#### North blasts CBS docudrama

MANCHESTER, N.H. — Former Marine Lt. Col. Oliver North attacked CBS for its docudrama on his life and role in the Iran-contra scandal, saying the network is always on the attack.

"I cannot ask you to endorse what I have done, or failed to do," North told about 750 people at a \$100-a-plate state Republican fund-raiser Monday night. "I stand before you as a mere mortal, contrary to what CBS would have you believe, a frail human being who makes mistakes every single day."

North, who is on a nationwide speaking tour to raise money for his legal defense while his case is under appeal, received a standing ovation before and after his half-hour speech, in which he attacked what he called "a hostile media."

#### U.S. prepares for MIA mission

BANGKOK, Thailand — A delegation of U.S. military officials went to Hanoi Tuesday for talks to set up the next joint search for evidence of Americans missing in action in Vietnam.

A six-man team of experts flew to Hanoi today from Bangkok for discussions with Vietnamese authorities concerning scheduling for the next joint investigation seeking to clarify the fates of the Americans unaccounted for since the Vietnam War, said embassy spokesman Ross Prizing.

#### U.S. official leaves Panama

PANAMA CITY, Panama — U.S. Ambassador Arthur Davis departed Panama with a parting shot aimed at military leader Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega, accusing the de facto ruler of trying to assassinate an opposition leader.

Davis was recalled by President Bush for consultations in protest of the Panamanian government's annulled presidential elections, which independent observers said should have given anti-Noriega forces a resounding victory.

#### Atlantis returns to Canaveral

CAPE CANAVERAL — A jumbo jet carrying the Shuttle Atlantis landed at the Kennedy Space Center late Monday, chasing out a weather-delayed, two-day trip from California that featured stops in Texas and Georgia.

The ungainly-looking ship touched down at the Shuttle's 3,000-foot emergency landing strip at 8:09 p.m. EDT after a low-altitude pass over the Florida shuttleport.

#### Bengal FB banned for life

NEW YORK — Fullback Stanley Wilson of the Cincinnati Bengals, who was suspended from the Super Bowl this year for drug abuse, was banned for life from the NFL by Commissioner Pete Rozelle.

Wilson, who was found under the influence of drugs in his Miami hotel room on the eve of the Bengals game against the San Francisco 49ers, can apply for reinstatement. NFL spokesman Joe Browne said Monday. However, Browne indicated that to be possible, Wilson would have to make major changes in his life.

The 27-year-old Wilson is the first player Rozelle has suspended permanently — without the promise of a hearing — for repeated violations of the NFL's drug policy.

# Education tax hike

## Local officials optimistic about proposal's chances

Seminole County School Board Chairman Ann Neiswender and State Sen. W.W. "Bud" Gardner today expressed enthusiasm about a proposed tax increase that could equalize financing for school districts.

The two, who said they believed the proposal

would be implemented, are among many who favor the plan for two property tax increases, one mandatory and the second an optional hike left up to each district.

If both increases were enacted, according to the proposal, a taxpayer would see the tax on a \$75,000 home rise about \$17 a year.

The proposal, prepared by the Florida School Boards Association and the Florida Association of District School Superintendents, could raise \$117 million a year statewide. Just as important, its backers said, the plan would help equalize the dollars sent to each of the 67 districts, which

often differ greatly from county to county.

"This is something that was part of the district's legislative package this year," said Neiswender. "It was one of the things the whole group (parents, teachers and administrators) that went to Tallahassee last month agreed on."

Neiswender added that the equalization proposal does not take anything away from the best-funded districts, instead it increases the money in the worst-funded areas.

"This is something that would help the

## Sanford in 'Catch-22' situation

SANFORD — The Catch-22 dilemma at a city commission work session yesterday was this: How can the city pay the cost of growth and still encourage residential growth with low impact and building fees?

As more homes built in the city expand the tax base, more demand is placed on city services. As the city establishes fees to offset the demand, homebuilders find it more difficult to build here.

City commissioners studied that dilemma yesterday with advisory boards they established to recommend recreation impact fees and to recommend changes in recreational facilities and programming. The question was tabled until after the commission begins studying budget proposals June 14.

The commission also considered adding to the cost of a home with an increase in building permit fees. A vote on an increase from \$23 to \$33 per square foot for building permit fees is scheduled for the May 22 meeting.

Bob McKee, a member of the systems development fee committee, said the dilemma puts the city's needs against those of the building industry.

"An additional \$500 cost to a house is the difference between some people qualifying or not qualifying for a mortgage," McKee said in an interview yesterday.

The fee committee has been studying a proposed increase in city recreation impact fees. A consultant for the city has recommended raising the fee to as much as \$600 per home. Based on two different calculations, the consultant recommended setting the fee at either \$311 or \$602 per home.

The existing fee was initially implemented in the early 1960s in lieu of a 600-square-foot dedication per dwelling unit in new subdivisions. The city adopted a \$75 per-unit fee for homes built in old subdivisions and a \$150 per-unit fee for apartments and duplexes.

McKee cautioned the commission yesterday that impact fee revenue could only be used for capital expenditures to offset growth, not to address deficiencies.

## Wildmere residents dislike plan

LONGWOOD — City commissioners wrestled with a road-widening issue last night as residents of Wildmere Avenue spoke against its proposed widening to 24 feet from the present width of approximately 21 feet.

The residents said the widening will spoil the country atmosphere of the road and would result in increased speeding and more traffic because people would use it as a shortcut to other highways.

Mayor Hank Hardy and Commissioner Ted A. Pockling agreed that the street should not be widened. The issue will be addressed again at a special meeting on Thursday in the commission chambers.

Pockling said he was "against

the widening which was planned one year ago by the city engineers, Lochrane Engineering Inc., 128 a residential street," Pockling said.

Hardy said the road must be rebuilt because of a new sewer line going in but that he wanted the width to stay the same. The road's present width, ranging from between 20 to 22 feet.

"The goal would be to go it even all the way down," Hardy said.

He made a motion that the street be redesigned to 21 feet and be approved as such.

June Lottmann, 402 Wildmere Ave., a resident for 32 years, said "I'm with Mr. Pockling. Leave the street its present width. Why make it a thoroughfare for everyone to travel?"

Barbara Williams, who has lived on Wildmere Avenue since 1964, is

also against the widening. She said the only reason the road is being widened is to accommodate two major subdivisions bordering it.

"We don't want it improved to accommodate two subdivisions. We're against it," Williams said. She said she wants it to remain a "country road" and she is also opposed to a proposed sidewalk going in on her side of the street.

Pat Woodson of 603 Wildmere Ave. said she is "opposed to widening, opposed to sidewalks and opposed to sewers."

Other residents, some who did not live along the street, said the city must give way to progress and that widening of the road is inevitable.

Personally, I would like to see Wildmere brought up to state standards for a residential road.

## Reactions mixed to Bush's get-tough crime policy

### BUSH'S CRIME PACKAGE

WASHINGTON — Here are highlights of President Bush's anti-crime package:

•Build prison cells for 24,000 more inmates.

•Hire 1,600 more prosecutors and 825 agents for FBI, ATF, and U.S. Marshals.

•Extend the federal death penalty law to include homicide with a firearm, by a person serving a life sentence, and by terrorists.

•Double to 10 years the federal minimum sentence for crimes with use of a gun.

•End plea bargaining for any violent crime in which a gun is used.

•Prohibit sale of firearms to anyone convicted of a violent misdemeanor.

•Give bonus in law enforcement grants to states that adopt sentencing guidelines for gun-related offenses.

•Prohibit the importation, manufacture, private sale of gun magazines with more than 15 rounds.

•Deferred decision on whether to make permanent his temporary ban on the import of semiautomatic guns until a federal review is completed next month.

Reaction in Seminole County and elsewhere in the nation ranged from support to criticism of the sweeping \$1.2-billion anti-crime package, disclosed Monday by President Bush.

Seminole County Sheriff John Polk generally were pleased that the president focused attention on crime issues, although each expressed differing views.

The anti-crime package drew mixed reviews — and some fire — from Congress, gun lobbies and some other law enforcement officials.

Bush proposed hiring more federal prosecutors and law enforcement agents, building more prison cells, and tougher laws for crimes committed with guns, among other things.

"We're going to take back the streets by taking criminals off the streets," Bush told a radio-televised memorial service at the Capitol for 161 police officers killed in the line of duty the past year.

To loud applause from several thousand uniformed police officers, Bush said he also wants to put an end to plea bargaining for gun-related crimes and expand the death sentence to cover certain offenses, such as murder for hire.

The president, however, deferred until next month a final decision on whether to make permanent his 2-month-old temporary ban on the import of semiautomatic guns. He said he would outlaw any foreign model that the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms determines has no legitimate sporting use.

Bush said he wants to limit the firepower of semiautomatics by prohibiting any magazine for those guns that carry more than 15 rounds. Some magazines now have more than 20 rounds.

The rapid-fire guns, which include the AK-47, the Israeli-made Uzi and a gun called "the street sweeper," have become increasingly popular among career criminals, particularly drug gangsters.

Bush's long-awaited proposal drew mixed reviews.

Lake Mary Police Chief Charles Lauderdale said, "Throwing money at the problem isn't the answer. The answer is thorough planning and execution."

"I hope we're not going back to the Safe Streets Act (of 1968)," Lauderdale said. "Through that act, lots of money was wasted through the Law Enforcement Assistance

### Bloody trail leads from crime scene

FERN PARK — A bloody trail from a burglarized convenience store led Seminole County sheriff's deputies on a fruitless search for an injured suspect. Deputies estimate the suspect lost two pints of blood while eluding deputies during a one-half-mile chase.

The pursuit began at about 4 a.m. today when a clerk who was opening the Cumberland Farms on U.S. Highway 17-92, Fern Park, reported to deputies she saw a man in a blood-soaked shirt run past her. A window of the store had been broken and the man was apparently injured when he crawled through the window, deputy G.H. Nagata said.

Deputies followed a bloody trail that circled through the parking lots of several businesses in that area, south of South Street.

The trail ended at a parking space at the Econo Lodge. Nagata said deputies believe the man fled in a car that had been parked there.

Nagata described the man as white with a blond afro. He is in his 20s, about 5-feet, 8-inches tall and weighs about 190 pounds. Deputies expect he will seek medical treatment for severe cuts.

Nagata said the man is also suspected of breaking the window of Rent-A-Center in the same area at about 2 a.m. today. Nothing was stolen from either burglarized business, Nagata said.

### Man jailed in alleged crowbar attack

# Airport barrels may not be hazardous

SANFORD — The Florida Department of Environmental Regulation yesterday said barrels found at Sanford Regional Airport last week may not be a hazard, the assistant airport director said today.

Steve Cook said DER investigators visiting the airport yesterday "indicated it's probably not a serious problem."

Backhoe operators for a heavy

equipment school at the airport industrial park unearthed about a dozen barrels last week. An explosive expert for the Seminole County Sheriff's Department turned the barrels over to DER and the Army Corps of Engineers to determine if their contents are hazardous.

The Corps of Engineers will investigate the site later this week, Cook said. Testing of the substance will probably be done by the Corps, he said.

Marty LaBrusciano, supervisor

of the sheriff's department bomb squad, said this weekend the barrels may have been buried in what was a landfill at the Navy base that operated at the airport until 1968.

John White, DER environmental specialist, said two emergency response investigators visited the airport yesterday.

The two investigators ordered the airport authority to hire a private firm to determine the

contents of a 20,000-gallon fuel storage tank and a 55-gallon drum. White said. The drum contained about 20 gallons of an unknown substance, he said.

The investigators also told the airport authority to have ground water and soil samples tested for possible contamination. White said, although they believed no contamination has occurred from their inspection.

"It was a Navy base, so there's no telling what's out there," White said.

## Longwood to pay \$23,000 for barrel removal

LONGWOOD — To prevent the cost of litigation, commissioners last night decided to settle the hazardous waste bill with Chemical Conservation Corporation, Orlando, by paying \$23,000.

This is \$3,000 more than the counteroffer Longwood City Attorney Richard S. Taylor Jr. made last month to the company for removal and testing of 16 barrels, some containing hazardous waste, buried behind the public works department last year. The company originally submitted a nearly \$32,000 bill to the city for the work done last December, but several commissioners said they were told at the

time the job would cost between \$3,000 to \$10,000 and the city did not pay the bill. Instead, it negotiated with the company, which reduced the bill to a low offer of \$25,000.

Taylor told the commissioners last night that Detroit Attorney Peter O'Rourke, Chemical Conservation representative, would file a lawsuit if they did not inform him of the bill payment by today. O'Rourke had earlier advised Taylor that he would try to negotiate a \$23,000 offer from the company.

"My gut feeling is to put this behind us and avoid lengthy litigation, and reluctantly go ahead and resolve this matter by paying the \$23,000. Economically, it's the better decision,"

Taylor said.

Taylor estimated it would cost the city \$5,000 for attorney's fees, between \$500 to \$800 a day just for expert witnesses and another \$2,000 to \$3,000 in additional costs if the city chose to litigate the matter.

"Because this would be a fairly complicated lawsuit, this would be my recommendation," Taylor said.

Mayor Hank Hardy concurred with Taylor's recommendation. "I'd like to put it behind us," he said.

Acting City Administrator Don Terry also agreed. "We have more to lose than to gain. I recommend we accept that offer," he said.

Commissioners voted unanimously to pay Chemical Conservation \$23,000.

In a related matter, Terry told the commissioners the Florida Department of Environmental Regulation (DER) intends to proceed with the \$25,000 fine it charged the city for improper burial of hazardous waste.

Terry said the city's representative on the matter, Tallahassee Attorney Segundo Fernandez hired by the city to negotiate with DER, will conduct a work session with city staff at 11 a.m., Thursday, May 25 prior to meeting with DER officials later that afternoon.

## Grant may send seniors to national games

SANFORD — Advancing to national competition long has been a goal for some athletes competing in the Golden Age Games here, but the money it would cost has been an obstacle.

But now, with help from General Foods Corp., money is being made available to Golden Age Games athletes to help them participate in the National Senior Olympic Games in St. Louis.

A \$10,000 check from Post, the sponsor of both the Golden Age and the national games, was recently sent to the Golden Age Games committee. The money was raised by General Foods, Post's parent company, by donating five cents from specially marked coupons which were redeemed in central Florida grocery stores.

General Foods is the parent corporation of Post, the company that sponsors both the Sanford games and the national games, this year to be June 19-21.

"Now that we have the money

to help local qualifiers attend" the national games, "we have to figure out how many of those who qualified actually want to go," said Golden Age Games committee chairman Dave Farr.

Farr and Jim Jernigan, Sanford director of parks and recreation and the organizer of the Golden Age Games, will be going over a list of qualifiers who will be attending the games as soon as the list becomes available from the national committee in St. Louis.

"I'd like to see that list as soon as possible," Jernigan said.

Farr noted that, due to previous commitments, he probably wouldn't be able to get started on the project until June 1.

Golden Age Games athletes said the money would be welcome.

For example, Sue Tudor, an archer from Sanford who qualified for the national games, would not normally attend the national games. "On a fixed income, that's too much of an expense," she said. Tudor said she had heard nothing about the possible financial aid. "I might

go if I can get some help," she said.

Farr said the potential senior Olympians had been told at the Golden Age Games that some money might be available.

## Don't succumb to Panamania

The theft of Panama's presidential election may have been more brazen this time, but it was certainly nothing new. In 1984, the military's anointed candidate was Nicolas Barletta, a former World Bank vice president. Barletta won, in an election so tainted that many Panamanians referred to their new president as *Fraudito Barletta*.

The other day, military strongman Manuel Noriega tried to work the same fraud, only this time the whole world was watching. In the face of massive evidence that opposition candidate Guillermo Endara won the election, Noriega insisted that his handpicked candidate, Carlos Duque, triumphed. Now he has annulled the results.

Noriega has proved to be something less than a slick con man; of course, he has never had to be. Panamanians who "have an instinct to live," to use the words of an opposition leader, have learned not to cross the man with guns. This time, however, Noriega may have gone too far.

President Bush, insisting that Noriega step aside, refuses to rule out military intervention. Members of a U.S. observer delegation have called for abrogating the Panama Canal Treaty, the 1979 agreement that gave Panama control of the waterway. Some administration officials are said to favor having U.S. special operations forces in Panama "detain" Noriega.

As satisfying as hard-line measures might be for some people, they're sure to be counterproductive. Former President Jimmy Carter, who headed an independent delegation of election observers, cautions that invading Panama or abrogating the canal treaty "could play right into Noriega's hands."

Carter is right. Violating Panama's sovereignty would transform a brutal dictator into Panamanian nationalist hero.

President Alan Garcia of Peru offers a more prudent approach. He has sent a letter to Endara, the opposition candidate, saying that Noriega had indeed committed fraud and that he was urging the Organization of American States and other Latin American governments to reject claims of victory by Noriega's candidate, Duque.

That's a first step. Garcia ultimately seeks a diplomatic and economic quarantine of a Noriega-ruled Panama. Whatever actions the United States takes against Noriega must be done in concert with Panama's Latin American neighbors.

Those countries have good reason to isolate Noriega, as do we. It was Noriega who provided training and safe haven to Argentine soldiers seeking the overthrow of their country's democratically elected government. It was Noriega who rode out American economic sanctions with the financial backing of the Colombian drug cartel. It was Noriega who offered to assist the Reagan administration by arranging the assassination of Nicaraguan President Daniel Ortega.

Manuel Noriega is, in short, an abcess on the hemisphere. The abcess must be removed, but it must be done carefully, with respect for the body infected. Noriega may prove to be his own worst enemy; time is on the side of his opponents.

## Ignore the ban, get yourself a tan

America's foreign policy priorities are not shared by the rest of the world. Nor are the National Institutes of Health's apprehensions shared by most of America's citizens.

Panama's despot, Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega, holds a mock election and tries to execute the opposition leaders, and a troops-dispensing President Bush calls on other nations to isolate Noriega.

The other nations yawn. Israel tightens its despotic screws on Palestinians by closing down their schools, and world leaders urge some form of Palestinian sovereignty to resolve the crisis.

America yawns. South African police are accused of assassinating a prominent white anti-apartheid leader, and an American diplomat attends his funeral.

South Africa yawns. The NIH issues a report that tanning jeopardizes your survival.

Millions of sun idolaters yawn. To quickly recap, an NIH consensus committee just published a report warning that suntanning can lead to skin cancer, a weakened immune system and skin that wrinkles and ages before its time.

But excessive suntanning would be lethal only

under the most extreme circumstances, and NIH cannot offer any statistics to the contrary. The correlation between excessive exposure to the sun and skin cancer is minuscule.

The other two dangers — prematurely wrinkled skin that resembles a piece of cured leather and a weakened immune system — are not comparable. The first is of concern only for the vain. The second could be serious, but again NIH offers little substantive evidence.

Ever since I was in college, I have been a fanatic about deepening my already ferocious epidermis. I still drive a convertible and sit out in the sun every chance I get. Ethnic physiology dictates that I "stay brown all year round," but hedonistic pursuit "does the most

for the toast."

But I have a physiological advantage over most of you. I am well endowed with melanin, a dark brown or black skin pigment peculiar to the geographic genesis of my ethnicity — which reminds me of a deliciously impudent anecdote.

A brother was bemoaning the state of his blackness and asked God why he had been made black.

"I made you black," boomed a voice from above, "to protect you from the incinerating rays of Africa's sun. Had you not been covered with a melanin-saturated layer, you would have been burned to a crisp. Instead, you have survived and thrived from your African roots."

"That's all very hip, Lord," the brother replied sarcastically. "But I'm in Cleveland!"

Melanin also prevents premature wrinkling. This is not intended as a pejorative comment, but have you noticed how white people tend to wrinkle earlier and deeper than black people?

When NIH worries about too much suntanning, it ignores ethnic differences. If more of us could start looking like a few of us, all of us would feel more comfortable about our proximity.

So, ignore the ban. Work on that suntan. See you at the beach — or in your backyard.

## Force yourself to smell the roses

WASHINGTON — A doctor has published evidence that hostility is hard on the heart. I hate that doctor.

In the 1970s, research identified certain personality traits as significant risk factors in heart disease. Specifically, Type A people were said to be especially prone to heart attacks.

Type A people are the kind who do not stop to smell the roses (or even at stop signs). They are list-making, clock-watching workaholics who think about and do several things simultaneously (such as jogging while listening to taped lessons in Japanese). They play to win even against children, measure success quantitatively (sales made, patients seen, cases argued, columns written) and generally charge headlong through long days, from 5 a.m. aerobics through tutorials with Ted Koppel, then to sleep, perchance to dream but dream efficiently.

I took such 1970s research to (so to speak) heart. I tried to become an Olympic-class rose-smeller, a disciplined sniffer of a complete array of roses: More smelled today than yesterday, more tomorrow than ever. Now Dr. Redford Williams, director of Duke University's Behavioral Medicine Research Center, has published "The Trusting Heart: The Great News About Type A Behavior." What he calls great news is heart-breaking.

It is that "only the hostility and anger associated with Type A behavior actually contribute to heart disease." The problem is not workaholicism or competitiveness or even perpetual impatience. Rather it is a quickness to anger that derives from a hostile outlook and cynical mistrust of people.

It is infuriating. They have taken from us dry martinis, marbled steaks, ham-and-eggs and most other pleasures, and now, not content with multiplying our reasons for being angry, they are proscribing anger. However, to be fair (this is especially engaging), Williams' fascinating book is a persuasive account of research regarding the biological consequences — the toxicity — of anger.

Since the 19th-century advancement of the germ theory of disease, medicine has emphasized the search for specific, often single, causes of particular diseases. The "one disease, one cause" approach has, Williams says, often been fruitful, as with the conquest of pneumonia by penicillin and of smallpox and polio by vaccines.

The search for a technological silver bullet is suited to the American spirit. However, it is less successful when the problem is not contagious diseases but the more complex diseases that now account for most of today's staggering health costs.

The search for multiple factors in heart disease has led to scrutiny of what Williams calls "negative mind-body interaction." Re-

search has moved "from anecdote to epidemiology" regarding increased risks of illness as a result of the impact of states of mind on the body. New learning about the physiology of stress (brain activities stimulated, bodily chemicals released) points Williams to old religious teachings about living.

Be more tranquil, less worldly. "If yours is a hostile heart, you need to change it into a more trusting heart," trusting that people are essentially good and generally trying to be fair.

Heart disease is the major cause of death in the United States and other industrial societies. Perhaps that is because such societies place high value on striving, efficiency and other potentially stressful behaviors. Williams believes that especially since the 1960s there has been an evolution of cultural norms that are, strictly speaking, unhealthy: A lonely individualism of restless enslavement to appetites.

His moral precepts would be banal were they not backed by interesting science. I have vowed to try to heed them when provoked to hostility by, for example, the outrage of improperly used turn signals.

Imagine this: You are in a hurry to get home to see the evening news. (No, not the network newscasts — SportsCenter on ESPN.) You are driving on a four-lane street, in the left lane. As you approach a red light, drumming your fingers on the steering wheel, you think: Should I get into the right lane — is the car in front of me going to turn left? No, its turn signal is not blinking.

But it should have been blinking. As the light turns green, the incompetent driver, who should be horsewhipped, pulls into the intersection, stops, and only then turns on his turn signal, thereby telling you what you already know. Next to you, in the right lane, the Type B rose-smeller is moving and you are not. Oh, to be driving a tank, for the savage pleasure of squishing the turn-signal criminal in front of you.

You are shouting inside: Move or I'll kill you. Williams is whispering: Lighten up or you'll kill you.

## Be warned: Don't mess with Iraq's president

BAGHDAD, Iraq — Here in the cradle of civilization, it doesn't seem out of the ordinary that the head of state fell for a married woman and dispatched her husband to parts unknown. After all, it's an old biblical story.

When David got an eyeful of Bathsheba, he shipped her husband, Uriah, off to the front to be killed. Iraqi President Saddam Hussein took a more humane approach. A high-level official of a friendly neighboring country confirmed this account:

Last August after Iraq and Iran reached a truce in their eight-year war, Hussein had time for his fancy to turn to a second wife. (Under some circumstances, Islam allows a man to marry up to four wives.) He saw a woman he had to have, but, like Bathsheba, she was married. The husband was a loyal Iraqi air force officer. There was no war on, so Hussein did not have the option of sending his rival to the front. Instead, he offered the man his pick of jobs and salaries, anywhere in the world except Iraq. The only condition was that the officer must divorce his wife. The officer chose divorce instead of offending Hussein.

Hussein is a man who gets what he wants. He is considered ruthless when it comes to punishing naysayers. His iron rule is maintained in large part because of the stories that circulate through Baghdad about what happens to people who cross him.

The story most often repeated here is of a cabinet minister who, several years ago, naively suggested that Hussein step down to facilitate a peace with Iran. The unfortunate fellow reportedly was asked to step outside of the cabinet meeting with Hussein, who dispatched him with a pistol to the next life and returned to resume the meeting.

Another Hussein tale involves a top health official who was reportedly executed when Hussein found that the medical supplies he had ordered arrived with old expiration dates. In another story, the president suspected that some military officers had burned down a building to cover up the fact that they were stealing supplies. He reportedly issued an execution order for everyone connected with the incident.

One knowledgeable observer told us that it matters little here whether such stories are true. Iraqis believe their president does such things and they are cowed.

As a young man, Hussein joined the Arab Baath Socialist Party and was part of a failed coup attempt to bring down King Faisal II in 1958. In 1958, Faisal was murdered, but his replacement, Abdel Karim Kassem, was not a Baathist. Hussein was one of 10 people chosen to assassinate Kassem. The other nine assassins were killed and Kassem was not. Finally a bloodless coup brought the Baath party to power and Hussein has been head of state since 1979.

The paranoia of those early days lives on. Hussein, fearing his handwriting could be traced, used typewriters to write revolutionary leaflets. Today typewriters are still a threat. It is illegal to import them here. Iraqis must be licensed to own them. On our recent visit, our modern hotel with many other amenities for the business traveler would not let guests use typewriters unless they made carbon copies for Hussein. We declined.

Against this backdrop, our intelligence sources say it is unlikely that anyone will topple President Hussein in the near future. His only real threat is from an Iraqi army with time on its hands.

That, like so many other stories here, is hard to confirm, but Hussein benefits from the publicity.

**Stocks open lower**

NEW YORK — Prices opened lower today in moderate trading of New York Stock Exchange issues, depressed by profit taking after the market's recent rally.

The Dow Jones Industrial average, which rose 24.19 Monday, was off 7.88 to 2456.71 shortly after the market opened.

Declines led advances 352-144 among the 809 issues crossing the NYSE tape. Early turnover amounted to about 8,448,000 shares. Sustained buying interest from Friday's

rally, when the Dow Industrial average soared 56.82 points, helped stock prices post further gains Monday, analysts said.

The momentum for the two-day rally began Friday when the April producer price report pointed toward moderate economic growth and a possible easing of inflation and interest-rate pressures.

"Friday's rally was the starting gun for a lot of 'born-again bulls,'" said Don R. Hays, director of research at Wheat, First Securities Inc. in Richmond, Va. "It caused many people to think they have to get on board."

**Dollar mixed, gold up**

The dollar was mixed today in light trading on major foreign currency markets as players awaited a key government report on the nation's trade picture. Gold managed small gains.

Currency traders in New York said the market was awaiting the important U.S. trade data due to be released Wednesday for future near-term clues.

Market expectations call for little change in the March trade gap from February's deficit of \$10.5 billion.

In New York, the dollar was slightly lower against key foreign currencies in light trading.

Market watchers said the dollar eased on profit taking following Monday's sharp gains.

Traders noted the dollar showed little reaction to a government report that U.S. housing starts fell 2.7 percent in April to a seasonally adjusted annual rate of 1.361 million units, the lowest level since December 1982.

In earlier trading in Tokyo the dollar continued to rise against the Japanese yen in active trading, closing at an

18-month high of 137 yen, up 0.20 yen from 136.80 yen Monday.

Market watchers said the Bank of Japan intervened to support the yen for the second consecutive trading session, but managed to brake the dollar's upswing only marginally.

Dealers said the Bank of Japan sold about \$500 million to prop up the yen in early trading. The central bank also stepped into the market late in the day, but the amount of the intervention was not immediately known.

funding for Seminole County without harming anyone else," Nelawender said.

"I think (the bill) will be heard soon," said Gardner. "To the best of my knowledge, other than the high price tag, there are no barriers to stand in the way of this."

Gardner said it would cost \$300 to \$400 million to implement the project. While such money is not available in the current budget, Gardner said that it could be budgeted for the 1990-91 year by rearranging priorities rather than raising taxes.

Commissioner of Education Betty Castor and other top education officials said that under the proposal, there would be a major revision in the complex formula lawmakers use to set each county's school budget.

Currently, Seminole County ranks 65th among the 67 counties in terms of the amount of money it receives from the state.

"With this formula, this year, for less than a half a mill increase at the local level, we will provide adequate funding, more

equitably distributed, for every student in the state," said Pat Tornillo of the Florida Education Association-United teachers' union.

The proposal is embodied in a Senate bill (SB 650) and a House bill (HB 769). Both bills are awaiting hearings in appropriations committees.

Supporters of the plan said the education funding formula now in use is one of the best in the United States, but is subject to political manipulation and pits legislators and the districts they represent against one another in the annual late-session scramble for money.

The formula as it is can result in obvious inequities, with schools in one district receiving hundreds of dollars less per student than schools in a neighboring county.

"When you still have a difference of \$800 (per student) between the wealthiest county and the poorest county, that's not fair," Castor told a news conference held jointly with Tornillo and other education officials.

Last year, the difference in per student funding between the

best- and worst-funded counties was 23 percent. The proposal would lower that to no more than 7 percent.

"This will help counties like Seminole which are pupil rich and property poor," said Gardner.

Scott Ross, president of the superintendents' association, said the funding level in the House's proposed budget is adequate, but the distribution formula it contains would create even worse discrepancies than last year.

Ross rejected as "totally unacceptable" the level of funding in the budget passed by the Senate last week.

Nelawender said she believes the proposal does not interfere with Governor Martinez's edict of "no new taxes" because it places the burden of taxation with the individual school boards and not with the legislature.

The latest proposal was also endorsed by the Florida Association of School Administrators and the Florida Teaching Profession-National Education Association teachers' union.

Administration." About Bush saying he wants to limit firepower of semiautomatic weapons, Lauderdale said, "What does that mean? What are you going to do with a semiautomatic weapon in a residential community besides put out a lot of lead?"

Seminole County Sheriff John Polk hadn't read Bush's proposal early today. However, Polk said, he agrees that prison space on both the state and federal level will need to be expanded by 80 percent by 1993.

Polk said he doesn't believe it will do any good to expand the use of the death penalty, "until they start using it" and carry out scheduled executions.

Polk doesn't believe there is any legitimate purpose for semiautomatic or automatic assault weapons by civilians. He believes they should be outlawed, because "they are designed for no purpose but to kill."

Sanford Police Chief Steve Harriett said, "I think it sends a good message. The president has among his priorities measures aimed at crime reductions. This is symbolic of things important to us in this stage of our society as a nation."

Harriett is especially supportive of Bush's proposals to expand prosecution and corrections (prisons) efforts. Harriett said the same needs to happen on a local level with enforcement and with the assurance that criminals will serve the full sentences to which they are sentenced. Both Polk and Harriett agree with Bush's proposal to curb plea bargaining.

"I like what he said. I hope we have the funds to implement his proposals," Harriett said. "The key is to increase the number of prosecutors and the number of federal officers. That needs to be done locally as well, and into the judicial system and with jail guards. It's all expensive."

Lt. Donald Eitinger, commander of the City County Investigative Bureau agrees that it's law enforcement's job to establish a deterrent to crime. He said that can't be done without truth in sentencing, with convicts serving their full sentences without plea bargaining and early release.

"Truth in sentencing is the only way available to make trafficking in cocaine a less attractive

crime," Eitinger said. In Washington, while some lawmakers applauded Bush's efforts, they questioned his contention that all money could come from a "discretionary spending cap" in the budget plan without reducing spending for other programs.

Others criticized Bush for failing to restrict domestically produced semiautomatic, while gun lobbies said they felt betrayed by Bush for the restrictions that he did impose.

John Bernstein, chairman of the Law Enforcement Steering Committee, a coalition of 11 police groups, said, "The president's package is a recognition that there's a need for affirmative action to combat crime... But we don't believe he went nearly far enough on assault weapons."

"We believe he needs to show more leadership, like backing some bills in Congress that would ban them," Bernstein said.

The National Rifle Association, which has led the battle against any permanent restrictions on semiautomatic, took issue with Bush on the issue in the most partisan terms it could, saying the president sounded like "Michael Dukakis on firearms."

Bush, a former member of the NRA, defeated Democrat Dukakis in November, using crime as a major issue. The NRA said Bush "had a bull's eye" with his call for more jails and tougher judges, but should "remember his promise" of the campaign about private gun ownership.

Michael Board, president of the

National Coalition to Ban Handguns, was equally upset, but he charged, "Bush caved in to the NRA. His program is a small step in the right direction, but it doesn't deal with the major problem — handguns."

Sarah Brady, leader of Handgun Control Inc., took a more charitable view of the Bush plan, saying he "sent a strong message that he is serious about fighting the war on drugs and crime."

Ben. Joseph Biden, D-Del., chairman of the Senate Judiciary Committee, said Bush's goals are "laudable" but added, "The president hasn't said how we are going to pay for his new anti-crime package."

Sen. James McClure, R-Idaho, said he backed Bush's "solid proposals" to deal with crime but warned, "If some members of Congress are going to try to use this issue to push for stricter gun controls, I'm going to fight them every step of the way."

Sen. Ernest Hollings, D-S.C., said the money for the anti-crime package would have to be taken out of other domestic programs and, "If the president really believes in the need for this program, he should provide the funds to implement it or let the programs he wants eliminated."

"For far too long," Bush said, "a privileged class of violent and repeat offenders have calculated that crime really does pay — that our criminal justice system is a crap shoot where the risks are worth the rewards."

"Well," he said, "It's time we change the odds — and up the stakes enormously."

Let's do it and do it right," said Craig Bush, president of the Columbus Harbour Homeowner's Association.

Bornie Linton said, "It's not good judgment to do something partial. It will not increase speed of material. It will not increase traffic."

Another resident said that widening of the street would make it safer for bicyclists.

"A 34-foot-wide street is much safer when we have no sidewalks. It's really tough to get around bicyclists," Dale Lilly said.

Senior Vice President of Lochrane Engineering Michael J. Henry recommended the city stick with the 34-width widening plan. Henry said it would not create increased traffic. The project, projected to begin this year in conjunction with the county's reconstruction of C.R. 437, would cost approximately \$1.6 million. Henry did not have a breakdown of Wildmore's cost this morning.

The project includes new water and sewer lines, paving of about 4,000 feet over the new lanes, and sidewalks, according to Henry.

"The revenue picture is relatively dim," City Manager Frank Falson said. While impact fees are a needed source of income, he said, growth-generated fees would not pay for the recreational facilities needed in Sanford.

"The growth we are experiencing is not population growth," Falson said. While police and fire departments are becoming more active, he said, the city's revenue remains constant.

Vance Taylor, a retired builder, said he opposed an increase in recreation impact fees, and called the fees an unfair tax. He said the cost of building a home had already been driven to the ceiling with the city's first police and fire impact fees, approved by the commission on first reading last week.

"We shouldn't be levying a tax on homeowners we aren't willing to pay ourselves," Taylor said.

The commissioners were slow to speak out on the question, and deferred fee committee members' pointed questions about recreation priorities.

Leon Bronks Jr., fee committee member, asked the commissioners to outline their priorities.

Mayor Bettye Smith told Bronks the commission couldn't set priorities until it reviews available revenue. She also said the commission should wait for recommendations of the recreation task force.

Bronks then asked again, "Are you comfortable with a fee between \$400 and \$600?"

Commissioner Lon Howell said he supported an increase to \$602, saying that fee would be comparable to the average recreation impact fee in Altamonte Springs.

Altamonte Springs charges a recreation fee based on the size and location of a house.

Commissioner Bob Thomas suggested turning to volunteerism to build needed facilities.

"Our children need some place to go besides three cotton picking parking lots," Thomas said. If the money is not available in city coffers to provide a recreation center, the city should motivate the public to build one.

Commissioner Whitey Eckstein said the city should explore the idea of volunteerism by kicking in funds from reserves.

"I can't see any other way," Eckstein said.

If the city spent reserves for a recreation center, Commissioner

A.A. McClanahan said, it would be creating a liability while depleting its funds.

McClanahan said of voter turnout, even at the 10-mil cap, would only fund 10 percent of the budget. For that reason, he said, the city needs impact fee revenue.

Ad valorem taxes in Sanford are at the four-mil level.

In a summary prepared by City Planner Jay Harder, revenue from the \$411 fee is projected to reach \$82,225 annually or \$1.08 million through 2005. Of the \$1 million cost of adding and expanding community parks before 2005, about 53 percent is eligible to be funded by impact fees, the summary read.

Group sues to ban Alar

WASHINGTON - An environmental group threatened to sue the government to force an immediate ban on Alar, an apple-ripening agent, saying there is enough evidence of a cancer risk to justify emergency action.

WASHINGTON - The scientist who discovered West German hackers prowling through U.S. military and civilian computer systems told Congress that electronic "burglar alarms" are needed to protect sensitive data networks.

Oil spill inquiry begins

ANCHORAGE, Alaska - The captain of the Exxon tanker that crashed into a reef, causing the nation's worst oil spill, has refused to testify at the inquiry into an environmental disaster that is still wreaking havoc nearly two months later.

The other 28 witnesses were expected to appear, said NTSB spokeswoman Drucella Andersen, including 3rd Mate Gregory Cousins, who is the first witness scheduled to testify following opening statements by the NTSB in the ballroom of a downtown hotel.

Gorbachev, Deng declare new era

No progress made on agreement about Cambodian government

BEIJING - Soviet President Mikhail Gorbachev met for 2 1/2 hours Tuesday with Chinese leader Deng Xiaoping, ending 30 years of Sino-Soviet estrangement and declaring restoration of normal relations between the two communist giants.

But while both leaders announced a new era in relations between their respective governments and parties, they failed to make progress on the issue of establishing a transitional government in Cambodia after Moscow's chief Asian ally, Vietnam, withdraws its remaining troops in September.

Meanwhile, continuing student protests for freedom

brought yet another embarrassment to China. The demonstrations by more than 100,000 people in downtown Tiananmen Square again forced the government to alter the summit schedule, this time moving Gorbachev's afternoon meeting with Premier Li Peng to the Dianyuntai Guest House, a secure wooded compound in western Beijing.

A later meeting with Communist Party General Secretary Zhao Ziyang had already been scheduled for that site.

In order to create the proper atmosphere for the summit, Gorbachev has made concessions on all three major points demanded by Beijing: he pulled out Soviet troops from Afghanistan; he greatly troop strength along their common border; and he pressured Soviet ally Vietnam to end its occupation of Cambodia, which it invaded in 1978, ousting the Khmer Rouge government.

The Soviets are insisting the Vietnamese-backed government of Hun Sen be part of any provisional government until elections can be held and that the Khmer Rouge be excluded.

China is demanding the three-party resistance led by Prince Norodom Sihanouk rule during the transitional period along with Hun Sen. The resistance includes the Khmer Rouge.

Xinhua said Gorbachev and Deng had a "detailed exchange" on the Cambodian issue but differences remain.

Both shared some viewpoints but failed to reach a complete agreement. They agreed to let their foreign ministers continue the exchange of views on this issue, the news agency said.

While Gorbachev and Deng made history inside the Great Hall, students and workers outside on Tiananmen Square demanding greater political freedom defied government pleas for calm and continued with the largest demonstration in China since the communist takeover in 1949.

The protest, which at its peak

involved more than 300,000 people, forced the cancellation of a wreath-laying ceremony by the Gorbachevs and has proved an acute embarrassment to the Chinese leadership since the summit began Monday.

The student protesters, who are demanding political and social reforms similar to those introduced by Gorbachev in the Soviet Union, already have forced several changes in the summit schedule and have taken the psychological edge away from the host Chinese and cast a cloud over the talks.

The Soviets are feeling a bit uneasy about the situation as well since the students are praising the reform program taking root in the Soviet Union as a model that Deng and the rest of the Chinese leadership should be following.

Nevertheless, Tuesday's meeting still marked a diplomatic triumph for both leaders.

For Gorbachev, it capped three years of concerted diplomatic effort and signaled a victory for the Kremlin's "new thinking," a more sophisticated multi-faceted approach to foreign policy.

Ambassador withdrawn from Panama

PANAMA CITY, Panama - U.S. Ambassador Arthur Davis departed Panama with a parting shot aimed at military leader Gen. Manuel Antonio Noriega, accusing the de facto ruler of trying to assassinate an opposition leader.

Davis was recalled by President Bush for consultations in protest of the Panamanian government's annulled presidential elections, which independent observers said should have given anti-Noriega forces a resounding victory.

Western diplomats said Monday that Noriega seemed to be avoiding confrontation with his opponents before Wednesday's meeting of the Organization of American States.

A series of opposition protests in churches across the country Sunday took place without incident. Sources close to the government and other diplomats said Noriega soon might offer to negotiate with the opposition as a way of defusing the political crisis. But several diplomats cautioned that Noriega might simply use negotiations as a ploy to buy time.

In a departure statement at Howard Air Force Base, Davis said Monday that an attack by a pro-Noriega paramilitary group on an opposition rally last week was a "deliberate, Noriega-directed attempt on the life" of Guillermo Ford, the vice-presidential candidate of the anti-Noriega Civil Democratic Opposition Alliance.

"From eyewitness reports and from the evidence of the wounds suffered by the bodyguards of ... Ford, the attack was meant to kill him," Davis said before boarding a plane bound for Washington.

Car bomb kills Moslem leader

BEIRUT, Lebanon - A car bomb exploded in West Beirut Tuesday, killing the religious leader of Lebanon's Sunni Moslem community and about 20 other people and wounding dozens, police said.

The bomb exploded in a parked car as a motorcade carrying Sheikh Hassan Khalid was driving through the densely populated neighborhood of Ayshe Bakkar in Moslem West Beirut, police said.

Police said the bomb exploded 100 yards from the house of pro-Brytan Sunni Moslem Prime Minister Selim Hoss, who was not injured. It was not immediately clear who the bomb was intended for.

Khalid, one of Lebanon's moderate religious leaders, was killed instantly. At least one of his four bodyguards and about 20 passersby also were killed. About 50 people were wounded, police said.

Reformer wins seat in Soviet parliament

MOSCOW - A senior public prosecutor who dared to criticize Politburo member Yegor Ligachev in a recent television debate on corruption has been elected to the new Soviet parliament, the official daily Izvestia reported.

The prosecutor, Nikolai Ivanov, won the main seat representing Leningrad in Sunday's election, which had been rescheduled after a majority of voters crossed out names of candidates for the seat during the nation's first partially democratic elections in March.

Sources in Leningrad said Ivanov won more than 60 percent of the vote.

## Bengals' Wilson barred from NFL for drug abuse

NEW YORK — Fullback Stanley Wilson of the Cincinnati Bengals, who was suspended from the Super Bowl this year for drug abuse, was banned for life from the NFL by Commissioner Pete Rozelle.

Wilson, who was found under the influence of drugs in his Miami hotel room on the eve of the Bengals' game against the San Francisco 49ers, can apply for reinstatement, NFL spokesman Joe Browne said Monday. However, Browne indicated for that to be possible, Wilson would have to make major changes in his life.

The 27-year-old Wilson is the first player Rozelle has suspended permanently — without the promise of a hearing — for repeated violations of the NFL's drug policy. Last year, Indianapolis running back Tony Collins was banned for life after his third violation of the drug policy, but was given the possibility of review after one year.

Wilson, who entered a three-month drug rehabilitation program in Phoenix on May 4, had been given a final chance following an April 7, 1988 meeting that set strict guidelines for the running back. Cocaine problems had caused the former Oklahoma Sooner to miss the 1985 and

1987 seasons, and he was warned that one more relapse could be the end of his NFL career.

Though he lost his starting job to rookie Ickey Woods, Wilson went through the 1988 season without incident off the field. However, his still-unexplained Miami relapse led Cincinnati assistant general manager Mike Brown to say Wilson would never again play for the Bengals.

Under the league's drug policy, a player who fails a drug test for the first time is not suspended but becomes subject to regular testing. If he fails another test, he draws a 30-day suspension. A third failure invokes a permanent ban with the option to reapply for reinstatement after a year.

MILWAUKEE — Isiah Thomas, a scoring and assist threat throughout his career, Monday night added clutch rebounding to his repertoire.

**Palestinian scholar arrested**

**United Press International**  
 JERUSALEM - Israeli security forces arrested a prominent Palestinian scholar early today, preventing his scheduled meeting with a high-level State Department delegation to discuss the unrest in the occupied territories, Palestinian sources said.

Ghassan al-Khatib, a lecturer at the West Bank's Bir Zeit University - closed under military order - was taken from his Ramallah home about 2 a.m., the sources said. No reason was given for his arrest and an army spokesman

said he had no information on Al Khatib.

Al Khatib and five other Palestinians were scheduled to meet in East Jerusalem this afternoon with a delegation led by Dennis Ross, the head of the State Department's Policy Planning Staff. Ross spoke with other prominent Palestinians Sunday in Jerusalem and his Middle East swing includes stops in Jordan and Egypt.

Palestinian sources said the U.S. Palestinian meeting would be held despite Al Khatib's arrest, and the Palestinians have contacted U.S. officials to express their concern at the detention.

In addition to Al Khatib, those Palestinians scheduled to meet with the U.S. delegation are: Sari Nusseibeh, of Bir Zeit University; Ziad Abu Zayyad, editor of the Palestinian Hebrew-language newspaper Geshet; Izreidin Aryan, head of the Red Crescent Society in the West Bank; Zahra Kamal, head of the Women's Work Committee, and Dr. Zakaria al-Agha, head of the Arab Medical Society in Gaza.

The six, considered supportive of mainstream and leftist factions of the Palestine Liberation Organization, had asked to talk with Ross separately instead of during the Sunday meeting. In a letter to the Americans, they said they would be too large a group in which to express their views, which they said were "representative of the vast majority" of Palestinians in the territories.

"We find the Shamir proposal concerning elections grossly deficient in as much as it is not part of a political process that leads clearly to the establishment of an independent Palestinian state and the exercise of our right of self-determination," the letter said.

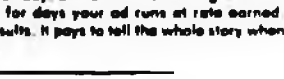

**Cortisone may cause hair growth on body**

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** Recently my doctor gave me a shot of cortisone in each knee for arthritis. It helped but now I have hair growing on my body. My doctor says the two are not related, but I want a second opinion.

**DEAR READER:** Then by all means obtain one from another physician who can examine you.

Cortisone, when injected into a joint, reduces inflammation and does not have appreciable effects on the body as a whole. In such small doses, it will not promote hair growth.

On the other hand, large doses of cortisone taken internally may produce a growth of fine hair, especially on the face.

I'm afraid you will have to find another reason for your troublesome problem.

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** I'm concerned about the electricity in my body. When I remove my panty hose, they practically do a cha cha when I try to put them on my chair. Now that my blood pressure is extremely high (I'm on Minipress), I'm wondering if too much electricity could be the culprit.

**DEAR READER:** Static electricity is harmless. It is the build-up (and discharge) of electrical charges on objects within our environment.

For example, when you walk on a rug and then touch a metal object, you may experience an unpleasant spark; this is the discharge of static electricity that formed from the friction between your shoes and the rug, and then jumped to a grounded object.

In dry weather, the friction of clothing-fabric will tend to cause garments to cling or to wrinkle.

Try a humidifier in winter if this bothers you.

Similarly, when you rub a balloon on a fuzzy surface, it will develop a static charge, causing it to stick to the wall or the ceiling.

These charges do not enter the body, cause hypertension or affect health. However, I must admit that after a long working

day, I sometimes feel that I'm being held together by static cling!

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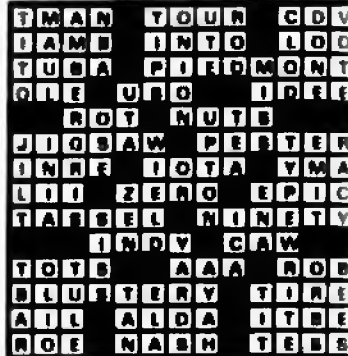

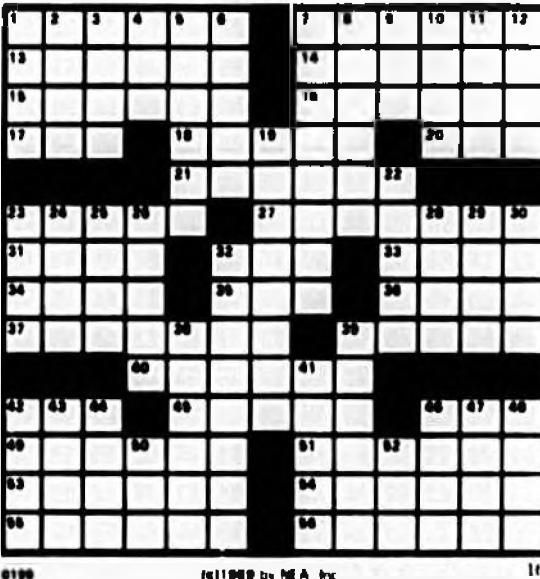

**WIN AT BRIDGE**

By James Jacoby

Suppose you have all the tricks but one. Perhaps you think it polite to concede a trick to the opponents. Not so. It is always right to play the hand out. First, a card you think is a loser may actually be a winner. Second, an opponent may discard carelessly to give you a trick. Finally, an advantageous end position may have developed without your realizing it.

North guessed better than I would have when he passed three spades. West led his singleton club. Declarer cashed dummy's spade king and led a heart. East won the jack and gave West a club ruff. Back came the queen of diamonds, ducked by declarer. A second diamond to East's 10 was ruffed, and

declarer played A-J of spades, shedding a diamond and a heart from dummy. West won the spade queen and played another heart. Declarer ruffed and now conceded that he would have to lose a club. That was much too charitable. Here is the layout:  
NORTH: Spades —, Hearts Q, Diamonds K 9, Clubs A  
EAST: Spades —, Hearts A, Diamonds A, Clubs J  
SOUTH: Spades J 10, Hearts —, Diamonds —, Clubs 10  
WEST: (immaterial)

South leads the jack of spades, throwing a diamond from dummy. East must keep his red ace, so throws a club. The club ace now drops the jack, and declarer ruffs back to his hand to win the 10 of clubs and make his contract.
