Precautions Taken Against Hurricane

Big Storm Near Cuba Reported as Moving North Northeast Into Gulf of Mexico

MIAMI, Nov. 6, (AP)—A storm of hurricane force near the center and accompanied by a wide area of strong winds is headed along the north coast of Cuba today apparently for the straits of the Gulf of Mexico away from the peninsula of Florida and its resort area.

It threatened the central and southern Bahamas islands and the coast of Cuba. The weather Bureau at Miami said the main force might pass inland over Cuba before proceeding westward toward the Gulf of Mexico.

However, heavily populated areas southward from Melbourne and Miami were threatened with heavy winds, although Forecaster Ernest Caron said they would miss the worst of it. South of Miami and in the Key West area at the tip of the state the threat was great and civilian and naval forces took all precautions against property damage and loss of life.

Some State Road Department workers were evacuated from the Keys south of the mainland of Florida but civilians generally decided to weather out the blow.

The worst of the storm apparently missed Nassau in the Bahamas. The Bureau's 10:45 A. M. bulletin placed the storm at 8:30 P. M. about 85 miles north-northeast of Neivitas, Cuba, moving west or west southwest 14 to 18 miles an hour.

MIAMI, Nov. 6, (AP)—A violent storm, probably including winds of hurricane force, roared through the West Indies early today and toward the Florida coast in the vicinity of Miami. With Navy approval, the Weather Bureau broke its usual silence on warnings of a major hurricane.

80 Men Sought Here For Seeking To Escape Draft

Apparently seeking to evade the draft law, 80 men are being sought by the San Diego County Health Unit for prescribed treatment of syphilis and two white men, formerly rejected by the selective service examiners following positive blood tests, are now being rounded up by Police Chief Williams, according to Dr. Leonard H. Dams, director of the unit.

Only about 18 of these men are notified by the unit to appear every week for shots, have reported at all, and now they have quit," said Dr. Dams. It is evident to me that they are seeking to avoid the draft by not taking the shots, which in 40 weeks at the rate of one shot a week would cure them of the disease.

Commenting upon this action, Mr. Jinkins stated that the value of Rhodes' property as well as of other property in Seminole County was being assessed on the basis of the 1940 tax roll under the law passed by the State Legislature at that time, meaning that all subsequent increases should be assessed at that value.

Stalin Blames Nazi Gains On No 2nd Front

MOSCOW, Nov. 6, (AP)—Joseph Stalin declared today that because of a lack of a second front the Germans had been able to break through the Russian lines in the west last summer and in five months advanced 300 miles. Still, however, the Premier told a special meeting of the Moscow Soviet, celebrating the 25th anniversary of the Bolshevik revolution, never before had Russia been so strong and well-organized on the home front.

Despite fresh German regiments and at least one new division, the Russians declared they beat off all attacks in Stalingrad where the embittered struggle on the Volga was in its 74th day.

Along the Black sea littoral the Red army continued its attrition northeast of Taupae, encircling and annihilating Axis troops. The noon communiqué quoted German prisoners as saying enormous losses had been suffered by their troops.

Chief Witnesses Are Released In Morris Case

Two material witnesses, John Lewis Oglesby and Del Wainwright, whom a coroner's jury last Monday recommended to be held for further questioning in regard to the death of J. Glenn Morris, Sanford Naval Air Station cadet, on the previous Monday were released from custody yesterday morning, due to the fact, according to Sheriff Charles Hand, that no charges had been made against them, and that he therefore could not hold them any longer.

Sherman Griffis, a third witness ordered held, has admitted that he deserted from the army and is still in custody, Sheriff Hand stated. Circuit Court will be held on Tuesday, Nov. 10, at which time the Grand Jury will be summoned.

It was stated at the coroner's inquest, that early Sunday, the day preceding the death of Mr. Morris in Permaland-Laughton Memorial Hospital, he had accompanied the three men, Oglesby, Wainwright and Griffis to a tavern about three and a half miles from Sanford on the Orlando highway, where a fight developed during which Griffis struck Morris twice. The latter then was said to have left the tavern alone, walking toward Sanford.

Some time later, when the three men were driving back toward the city, the driver, Oglesby, stated that he saw a figure lying in the road but due to poor visibility caused by fog, was unable to stop in time, and so to avoid hitting it with the wheels, straddled the figure, which a few minutes later he identified as Mr. Morris, having stopped, gone back and lit a match to investigate.

The next day, Mr. Morris died at the hospital from severe head wounds, shock and concussion. The verdict of the coroner's jury was that "he had come to his death at the hand or hands of a party or parties unknown, with an instrument or instruments unknown."

Officers Men View Plane Warning Posts

A fourth contingent of 43 officers and enlisted men, who are taking a 100-hour ground course in aircraft identification and aircraft warning service at the Orlando fighter Command School, made a complete inspection yesterday of observation posts in the district and investigated their personnel. Lt. Col. H. Wollenberg, Army Signal Corps instructor, disclosed this morning, adding that this tour of inspection was more complete than previous ones.

The soldiers, after climbing observation towers at the various posts, checked bulletin boards and post records, and made sketches and photographs of the sites to use when they return to their respective commands to instruct civilians in aircraft warning and post-up duties. Plans spelling out the plan, Lt. Wollenberg explained.

Allowed To Vote

Denied the right to vote, Tuesday, by election board officials of Precinct 14 in Fern Park, Hubbard Cassberry, fern grower, appeared in the Circuit Court with preliminary writ of habeas corpus to compel those officials to let him vote. Judge M. E. Smith thereupon directed the election board to allow Mr. Cassberry to vote.

Chances For Sales Tax Are Said Better

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6, (AP)—Administration economic chiefs agree that sentiment for general sales tax will be much stronger in the new congress which organizes in January.

The same authorities agree that the argument of the new Congress on military matters probably will be restrained, leaving "home front" issues as an outlet for political steam.

Leading Senate Republican, Vandenberg of Michigan, proposed a Republican-Democrat victory coalition with "politics and New Deal" out for the duration—as the solution to avert those political issues from the close party alignments in House and Senate.

This idea is that Congress should now create a unified committee on war cooperation. The Administration "should deal more openly with Congress" including the Republican leadership and with the country. The election, he added, had demonstrated popular dissatisfaction with the conduct of the war.

Meanwhile, the House heard demands that the wage-hour law and National Labor Relations Act be repealed, while a Senate colloquy found a prominent Republican and leading Democrat agreeing that Tuesday's many Democratic losses could not be attributed to any lack of unity on the war front.

Senator C. McNamara (D-Texas) stated he would make it clear that the reversal of the Administration party could not be interpreted by the propagandists of Berlin and Tokyo as a "repeal" of the war purpose.

He attributed them to public impatience with the prosecution of the war and resentment against Washington Democrats. "I don't think," he said, the voters had "registered a more drastic protest than carry this war to triumph and victory."

New Deal Sees Election Results As Presaging Fight On 'Home Front'

WASHINGTON, Nov. 6, (AP)—The new Office of Price Administration mileage rationing program that will go into operation next Monday, November 22, which was explained yesterday to more than 100 tire dealers, carpers, and gasoline dealers at a meeting in the Jacksonville City Hall, will assume the responsibility of making available tires as well as gasoline, with dealers by J. Armstrong, regional OPA mileage representative.

The new OPA program, the speaker explained, is the result of the rubber situation revealed by the unavailability of that so far rubber for rationing has been improperly allocated. This committee, it was recalled, recommended the immediate rationing of gasoline throughout the Nation, as a tire-saving measure after pointing out that in the unrationed West automobiles were wearing out their tires at a rate eight times faster than they could be replaced.

"The greatest rubber stockpile in the country is represented by the tires on automobiles and trucks," Armstrong said. "By conserving this stockpile, the other rubber on hand can be made to supply all essential requirements for the next two years."

It was explained that three classes of tires will be placed on the market in the near future, and made available to all automobile users. Class No. 1 will include three formerly designated as "first line"; Class No. 2 will be the former "second line" tires, and Class No. 3 will include used or recycled tires, or tires made from reclaimed rubber. The holders of "A" mileage will be entitled to purchase the Class No. 3 grade of tires, with the better tires going to the more essential users.

A British communiqué said the Vichy 25th Army is attacking well beyond El Daba, east of El Alamein. The communiqué acknowledged the battle in the desert was a large-scale battle.
