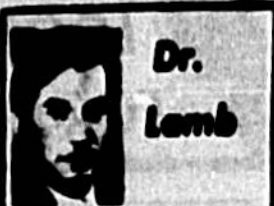

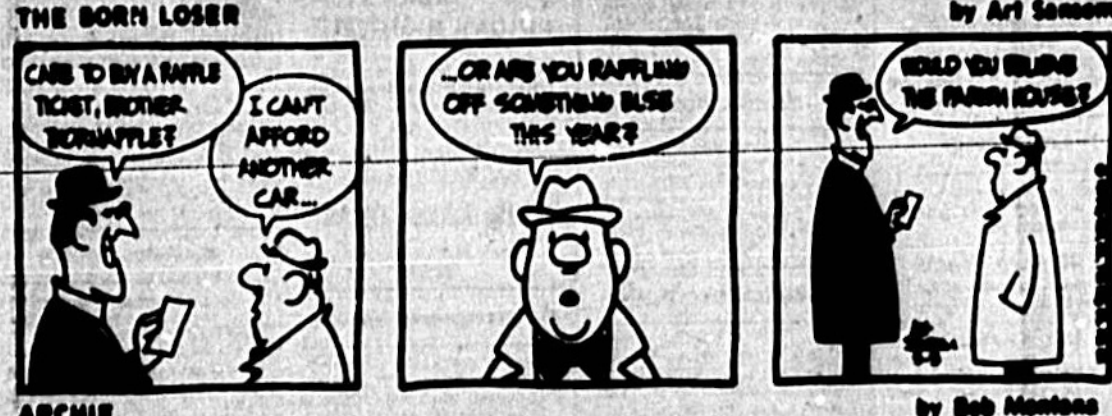

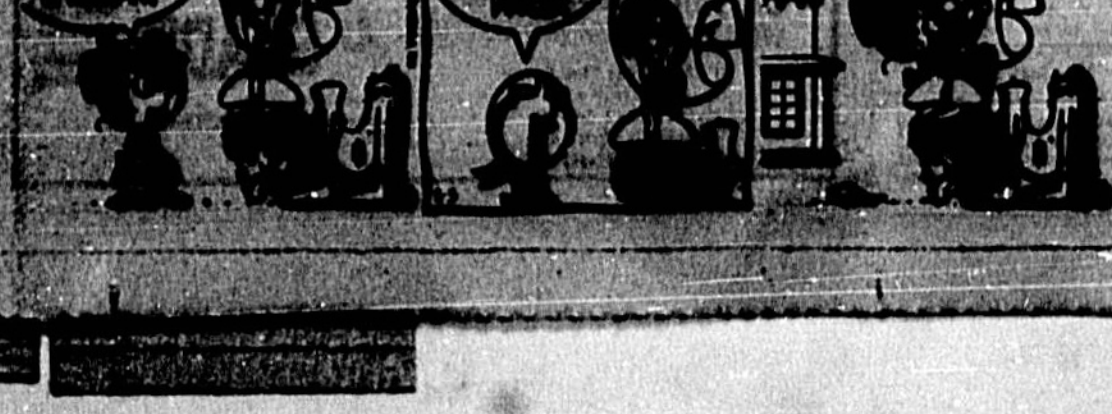

Strike, Weather, Force

900 Railroad Co. Layoffs

JACKSONVILLE (UPI) — The coal strike and bad weather conditions forced layoff of 900 Seaboard Coast Line employees in five southern states, the company announced Friday.

An SCLM spokesman said about 400 of the railroad system's 20,000 employees had been laid off in the last week due to weather conditions and a construction in business caused by the UMW strike.

Others apparently were laid off to lower paying jobs, the spokesman said.

"We hope there will be no more. That's as far as we expect to go at this point," the spokesman said.

By The Stroke Of A Pen

ORLANDO (UPI) — United Shippers and Growers, a Florida citrus industry association, has expressed concern that preferential tariff treatment could be afforded all Cuban products by the stroke of the president's pen.

General manager William McGee said Friday the association had been advised by its attorneys that a presidential order could revoke the action taken by President John Kennedy in 1962 when he banned all U.S. assistance to the present government of Cuba.

More Charges Against Bundy

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The state has filed 20 more felony charges against Theodore R. Bundy, but still lacks the hard evidence needed to link him to the disappearance of a Lake City girl who police believe has been killed and buried in some desolate spot.

Since Kimberly Diane Leach, 15, vanished from her junior high school campus three weeks ago, hundreds of law enforcement officers have combed the woods and swamps of North Florida. Not a trace of the girl has been found.

Prisoner Return Scored

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The Florida Parole and Probation Commission will open a state hearing officer's finding that the procedures it uses to return an estimated 800 persons a year to prison are illegal.

PPPC attorney Carolyn Bernierowski said the case will be filed in the 1st District Court of Appeals by Friday, awaiting a hearing on things that the revision part of the agency's function is not subject to the Administrative Procedures Act.

Sheriff Colman Fires Three

ORLANDO (UPI) — Orange County Sheriff Melvin G. Colman has fired his indicted chief deputy plus the two deputies who first aired charges that money was missing from an investigative fund.

Colman announced the dismissals Friday of Chief Deputy Leigh O. McEachern, Capt. Wayne Hind and Deputy Steve J. Giv. He said he fired McEachern because the chief deputy refused to resign after being indicted by an Orange County grand jury Wednesday on charges of stealing money from the Sheriff's Department investigative fund.

How Much To Get What?

MIAMI (UPI) — Dade County officials told a congressional subcommittee Friday they spent more than \$80 million in taxpayer funds last year on paper work to apply for the money in federal aid.

Bill Tolbert testified before the committee on a commission and provision that the state government delivered five million of completed forms to Atlanta to apply for 18 federal grant programs. The county received aid from only three, he said.

\$3 Billion In The Hole

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — The Florida Legislature is expected to pass a bill Friday that would allow the state to sue the federal government for \$3 billion in federal aid that has not been received.

Mr. Grant And The Law

Longwood Council Chairman J. R. Grant this week demonstrated a total disregard and disrespect for the cause of lawlessness.

Mr. Grant, vehemently opposed to a proposed ordinance banning parking of vehicles weighing a ton or more in front of houses in residentially zoned areas, was not content only to express his opposition to the law.

Instead, he publicly pledged to disobey the law if and when it came into effect.

Such behavior is at least inexcusable; at worst, irresponsible for an elected public servant in a nation of laws.

An elected public servant, above all others, must be a devotee to law and encourage the observance of laws among those whom he is governing. Anything less could lead to anarchy.

Our system is based on law. And, if any one law is deemed by the citizenry to be unfair, discriminatory, or wrong, there are procedures to change that law.

That is the way our system works. And the way it must work if it is to survive.

Mr. Grant has his opposition to the law on his belt. It is unconstitutional. It might be, but the burden is on him to show that it is. It is not on the backs of a reviewer or his fellow citizens.

Mr. Grant has allied himself with school bus drivers in Longwood in opposing the proposed parking ban. "I've got three church buses at my house and I'm going to park them there," he promised. "I don't care what you do."

And, added Mr. Grant haughty might: "I've been a citizen and a community leader since 1946. Whenever I leave here they can arrest me."

Such a total flouting of the law and lawful processes is bad enough. But Mr. Grant went further, belittling those on the other side of the issue.

"These others who have moved in here," he claimed, "are a higher class of people who don't have to work for a living."

Is this the way for an elected public official to act and talk? Such behavior is disgraceful and Mr. Grant should be called on it by the residents of Longwood.

It is the duty of every citizen to feel as chairman of this city council, were charged with the duty of representing the people of interest," he commented. "If you are going to ignore this ordinance, you set a precedent for other residents."

We second that appraisal and suggest that Mr. Grant, at the very least, should excuse himself from this issue.

The Urban Game

Bits of what may be the Carter urban policy are trickling out of Washington, and there is one man that ought to question the policies of city officials.

That man is the plan to punish or reward cities in accordance with whether or not they channel federal funds into the cities and towns most depressed or most financially hardened.

The plan would mark a departure from the past in several respects. However, it would become a competitive game between the cities of the 50 states as to who would be the winners and who would be the losers.

These cities which do not qualify under these standards would not stand to benefit by the new plan. And they would stand to lose part of their own revenue-sharing funds.

However much cities might like to renege on their part in the new urban policy, they would have to make it by increasing the property tax or cutting back on their own revenue sharing programs.

It is not an encouraging thought, and it is a reminder of the need for cities to be prepared for the changes in the way of the city.

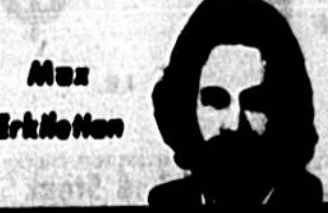

Lyman and Lake County had far swiftest with 30 each. Apollo, Seabrook and Mainland rounded out the winners.

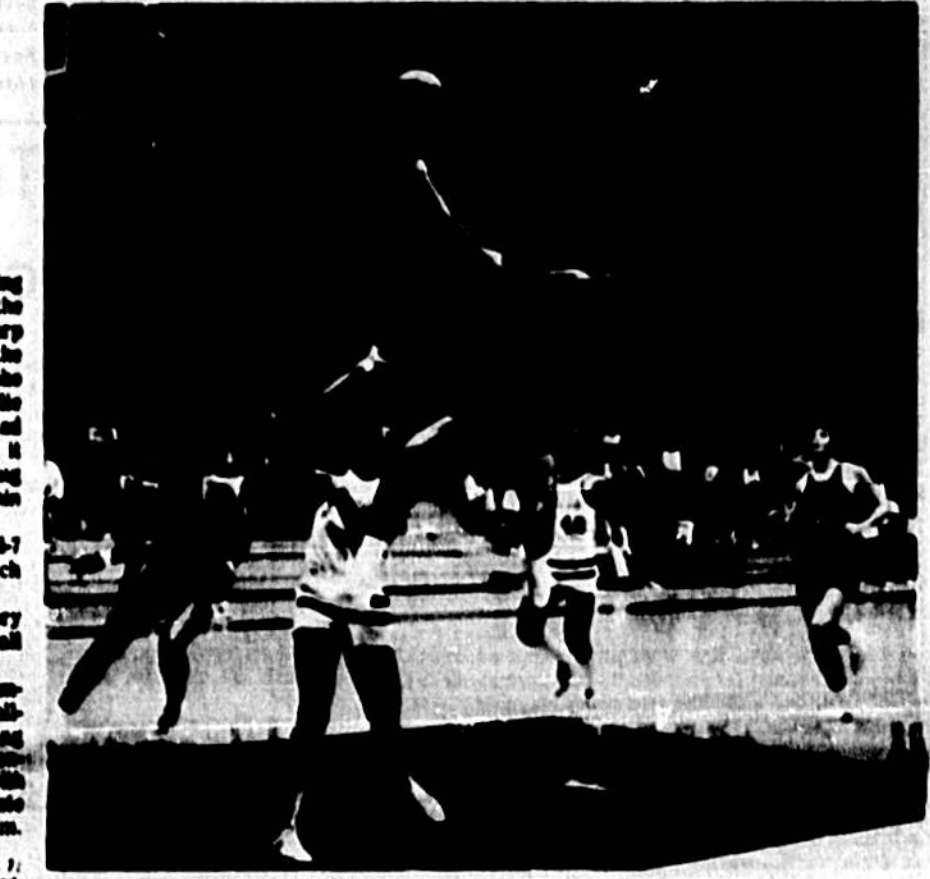

HOLLYWOOD — Mike Douglas is big time now. The big time as you can get, and he comes out to California frequently to do his highly successful talk show.

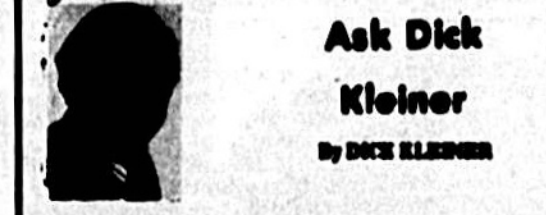

He's still with them. This is his 17th year and he's just done his 4,200th show. In the world of talk shows on TV, you'll find Carson and Griffiths, but there are just as many Douglases. The show, based in Philadelphia, is one of the big ones in that field.

It isn't easy. He makes it look easy — so do Johnny Carson and Mary Griffin — but it's hard. He says nobody knows quite how hard it is.

"There's a lot of pressure," he says. "There's the syndicator pressure, trying to turn a dull person into an interesting interview. Trying to get along with a drunk."

"You have the rock sets who are stoned — if you asked them the next day if they had been on the show, they wouldn't know."

He thinks one of his greatest tributes is that he has no enemies — "Because I never say anything bad."

And, come to think of it, he's right.

He has the staff, which interviews the guests in advance, to get some idea of what they can say and of areas that should be avoided. But Douglas never once lets a guest before he goes on the air. "That's the bias of death," he says.

Now, with 17 years of experience behind him, he is looking for new worlds to conquer. He would like to do more acting. There's nothing on other people's shows.

They're not Marie Casanovi were on my show, and that's where they were spotted by Fred Silverman, that's how they got their own show," he says. "They've been after me to guest on their show and I just made a date — I'll be a good with them on a show they'll tape next August."
