Texas Heads List Of Grid Teams In A. P. Poll

NEW YORK, Nov. 4.—(AP)—The University of Texas football team, which got into high gear for the opening game of its season and hasn't been throttled down since today rolled into first place in the Associated Press football ranking poll.

The awesome scoring machine which Coach Dana Bible has perfected in the fifth year of his five-year plan ran a close second to Minnesota the first two weeks of the poll. A week ago the Longhorns moved up on even terms, and in his fourth weekly ranking went out in front by 37 points.

Of the 121 football experts throughout the country who took part in the voting, 73 made the Texans first choice, and no other split his ballot between Texas and Minnesota. The Longhorns were ranked first or second on 110 ballots, and accumulated 114 1/2 points, 111 for the Gophers, points being awarded on the basis of 10 for a first-place vote, nine for second, eight for third, and so on down.

Texas hit probably its peak of the year when Southern Methodist last Saturday, when Bible's boys won 34-0. They gave them a total of 230 points for six games, on average of a fraction over 38 per game. On defense they have allowed only 37 points while beating down Colorado, Louisiana State, Oklahoma, Arkansas, Rice and S. M. U.

Minnesota, rated No. 2 team nationally a year ago, slipped from the top after scoring what was perhaps the Gophers' most creditable victory—an 8-7 conquest of Northwestern.

The next three places in the week's tabulation went to holders from a week ago—Ford-

Navy Searches Bag Of Tricks For Notre Dame

BALTIMORE, Nov. 4.—(AP)—Canny Swede Larson, who likes to play a hunch, is at it again—packing surprise dynamite to throw at the Irish when Navy takes the field Saturday hoping to blast high-flying Notre Dame from the pedestal of football's unbeaten teams.

For the third straight year Larson is digging into the junior varsity grab bag to haul out another prospect for the Middle hall of fame.

Two years ago Dick Shafer came up and ran Army right into the turf. Last year it was Bill Chip, a fancy-blocking back. This time it's Teddy Gilliland, 174-pound speedster from Altoona, Pa.

So the nearly 65,000 fans who will jam Baltimore Municipal Stadium may see new stars. Besides Gilliland, Cassin Florsay, a top-flight soph, will be back after being sidetracked by an appendectomy, and Zeke Zechella is recovered from injuries and likely to see action.

But those boys will have to be good to outshine Barnacle Bill Busk, the great Navy back who will be rested and ready.

"We've got to win this one, but it's going to be tough," Larson said.

There'll be nerve-tangling action from start to finish with both teams unbeaten up to the 15th clay of their series in which Navy will be seeking its fourth triumph. Notre Dame has won 11. Each team has won five games and each has played one scoreless tie—Navy with Harvard and Notre Dame with Army.

Larson said the team will be 142 points rolled up apiece, but defensively the powerful and numerous Middle, linemen claim a slight edge, having yielded only a safety and one touchdown compared with 27 points against the Irish.

Harmon's Record As Sophomore Is Beaten By Kuzma

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Nov. 4.—(AP)—Tom Kuzma made up his mind to come to the University of Michigan when a boy across town from him in Gary, Ind., made a football name for himself with the Wolverines.

Nobody—except maybe relatives and home town cronies—ever expected Kuzma to touch the amazing gridiron record of that other Gary lad, Tom Harmon.

But Gary's Tom No. 11 fooled them. Harmon's Michigan football team might have been choice pickings for several 1941 opponents if Coach Fritz Cralter had not come up with this sophomore to fill Harmon's old tailback position.

By mid-season, this 18-year-old grinder had surpassed Harmon's sophomore record in scoring, had earned his first-year passing mark and had become one of the Western Conference's greatest kickers.

Midway through Michigan's eight-game schedule, Kuzma had scored five touchdowns, passed for two more and made his bid as the greatest Wolverine kicker since Harry Kipke got his diploma in 1924.

Cralter has described Kuzma's kicking, such as his 63-yard boot out of bounds four yards short of the goal against Northwest-

ern, as "miraculous." Harmon as a sophomore crashed over the goal line three times. He didn't start punting until his junior year. He heaved three touchdown passes.

Kuzma, a 200-pounder, has a five-pound advantage over Harmon. Each of the Gary boys stands six feet, one inch.

The Michigan coach, always reluctant to praise a sophomore, says that "Kuzma is a good boy to have around."

Cralter will tell you Kuzma can match Harmon in power driving and punting, but that he'll never equal Harmon's speed and shifty broken field running.

"Kuzma doesn't pass as well as Harmon did as a sophomore," Cralter says. But Kuzma is improving. He got off to a bad start in this department of the game but redeemed himself in the critical Northwest battle by tossing 10 and 20 yards for both of Michigan's touchdowns.

Kuzma had to go to summer school after his freshman year to bring his grades up to Western Conference eligibility standards, but he buckled down and got a "B" average for the summer term while coaches moaned that his chances were less than one to five.

Phi Gamma Delta welcomed the outstanding gridman as a freshman and found him "a great social mixer." He waits on tables at the fraternity house to help meet school expenses.

In a geology class last Spring, Tom met Peggy Cannon, an attractive local brunette. Since then they've been studying the stars together as often as they get a chance. She's a sophomore, Kappa Kappa Gamma, and the only girl on the campus Tom dates. Peggy says that "Tom really dances well."

Statement Is Made In Commenting On Attack On U. S. Tanker, Salinas

Indemnity Claims Put Off One Day

Nazi Subs Reported In Sight Of Newfoundland Shore

BERLIN, Nov. 5.—(AP)—German spokesmen commenting on the attack on the United States naval tanker Salinas near Iceland, declared today "now as always, we can only say whoever starts for England heads for sudden death."

These sources asked that they be given another day for "further reflection before giving German reaction to the United States' claim for indemnity in the torpedo sinking of the United States steamer Robin Moor, sunk in the south Atlantic last month."

In Toronto, Navy Minister Angus Macdonald said Nazi submarines are now operating "off the coast of Newfoundland—within sight of the shore," indicating that Berlin had moved its undercurrent threat to the closest approach to American shores.

The Navy department yesterday abandoned hope of rescuing the 88 crew members of the U. S. destroyer Robin Moor, which was reported sunk off Iceland last month, and announced belatedly that the 16,000-ton naval tanker Salinas had been "seriously damaged" by a "U-boat" in the same general area.

"The tanker was in a convoy when it was attacked on Oct. 28, a day before the Robin Moor was sunk," the Navy said. There was no loss of life or serious injury among the Salinas' crew of 107 officers and men, but the navy withheld information about the tanker's fate because it would be "of no value except to the Nazis."

Word of the latest casualty in the battle of the Atlantic was kept secret, it was said, until the tanker had reached port safely. Identity of the port was not disclosed, but the crippled craft (Continued On Page Six)

With all districts re-elected only 5 new men moved into the posts as School Trustees of Seminole County in the county-wide election held yesterday. T. W. Lawton said today, after the School Board had completed the tabulation and most of the district favored a four mill levy for schools next year.

In the Sanford district, with the second largest turnout in the county, 228 voters, three new men went into office. S. D. Chase, Jr., J. L. Galloway and Mrs. W. C. Hutchinson District Two, representing Lake Mary, Longwood, Altamonte, Fern Park, Forest City, Bear Lake and Gabriella, 323 votes were cast with Fred Forward, Roy Howell and W. J. Hartley, a new member, going into office.

All candidates were re-elected in Districts Three, Four and Six, while only one new candidate was elected in District Five. C. R. Clonts, L. H. Gore and George Jakubec were re-elected in District Three by the 21 voters, who also approved a four mill levy for schools next year. The Fourth district approved the four mill levy and re-named E. T. Hamik, A. F. Long and Nolan Fore to office as 15 voters.

O. H. Frynt was elected as a new trustee for District Five and O. B. Mathews and H. W. Smith were re-elected, while the four mill levy was favored. Harold Kaster, J. C. Muse and Gus Schmah were re-elected in District Six where the four mill school tax levy was in favor, 28 casting their ballot.

The tax levy recommended by the State Comptroller's office and adopted by the School Board of the county was set at 3.5 mills for this year so the voters have themselves voted a recommendation of an increase of .5 mill for schools. The vote of District one, embracing Sanford, has not been tabulated as to the millage rate recommendation for next year.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 5.—(AP)—Administration leaders reported today after a White House conference that President Roosevelt believes Congress should enact the pending neutrality revision measure in its present form rather than delay it by tacking on amendments designed to curtail defense strikes.

The two Senators Bilbo (D-Miss.) and Lodge (R-Mass.), asserted their positions as administration leaders carefully checked their voting strength. More than enough senators were still uncommitted, they said, to swing the victory to them.

German Troops Report Reaching Black Sea

Hitler Fighters Are Apparently Splitting Into Three Parts

Nazi Bombers Hit Red Fleet

Russians Report Recapture Of Kalinin In Defense Drive

Hitler's headquarters said that German troops had reached the Black Sea today on the southern Crimean coast between Sevastopol and Kersch and were apparently splitting into three parts. The Germans compared the Red retreat to the allied withdrawal at Dunkerque and added that the Russians were being pursued from Balaklava heights, south of Sevastopol, scene of the storied "The Charge of the Light Brigade."

The Russians reported that Moscow defenders had recaptured Kalinin, 95 miles north-west of Moscow, and declared the Germans were thrown back from the Moshansk sector, 27 miles west of Moscow. The Soviet air force was credited in assisting to recapture Kalinin.

The Germans said repeated Russian attempts to break out of ringed Leningrad were repulsed and Nazi bombers reported new attacks on Leningrad, and Moscow.

Nazi dive-bombers were attempting to cripple the Russian Black Sea fleet and reportedly sank two Red transport, damaged five merchantmen, and small craft in the harbors of Sevastopol, Yalta and Kersch.

In Tokyo, Japan announced she was sending Satoru Kurusu, former ambassador to Germany, to Washington by trans-Pacific clipper in an effort to reach an accord in the U. S. "in view of the very serious situation prevailing."

The new German offensive against Tula, south of Moscow, has been stopped, with thousands of casualties, Russian dispatches said Wednesday, but new Nazi attacks have been launched west and north of the besieged Red capital.

County To Get 6 Million In State Credit

Fund Is From Gas Tax Law, Acts Of Last Legislature

A total of \$6,000,000 is to be credited to the County by the State on the road bonds and interest in accordance with the Gasoline Allocation Act of 1931 and additional roads designated in the County by the last session of the Legislature, the County commissioners were informed by representatives of the State Road Department last night.

The amount is the recapitulation of an audit just completed by the Road Department and the State Comptroller's office, where the County is to receive additional credits for roads not included in the act of 1931 but designated by the 1941 Legislature, Mr. Herndon explained.

The board adopted a resolution requesting the Road Department to accept less than a 100-foot right-of-way on State Road No. 20 to go through Oviedo, as the 100-foot requirement of the proposed state road would mean the tearing down of business buildings along the main street of Oviedo.

U. S. Is Caught In War, Declares Kiwanis Speaker

Lack Of Interest Is Root Of Condition, Says Rollins' Dean

No matter what the United States wants to do it will be caught in the present World revolution, Dean Winslow Anderson, of Rollins College, declared in an address before the Kiwanis luncheon today. Frank Shames, reporter of the club, said.

The present revolution is a struggle between two diametrically opposed ways of life—democracy and totalitarianism, Dean Anderson pointed out. The condition has been brought about by the change in social attitude, and since it has taken a long time to develop it will take a long time to solve, he added.

Defining the two philosophies, Dean Anderson said "democracy is the struggle for individual freedom while totalitarianism is the refusal of the individual to accept the responsibilities of freedom."

Tearing the struggle for freedom, the speaker harkened back to the days of feudalism when an individual counted as nothing except as a part of the group. The fight for freedom brought about democracy as fostered in the United States and parts of Europe.

The young people of today are not interested in freedom but rather in the elements of security and are not ready to fight for their freedom, Dean Anderson declared. This has brought a change in the basic philosophy of government in this country and given birth to the New Deal, the speaker explained.

In a poll of the college youth in this country Dean Anderson said he found their interest lay first in food, clothing and shelter; second in home and family; and third in security in old age, while they gave little interest in freedom.
