



Speed in usually cited as the major contributory factor in accidents and undoubtedly it plays its part, but we have always thought that speed by itself is not the dire menace it sometimes is considered. There are times when a 25-milean-hour rate is extremely dangerous and there are times when the 60-mile-an-hour rate is comparatively safe. Speed at the wrong time and the wrong place will always be a highway bazard.

There is one common fault in motoring which has been brought to our attention and that is the tendency of many drivers to stay too close to the car ahead. This is dangerous at any speed but when driving 50 or 60 miles an hour the distance between two cars should be at least 300 feet. Most all of us have had the experience of having a trailing car stay within 40 or 50 feet while we travel along at a mile a Perfective Nationally By Inminute clip. This is one of the most dangerous current
practices and is almost routine with many drivers.

The slightest application of the break pedal or even the release of the accelerator is, under these circumstances, often the cause of a major mishap, and any audden pressure on the breaks would certainly lead to a condition bordering on tragedy. The next time you drive on the highways concentrate on the distance between your car and the one ahead, notice how often the car behind is practically on top of you, and then make every effort to keep the space between yourself and other cars sufficient for maneuver in case of any audden emergency.


