

Scientists discover oldest chimp-human in Ethiopia

NEW YORK — Scientists have discovered fossils of the earliest known relative of humanity since the human lineage split off from the ancestors of the African ape.

The previously unknown species of ape-man roamed woodlands about 4.4 million years ago in Ethiopia, said researcher Tim White of the University of California, Berkeley.

"This is the first time we've seen a human ancestor in such a wooded environment," White said Wednesday.

The finding suggests the first stages of human evolution probably happened in forests, rather than grasslands as many scientists had envisioned, said Richard Wood of the University of Liverpool in England.

"It's not the Savannah that we used to think of as the evolutionary site," White said. "The first signs seem to have been taken in forest habitats" after the human lineage split from the ancestors of the chimps.

White said the creature was only related to the last ancestor shared by humans and apes.

White and his colleagues announced the discovery in today's

issue of the journal Nature. They found fossils from 17 individuals of the species they dubbed *Australopithecus ramidus*, including teeth, parts of a skull and lower jaw, and complete bones of a left arm.

"Ramidus" means "root" in the language of the Afar people who live in the area of the discovery and contribute to the scientific work there. Scientists chose the name to recognize them.

The fossils are about 800,000 years older than the earliest firmly established remains of *Australopithecus afarensis*, which had been the oldest known link to ancestors of the apes.

The ramidus fossils were recovered in 1982 and 1983 about 140 miles northwest of Addis Ababa. The site is about 45 miles south of Hadar, where the most famous *afarensis* remains, a partial skeleton nicknamed "Lucy," were found.

Researchers uncovered the ramidus fossil trove after Gen. Sawa of the University of Tokyo spotted a ramidus tooth among pebbles on the desert floor in December 1982.

Analysis of the teeth and other fossils showed a mix of traits that place ramidus between *afarensis* and a more chimp-like

precursor. Wood said the work supports the controversial view that modern humans are more closely related to chimps than to gorillas.

The idea that ramidus lived in woodlands comes from analyzing sediments and fossils from hundreds of mammals found along with the ramidus remains. The analysis is presented in a Nature paper by Giday WoldeGabriel of Los Alamos National Laboratory in New Mexico with colleagues, including White.

Researchers found abundant evidence of forest-dwelling monkeys and anteaters that lived in bushlands and forests, White said. He said the environment apparently contained abundant trees but was not a lush rain-forest.

Eric Nelson, anthropology professor at Lehman College in New York, said more study was needed to confirm the idea that ramidus lived in the woods.

White said scientists have not yet found any bones from below the waist, which they hope to use in determining whether ramidus typically walked on two legs or four. Some indirect evidence suggests it walked on two legs as its descendant *afarensis* did, he said.

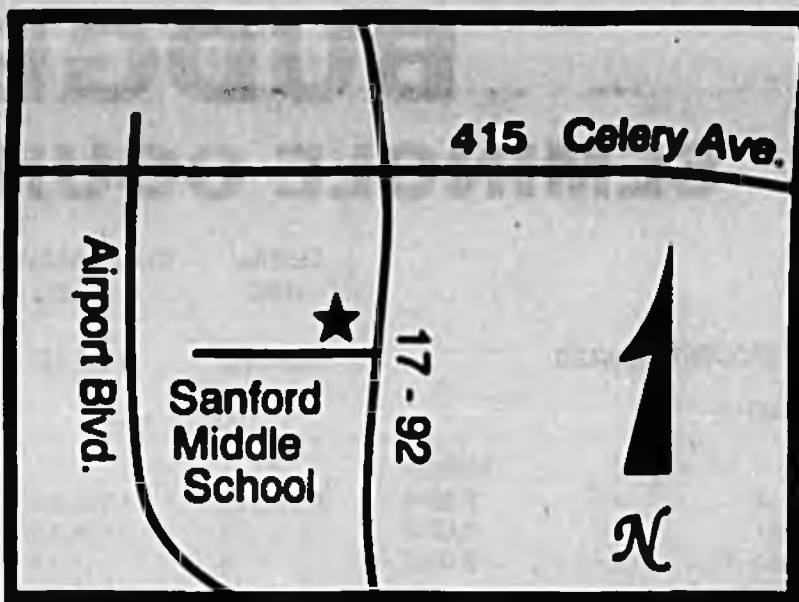

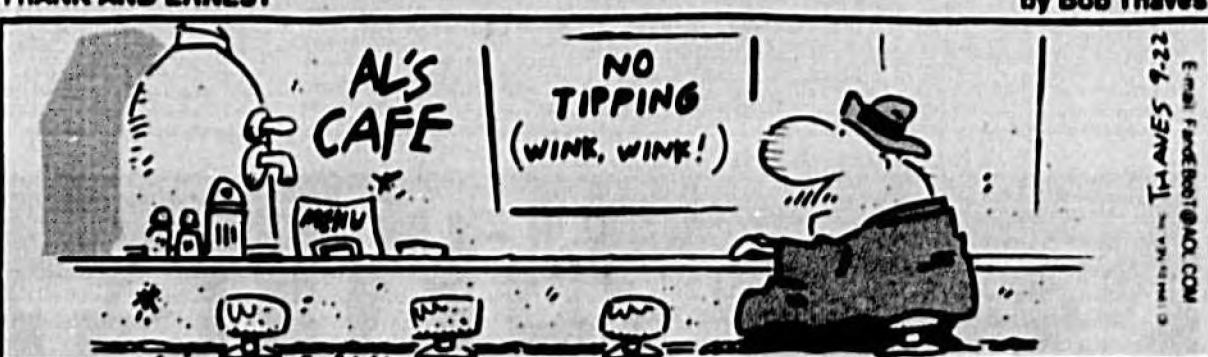

DEAR DR. GOTT: My mother has been diagnosed with small vessel disease...

DEAR READER: As a consequence of the aging process, each of us, sooner or later, develops 'rust in the pipes'...

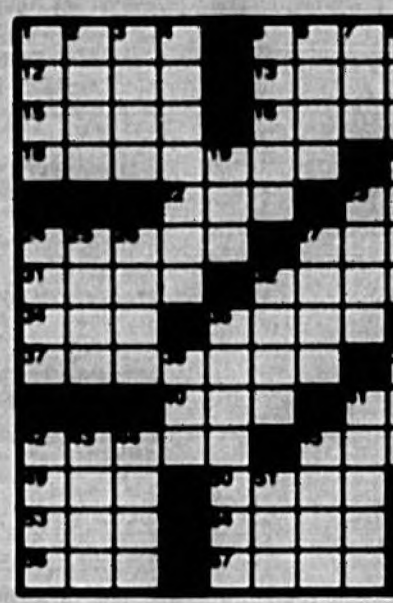
