His father left a Spokane golf tournament to fly to Raymond. Bing would allow no hospital pictures taken of his son.

At the New Riverview Hospital, it was said Phillip had three fractured vertebrae and minor lacer ations. One of the spinal fractures was in the neck. The other two were lower down in the back.

He will be hospitalized several weeks. As soon as possible, he will be taken to Madigan Army Hospital, at Ft.Lewis.
