

HIGHER TAXES FOR JOBLESS RELIEF ASKED

Committee Report Is Favorable To Levy As Aid For 'Employable Unemployed'

WASHINGTON, Apr. 15.—(AP)—The joint committee on unemployment recommended to President Roosevelt yesterday that he ask Congress to "increase surtax rates, estate taxes and corporation taxes, and take measures to secure revenue for tax exempt bonds to care properly for the nation's 'employable unemployed'."

In a letter to the President the committee said: "The fifth year of economic distress holds little prospect for restoration of many unemployed to commercial employment at adequate pay. At least eight or nine million employable people are still unemployed. Many have one to three dependents."

"We do not blame any individual for this situation. We believe widespread unemployment and poverty are inherent in our economic system. While that system continues the federal government cannot escape its duty to see that the unemployed and their dependents do not suffer for lack of the necessities and reasonable comforts of life."

ICKES DEMANDS ALL STATE FERA SPEEDING UP OF PWA PROJECTS ENDED ON APR. 28

\$130,000,000 Allotment May Be Cancelled If Further Delay Holds

WASHINGTON, Apr. 15.—(AP)—Repeating his demand for speed in submitting contracts for non-federal projects, Secretary Ickes, Public Works administrator, said yesterday allotments for \$130,000,000 would be cancelled if the agreements were not returned speedily. Ickes, seeking completion of what he said "may be the greatest job of financial contract rating in history," said contracts for 2,000 of the 2,348 projects authorized for public subdivisions had been sent out.

The administrator said if contracts were completed the Public Works Administration was ready to pay loans and grants "as soon as the money is required for work actually done." He said an enlarged legal staff was working "night and day" to get out the remaining 348 contracts, involving \$43,000,000.

Oranges, Grapefruit In Boxes Showed Increase In Average Prices Last Week

TAMPA, Apr. 15.—(AP)—Oranges and grapefruit in boxes showed an increase in average prices for the present week as compared to last week, on the 10 Eastern citrus markets, according to statistics issued yesterday by the Florida Citrus Exchange. Sales showed a large decrease in the same periods. They totaled 875 cars this week, a drop of 163 cars from last week's total. Orange sales were 680 last week, a decrease of 177 cars. The average price during the past five days was \$2.50 against \$2.50 last week. Grapefruit sales were \$2.74 three weeks ago. This was an increase of 10 cents in average price this week over last. This week last year the average price was \$2.14 and for this week in 1932 the average price was \$2.75.

Grapefruit showed an advance of 9 cents in average price this week over last, with sales of 222 cars against 248. This week's average price was \$2.52 against \$2.43 last week; \$2.56 two weeks ago; \$2.48 three weeks ago; \$1.79 this week last year; and \$2.00 for this week two years ago. Figures on tangerines were not issued because of the scarcity of supplies. This week's market for oranges fluctuated rapidly with Monday's average price of \$2.53 as the low and yesterday's \$2.75 as high. The grapefruit market rose from \$2.40 Monday to \$2.54 Wednesday and then declined to \$2.52 Friday. The highest average box price for oranges maintained this week among the 10 auction markets was \$2.74 at Chicago. The low was \$2.31 at Pittsburg. Last week's high of \$2.52 was recorded at St. Louis, the low of \$2.34 was maintained at Baltimore. The advance for grapefruit this week was \$2.26 at Detroit and \$2.20 at Baltimore. Last week's limits were \$2.70 at Detroit and \$2.20 at Baltimore.

Walkout In France Is Seen As Being 'Flop'

PARIS, Apr. 15.—(AP)—Government employees in a "national protest" strike today against pay cuts, paralyzed work ramifications between Paris and the provinces but otherwise the walk out was a flop. Police guarded post offices and other public buildings, watching for demonstrations which never developed. Telegraph employees who had struck for a few minutes daily for the past week stretched their patience to two hours today, then returned to their instruments. Long distance telephone operators, however, walked out at 11:30 A. M. and stayed out, failing to return by mid-afternoon.

Karl Dane, Down On Luck, Commits Suicide

HOLLYWOOD, Apr. 15.—(AP)—Big, gangling, jolly Karl Dane, who came to Hollywood from his native Denmark and skyrocketed to prominence overnight, by his part in "The Big Parade," one of the screen's war epics, took his own life Saturday night. He left no written explanation for shooting himself through the head in the hotel, but friends and his drop into the obscurity from which he came prompted the act. The body was found in a chair in his apartment. A nearby tailor was taking a nap and several snapshots and several prints he signed for films that followed his initial success. A pistol was at his feet.

Acting On NRA Protest, ICC Orders General Investigation Of Rail Fares In South, West

WASHINGTON, Apr. 15.—(AP)—Acting on an NRA protest against continued low passenger rates on the Southern Railway, the Interstate Commerce Commission yesterday ordered a general investigation of fares in the South and West. A hearing was called here for Apr. 23, and bus operators and passenger traffic officials of the railroads as well as the public will be heard.

The dispute had its inception in a conference called by Roosevelt of the NRA and the Interstate Commerce Commission last week. B. Eastman, at New Orleans, and one of the officials of the railroads of the Southeast and of bus operators attended to discuss the fare.

MERCHANTS TO PAY PART OF NRA COSTS, IS ORDER

Roosevelt Says Blue Eagle To Fly Only If 'Dues' Are Paid

WASHINGTON, Apr. 15.—(AP)—President Roosevelt yesterday issued an order under which future display of the blue eagle will be allowed only to those firms which contribute to expenses of such administration, wherever such outlets are required.

To protect employees from cabotage by organized labor in industrial groups, the President announced that all code authority rates of assessments and budgets of Administrative Johnson before a group can be collected. The executive order does not take effect until the next week.

ROOSEVELT ASKS FOR PASSAGE OF BANKRUPTCY BILL

President Includes Act In List Of All He Expects Passed

WASHINGTON, Apr. 15.—(AP)—Congressional leaders were told today by President Roosevelt that he expected the House to pass a law before adjournment.

Taking hold of the reins of the legislative branch, which has been slackening since the traces of the White House conference that the stock market regulation bill, proposed tariff bill, the monetary bankruptcy and guaranteed bank deposit proposals should be placed on the statute books. The controversial tax bill also is included in the list.
