Happy New Year

As the year of 1939 comes to a close it brings to an end not only another 12 months period but also a decade of remarkable events.

Herbert Hoover had been inaugurated President in March lifting the country to new heights of confidence and optimism. Business was booming at a spectacular rate and the stock market held the attention and attracted the savings of rich and poor alike.

The depression was soon on in full force. For ones were wiped out over night. Banks failed all over the country. Credit was cut off where credit had seemed inexhaustible before.

Then came the New Deal. The government undertook to furnish every man a job who did not have one in private industry. Quickly came the nightmare of alphabetical agencies, the NRA, the AAA, the CCC and the CWA.

Came also during this decade, trouble abroad. Almost forgotten now is the little South American war between Paraguay and Bolivia over the Grand Chaco though it dragged on for three years and cost thousands of lives.

As we go into 1940 the world is still wondering whether there will be peace or war. Everybody seems ready to admit that nobody wants war. Certainly none of the people of any country seems very enthusiastic about it.

Not because Roger Babson says that the first half of 1940 will see the best business conditions in the United States since 1929, that dividends will increase and employment decline, not because there is a boom in the last year of the depression in 1940.

For that reason we can say Happy New Year with readers with greater confidence in the future than we have for many years.

New Year Resolutions

With the approach of the New Year this is the time for preparing New Year resolutions and getting in condition to swear off all the vice and wickedness which has been so generously indulged in during the previous twelve months.

If we were the type that is disposed to make New Year resolutions we would honestly resolve never to publish anything in the paper again which someone did not want published and to publish everything which anyone thought we ought to publish.

We would resolve never again to put out a special edition or to solicit any advertising from the merchants and if one of them should ask particularly to put an ad in, we would tactfully suggest that we give him free publicity instead.

We would lend our enthusiastic and whole-hearted support to any candidate for public office and if in this way we incurred the displeasure of his opponent, we would support him too.

We would resolve to give everyone who works for us a raise in salary, with the week-end off any time there is a football game or a house party to go to, and if there were more news than could be written under the circumstances we would stay up all night and do it ourself.

And if we came down to work the next morning, bleary-eyed and groggy, after the cook had failed to show up in time for breakfast, and the car wouldn't start, and someone dropped in to talk and wanted to know, "Why don't you have more cheerful optimistic editorials?" we would resolve to write, "There is joy, peace and happiness everywhere in the world, even in Finland."

WASHINGTON DAYBOOK

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30.—(AP)—The day of the Congressional "killer" investigation has arrived to displace the long series of whoop-cries investigations designed to put across pet pieces of legislation.

Many of the methods adopted by the one are about as fantastic as those of the other. Two "killer" investigations are underway and a third has already completed its work.

The Dies committee was largely credited with bringing about the defeat of Frank Murphy last year in his race for reelection as Governor of Michigan. It is adding to the shelling directed by the Smith committee at the Wagner Act.


