Local Letter Carriers On Job.. For 5 Days

Mail was flowing into and out of Seminole County postoffices today on usual schedules, despite the wildcat postal carriers' strikes in the north. There was only a small drop in the volume of incoming mail. Volume dropped to almost nothing in mail destined for some New York City points since it was announced that it would be held at Orlando.

Sanford spokesmen today reported that local members of the letter carriers' union are abiding by instructions from national headquarters to remain on the job during the five-day negotiating period this week. If agreement on salary is not reached by then, the local carriers probably will go on strike, it was said. (Detailed article on page 3A.)

Meantime, Associated Press reported mail delivery continued on normal schedules in Florida cities today as postal employees kept an eye on efforts to begin negotiations between the Nixon administration and their national unions.

Union mail personnel in Tampa, St. Petersburg, Orlando and Fort Myers voted during the weekend to remain on the job pending developments on the national level. Similar votes were scheduled today in Florida's two largest postal systems, Jacksonville and Miami.

Anthony Montazer, president of the 2,000-member letter carriers union in Miami, said he favored a delay in any walkout until at least Friday. But Montazer predicted the local's members would vote to interrupt service.

If the men vote to walk out, Montazer said he would lead them.

Mail clerks in Fort Myers decided to wait until Friday. If the situation is unchanged at that time, a spokesman said, they plan to halt work at 3 p.m. Friday. Letter carriers in Fort Myers voted to remain on the job, but a spokesman said they would respect any picket lines set up by the clerks.

In Orlando, letter carriers voted not to strike unless such action was called by their national union. Similar agreements were announced by clerks and letter carriers in Tampa, and by the letter carriers in St. Petersburg.

Girl Held On Charge Of Dope

A raid by Seminole County sheriff's department and Constable Chester Boyd to a country area on SR 426 between Geneva and Oviedo last night resulted in the arrest of a 14-year-old girl on possession of marijuana charges, Sheriff John Polk said today.

According to Polk, the approximately 25 persons had gathered from both Seminole and Orange Counties for a "weed roast" and, suspecting narcotics, the authorities had moved into the area after receiving complaints from nearby residents. Polk said the group was of both sexes and was racially mixed.

The juvenile female was charged after investigators found drugs on one of three girls, all from Orlando, together in a wooded area. Polk described the group as "hippie" type.

Four women who had been living at the county jail since February left Florida Friday night for Kentucky and Chicago. Sheriff Polk said the four, including a woman and her two daughters from Kentucky and an 18-year-old from Chicago, had been staying at the jail as material witnesses in the trials involving Harlan Blackburn, repaired bolt operator and Edward Kirkland, Orlando attorney.

Polk said the women wanted to leave but had indicated plans to return to give testimony in the morals charges against Blackburn and Kirkland, accused of lewd and lascivious conduct.

Trial had been set for Blackburn Wednesday but was delayed after his attorney appealed to the Supreme Court the 18th Judicial Circuit, consisting of Seminole and Brevard Counties, is illegal.

Trial cannot commence until the court has ruled, Polk said.

In another county case involving a Sanford motel operator, Polk said charges against James Billy Cain, 40, of 200 Scott Avenue and owner of the Coachman Motel on U.S. 17-92, were dropped after a Friday hearing before County Judge Wallace Hall.

Polk said Cain was arrested on a charge of receiving, concealing and selling stolen goods after Florida Department of Law Enforcement agents and sheriff's deputies found 35 rifles and six hand guns in a raid Feb. 27 on the motel.

The sheriff said Judge Hall had no alternative but to drop the charges after the state failed to produce witnesses but Polk added the state attorney is going to file direct information charges against Cain.

Polk explained that direct information charges could be filed even though the charges were dismissed by Hall for lack of witnesses present at the preliminary hearing.

Teen Abducted, Beaten; Two Others Accosted

A 15-year-old girl was abducted at gunpoint yesterday afternoon while walking along Southwest Road and driven to Volusia County where she was beaten, according to Sanford police records.

Police Chief Ben Butler said the incident occurred around 1:30 p.m. when the girl said a blond man in a white Corvair car drove alongside and told her to "get in the car."

She said she refused and the man drew a gun, pointed it at her and again told her to get in the car.

At this point, a struggle between the girl and her abductor occurred when the man tried to remove her clothes, she said. The man finally slapped her several times and then struck her with his fist, knocking the girl unconscious.

She said she awoke later to find her clothing unfurnished but she was not assaulted, she added.

The girl walked to the road and was given a ride back to Lake Monroe where she called her uncle, who came after her. Police were notified at 4:47 p.m. of the abduction and attack.

In a near-molestation report, two 14-year-old girls told police a man riding in a green and black Chevrolet accosted them while they walked along 13th Street at French Avenue and sought to entice them into his car.

When the girls refused, the man reportedly opened the door and exposed himself, the girls reported.

Rolfe Wagner Wears 2 Hats

Rolfe Wagner wears two hats in the municipality of Altamonte Springs... that of city clerk and administrative assistant, and does an admirable job of both. At a recent city council meeting Wagner was commended by City Attorney S. Joseph Davis, who stated that Wagner had been of "invaluable assistance to him in various capacities."

Wagner should also receive the plaudits of the press... not only does he prepare a clear and concise agenda, but goes "beyond the call of duty" in inserting a resume of background information in press folders.

But Wagner has given a report to the council on operational departments, which as a matter of routine, he plans to present quarterly as a "state of the city." Wagner stated that in relation to the Altamonte police department, comprised of Chief Fred Folsom, Assistant Chief Frank Papa and a sergeant, four patrolmen and a police secretary he has found an esprit de corps which will make for an efficient department.

The fire department, in Wagner's report, encompasses twice weekly drills in fire fighting techniques, with much of the curricula taught in Orlando fire fighting schools repeated in Altamonte.

The water department, according to Wagner, has installed 50 new services. A part time meter reader has been employed to facilitate more efficient billing. Phase I of the sewer project is moving to completion and the first hook-ups are anticipated in 45 days.

The sanitation department under Don Bundy has initiated a plan to segregate paper and dry trash from wet garbage and will "utilize less expensive landfill facilities for this material. A new trash truck, expected shortly, is also expected to create service.

Wagner concluded his report with the notation that the administrative aspect of the city is "generally in order."

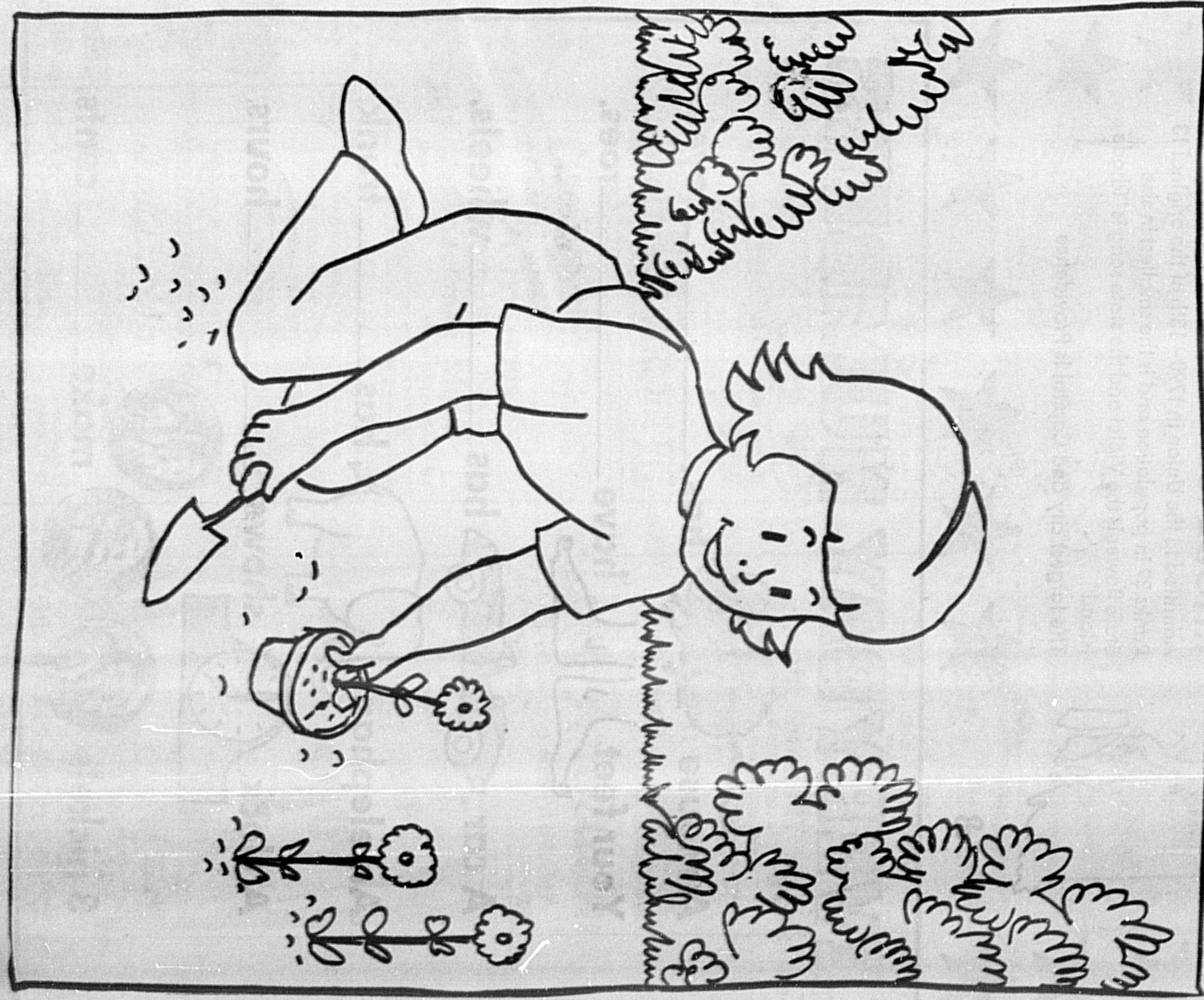

Nixon Ponders Mail Action Move

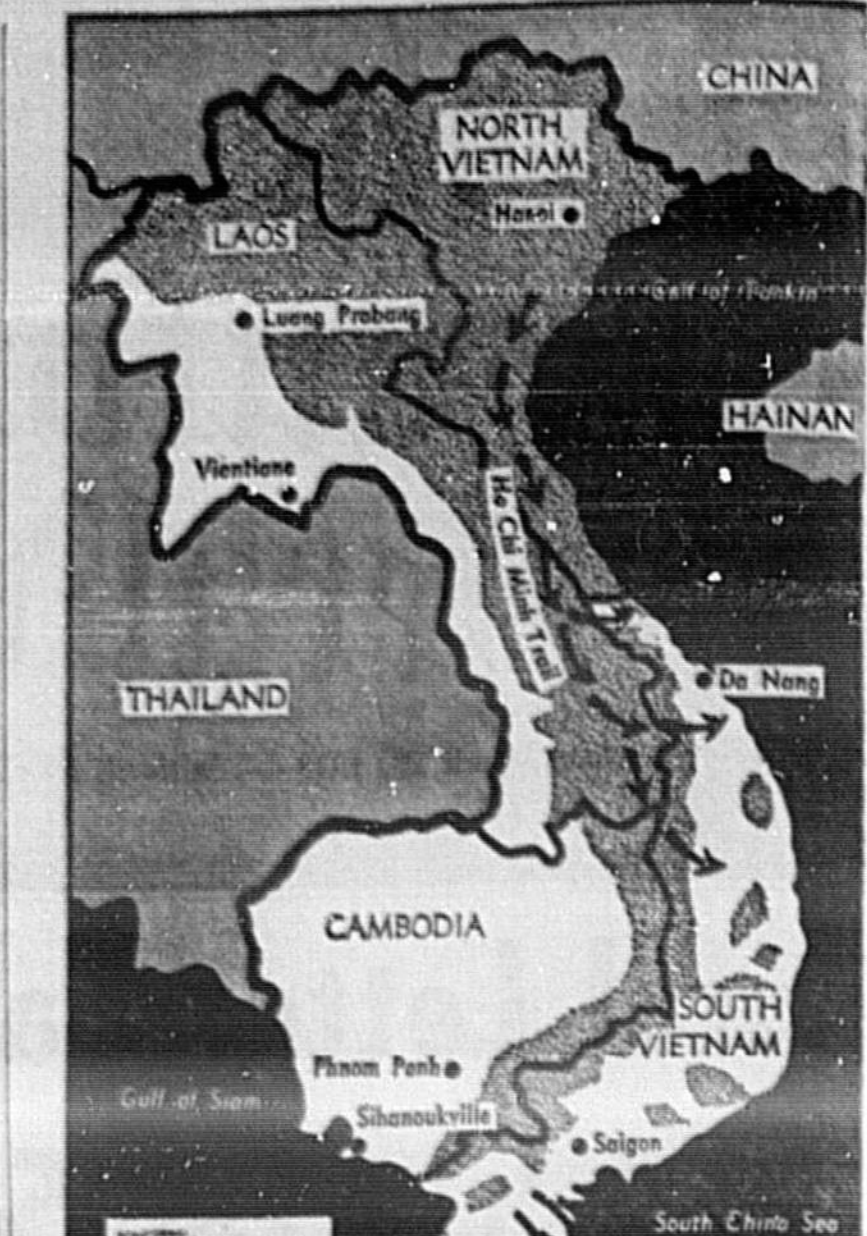

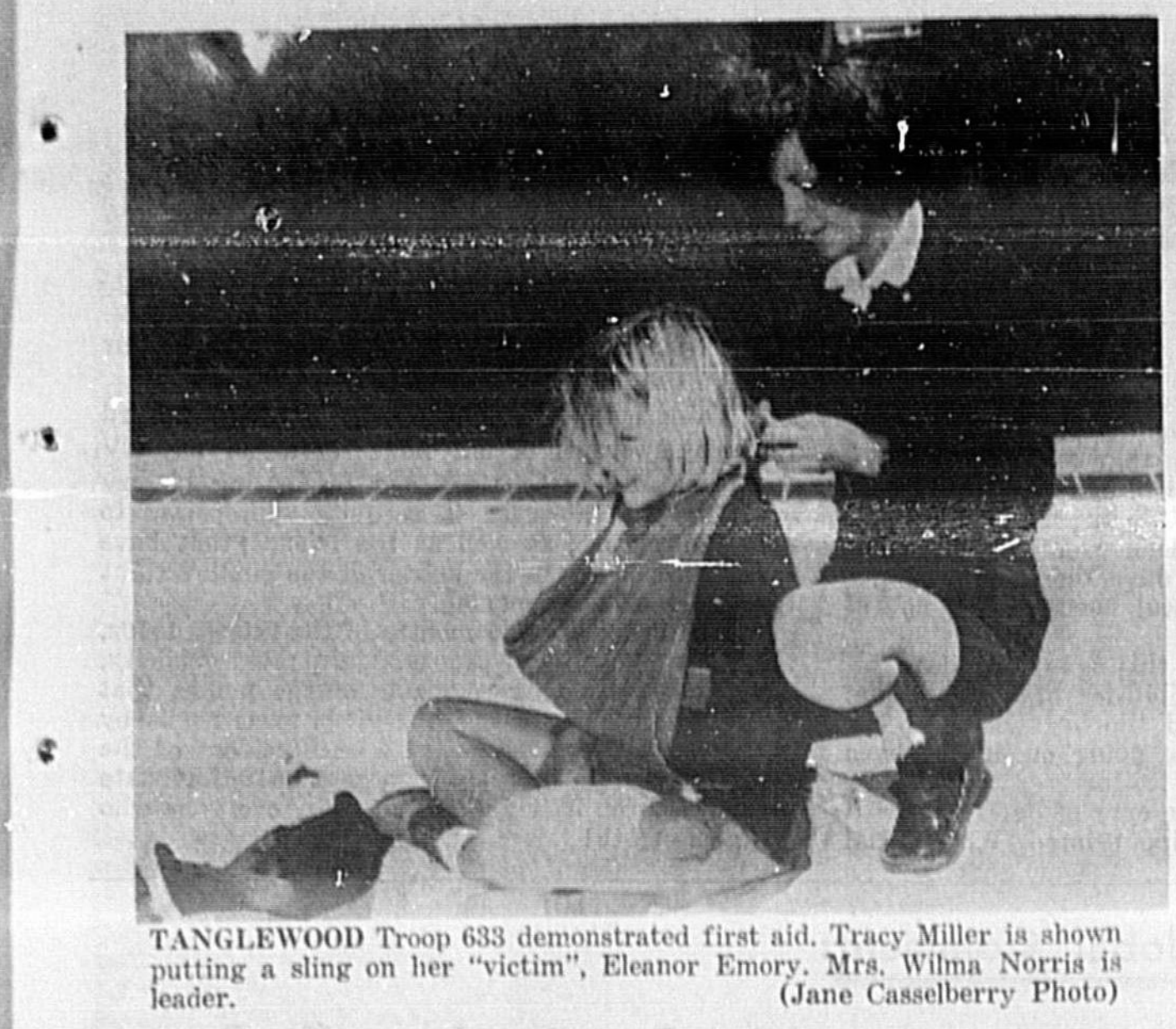

Of course such broad and biased interpretations of the value and use of responsible journalistic activities are defeating in themselves.

Especially is this so when the outstanding achievements of the Pulitzer Prize winners are so headlined by Mr. Agnew with caustic comment which could only be made by someone who has not done any serious thinking on this subject himself.

Yet, we of the Fourth Estate do owe something to the Vice President who must be accepted as speaking with approval of the White House as his breach-making and fund-raising speeches proliferate.

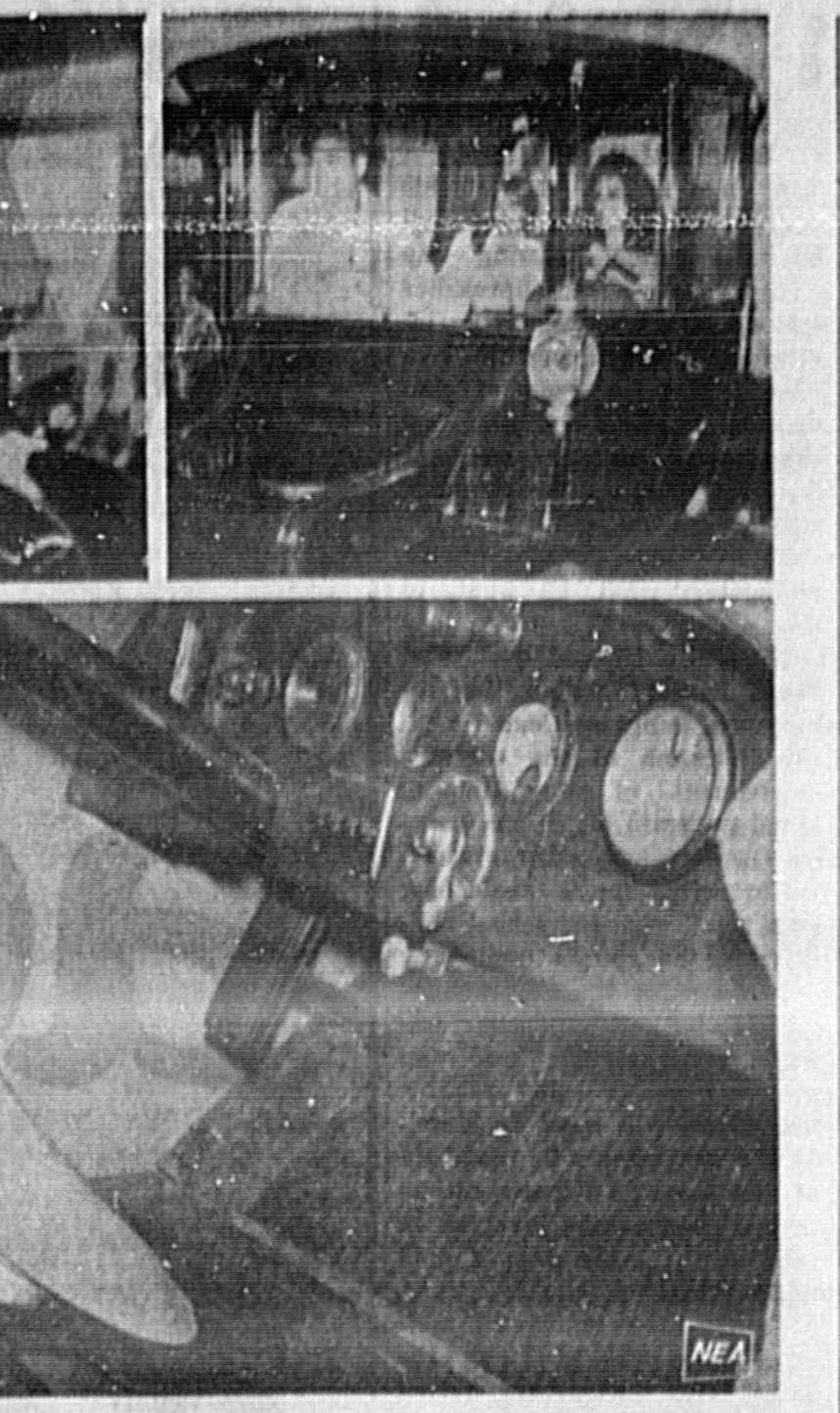

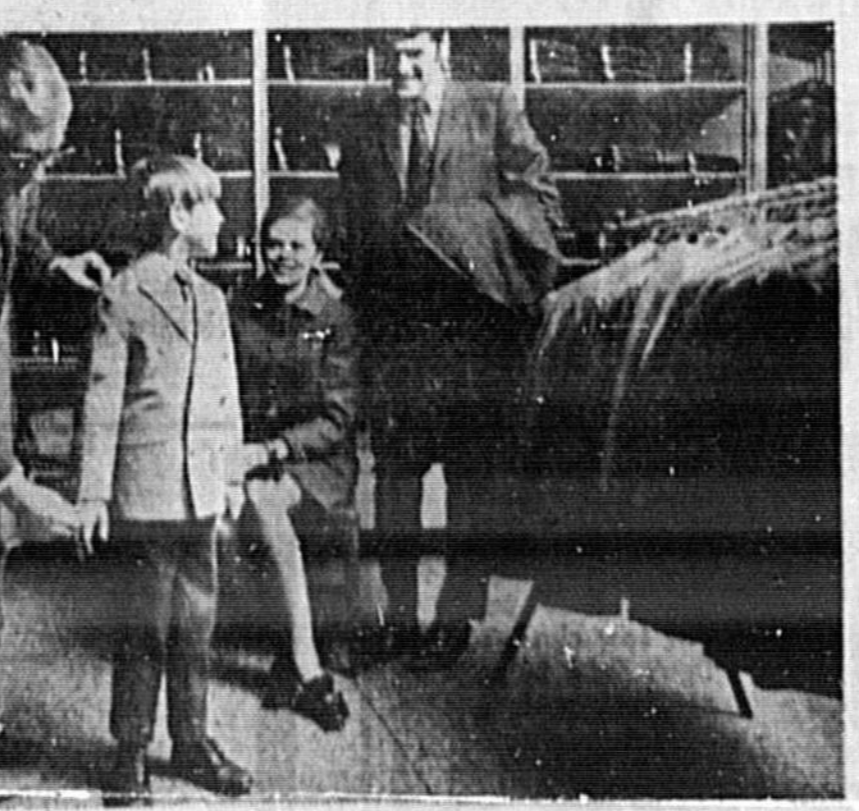

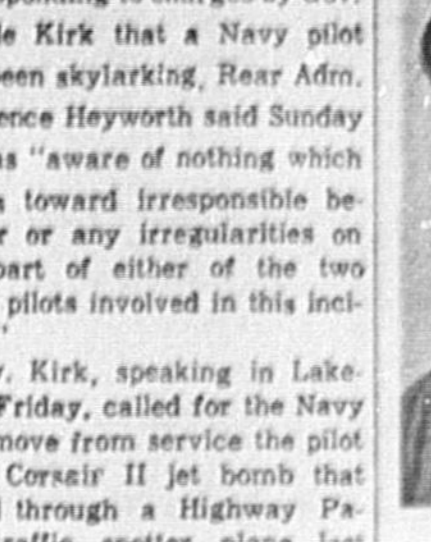

\$10 Million Voc-Ed Program Readied For Legislature

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP)—Education officials are preparing a \$10 million vocational education program for the Legislature, but Gov. Claude Kirk says guidelines should be established before the money is granted.

Education side Bill Maloy said the governor will propose to the Legislature that it hold the line on new education spending and instead fund a \$100,000 study that would include guidelines for a statewide job preparation program.

"It's just a difference in priorities," Maloy said. "Education Commissioner Floyd Christian and State Rep. Kenneth 'Buddy' MacKay, D-Orlando, who is working on the vocational education package, were reluctant to discuss the possibility of conflict with the governor."

Christian said the package will be aimed at immediate solutions to vocational education problems.

"We can just talk about it until we're blue in the face, but you've got to have programs and you've got to have money," Christian said.

Maloy said he can understand any apprehensions that Christian and MacKay, chairman of a House Committee on Vocational Education, may have about Kirk's proposal for a study.

"They may feel that we're just playing around and wanting to spend any money on it," Maloy said. "What we're really saying is if we're going to spend money, let's do it wisely."

The package of bills being prepared by the department and the House committee calls for two appropriations: \$10 million to upgrade vocational education equipment and \$600,000 to train vocational counselors in education colleges.

Also in the package are bills to establish a new formula for financing vocational education and a definition of the term to allow expansion of job preparation programs into junior high and elementary schools.

Cecil Golden, associate education commissioner for planning and coordination, said the \$10 million appropriation would enable local school systems to upgrade their programs by purchasing costly equipment.

Golden said equipment in some vocational education fields must be upgraded every year.

"It's not like where you get an algebra book and use it for five years because algebra stays the same," Golden said.

MacKay said his committee learned there is a serious shortage of vocational counselors, and the connecting bill would be a major start toward training new ones.

"The vast majority of the curriculum have got to be prepared in comprehensive counseling," MacKay said.

Maloy said it is the governor's position the new formula for vocational education should not be created and new funds should not be poured into communities.

Maloy said, "Whether you want to put more money into a lot of programs or you want to put more money into one program, it's up to you to decide that. We're going to get to this point." Maloy said.

Golden said the financing formula would not go into effect until the 1977-78 school year. "We would give education officials a year to work it out. It will enable us to have more money to generate new programs at the junior high level," Christian said. "This is the most serious step of the package is to make vocational education available where it is most needed."

"We'll be able to have them stay in school because we'll have some programs that will make them want to stay in school," Christian added.

The difference in opinions on vocational education arises out of Kirk's long-time campaign to upgrade programs he feels aren't meeting the needs of Florida's school children.

He indicated in January he would include a "job ready" program for all school children in his budget, but he was informed by state education officials such a program would cost around \$80 million.

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'Lost' Property Owners Sought By State Aide

Comptroller Fred O. Dickinson Jr. has announced that during the period of March 11-March 25 his office is attempting to locate some 1,100 persons who are owners of abandoned property. One method of locating the "missing owners" is by publishing their names in 45 newspapers in Florida. If an address has been furnished, the comptroller's office also directs a mailed notice to that address.

Dickinson states that relatives, former neighbors and friends of persons sought have been helpful in efforts to trace these elusive people. "Since 1962, as a result of the Abandoned Property Act, more than one-half million dollars has been restored to the control of legitimate claimants," the comptroller noted.

Should owners not be located, their funds are deposited in the State School Fund, earnings of which are distributed to the various school systems of Florida.

The principal amount continues to earn interest from investments but is available to a qualified claimant at any time he can prove his right to the property.

Infatation Comes To City

Sanford Caught In Bind

Sanford City Commission last night fell victim to one of its own devices and the result will be an extra cost to the city taxpayer of \$4.26 per running foot to pave 400 feet of Elm Street, located off 23th Street.

The situation came about when a group of Elm Street residents, led by Rev. Robert G. Welch, of the Church of God of Prophecy, which is located on the street, appeared before the Commission to request the paving of the street on an arrangement whereby the city pays one third, and property owners on both sides of the street pay the remaining two thirds at one-third each.

This would have worked out alright had not the price quoted the church group been a 1966 price of \$2.17 per running foot instead of the new inflated estimate of \$11.70 a square foot.

Rev. Welch presented a check to City Manager W. E. Knowles before last night's meeting for the property owners share of the cost or approximately \$1,736, leaving the city to pay the remaining \$2,944 of the total paving cost.

Still further complications could arise over the paving of the north-south streets in the city's Georgetown section by those property owners living adjacent to the affected streets.

Costs to these property owners who have volunteered to assess themselves via the city commission help in keeping Building 17 at the airport for its headquarters.

An amendment was offered to the motion to bring the future figures up to current costs, but because of the over sight the city will have to honor the low \$2.17 price for the Elm Street project.

The Georgetown paving project is to be presented at a public hearing of those affected property owners at an April 27 public hearing since the residents of that area are offering a tax lien on their property until they have paid the costs at \$11.70 figure.

City-CAP Hassle Simmers

The long simmering hassle between the Seminole Composite Squadron of Civil Air Patrol and the Sanford Airport over the use of one of the airport buildings by the group came to a boil, then cooled off during last night's Sanford City Commission meeting.

Appearing with a number of the air group was Don Knight, squadron commander, as spokesman in seeking commission help in keeping Building 17 at the airport for its headquarters.

Knights said City Manager W. E. Knowles had given the group until April 1 to vacate the structure which it has occupied since receiving permission from Don Rathel, Sanford Industrial Commission director, upon the city receiving right of entry to the former Navy base nearly a year ago.

In a Feb. 25 letter to Knight, Knowles requested that Knight furnish written evidence of corrective steps taken by his group to maintain the building in a proper manner.

Knowles, in a memo to commissioners, said, "The airport manager talked with the CAP personnel on several occasions regarding taking care of the building and their personnel; there was no cooperation forthcoming. CAP personnel violated the regulation by driving on the runways and taxiways... they went to the base dump area and pulled stuff out and transported it over the taxiways. They installed a makeshift, metal antenna base within three feet of the power line and fastened it with a one-inch strap to the building's facial board."

"Requests to remove a water pipe were ignored and so the airport manager had it removed and the CAP was offered a wooden pole to use if they would erect it safely."

"CAP personnel forcefully entered another building and removed a water cooler through a window; it was found installed in their building. When questioned, Mr. Knight and other CAP supervisory personnel claimed to have given permission to take it."

Knights admitted to commissioners that "we have done some things that were in error" but said his group wanted to fix up the building and remain on the base.

He said they would abide by the regulations as outlined by the city and would submit such intention in writing to the airport manager.

After discussion, commission decided to allow until April 15 for the CAP and city to resolve the situation to the satisfaction of the airport manager and city manager.

Commissioner Thomas McDonald warned Knight his group would be "kicked off" if it continues in the future to do those things that caused the confrontation.

City Eyes CATV Contract

A workshop is set for 7:30 p.m. March 30 by the Sanford City Commission to deal with the four proposals received by city from community antenna television firms.

Commissioner Gordon Meyer moved to set the special session after the matter was presented on last night's city commission agenda. Because of the importance of the proposals, Meyer felt the matter deserved consultations from each of the companies submitting proposals in a bid fashion.

Commissioner Thomas McDonald agreed and suggested that each bidder have a private audience with the commission in an interval of 20 minutes each and that a decision be made after hearing each firm. This proposal received unanimous approval.

In another item, commission approved hiring of Gerald Dake Planning Consultants of Jacksonville to do urban renewal survey work in preparing a request to the federal government for funds at a cost to city of \$1850.

In other actions, the commission:

- Asked Mrs. Glenn L. Edmondson to write E. Pope Bassett of legislative delegation a letter seeking help in the area of a special leash law to control the roaming dogs in the city.
- Approved first reading of an ordinance to rezone the tank farm area north of Fulton Street between French Avenue and Myrtle Avenue from M-1 industrial to C-2 commercial over the request of J. Edwin

Rock Festival Set In County?

Seminole County Sheriff John E. Polk said this morning he was concerned over a report that Seminole County would be the scene of a rock festival during the Easter weekend.

Polk said he had information that an area two miles north of Florida Tech was being sought by a rock festival promoter as a site for the two-day session that would bring some of the college students in Florida for their annual Easter vacation to this county.

The sheriff indicated he was working to get information to place the exact area of the planned festival and the name of the property owner.

Polk said radio stations were due to announce the exact site for rock music lovers some time Friday in time for them to congregate for a week of frivolity.

Authorities in Orange County also have been fighting the intention to locate a so-called "rock bash" for this weekend and several laws designed to harass the promoters of such events have been passed by the Orange County Commission.

Seminole Commissioners have discussed passage of similar ordinances to discourage the rock festivals here but, thus far, no action has been undertaken.

In past state festivals there have been narcotics sold and several fights among persons attending the sessions that usually last around the clock but no festivals have been promoted in Seminole County thus far.

Medics' Offices Entered

Sanford police are probing a series of burglaries that occurred last night at doctors' offices principally in the area of Seminole Memorial Hospital on San Marcos Avenue.

Chief Ben Butler this morning said his detective division of Tom Deppen, Ralph Russell and Bill Lykens were working on the reported entries of three offices. Butler said all information is not available since the investigations have just started but Simon Clinical Laboratories, Dr. George Edwards dental office and Dr. Maria Perez office were entered. Some money, office \$50, was removed from Dr. Perez's office.

Another break in occurred at Sanford Beauty College on Park Avenue at 23th Street, but, according to a police report, nothing was taken.

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
