


SAIGON (AP) - Heavy Communist rocket and artillery fire pounded U.S. Marine outposts and sweeping forces today just below the demilitarized zone where ground fighting or gus duels have raged for four days. The U.S. Command said 15 Leathernecks were killed and 51 wounded in eight enemy bal rages in the past 24 hours. This brought the unofficial four-day casualty toll to 106 killed, 321 wounded and 6 missing. The Marines have reported 168 North Vietnamese killed but believe the total enemy casualties are far higher. Each North Vietnamese bar-

rage was answered by the Marine guns, but the Red bal teries were evidently well dug in at solidly prepared siles. As sociated Press correspondent Steve Stibbens reported from the battle area that the forces of the 90th North Vietnamese Regiment, which had been fighting the Marines since Sunday, had pulled back at least temporari-

Pushing forward to recove the bodies of Marines killed in the big battle last Sunday, the Marines ran into a rabbit warren of abandoned, battered Sweeping forces protected by



WASHINGTON (AP) - The chief of schools in the nation's capital has resigned in a dispute over a recent court finding that racial discrimination exists in the system. Carl F. Hansen, 61, superin-

tendent of Washington's schools since 1958, announced his resignation Monday from the \$26,000 His decision followed a vote by the district of Columbia Board of Education not to permit him to appeal a decision handed down last month by U.S. Circuit Judge J. Skelly Wright. Wright ordered busing of pu-

pils to end so-called de facto segregation, or racial imbalance, in the schools. Wright's ruling also ordered integration of school faculties while condemning and ordering halt to Hansen's inventionthe so-called track system of student placement. Under the system, children are given aptitude tests and then assigned curiculum of

varying degrees of difficulty. Vright said the tests were geared to white, middle-class children and thus handicapped from the beginning Negro youngsters and those from lowucome white families. At a news conference, Hansen accused the board of depriving him of a civil right by denying him the right to appeal. He said he did not plan to appeal the court's ruling on busing, faculty integration or even the track system, but "upon the threat to local management of the public schools inherent in the court opinion and upon the uncertainties in the declarations concerning de facto segrega-

MacDonell Tyre, Chapter president, in a letter to members of the Board of Directors of the American Red Cross and United Fund Agencies, stated that the first comprehensive dispatch from the International Committee of the Red Cross concerning the situation in the Middle East has now been received. The relief program will be handled jointly by the League and the ICRC particularly as it relates to the handling and processing of appeals for assistance. The ICRC now has special delegates in the area, two of whom are in Cairo, two in Amman, one in Beirut, one in Damascus, and four in Tel-Aviv (two of whom are physicians).

The first appeal has been for medical supplies and equipment for use in Jordan, Syria and the United Arab Republic. Thus far, there has been appeal for medical supplies by the Society in Israel. In accordance with long established procedure, the Sen-for Medical Advisor of the American Red Cross will be in touch with the Pharmaceutica Manufacturers Association, who, in turn will determine where the various items requested can be secured.

Eight GOP governors who ousted Democrats in 1966 are eager to strengthen their party's position in their states. Most states will elect legisla tures in 1968. These local and state factors are among concerns behind the

unanimous call at the June Republican Governors Conference for uninstructed delegations to the national convention except where instruction is dictated by state law or favorite-son wishes. There also is a desire to avoid the fractionating that surounded the 1964 nomination of Barry Goldwater.

While there has been a surge of interest in recent weeks in Gov. Ronald Reagan of California, former Vice President Richard M. Nixon has been abroad and Gov. George Romney has been busy getting his tax program through the Michigan Legislature.


