the taste buds with a few added ingredients, so that the beef tastes more like beef, and the green beans more like green beans.

Where seasoning means enhancing the natural flavor of the food without significantly changing its flavor, flavoring means adding a new flavor to a food, changing or modifying the original flavor.

As the difference between the two is often one of degree, here is where it takes knowledge in how to use your herbs in adding flavor that complement your main ingredient, to heighten and to give extra interest, rather than overpower it or cover up badly prepared food.

Flavoring

Flavoring ingredients can be added at the beginning, middle, or end, depending on the cooking time, the cooking process, and the flavoring ingredient.

Fresh herbs are almost always superior to dried herbs. They should be used whenever cost and availability permit. Not long ago the only fresh herbs generally available in many areas were parsley, chives, and sometimes mint and dill. Now, however, most herbs are available fresh. The accompanying photos illustrate some of the most commonly used fresh herbs, as well as some unusual fresh flavoring ingredients.

Onion, garlic, shallots, and other members of the onion fami-

ly, as well as carrots and celery, are used as flavorings in virtually all situations of the kitchen. Try to avoid the use of dried onion and garlic products. They have fewer flavors.

Wine, brandy, and other alcoholic beverages are used to flavor sauces, soups, and many entrees. Brandy should be boiled or flamed to eliminate the high percentage of alcohol, which would be unpleasant in the finished dish. Table wines usually need some cooking or reduction (either separately or with other ingredients) to produce the desired flavors. Fortified wines like sherry and Madeira, on the other hand, may be added as flavorings at the end of cooking.

Grated lemon and orange rinds are used in sauces, meats, and poultry (as in ducking a l'orange), as well as in the bakeshop. Only the colored outer zest, which contains the flavorful oils, is used. The white pith is bitter.

Don't use stale herbs, and don't buy more than you need. If you do, tie them and hang upside down in a dry place.

Whole herbs for flavoring a liquid are tied loosely in a piece of cheesecloth (called a sachet) for easy removal.

Herbs added to uncooked foods such as salads and dressings need several hours to release flavors and blend.

Taste food before serving, whenever possible. How else can you "adjust the seasoning?"

Examples Of Use

BASIL — Aromatic leaf; member of the mint family. Use in tomatoes and tomatoes dishes, pesto (Italian basil sauce), egg dishes, lamb chops, eggplant, peas, squash, pasta.

BAY LEAVES — Whole stiff, dark green, oblong leaves; pungent aroma - one of the most important herbs: used in stocks, soups, stews, cabbage braised meats.

CHERVIL - Mild flavor of parsley and tarragon. Soups, salads, sauces, egg and cheese dishes.

CHIVES — Grass like herb with onion flavor. Salads, egg and cheese dishes, fish and soups.

CILANTRO — The plant that produces the coriander seeds; delicate texture; assertive, herbaceous aroma and flavor. Widely used in Asian and Southwestern cooking and in dishes with various ethnic influences. Great in dressings for seared tuna.

DILL — Herb and seed with familiar "dill pickle" flavor; Use in: salads, cheese dishes, fish and shellfish, spinach, potatoes stew

GARLIC — Strong, aromatic, member of onion family; fresh bulbs composed of many small cloves; use in a wide variety of foods.

GINGER — Light brown, knobby root of ginger plant; use in baked goods and desserts, fruits, curried dishes, braised meats; fresh; in Chinese and other oriental dishes. Marinated: in salads.

MARJORAM — Grey-green herb with pleasant aroma and slightly minty flavor, similar to oregano but much milder. Used in Pates and ground meats, braised meats ends sauces, roast lamb, poultry and poultry stuffing.

MINT — Aromatic leaves with cool flavor; use in lamb, fruits, tea and fruit beverages, peas, carrots and potatoes, puddings, and jellies.

OREGANO — Pungent herb, known as the "pizza herb;" Use in Italian and Mexican dishes, marinates for chicken, tomatoes products.

PARSLEY — Most widely used herb. Dark green curly or flat leaves with delicate, sweet flavor; almost all foods.

ROSEMARY — Light green leaves resembling pine needles;

use in lamb, braised meats, and poultry, soups, tomatoes, and meat sauces, breads and marinades.

SAGE — Pungent gray-green herb with fuzzy leaves. Use in pork, poultry, stuffing, sausage, beans, tomatoes.

TARRAGON — Delicate green herb with flavor that is both minty and licorice-like. Use in Bearnaise sauce, tarragon vinegar, chicken, fish salads and dressings, eggs.

THYME — Tiny brownish-green leaves) very aromatic. Used as one of the most important and versatile of herbs. Use in stocks, soups, sauces, meats, poultry, and tomatoes.

Mushrooms And Zucchini With Mint

This is a Tuscan dish. The unusual blend of flavors is reminiscent of the countryside, and it's great to serve as a side dish for chicken or lamb roast.

Preparation time: 30 minutes
Cooking time: 20 minutes
Servings: 6

3 tablespoons virgin olive oil
2 ounces butter
1/2 pound champignon mushrooms, cleaned and sliced
3 garlic cloves, peeled and

lightly crushed
1 tablespoons chopped mint
Salt and freshly ground pepper
5 medium zucchini, sliced

Heat the oil and butter in a saucepan and saute the mushrooms with garlic and mint. Cover and cook for 10 minutes over moderate heat. Add the zucchini and stir well. Season with a little salt and black pepper. Cover and cook for a further 10 minutes. Remove garlic and serve hot.

Potatoes With Rosemary
Preparation time: 5 minutes
Cook time: 15 minutes
Servings: 4

1 1/2 pounds russet potatoes, peeled and cubed
2 tablespoons unsalted butter
2 tablespoons fresh Misty hills rosemary, crumbled

Cover potatoes with water in medium saucepan and bring to a boil. Lower heat. Cover and simmer 15 minutes or until potatoes are tender. Drain water. Add remaining ingredients and salt and pepper to taste. Toss gently and serve.
