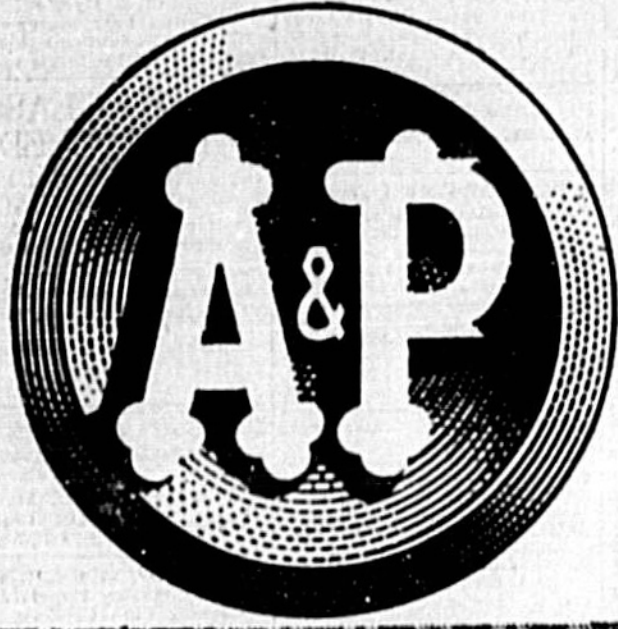

## Ribbon Cutting Opens Penney's

It's gloomy on the outside but there's plenty of sunshine inside. Manager Charles L. Robinson said this morning as J. Penney Company opened its new department store in Sanford Plaza. The company opened its first store in Florida in the city's downtown business district 37 years ago.

Special guests were four women who shopped in the downtown store when it was opened in 1928. They are Mrs. R. H. Pippin, Mrs. J. S. Cleveland, Mrs. C. M. Flowers and Mrs. Elsie Memender.

A ceremonial ribbon-cutting ceremony was held by Penney executives. The group includes Everett Kinton, Tampa, district manager; John Plume, Dallas, Southern zone sales and merchandise manager; Vincent Fernandez, Dallas, operations and control manager; and Bennett Karmim, New York, public relations director.

The new store contains 42,500 square feet and is five times larger than the previous store which closed Saturday in downtown Sanford. The store has 23 separate departments of one level and an inventory of more than \$200,000.

Robinson said he is pulling out all stops to make the opening of Seminoles County's first, true department store as colorful and entertaining as possible.

He said there would be a continuous program of special opening day events with giveaways, special guests and pretty girls modeling Penney's new fashion line.

The new Penney's will be open from 9:30 a. m. to 9 p. m. six days a week.

There were plans for the opening ceremony despite bad weather. Charlie Melford, of the Seminoles County Chamber of Commerce, officiated at the activities.

## Henry Schumacher, Pioneer Farmer, Dies Wednesday

Henry Schumacher Jr., 60, pioneer Seminoles County farmer, died Wednesday afternoon.

Who he failed to return home for lunch, Schumacher's son, Henry, began searching for him. The elderly man was located slumped over the wheel of his truck parked at First Street and Park Avenue. He was rushed to Seminoles Memorial Hospital, but was pronounced dead on arrival.

Schumacher has been described as "one of the most successful farmers" in the area. His crops primarily consisted of lettuce and cabbage.

Born in Jersey City, N. J., on June 22, 1905, Schumacher came to Sanford in 1928. He began farming at that time, and during the coming years he "pioneered" many innovations in the raising of truck crops.

Many labor saving devices were developed by Schumacher at his farm on Myrtle Street in Eureka, Homestead, south of Sanford. One of these, developed last year, is a lettuce planting machine.

Described as a quiet man, Schumacher was known for not talking about his accomplishments. He died this morning.

"His farm did his talking for him. He was really a first rate farmer," Schumacher was a member of Congregational Christian Church in Sanford and of Oak Lodge 1211.

## County Facility Opens Monday

Seminole County branch office, commonly referred to as the courthouse annex, will be opened for business Monday morning.

John E. Alexander, chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, said the facility will be opened by the board at 9 a. m. in the Seminoles County building.

Alexander said today that all the equipment for the new facility has arrived and has been installed.

# Undefeated 'Cats Face Rough Trail To NCAA

ATLANTA (UPI) — Unbeaten Kentucky is making a big splash on the national basketball scene, but the Wildcats have a lot of rough work ahead before shooting for an unprecedented fifth NCAA crown.

To get into the NCAA playoffs in March, the Wildcats first must win the Southeastern Conference title, and there are a number of contenders jostling for a chance to upset them.

Kentucky, 15-0 overall, leads the SEC with a 6-0 mark but has only one win over a team which has won three league titles and the SEC championship.

The Wildcats play their next six games in the conference, including a double-header at Vanderbilt Feb. 2 but must play two of its last seven games away.

The situation for Vanderbilt, which has only 10 games left, is not the most favorable. The Tigers won seven straight, lost three straight and then won the last three. They are paced by 6-foot-6 senior Lee DeFord who leads the SEC in scoring with 22.8 points a game.

Question: What's the biggest sports attraction in Seminole County?

Answer: The Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club. Question: What's the biggest sports attraction in Central Florida?

Answer: Probably the same — the Sanford-Orlando Kennel Club.

According to Jack Ledoux, manager of the SOKC, the track drew last week's race.

The SOKC has grown immensely since Jack and Jerry Collins, along with Ledoux, took over in 1955. The year before this trio came along, the track had a total annual handle of roughly \$3 million.

Last year the mutual handle was over \$10.5 million, an increase of over 300 pct. This was over a season that consisted of 90 nights and 40 matinee racing cards.

The season, with 105 nights and 54 afternoons of racing, the handle will surely be even higher, and not just because of 20 more racing days either.

Through the first 36 performances this season, the handle was \$2.76 million, while after the first 36 performances last season, the handle was \$2.54 million.

This is an 8.5 pct. increase over last year when the opening January racing dates are normally better than dates in December, which was when the track opened this time around.

So far the average mutual handle this year has been \$76,717 per session, but with the best racing attractions still coming up, Ledoux feels that the average will go up to \$85,000 by the season's end, which comes on April 21.

The best single day season in the history of the track was last year's closing day with a handle of \$176,788.

The record handle in the track's history came on the last week in the match race with Hickney's top greyhounds.

In fact, last week's handle of \$771,167 was just about the best in the track's history. It was nearly \$200,000 better than the same week a year ago.

But don't let the figures fool you. It's not all take and no give. The state of Florida alone benefited by approximately \$3 million from the track last year through taxes.

The track also scheduled two charity nights and two scholarship nights each year and over the past 10 years more than \$100,000 has gone to Orange and Seminole County charities and another 16 or 20 thousand bucks will go to charities in the two counties again this year.

Not only is the track enjoying its greatest prosperity, but it is also fortunate in being the home track of the great Miss Whirl, the world champion of greyhound racing.

Miss Whirl, of the Larry Hughes kennel, got the upper hand in last week's two races against the fast Hickney entries with a second and a first in the two races.

Ledoux has slated more match races for Miss Whirl. This week Miss Whirl, along with Mr. Whirl and Klantell, are in match races at Hickeys on March 19, the top three SOKC dogs visit St. Petersburg for a match race and St. Pete's best three dogs will come to SOKC on March 27.

Match races with the best from Hollywood and Jacksonville tracks are slated also, but no definite dates have been set.

Not only is the SOKC the home of championship greyhounds, there's quite a bit of championship blood in management, too.

## Plant Trees Almost Anytime In Florida

Trees and shrubs can be planted almost anytime in Florida.

Nurserymen now grow many trees and shrubs in individual containers so that they can be set out without disturbing their roots or growth.

Roses, azaleas and similar flowering shrubs can be planted when they are in bud or flower. You can do the same thing with evergreens in foundation plantings or anywhere in your yard.

This planting procedure applies to large or small shade trees, which are grown in containers. They can be set out during the growing period.

The secret of getting them off to a good start is to water them regularly for the first few weeks until the roots are well set in the soil. So whenever you need to plant shrubs or trees, go ahead and do it, regardless of the season.

1 1/2 cup chopped dates  
1 cup sugar  
2 eggs  
Slip in fry pan until thickened  
1 tsp. vanilla  
1/2 tsp. salt  
2 1/2 cups rice krispies  
1/2 cup walnuts, chopped  
Add to above mixture. Stir all together. Form into balls and roll in coconut or graham cracker crumbs.

1 cup water  
1 tsp. vinegar  
Saute beef, onion, garlic, seasonings in shortening. Add soup, beans, water and vinegar. Cover and simmer 30 minutes, stirring often. Uncover and cook to desired consistency. Serves 4.

### Suggestions For A Good Fit In Man's Suit

Do you know what to look for in a good fit in a man's suit?

Try on the whole suit and view it while standing naturally. Then try it on in section — walking, stepping up and down, and bending the arms and knees.  
The V-line of the coatfront should not buckle up. The collar should set close to the neck.  
The coat should cover the seat of the trousers and fit smoothly around the hips.  
You should be able to raise your arms without lifting the coat noticeably.  
Trousers should hang straight from the waist and be creased with the grain of the material, back and front.

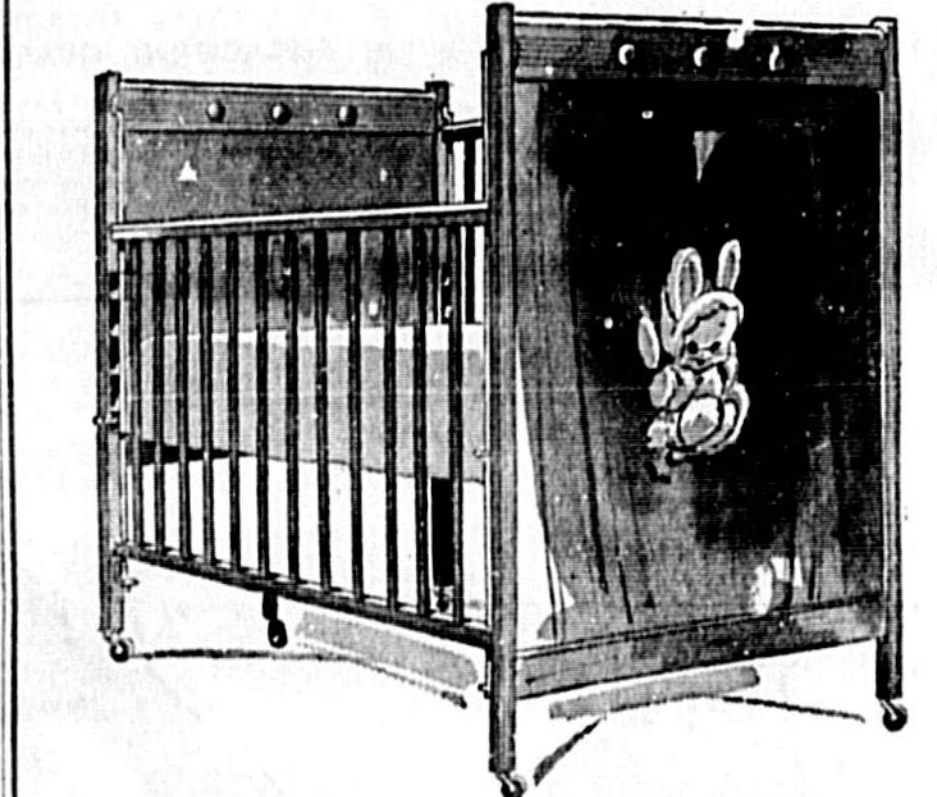

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# Constitutional Changes Proposed By LBJ

WASHINGTON (UPI) — President Johnson today sent his proposal for four-year House terms to Congress where it faces the prospect of a fight among the lawmakers it would benefit.

The proposed constitutional amendment would lengthen the present two-year term of congressmen.

Another proposed amendment would streamline the Electoral College system of electing presidents.

Both amendments will go to the Judiciary committee of the House and the Senate, in the House this will put it under the wing of Rep. Emanuel Celler, a man who has won 22 two-year terms and likes the system the way it is.

The 77-year-old Celler, chairman of the House committee and dean of that chamber with his 44 years service, has long opposed changing the Constitution to give representatives longer terms.

Cells' sympathized with members who must run for their lives to get re-elected each two years. But he also argues it is more important to give the citizens a chance to express their feelings than to give congressmen peace of mind and pocketbook.

The Judiciary committee chairman may be hard put, however, to keep a four-year term amendment bottled up in his committee. There is strong evidence a majority of the 35 other lawmakers on the panel favors a change.

Should the amendment get to the floor, it would need a two-thirds vote to pass. Following similar vote by the Senate, it would have to be ratified by three-fourths of the states to become part of the Constitution.

Cells favors the Electoral College amendment, which was originally proposed last session, and he hopes to use hearings on it to delay action on the four-year term proposal.

Foreman, 62, of Houston, heads three law firms defending Powers, although his fee largely has been paid by Masher's \$28 million estate. Candace's three-member legal team is directed by Heavy Haul.

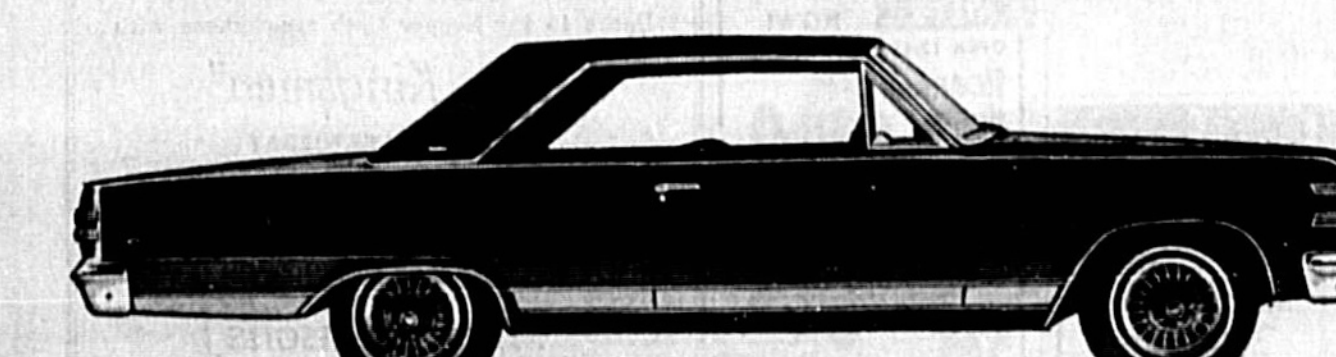

### Cut Your Own Taxes - 14 List All Of Your 'Other Deducts'

A catch-all category for deductions you could not classify elsewhere is found at the bottom of Part IV on Page 2 of Form 1040. It is labeled "Other Deductions."

Properly listed here, if they apply in your case, are:

- Child care expenses.
- Education expenses.
- Casualty and theft losses.
- Alimony.
- Cost of safety equipment, tools and supplies used in your work.
- Union and professional dues.
- Unreimbursed business entertainment expenses.
- Fees to employment agencies.

"I know there was a catch to it," the expert reader will probably say who has learned there are qualifications for most entries.

The child care deduction. The child care deduction, under a working wife, or a widow or widower, in order to be employed or to seek, significant employment requires outside assistance in caring for dependent children under 13 or for dependent who is physically or mentally incapable of self-care.

The deduction is restricted to \$600 when one dependent is being cared for, to \$900 when two or more are involved. A working wife must file a joint return with her husband to claim the deduction and the deduction is reduced by the amount by which their combined income exceeds \$5,000. From this it will be clear that if one person is being cared for, there is a deduction of \$600 or \$900 when two or more are receiving child care.

The income limitation does not apply in cases where the husband is physically or mentally incapable of self-support or if the wife is institutionally confined for at least 90 consecutive days, or for a shorter period if she dies.

Casualty and theft losses are restricted to the amount of the loss reduced by insurance proceeds or other compensation received in excess of \$100 for each occurrence. A statement must be attached to the return explaining the deduction.

City crews, plagued with bursting water lines all over town since the new city wells went into operation last summer, were at work today repairing the latest break, the most expensive one to date.

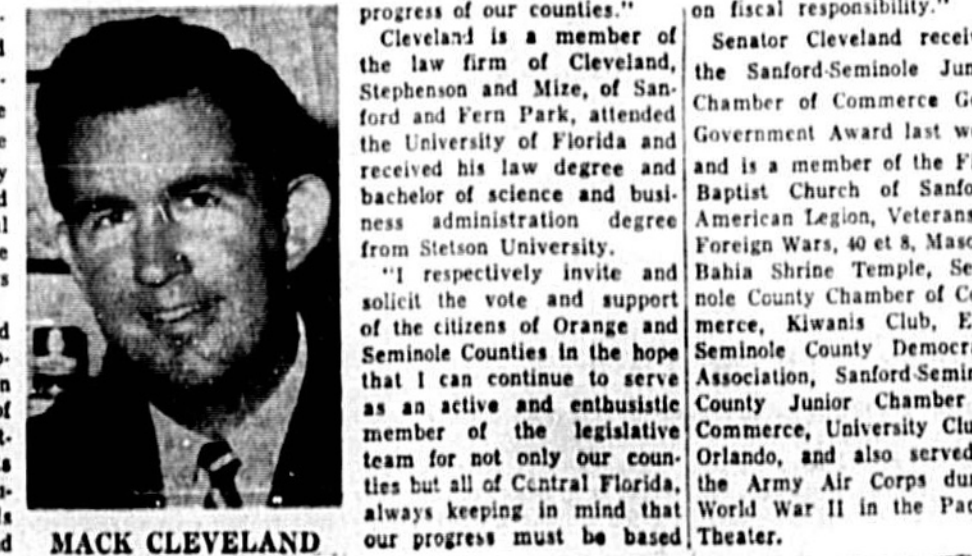
