Many Buffalo In National Park To Be Slaughtered

MISSOULA, Mont., Nov. 10.—Between 200 and 300 buffalo on the Montana national bison range west of here must be slain this fall, Frank Rose, the superintendent, announces. A census last summer showed 700 buffalo, 500 elk, 28 mountain sheep and 100 deer on the range, and an inspection of the grasses convinced the superintendent that the preserve was about 40 per cent overstocked.

The sale of buffalo to parks and zoos is not great enough to bring the herd down to the required size, and so a large number will be slaughtered and sold on the meat market. Each fall the herd is reduced in this manner, but this year a far greater number than ever before will be butchered.

The Montana buffalo herd is the third largest in the world. The range, containing 13,000 acres, is under the supervision of the United States Biological Survey.

So far Mr. Rose has obtained the services of but two cowboys to help him in segregating the animals to be slaughtered. Few riders are willing and able to do this work. The buffalo is a stubborn animal, and the chances are ten to one he will charge the rider who attempts to cut him out of the rest of the herd.

TENNIS LEAGUE FORMED

ST. AUGUSTINE, Nov. 10.—A tennis league to take in the principal cities of the East Coast, with competing players of wide reputations is planned for this section of the state. An effort will be made to interest the United States Lawn Tennis Association in the movement, which is intended to make tennis an all-year outdoor sport in this country, it is stated. Places mentioned as possibilities for membership in the league are Nassau, Havana, Palm Beach, Ormond, St. Augustine, and perhaps Tampa, on the west coast.

More Buying Orders Whites Drive Negroes From the Work Camp

NEW YORK, Nov. 10.—Another flood of buying orders poured into today's stock market, carrying more than a score of issues to new peaks for the year in the first fifteen minutes of trading.

Total sales are in excess of 150,000 thousand shares. Initial gains ranged from fractions to four points.

Race Riot Imminent In Kentucky Town

FRANKFORT, Ky., Nov. 10.—Reports of race rioting near Harrodsburg reaching here this morning caused National Guardsmen to be dispatched to the Dix River dam. A Lexington dispatch told of the arrival there of 19 negroes from the Dix river who said they had been driven from the construction camp by a mob with clubs, sticks, pistols and shotguns.


