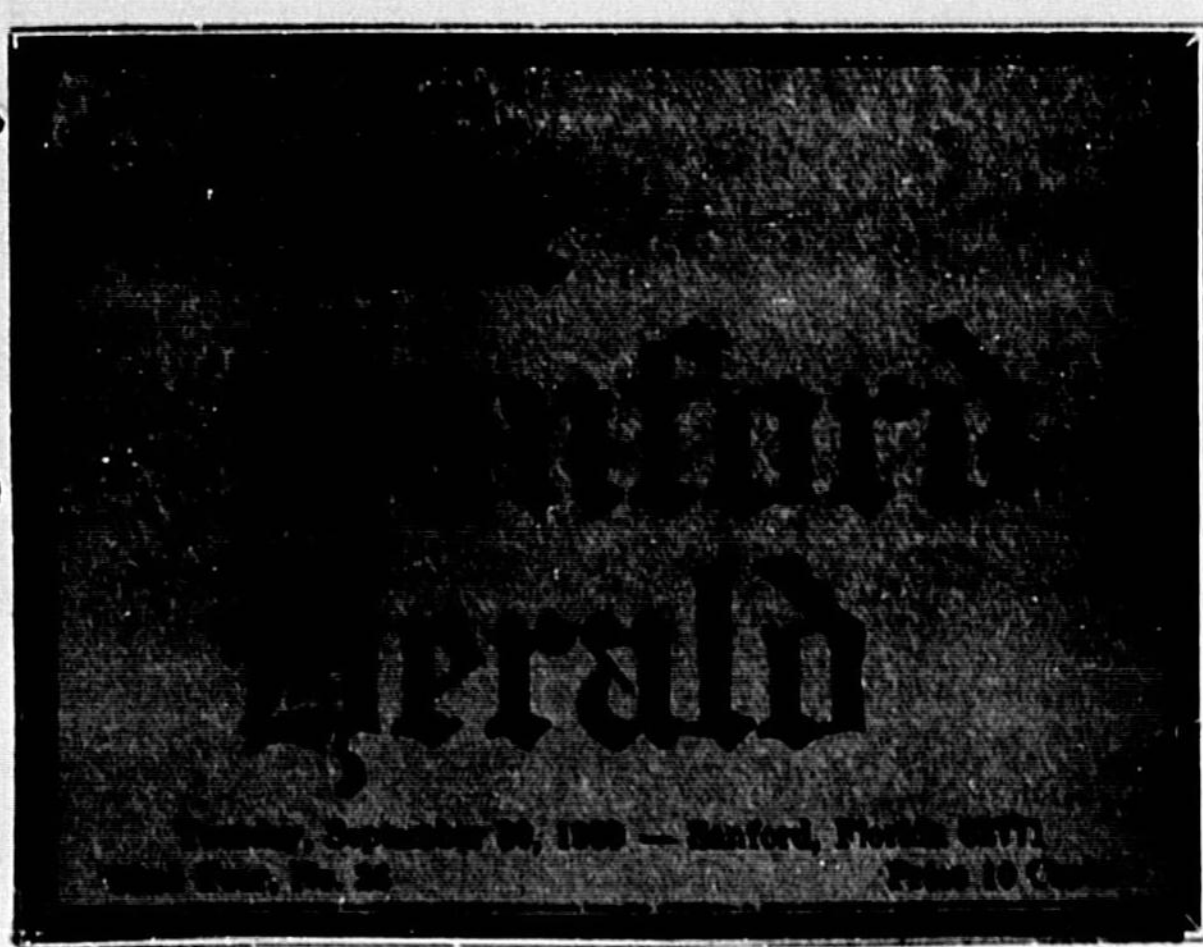

## Sanford Migrant School Is Vetoed

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — The federal government has vetoed a proposed training school for migrants operated by private industry at the old Sanford Naval Air Station, a state official said today.

Don Meiklejohn, director of the Division of Commercial Development said the state is "starting a new ball game" in an effort to revive the migrant training program.

He said he didn't know whether it would be at Sanford, if put into operation.

"I would think that if it makes sense for it to be at Sanford, yes," he said. "I suppose Sanford is reasonably centrally located."

Meiklejohn said Gov. Claude Kirk received a letter from Robert Fish, secretary of health, education and welfare, which said "they didn't seem to think they could fund" the program as originally proposed.

Two of the nation's biggest firms, General Electric and Aeco Corp., offered competing proposals which would have entailed a federal outlay of about \$6 million.

"We're trying to devise some sort of plans which will meet the criteria of HEW," Meiklejohn said. "It may fit into the Department of Commerce ... into an ongoing program so we're not heaping one program atop of another."

## 'A Lie Was Told' Lawyer To Sue School Board

 Orlando Attorney William D. Rowland said today he intended to file a suit against the Seminole County School Board after a meeting Monday with a number of plaintiffs, who are opposed to the freedom of choice desegregation plan adopted by the board for the 1969-70 school term.

Rowland, in an exclusive Herald interview today, said that the "choice" plan as implemented by the board was not a choice plan and that a "lie was told to the public by the board through their attorney Douglas Stenstrom."

Rowland stated that in Stenstrom's reply to the U.S. Department of Health Education and Welfare's (HEW) allegations that resulted in the county's federal funds being deferred, was the statement, "while the words freedom of choice were used in the board's school plan for 1969-70, in truth and in fact, the plan of the board was a modified zoning plan."

This statement to the federal bureau is interpreted by Rowland as an admission that the county tried to pass off a freedom of choice plan on citizens while in reality it was a modified zone plan, and as such was never considered by the board in deliberations of three plans.

Rowland said that Pat Buis, board member, was willing to give an affidavit attesting that at no time was a modified zoning plan considered by the board.

Rowland accessed the board of calling it a freedom of choice plan, but all the time they knew it was not.

The attorney stated he had been in contact with HEW and was told by that body the county could not safeguard deferred funds by getting the case before a federal judge.

This confirms a Herald story reported last week when an attorney from HEW called Stenstrom and said board could possibly lose federal funds thought to have been approved for this term.

Rowland said he had every-

## White House Called Relatives Digging Deep

Two relatives of slain Sanford Fireman Bobby Thompson came to the Herald today and advised they were told to collect information to submit to the office of President Richard M. Nixon, after they contacted the chief executive's office Sunday by phone.

Dorothy Brooke, 244 Orange Avenue, and Evelyn McClary, 610 W. Ninth Street, sisters and cousins to the dead man who was found by police stuffed in a closet at his Sanford home, said they had contacted the President's office for help in seeing that justice was done in the upcoming murder trial of Mable Frances Thompson, wife of the deceased.

The women maintained that unless there is some outside action to force the trial of Mrs. Thompson, it is possible the woman may never face prosecution.

Citing the county's murder conviction record, the women noted that it had been 29 years since a first degree conviction has been obtained in the county's courts.

## 7,300 Here Eligible For Food Help

 A total of 7,300 persons in Seminole County are eligible for assistance under the federal food commodity program, it was reported today by E. Lee McCubbin of Jacksonville, chief of the Bureau of Agricultural Distribution, State Division of Family Services (formerly the Family Welfare Department), to the County Commission.

McCubbin outlined the program of the food stamp plan as compared to the food distribution plan to the county commission, which is giving consideration to giving food assistance to county indigents. McCubbin said, 31 Florida counties now are under the food distribution program and none under the food stamp program. He added that Orange and Collier Counties have been approved for the food stamp program.

He indicated that the federal government, through proposed laws now before congress, eventually will favor the food stamp plan. He said that the food distribution program could be implemented in Seminole County within 90 days. Under this plan surplus foods are given to welfare beneficiaries. He added that it is a moot question when the U.S. Department of Agriculture might approve an application by Seminole County for food stamp plan assistance. Under the food stamp plan welfare beneficiaries purchase stamps and receive bonus stamps commensurate with their income.

## 90 Persons Argue Pro And Con Orange OKs Sex Education

ORLANDO, Fla. (AP) — A voluntary sex education program that some called "Communist inspired" and others said was "God-given right of our children" was hammered out Monday by the Orange County School Board during a 12 1/2-hour public hearing. The program, based on a controversial pilot program used in a few schools last year, came at the end of the meeting at which nearly 90 persons earnestly and sometimes tearfully testified for or against sex education in the public schools. "We must stop this thing before Florida blossoms into another California or Sweden," Mrs. Helen Alderman said in quavering voice. 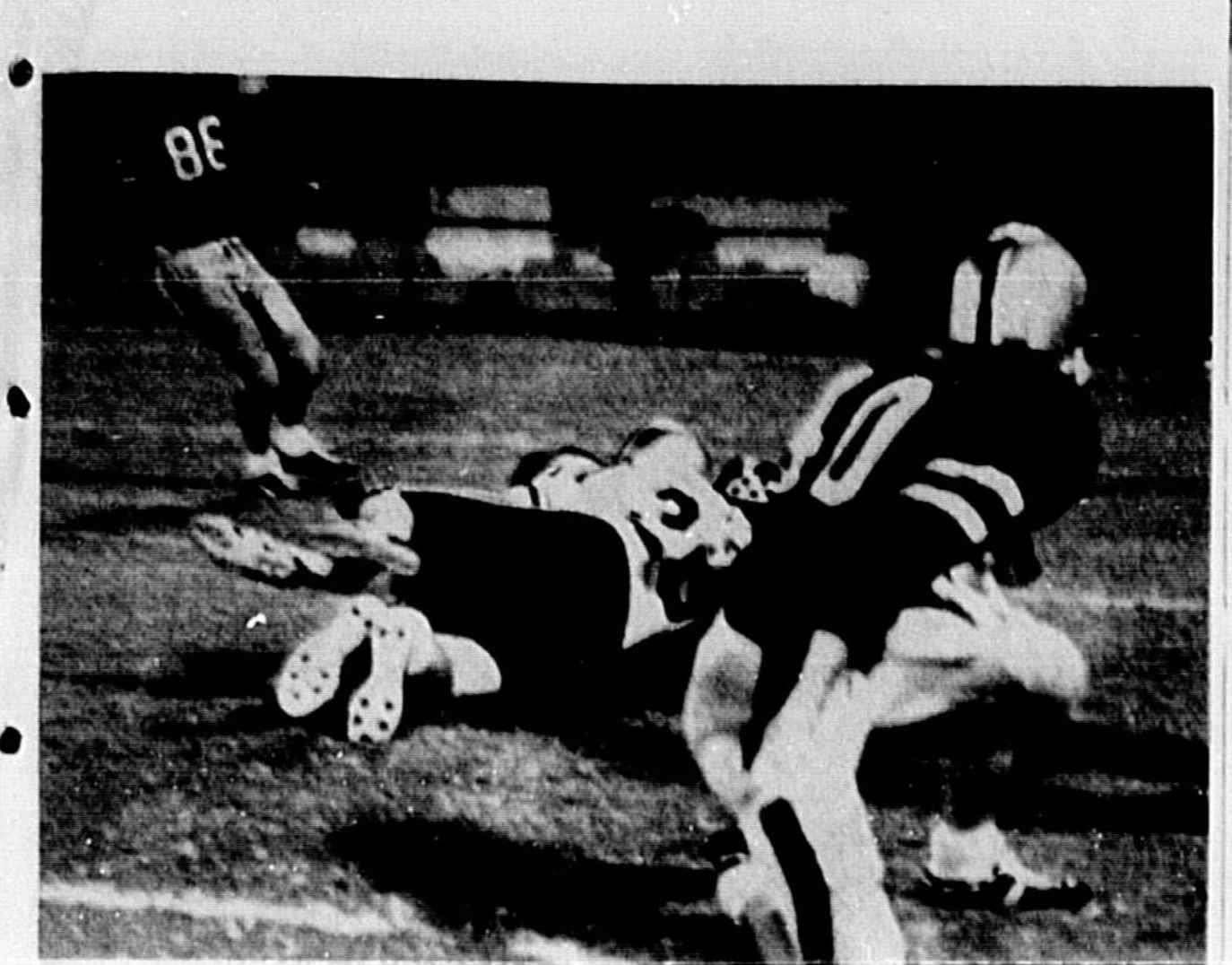

## Pro Bouts Announced

In the recorded history of the sail-propelled boat, the very first drawing of such a vessel appears in Egyptian art about 4,000 years ago. Primitive man must have long before discovered the value of a sail as a propellant factor, spreading animal skins before the wind to move his ungainly craft. "Rags" as the motorboat enthusiast terms the sailboat lever, will tell you that modern sailmaking is an art practiced to a high degree by that old firm of sailmakers at City Island, New York, Ratsey & Laphorn, Inc. This firm was established on the Isle of Wight in England in 1796, and supplied the foremast carried by Nelson's Victory at the Battle of Trafalgar. The indomitable Nelson was mortally wounded in that conflict and his remains were returned to England in a cask of rum, the only preservative aboard ship in that day. Ratsey and Laphorn has furnished sails for many American cup defenders in the world's most renowned sailing competitions. Three of the 29 sloops participating in the Block Island race in June carried sails manufactured by these sailmakers. Yachting and sailing were once regarded as strictly recreational pursuits of the affluent, but now, and more ordinary folk today are turning to sailing. 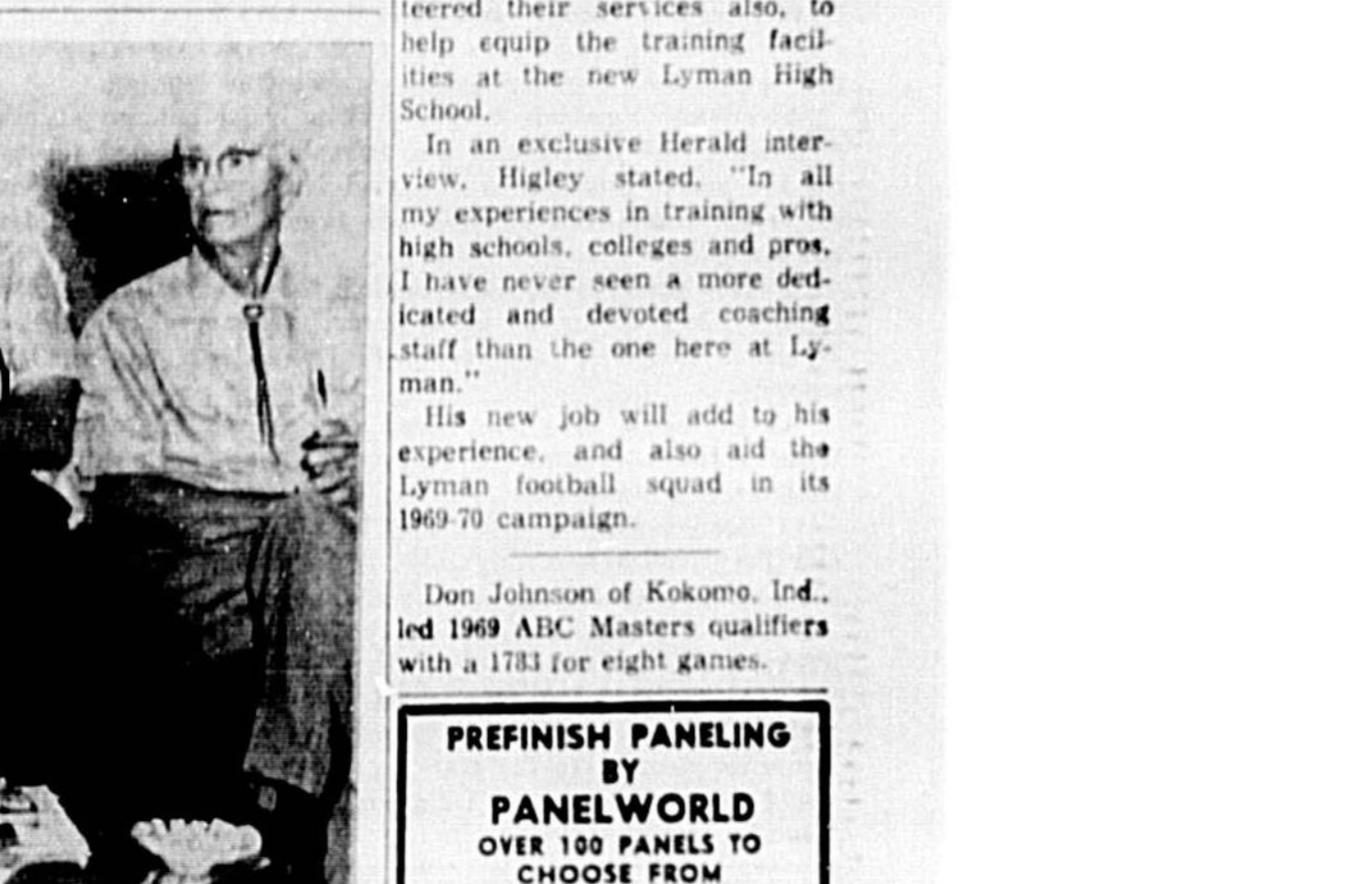
