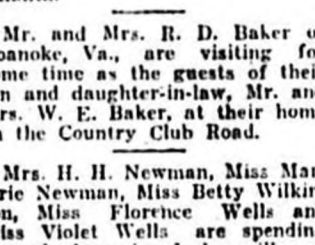
Arrangements in the class call for silver and blue were used throughout the banquet hall to decorate.
