Choice Would Cost Less Than F.T.U.

County Official Favors SCC Management Courses

At least one county official is leaning toward Seminole Community College for each management course to top-level county employees.

Bob Andrew, the county's education coordinator, said SCC courses will cost about 10 times less than a similar under consideration by the county officials.

If SCC instructors are chosen, the cost will be about \$10 per employee, Andrew said.

When Andrew — the director of public works — first reported on the availability of management courses, county officials leaned toward selection of the more costly FTU proposal because FTU's staff is larger and is

composed of professors who have published books. But Andrew said the county staff reevaluated its position after meeting with SCC. He said it looks as if SCC will teach about 30 county employees.

Before classes begin, however, the Board of County Commissioners must give the proposal. Andrew says he may present the matter for the commission's perusal at Tuesday's meeting.

Though some citizen criticism has arisen concerning the county's paying out taxpayer money to train county employees, two county commissioners—John Kimbrough and Harry Kwiatkowski—defend the practice.

Kimbrough said keeping county employees up to date on the state of the art of management will save thousands and thousands of dollars in the future.

I would be nice, Kimbrough said, if all management

employees had all the skills necessary to do a top-notch job. But, he added, that just isn't the case — not in private industry, nor in county government.

Kimbrough also said cost management has the potential to save taxpayers a bundle. All 15 all Kimbrough said the commission would be selecting its duty not to insure county government against poor management. If it costs money, Kimbrough says it's a small price for the benefits that will be reaped in the end.

Kwiatkowski said managerial employees need to be brought up to date, also, on the latest theories of employee relations and that state of the art which deals with labor problems.

Not to do that, Kwiatkowski maintains, could have the county in an awkward position when it comes time to bargain with county employees. Public employees this year

for the first time have the right to form unions and bargain collectively for wages and other benefits.

Commissioner Richard Williams, who initially favored paying taxpayer money to train county employees, said he wasn't aware of any controversy concerning the issue.

Commission Chairman Michael Hattaway questioned the facts in a newspaper article which said county officials initially chose FTU courses at \$3,000, as opposed to SCC courses for about \$300.

However, Hattaway plus the county's department chiefs chose FTU over SCC at a staff meeting at the county courthouse in Sanford.

Of course the choice was merely an indication of preference — not an official action by the board.

In Longwood Case

Sheriff Denies Promises Made

Sheriff John Polk denied today that any member of his department promised to assist in the Longwood mother assistance in having arson charges dismissed against her son.

Mrs. Ora (Mary) Jones said Saturday that Sgt. William Vinton of the Seminole County Sheriff's Department gave her "assurances" that the arson charges against her son, Charles Edward Jones, 22, of 274 Warren St., Longwood, would be dismissed. The charges stem from a firebombing at the Church Street, Longwood home of Mr. and Mrs. Linton King.

Sheriff Polk said he discussed the matter with Vinton this morning and Vinton denies making any such promises. "Our department fully intends to handle this case right down the middle and let justice take its course," Polk said.

"I would not tolerate any of my people making such promises if any such promises were ever made," he said.

Meanwhile, Assistant State Attorney William Heffernan, who is scheduled to prosecute Jones on the arson charges, declined comment on the case today.

The arson case is docketed for trial in circuit court this week.

Mrs. Jones said Saturday the arson charge will be dismissed against her son because there is not enough evidence.

Admitting that her son's fingerprints were on the soda pop bottle used in the "Molotov cocktail" hurled into a side bedroom window at the King home on November 10, Mrs. Jones said other fingerprints were also on the bottle.

She said that in addition to the bottle, which lodged between the window and screen at the King home, did not contain a flammable fluid, but rather contained only water.

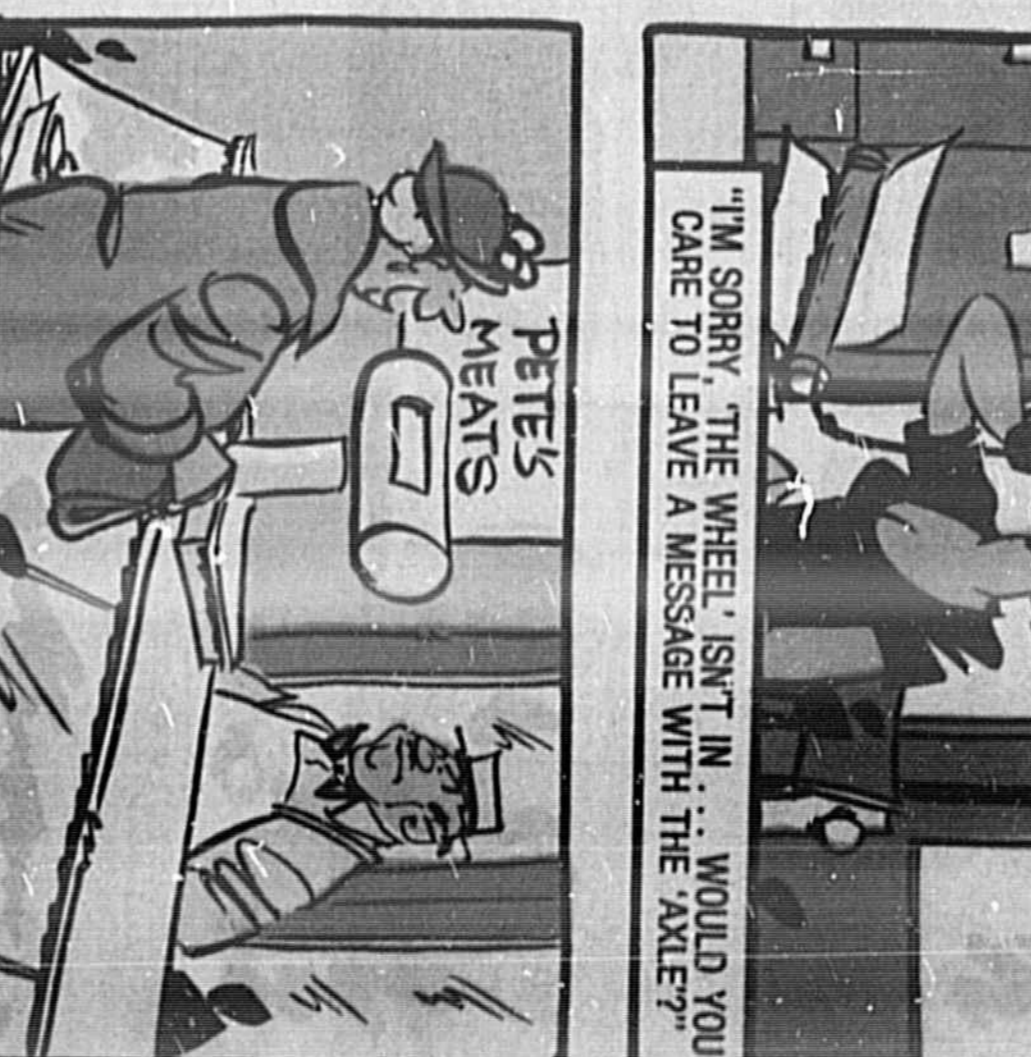
