TALLADEGA, Ala. - Charlie Glotzbach, the world's fastest stock car driver, and Buddy Baker, a determined competitor who's after the same distinction, are the latest NASCAR Grand National performers to return signed entry blanks for Alabama International Motor Speedway's April 12th inaugural Alabama 500.

Both drivers have entered sleek winged Dodge Daytonas in the \$138,100 event over AIMS's \$6 million 2.66-mile layout. Glotzbach, the Georgetown, Ind., performer who drives for Ray Nichels, established a world closed-course speed record here last fall when he was clocked at 199,466 miles per hour while qualifying for the Talladega 500. Baker, a 29-year-old charger from Charlotte, N.C., hit 197.814 mph in his Cotton

Both Glotzbach and Baker will make strong bids to share the prestigious pole position for the Alabama 500 when qualify ing runs get underway Wednesday afternoon, April 8. Glotzbach and Baker also both scored their last major triumphs at Charlotte (N.C.) Motor Speedway in 1968 when Baker won the rich World 600 and Glotzbach later captured the National 500.

The duo joins one of the most impressive Dodge lineups ever assembled, with Bobby Isaac, Dr. Don Tarr, Dave Marcis and Nell Castles also entered in the aerodynamically-sound Daytonas in the highspeed 500-mile chase.

T etime Grand National champion David Pearson, who'll be in a Holman-Moody FoFrd, and two-time national champ Richard Petty, NASCAR's winningest Grand National performer with 103 victories to his credit, have also confirmed their entries in the April 500-miler.

Grand National qualifying for the Alabama classic continues through Saturday morning, April 11. A 125-mile, \$10,-450 ARCA qualifying race and a 100-mile IMSA Formula Ford road case are also on Saturday's schedule.

Sunday's inaugural Alabama 500 (the final portion of which will be televised live over ABC-TV outside the South) will start the 40 fastest qualifiers at 1:45 p.m., (CST), April 12.

period of March 11-March 25 his office is attempting to locate some 1,100 persons who are owners of abandoned property. One method of locating the "missing owners" is by publishing their names in 45 newspapers in Florida. If an address has been furnished, the comptroller's office also directs a mailed notice to that address.

Dickinson states that relatives, former neighbors and friends of persons sought have people. "Since 1962, as a result of the Abandoned Property Act, more than one-half million dollars has been restored to the control of legitimate claimants," the comptroller noted.

Should owners not be located, their funds are deposited in the State School Fund, earnings of which are distributed to the various school systems of Florida.

The principal amount continues to earn interest from investments but is available to a qualified claimant at any time he can prove his right to the property.
