It's the time of year — after the elab-orate holiday sweets, the fancy cheeses and canapes — when I yearn to return to the basics. And the basics, in our house, means roast chicken

in our house, means roast chicken dinner. (It also means pot roast, but that's another column.) My hands-down favorite wintertime comfort-food meal consists of a roast chicken, roast potatoes toolted in the chicken fat), a dish of coolted chard, fennel salad, and a basic, unfrosted yellow cake served with whisped cream and jam. There are a zillion ways to roast a chicken. Like most home cooks, five got my own method. I don't truss the chicken, but you can if you feel strong-by about it. I don't stuff herbs under the skin, but be my guest if that suits you. What I DO do is surround the chicken with chunks of regular and sweet potatoes, stuff the bird with a bunch of savory items thay leaf, onion, lemon, etc.), and cook it until it — AND the polatoes — are really, really crispy e potatoes - are really, really crispy and delicious.

and delicious. There are probably a zillion ways to cook Swiss chard, too. But my favorile comes from Elizabeth Schneider's fab-ulous book "Uncommon Fruits and Vegetables." Stir often, and add water if necessary during cooking.

## **Outdoors-**Woman workshops scheduled

SANFORD - The Florida Game and Freshwater Fish Commission (GFC) will host two "Becoming an Out-doors-Woman" workshops. They are scheduled for February 5-7 in Palm Beach and April 16-18 in Ocala. These workshops are for women who are interested in acquiring outdoor skills.

The cost is \$100, which includes food and lodging at the camp, plus materials and instruction. The workshop is limited to 100 people. The program is primarily for women, 18 or older, who want to learn outdoor skills associated with hunting and fishing, but it also includes training that is useful for many other outdoor pursuits, said Lt. Lynne Hawk, the program's director.

Participants will be able to choose four of the 18 topics offered and will spend four hours on each topic.

. Topics include: Introduction to Panfishing, Basic Flyfishing Techniques, In-troduction to Bass Fishing. Boating Basics, Canoeing/Kayaking, Deer Hunting Besics, Small Game Hunting

### Offering hope to the disabled

Several years ago a woman drove her developmentally disabled son into a wooded area near Maitland. She poured kerosene over the young man and herself and then struck a match.

The woman reasoned it was too much for them to live any longer.

She was dying, anyhow. And there was no one to care for the son as she had for nearly 40 years. They had lost their rental home. They had lost hope. They cried for help but no

one heard their calls.

It was evident the other night at the first meeting of the county's new Disability Advisory Council that others in the same situation as the mother and son will not have to give up. That someone will hear their calls.

One of those on the eight-member council is 33-yearold Chris Drummond of Longwood. Drummond is deeply determined to enrich the lives of the developmentally disabled.

Drummond was born with only one eye. He was born with cerebral palsy. He had to have a brain tumor removed when he was only a few months old. He was slowed by a learning disability. Yet he was loved by his parents and two brothers and this made all the difference.

Greg Drummond, a former Seminole County commissioner, is overjoyed at his son's enthusiasm and tenacity. He maryels how Chris refuses to give up when he is shunned or rejected. "Chris has had 60 or so job rejec-tions but he plugs on. Drummond said.

# Longwood mulls county's adult code

SANFORD - The Longwood **City Commission is considering** enforcing the Seminole County Public Decency ordinance, reversing its stance that the decency ordinance would weaken the city's existing adult code.

At the urging of Commissioner Paul Lovestrand, the vote at Monday's commission seasion on opting out of enforcement of the county's public deordinance was postcency poned.

The decency ordinance is a complement to our code," Lovestrand said. "It's a dress code. It does nothing to our ordinance but strengthen it. I'mnot ready to cancel out what our voters approved."

According to Lovestrand, some 10,000 voters in the county, including Longwood,

signed petitions to pass the county ordinance.

Lovestrand had previously said the county's public decency ordinance may weaken the city's adult entertainment ordinance. The city's ordinance does not permit the sale. of alcoholic beverages in an adult entertainment business, or the advertising of adult entertainment businesses on road sides.

county's ordinance,

passed by referendum Nov. 3, 1998, sets a minimal level of public dress for anyone 10 or older. It does not address the sale of alcohol in adult entertainment businesses, or advertising on road sides.

There are no adult entertainment businesses in the Longwood city limits.

City attorney Richard Taylor said he is concerned that if the city supports the county's public decency ordinance, it may become involved in a legal challenge. Rachel's, Club Juana, and Cabaret are currently suing the county over the ordinance, and Casselberry has been named in the suit.

These suits can get very expensive to defend," Taylor said. "I don't know whether the county would pay for our defense costs or not."

Taylor said he believes the city's adult entertainment ordinance "adequately protects our city".

### **County manager hunt** delayed a month

**SEMINOLE COUNTY - County** Commission Chairman Cartion Henley says it will be mid-February before the county can begin in earnest its procedure to find a new manager

Anxious to avoid the 16month debacle that occurred in 1990 when the county sought a manager, Henley wants the search of 1999 to be swift and sound.

His priority this week is coordinating the manager's hunt with County Attorney Robert McMillan and Human Resources Director Nancy Tallent.

Henley said it isn't possible for all of the county commissioners to conduct a manager's search workshop until next month. Henley said there are too many other agenda items to leave sufficient time for the search plan. The commissioners need a separate workshop. Plus there is a legality snag.

County Manager Gary Kalser. who is retiring, said he would work through mid April. This could change, however, if Kai-ser were to take a month or so of accrued time before April.

One of the options the county has before it begins a national search for a manager is to hire an interim manager. Henley said this can not be done under the law until the present manager has completed his last day - in Kaiser's case April 16. Assistant County Manager Cindy Coto may be asked to be the acting manager during the time of the search. She also is interested in the manager's job. Coto has her own work load, however. How much more could she add if Kaiser were away?

Sources at the County Services Building say that there is a strong possibility that one of the commissioners has already asked Kevin Grace, a former assistant county manager, if he would return as an interim manager. Grace lives in Longwood and is presently working in the private sector. "A commission can call any-

one he wants and ask if that person would be interested," Henley said Tuesday. "A com-missioner cannot offer anyone the job, however. That would have to be decided by the entire board."

Grace is not talking about the manager's job - whether it be
