SANFORD - Pan Am will cease flight operations in Sanford for about a month

while the company undergoes a restructure.
Officials at Orlando Sanford International irport (OSIA) confirmed that Pan Am will halt flights beginning Jan. 12 and is schedule to restart service on Feb. 13.

"They plan to redesign the airline struc-ture after the 12th and focus on service in the Caribbean and South America," said Larry Gouldthorpe, president of TBI Airport Management Inc., which manages the domestic and international terminal for the

Operations will cease for about a month while company plans restructuring

Sanford Airport Authority. "While they're putting that new structure in place, they

won't be flying."

The airline's decision is not a complete surprise to airport officials. In September, Pan Am sharply reduced it's flight service in and out of OSIA, and there was speculation as early as October that the company would stop flights in January.

Currently Pan Am has a total of 10 flights

Currently Pan Am has a total of 10 flights a week out of Sanford to three destinations:

Bangor Maine, Portsmouth, N.H., and San Juan, Puerto Rico. That's a substantial drop from this summer when the airline was offer service to New York, Baltimore and three

daily flights to San Juan. Pan Am's vice president of marketing,
Dan Fortnam, said in September, "There's
no point in burning fuel if we don't have the
passengers," and said the airline industry as a whole is suffering huge loses. He said Pan Am's strategy is to conserve resources during the slow periods and provide limited service only to those markets that are prof-itable.

"We're a leisure carrier, and from the first of the year until spring vacations you are going to see a real valley in the number of passengers," Fortnam said. "We've made the decision not to fly because it's not profitable. You're going to see many of the other carriers offering deep, deep discounts to attract passengers. We're not going to do

Pan Am, once one of the premier compa-nies in the airline industry, originally made

City manger discusses new form of city government

SANFORD — City Commis-sion approved on first reading an ordinance that would ask Sanford voters if they want to change the city charter to provide for a strong mayor form

of govern-ment. The matter will be decid-ed Monday, Dec. 23, when Com-mission will have a

second read-ing of the



ordinance.

Mayor Brady Lessard is pushing the proposal, saying Sanford needs an elected official who is accountable to citizens running the day-to-day operations of the city. City Manager Tony VanDerworp performs those duties currently.

As a follow-up to last week's interview with Lessard, I sat down with VanDerworp to get his views on the issue.

TV: Before we start, I want to limit what I say to the operational process. I want to talk about the impact on operations.

DP: Can I ask you your opinion of the types of government?

TV: Yeah, I can do that. From an operational standpoint, I think a change in government has the potential to impact major projects, like the Riverwalk. You could change the head of government every four years. When you ment every four years. When you do that there is going to be a learning curve. That's going to impact those projects. For exam-ple, I've been working on secur-ing land next to the State Farmers' Market for a public safety headquarters. Any time you have a transition you're going to loss continuity on these projects.

Stormwater park is another one.
Second, I think delivery of services is impacted because of the Sunshine Law. Right now I can

Custody battle leads to 12-hour standoff

LONGWOOD - A nearly 12 hour standoff situation, which started over a child custody issue, came to a close just after 10 a.m. Thursday in the Sweetwater area of Seminole County.

The man who was barricaded inside the house, identified as Mario Arteaga, 43, had to be subdued after the Seminole County Sheriff's Office SWAT team made entry through the front door of his home at 310 Riverview Boulevard.

home at 310 Riverview Boulevard.

According to a deputy's report, the incident began Wednesday night when Arteaga's ex-wife and her current husband, left their home which is in another part of the county, for a dinner engagement. Her 12-year-old daughter (Arteaga is the girl's father) was left at home.

I from their arrival back home

Upon their arrival back home, they discovered the girl was not home. A short time later, Arteaga called his ex-wife's cell phone and reportedly advised her that if she wanted to see her daughter alive, she needed to be at his home in 20

Sheriff's deputies were contacted and one of them accompanied Arteaga's ex-wife to Arteaga's home. When the mother asked to see her daughter she was told she could not, but that the daughter

was in a safe place.

The deputy observed loud yelling and screaming accompanied the conversation with

Arteaga.
At this point, the deputy identified himself to Arteaga, but the man immediately slammed the door and locked it. Arteaga reportedly yelled, "Now you've made a big mistake bringing them

he advised her that deputies had arrested him several days ago and wanted them to leave. He then yelled through the door that the house was "booby trapped" and that he would shoot the first person /brough the door. The mother then advised the deputy she saw Arteaga briefly with a "bow and arrow or a sea fishing

School Board begins discussion on how to search for system's next superintendent

SANFORD — After 11 years, the Seminole County School Board is once again looking for a person to lead the school system.

The Board's search process for a new superintendent began ear-lier in the week with a work session led by Florida School Board Association Executive Director Wayne Blanton. Board members listened while Blanton presented an outline of what they need to consider for a successful search. "You have to remember, no

two superintendent searches are done the same," Blanton said.

"Many aren't done without con-

"Many aren't done without con-troversy."

The work session followed Superintendent Paul Hagerty's announcement last month that he is retiring on July 31 after serving as the school system's leader for the past 11 years. As required by his contract, he gave six months notice in order for the Board to conduct a search for Seminole's

conduct a search for Seminole's next superintendent.

Hagerty was hired in 1992 following a national search conducted by the School Board. During the work session, Board members agreed to once again consider applicants from throughout the country.

Blanton advised the Board to advertise in national publications advertise in national publications as soon as possible in order to select the best candidate before July. He estimated the school system would probably receive between 60 to 65 application during the nationwide search.

With consulting, advertising and travel, Blanton also estimated the total cost of the search would

the total cost of the search would be about \$30,000. Travel costs include the interviewing process when Board members may visit the location of various candidates and vice versa.

Pain in the neck award: Since the Sept. 11 terrorist attacks, airports across the nation have undergone security overhauls. The agency charged with implementing is the Transportation Security Administration (TSA). The agency may have a three-letter acronym but it's been a four-letter word for most airport administrators (kind of like the IRS).

Under the new security guidelines, size matters. Class III alrports aren't required to meet all of the security measures and, more importantly, aren't eligi-ble for as much federal money to make security improve-

ments.

In typically fashion, Dale used all the grace of a bull in a china shop to argue that the FAA and the TSA were wrong. In typically federal red-tape style, the folks in Washington didn't seem to care. Apparently the dispute became so heated that at one point the feds were threatening to arrest Dale, to which Dale promised to promptly when the factors. ly return the favor.

Dale's demeanor did manage to win the sympathy of the TSA officials, specifically Nick Scott, the TSA regional director overseeing security measures in Sanford.
(Dale won't confirm or deny if he used the ranching techniques he learned as a Middle Tennessee dairy

With the help of Scott and Congressman John Mica, the FAA eventually changed the airport to a Class II des-ignation, where it should have been all along.

To show that there were no hard feelings, Scott pre-sented Dale with the letter, attached to a plaque, officially announcing the change.

The moment wasn't lost on Airport Authority board

member Geoffrey Longstaff.
"It's the first time Larry's gotten an award for being a jerk," Longstaff said.

Signature mistake: Is there some backstabbing going on at City Hall over Mayor Brady Lessard's proposal to change the city to a strong mayor form of government? Depends on who you talk to.

Here are the undisputed facts: The city wants to secure the property, currently owned by Seminole County, where the old FP&L Building used to be. The city wants to use it as part of a redevelopment project proposed by Suncor Properties Inc. which wants to build condos, offices and retail shops on the lakefront. City officials had hoped the county would donate the land, but discussions with county commissioner made it

City officials had hoped the county would donate the land, but discussions with county commissioner made it pretty clear that wasn't going to happen.

At this point the facts get a little suppery. City Manager Tony VanDerworp and the city's economic development guru John Jones (recruited from the county by VanDerworp) drafted a letter sometime in November asking for the county to donate the land. They asked Lessard to sign the letter, but he says he delayed signing it because he felt county commissioners were clear in their negotiations: no freebies. After a few days Lessard told Jones the letter should include a \$200,000 offer.

Under Sanford's current form of government, the

Under Sanford's current form of government, the mayor can't make such an offer, without some type of consent from the city commission. Any acceptance by the county would still have to come back to the city commission for approval, but it's wise to at least make commissioners aware of the deal on the front end. Since the mayor can't contact commissioners outside a public meeting, normal protocol has been for VanDerworp to shop these letters around individually to the commis-

Jones made the change to the letter and it was sent to the county. Lessard says he assumed VanDerworp and Jones were informing the other commissioners.

VanDerworp says he was out of the loop and didn't know the letter was sent. Jones says first VanDerworp was "out of the loop," then latter recented and said he

was in the loop.

All of which caused Commissioner Whitey Eckstein to flip his lid during the work session. (That's a fact). The city's senior statesman (or maybe it's cityman) chewed on Lessard then turned to VanDerworp and asked why he wrote the letter and didn't tell the other

VanDerworp's response?
"I didn't sign the letter, commissioner," VanDerworp

Sounds like a lot of assumptions were being made during this whole deal, and each party should shoulder some of the blame. But VanDerworp's answer about not signing the letter is pretty weak, particularly since any correspondence about property – donated or purchased – should have been presented to commissioners.



Commission receives briefing on Wekiva Task Force

On Dec. 10, the Seminole County Board of County Commissioners received a briefing on preliminary recommenda-tions recently developed by the Wekiva Basin Area Task Force. Chairman Daryl McLain iden-

tified that these recommendations would be a topic of further dis-cussion, public input and poten-tial action at the upcoming Dec. 16 and Dec. 17 meetings of the Task Force. Based upon signifi-cant concerns of detrimental impacts for the citizens of Seminole County, the Board adopted a resolution opposing adopted a resolution opposing any toll route or expressway facil-ity that crosses the Wekiva River into Seminole County. The Commission further requested

that the Task Force remove from consideration any such proposed corridor in Seminole County and urged partner agencies in central Florida, s transportation planning to consider other alternatives to address the Governor,s Executive Order which created the Task


our relationships with one another. the spirit of the day. We watch these programs knowing


the outcome, but delighted that the stars of the show have a turn-around in their lives bringing about a But are we missing something here? I believe what

Woman loses daughter second time after missed telephone call

DEAR ABBY: Thirty-six years ago, I gave birth and placed my baby girl for adoption. The father was going away to school and had no inter-

est in me or the child. My parents were about to divorce, and my brother was in trouble with the law. I knew there was no way I could keep my daughter, so with a heavy heart I signed away my parental rights and tried to go on with my life. Eventually I mar-ried and had a son, who

My mother has since moved in with my husband and me. Two weeks ago, a call came to the house while I was at work. Mom answered the phone. The woman calling was looking for her birth mother, and had information that

I was, indeed, that woman Mother explained all this to me when I got home. As I was

becoming more and more excited, she gave me the devastating news that she had told the woman that I had only ONE child - a son — and that I was NOT the person she was looking for. The caller continued to ask questions, but Mother denied all of the facts, and finally ended the call by hanging up on her.

I am crushed. For years, I have hoped for a call like that, but had not searched for my child because I did not want to invade her life or the lives of her adoptive parents. My mother was extremely judgmental and nonsupportive when I was pregnant that first time, and the day my

daughter was born, she pointed at my baby and said, "She is NOT coming home with us. I am NOT raising any more children."

Now I am desperate for my daughter to call again. I must find her! I have filed with the state adoption registry and private bureaus, called an attorney, and searched online. I pray that she will call back, so I can assure her that I love her and have thought about her every day since her

My husband is anxious to welcome her into our lives. We are both heartbroken we may never have the chance. Mother has since come to understand what a grave injustice she performed — for a second time.

County Commission ponders Florida Power & Light's power line request

By Nick Plettauf

The question posed to the Seminole County Commission Tuesday morning was whether to allow Florida Power & Light to have overhead or buried power lines along certain sections of East Lake Mary Boulevard.

The request from FP&L came in two sections. The first was to relocate existing overhead utilities on

East Lake Mary Boulevard between Ohio Avenue and the existing entrance to the Orlando Sanford International Airport.

The second request was for the installation of new overhead lines on the extension of East Lake Mary Boulevard which has not been constructed, from the airport entrance eastward for approxi-mately 3,000 feet. This would be in anticipation of the proposed extension of Lake Mary

Boulevard from the airport area to the east then north, eventually joining SR-46.

The Land Development Code specifically requires the undergrounding of any transmission or primary distribution feeder lines.

Addressing the Commission,

County Engineer Jerry McCullium explained that he would recommend approval of the first request, as the lines are already in existence. He added however, that he would be against the sec-ond proposal, as it would be in a

Although it was on Tuesday's commission agenda, McCullum observed that FP&L had requested the entire matter be temporarily delayed.

With a unanimous vote, the commission agreed to continue the requests until at least the Jan. 14 commission meeting, pending further discussions with FP&L.







DP: So operating in the dark is better than operating in the sun-

TV: We're not violating the Sunshine Law because ...

DP: I know you're not violating the law, but you're saying it's bet-ter to conduct a major part of debate on an issue in one-on-one meetings that the public is not privy to? That the press isn't privy

TV: It's mainly a lot of informa-tional requests. You'll notice that when we bring an item to the work session we very seldom have to have a follow up. I'm not polling commissioners in these meetings or counting votes. A lot of times in those meetings a commissioner will ask for more information, and I can provide that before the meeting.

DP: Still, wouldn't those discussions be better in public, where citizens and other commissioners could hear them?

TV: It slows the process down. Like I said most of what comes out of those meetings is requests for information. That research has to occur sometime. ... The third area where you have an operational impact is on commissioners' pro-jects in their own districts. A strong mayor is going to campaign on his visions and is going to come in with his own agenda. Staff is going to spend a lot of time on the mayor's projects at the expense of projects in commissioners' dis-





He was born in Eatonton, Georgia and was educated in the public schools there, later completing special courses in a private school


He was a Mason, member of Knights of Pythias and First Baptist Church







UCF rocks No. 25 College of Charleston

ORLANDO - Forward Ed Dotson scored a game-high 18 points and UCF had three other players finish with dou-ble figures in scoring as the Golden Knights rolled over No. 25 College of Charleston, 82-64, Thursday evening at UCF Arena.

The win over the Cougars (6-1), marked the first time

UCF (5-2) has ever beaten a nationally ranked opponent. Dotson was dominant down low for UCF connecting on eight-of-13 field goal attempts, most from inside the paint. The senior scored 11 points in the first half, enabling the Golden Knights to pull away and send C of C to their first loss of the season. Earlier in the year the Cougars had put together an impressive run winning the prestigious Great Alaska Shootout, defeating, Wyoming, Oklahoma State, and Villanova.

The Cougars led early on as UCF did not have a field goal until center Roberto Morentin grabbed an offensive board grabbed an offensive board and scored to the the game at six with 16:23 left in the first half. Ray Abelland then hit two free-throws following a C of C technical foul to give the Golden Knights an 8-6 lead. UCF did not trail the rest of the way. Abelland's foul shots were the start of a seven to were the start of a seven to nothing UCP run, capped by Dotson slam with just over 14 minutes remaining.

Two minutes later Dexter Lyons picked up a loose ball and drained a three-pointer, giving the Golden Knights a 27-12 lead.

The Golden Knights shot 57.1 percent from the field in the first half compared to the struggling Cougars who hit on only seven of 25 attempts (28 percent). Five UCF players hit three-pointers in the first stanza including Abellard, Al Miller, and Will

Bakanowsky. Bakanowsky later followed up with a layin with 15 seconds remaining to give UCF a commanding 47-26 advantage at the break, also its largest of the first half.

C of C was unable to close the gap in the second half, as Abellard hit one of his gamehigh four three-pointers at the 13:42 mark to push the Golden Knighis lead to 25. UCF hit 10-of-13 foul shots in the second half and 80 percent from the charity stripe for the game (20-25). The Golden Knights 82

points was the most given up by the Cougars since November of 1998, when C of C fell to Georgia, 84-63. Also, the game marked the Cougars largest losing deficit since a December 1999 loss to Princeton.

Abellard finished with 16 points for UCF, while Miller and Lyons rounded out the double figure scorers with 12 and 11 points respectively. Morentin paced the team with 10 rebounds. The Knights finished the game hitting a season-high 50 percent from the floor and 42 percent from behind the arc

Thomas Mobley and Zeke Johnson scored 15 apiece for C of C. Mike Benton had eight rebounds. The Cougars shot 43 percent from the field and were only two-of-14 from

three-point range. The Golden Knights hit the road for a pair of games, starting with a visit to Tennessee-Martin on Sunday. Tip-off is slated for 6 p.m. After facing the Skyhawks, See UCF, Page 28

them twice this season. Things didn't look like they had changed much as the Panthers took a 30-24 lead at


