





fied." Blue told United Press International today. They said they were not abused by their guards. They found the food poor.

"It kept us alive and our stomachs full," said Blue, "but that's about all. The jails were terribly het and crawded."

"We had sufficient things to eat," said Swenson, "but not what you would call desirable by our standards. The mattress I slept on looked like it had been slept on by a hundred people before with ne attempt to clean it

## **Turnover Of City Managers**

A research team at the University of Florida which has just completed a year's study of city manager tenure and turnover in Florida has announced its preliminary findings. In sum they are:

City Managers find themselves "on the firing line of local politics' even though they are appointed and not elected to office. A major reason for turnover, the team found, "is that city managers are usually the chief re-commenders of city policy. This places them right in the firing line of local politics and makes them political figures subject to the liabilities of politics.

"Consequently, in unstable communities where councilman and mayors are afraid to take responsibility for policy, the manager may be a convenient focus for

ention to an unpopular policy." The research team's findings are based on questionnaires and personal interviews with city managers and councilmen. Seventy-six of the 107 cities in Florida re-sponded (including Sanford) to the mailed questionnaire. Too many city commissions and councils take the

position that the city manager is a hired hand who must do their bidding, and give him little latitude in function-ing as he should by being a manager in fact rather than by his name only. It is also interesting to note that there are 107

cities that have a city manager form of government.
