

'Harassed' Sanford Looks To Sen. Chiles

The city of Sanford has appealed to U.S. Sen. Lawton Chiles to find out why the U.S. Justice Department has resurrected a civil rights complaint settled by the city nearly three years ago.

City Commissioner John Morris said today Chiles has been contacted about the order from the Law Enforcement Assistance Administration (LEAA) demanding completion of a detailed questionnaire concerning the settled

complaint. LEAA is an agency of the justice department.

LEAA attorneys have warned the city that failure to complete the questionnaire could result in the city losing federal revenue sharing funds and future LEAA grants.

The questionnaire concerns a former police officer, John C. Moore, who has retired from the city force on a disability pension, and Tony Brooks, who is on the police department payroll but assigned to the Drug Enforcement Administration.

Morris said Chiles has responded to the city appeal by advising he has asked for an explanation from the justice department.

Morris said the city feels it is being harassed since the matter was settled in July 1977. At that time the city settled the issue with the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC) by reinstating John Moore and Tony Brooks to police department posts.

Moore has since retired on a disability pension while Brooks is working with the DEA.

Morris also pointed out today that it is difficult for the city to answer some questions about the employment of Brooks and Moore prior to the settlement because part of the three-year-old settlement with EEOC required the city to destroy detrimental information in the personnel files of the two men.

"LEAA is trying to reopen a file which leaves the city naked because it complied with its part of the EEOC agreement," Morris said.

Meanwhile, City Attorney Vernon Mize was to meet this afternoon with Police Chief Ben Butler and police department personnel to go over the 14-page questionnaire demanded by the LEAA.

Butler said he is puzzled by the newest request for information from LEAA, noting the Justice Department assured the city two years ago that the case was closed.

Butler said the department has completed the questionnaire and Mize will go over the document with police officials.

Mize is to include with the questionnaire a statement of the city's position on the matter. Also to be sent with the questionnaire is the EEOC settlement agreement with the city, a voluminous document.

Mayor Lee P. Moore said the city's position to be given by Mize in a letter to LEAA will say: "The city hasn't done anything wrong; the two men were reinstated and paid back wages; one is still employed by the city and the other would be if he were physically capable of working."

... Running as Independent

Anderson Makes It Official

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Rep. John Anderson announced today he will run for president as an independent because Americans are disillusioned by the candidates running under Democratic and Republican banners.

Anderson, R-Ill., a one-time model conservative who became more liberal during his 20 years in Congress, said he is ending his campaign for the GOP nomination — but that he will remain in the Republican Party.

"America can no longer afford those who are more interested in perpetuating their political power than in perpetuating the ideal for which everyday Americans continue to strive," he told a news conference at the National Press Club.

"I have chosen, after careful deliberation, to pursue an independent course toward the presidency of the United States," said Anderson, and promised to return unused federal campaign subsidies from his GOP efforts to date.

He said he is running as an independent partly because it is clear he cannot win the nomination of a Republican Party dominated by conservatives alienated at his liberal stance on social issues.

Anderson, 58, harshly criticized President Carter — the likely Democratic nominee — but did not mention Ronald Reagan — virtually assured of the GOP nomination.

While noting that he faces an uphill fight for the White House, Anderson said: "On balance, the obstacles pale when one considers that too many people are disillusioned with the prospective choices our party structures are offering."

"Least anybody misunderstand, I have been a member of the Republican Party for 30 years. I will continue my membership in that party."

"I have authorized an exploratory group to begin the process of placing my name on as many states' ballots as possible and to take those steps to challenge the laws in those states which restrict access to the ballot," he said of the Nov. 4 general election.

"However, I am confident the legal obstacles will be overcome and that, indeed, I will remain as an independent candidate through election day."

"The current administration has demonstrated a total inability to chart a clear, common sense economic policy that is capable of arresting our domestic economic decline," Anderson said.

"Our people have come to doubt that they are being told the real truth about their nation's condition. And they have acquired a skepticism that President Carter will do what needs to be done."

3 Groups Want To Build Deltona Hospital

Three separate hospital groups are officially in a race to get permission to build a hospital in Deltona.

The requests may impinge on the future of the planned replacement facility for Seminole Memorial Hospital if a suit now being considered returns Volusia County to the jurisdiction of the Health Systems Agency of East Central Florida (HSA-ECF).

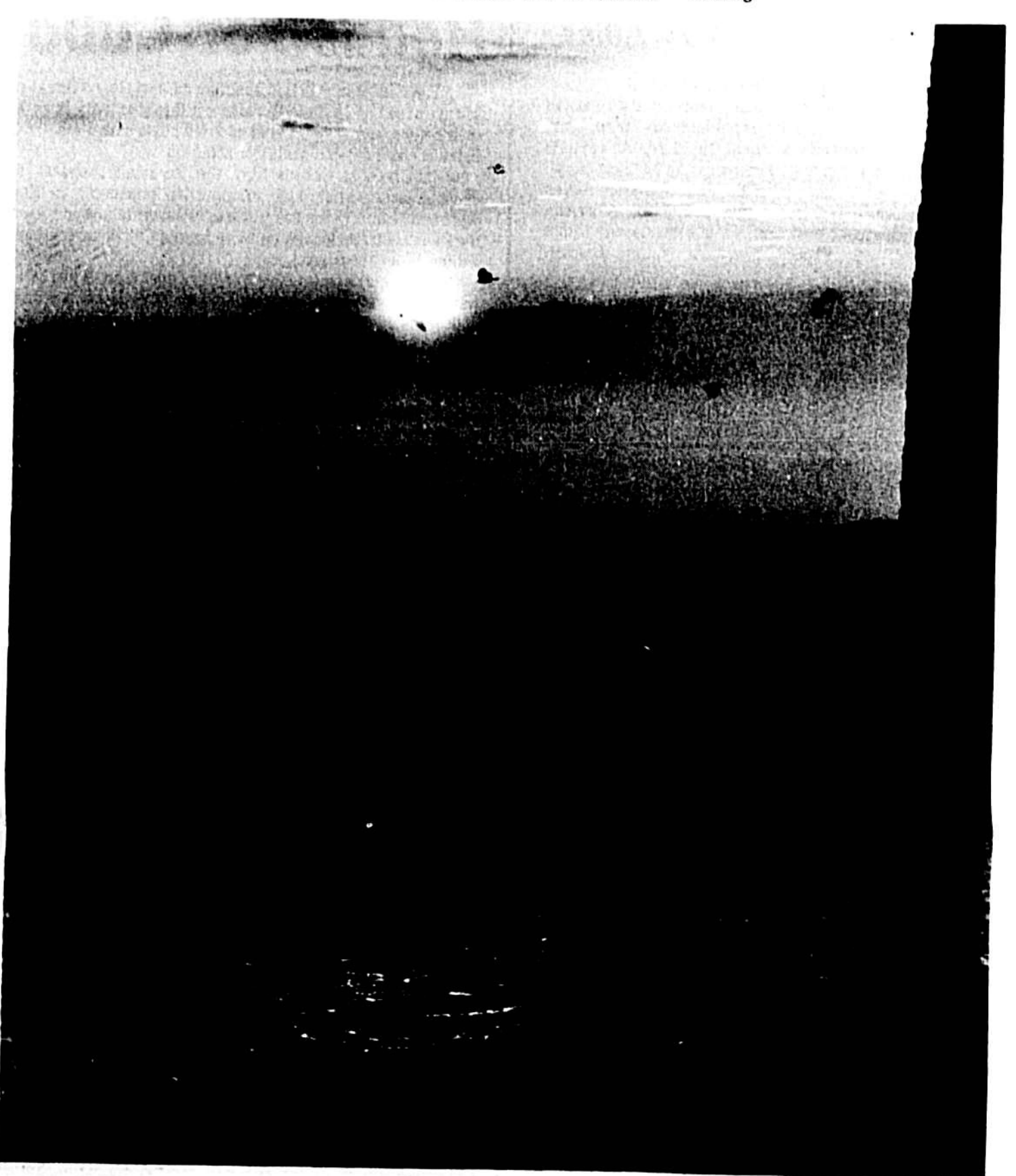
According to the Health Systems Agency of North East Florida (HSA-NEF), which currently has jurisdiction over hospital building requests in Volusia County, three groups have filed letters of intent with that agency. The letters of intent state that each of the groups will ask for the required Certificates of Need to build a hospital.

The groups are Gateway Medical Management Corp., Clearwater; Southern Health Services, Atlanta; and the West Volusia Hospital, Del-And, said Ron Floyd, director of the project review for HSA-NEF.

Volusia County currently has a surplus of a few hundred beds, Floyd said. "But perhaps they are not distributed right," he added.

He said the HSA probably would not begin considering the Certificate of Need request until July. The HSA-NEF board meets four times a year, he said, and has a meeting scheduled for tonight. The board cannot officially consider an application until that application is ruled complete by the state Office of Community Medical Facilities.

According to recent surveys, Keeling said, Seminole County needs about 51 more beds by 1984. But, she said, Florida Hospital-Alamonte is included in the Seminole County area and it may also have requests.

Iran Considers Family's Plea For Conference

TEHRAN, Iran (UPI) — Iran is considering an American family's proposal for an Iranian-American conference aimed at resolving the hostage crisis and intends to take up the Soviet bloc on its offer to help Iran counter U.S.-imposed economic sanctions.

Word on the proposed conference came today from Carl McAfee, attorney for Barbara and Kenneth Timms, mother and stepfather of 20-year-old American hostage Kevin Hermoning.

McAfee said the Timms had proposed the conference in a letter given to Foreign Minister Sadegh Ghotbzadeh Wednesday night and now are awaiting the Iranian government's response.

The official Iranian radio made no mention of the letter or the Oak Creek, Wis., family and government departments were closed in mourning for a

Goldwater Warns Against War

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Barry Goldwater, considered one of the Senate's leading "hawks," wants President Carter to wait a "long time" before imposing a blockade of the Persian Gulf or mining Iranian harbors.

Goldwater, R-Ariz., said Wednesday either move — considered the two most likely options if Carter resorts to military action in an attempt to free the hostages

— would constitute an act of war. He said he hopes Carter will "take a long, long time before committing an act of war at a time when we are not prepared for war. ... I don't want to see my country go to war until I'm sure we can win a war."

Goldwater was the Republican candidate for president in 1964.

The official suggested the matter may be solved by other means because of the inability of the government of Iran to handle its economic and political problems.

The official mentioned a scenario that winds up with Iran becoming a partitioned, dependent state.

He suggested that the present government and Revolutionary Council may be replaced by another form of theoretically controlled government, which would also be incompetent to solve such problems as ethnic divisions and massive unemployment.

That government, he suggested, would then be replaced by something more efficient, but also more ominous: a left-wing Marxist regime that would invite the Soviets to dominate Tehran and the northern half of a partitioned Iran. The southern part, containing the oil fields, would come under the domination of Iraq.

The Russians have put two cosmonauts in orbit for another scientific mission in an orbiting space station. Moscow also has announced the start-up of the world's fastest breeder reactor to generate electricity.

WASHINGTON (NEA) — It is the second week in August and the Democratic Party has assembled in New York City to pick its 1980 presidential nominee.

It is not a happy time in the land. The American hopes have finally returned from Iran, but only after several weeks of "confessions" and "guilt" in news trials.

Obviously, the United States is not happy with Carter. A pre-convention Gallup Poll shows the president's approval rating has dropped below 25 percent to its lowest point ever.

In 1976, only Carter had 25 percent of the delegates, so only what he wanted to reach the floor. It was a smooth convention for Carter.

Would U.S. Allies Boycott Iran?

WASHINGTON — The Central Intelligence Agency has determined that Iran can be brought to its knees "within a matter of weeks" if U.S. allies will agree to boycott the country.

Schools Revise Kindergarten Rules

Parents who think their children don't deserve to wait a year for school because they missed a birth date by a month will be given a chance to get the children into kindergarten next year.

But the new law affects only children born in December 1975, school spokesman Ralph Ray. Under a new law going into effect on July 1, all students entering kindergarten this fall will either have to be 5 by December, 1980 or score 80 percent or better on special early entrance test.

For the past few years, 4-year olds could start school if they would be 5 before January 1 of that school year.

The new law will eventually lead to mandatory kindergarten for Florida children with provisions saying almost all children must begin school after their fifth birthday.

While the Seminole County School Board has yet to approve an official policy implementing the state law on a local level, Ray said parents of children, born in December, who would turn 5 after the new deadline but before the old one, should be prepared to schedule them for specialized testing during the weeks before school opens.

Each student will be individually tested, said a nationally recognized test which determines exceptional and intellectual maturity, said Ray. Students scoring 80 percent or better will then have to prove themselves able to handle school early within the first 20 days or face a one-year wait.

Senators Want Investigation Of Carter Role With Vesco

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Several senators, aroused by complaints from a grand jury foreman, want to investigate whether the Carter administration sought to "cover up" an alleged attempt by fugitive Robert Vesco to bribe White House aides.

Justice Department officials say privately the alleged Vesco influence-buying approach was "thoroughly investigated" during an 18-month probe that resulted in no indictments.

They attributed the "cover-up" charges from Sen. Orrin Hatch, R-Utah, largely to politeness and a "runaway" jury foreman, retired engineer Ralph Ulmer.

Hatch urged during a Senate Judiciary Committee hearing Wednesday the panel subpoena the former chief prosecutor in the case, whom Ulmer accused of trying "to lead the grand jury by the nose."

Lance Jury Makes Progress

ATLANTA (UPI)—There are indications the jury in the bank fraud trial of Bert Lance and three co-defendants is making progress toward reaching a verdict.

After concluding the third day of deliberations, one juror reportedly told a court official that the panel was pleased with what it had accomplished Wednesday.

The jurors also appeared more somber when leaving the courthouse Wednesday evening compared to earlier when they joked and laughed at lunch.

Study Criticizes Care Units

BOSTON (UPI)—Over three-fourths of all patients admitted to intensive care units could have been treated just as well in a general hospital setting, a study published today said.

A related study showed many patients admitted to ICUs with apparent heart attacks could be transferred to general-care facilities within 24 hours and suffer no harmful effects.

The two studies, appearing in the New England Journal of Medicine, were conducted by two groups of doctors at the Massachusetts General Hospital.

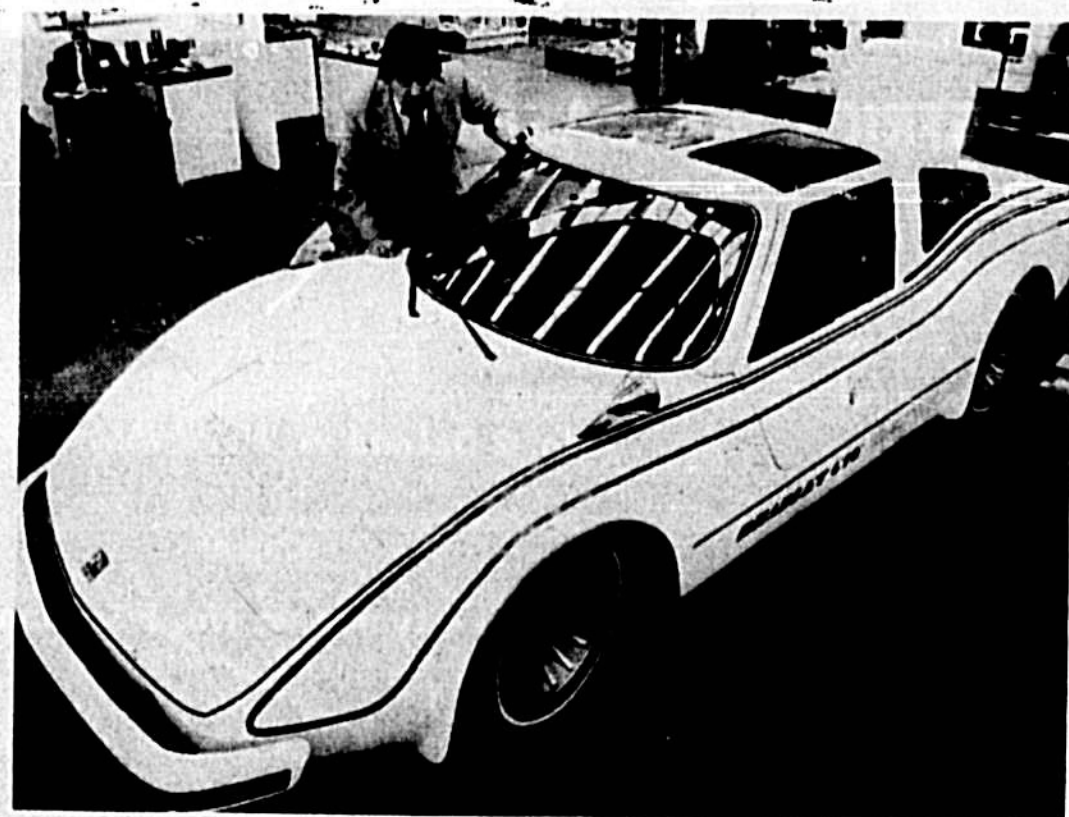

Auto Sales Drop, Prime Up

Economists increasingly agree the economy has entered the long-predicted recession. Charles Schultz, chairman of the President's Council of Economic Advisors, buttressed that assessment Wednesday.

Schultz told the Senate Appropriations Committee "without qualification" the recession had begun but said the administration expected the downturn to be mild.

The five domestic automakers sold 147,371 U.S.-built cars in the April 11-20 period.

The U.S. auto industry's sales slump is now spreading across all model lines, including small cars, in a consumer reaction to the federal government's inflation-fighting tight credit policy.

In other economic developments, the oil industry reported huge profits, and the third largest U.S. bank—Chase Manhattan—cut its prime interest rate a half point to 19 per cent.

Rodino Wants Gun Control

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Rep. Peter W. Rodino, D-N.J., has re-introduced his 1979 handgun control bill—this time with 42 co-sponsors and more determination to get it passed.

"I want to stress that this bill will not interfere with Americans' right to bear arms," Rodino said.

Bush, Reagan Debate To Draw

HOUSTON (UPI)—In their latest televised debate, Republicans George Bush and Ronald Reagan kicked around Cuba, President Carter, taxes and inflation, but not each other. With the cameras off, Bush wondered aloud if they had bored their audience.

With the cameras still on Wednesday night, moderator Howard K. Smith wondered if they hadn't agreed a little too much.

"They did agree on some very important things but they didn't disagree as much as I wanted them to," Smith said, "which is very bad for show business but probably very good for the Republican Party."

At worst, each GOP contender damaged his own cause no more than he damaged the other's, which was not at all.

Hours before the debate Bush boasted he would attack Reagan like the underdog boxer "Rocky." Afterward, he conceded his restraint, saying "you don't have to slug somebody square between the eyeballs" to be effective.

The two agreed on so many points they took care to emphasize the occasional difference. They disagreed on Cuba. Reagan admitted his months-old suggestion Cuba be blockaded in response to global Soviet aggression was only hypothetical and said he knew there "might be other and better options."

But he backed off no further, and when Bush characterized a blockade as "war," Reagan again endorsed it, saying a blockade combined with "a little call on the hot line" to Russia "might get the withdrawal of the (Soviet) troops from Afghanistan."

Reagan, who spent the day campaigning in Texas and playing down his loss to Bush.
