

Traveling criminals take shoplifting trip

Sheriff's office advises stores to beef up security to ward off thieves

Retail shop owners beware. The Seminole County Sheriff's Office last week identified two separate shoplifting incidents that are reportedly the handy work of traveling criminals.

Sheriff's office Lt. John Thorpe specializes in tracking traveling criminals, and suggests retail stores should beef up security and double check operating security cameras to ward off the shoplifters.

On Feb. 15, a police report was taken at a

Lake Mary bike shop involving an attempted shoplifting. An Out Spoke 'N store manager told deputies two females and one male approximately 50 years of age entered the bike shop and began looking around.

The manager stated to police he noticed store clothing hanging from under one of the female's dresses and grabbed it. The

three suspects fled east on Lake Mary Boulevard in a late model maroon Toyota Camry with a tan top.

"It appears the method of operation is similar to the organized shoplifters," Thorpe said about the incident.

On Feb. 16, another police report was filed after an arrest at Sam's Wholesale Club

in the Casselberry area. Similar to the previous incident, three people entered the store, two males and one female. Security officers at the wholesale club witnessed the trio stealing computer software.

The two men fled out the store and escaped in a silver Ford Taurus bearing Illinois tags, but the woman was apprehended with more than \$750 worth of software in her possession. It was discovered the woman was wearing a blue booster dress underneath her floor length dress. The

SALT LAKE CITY — Well I finally got some time to e-mail *The Seminole Herald*.

I have been working 16-hour days. Starting at 4 a.m. and not getting back to our sleeping quarters until sometimes 1 a.m. and back up again at 4 a.m.

Let me tell you a typical day. I left Orlando at 4:30 p.m. on the 13th, changed planes in Albuquerque and arrived in Salt Lake at 9:10 p.m. Mountain Time, which is two hours behind us.

Allen Clark, Park City Fire District, picked me up at the airport. He took me to Park City, and we met up with Ron Farr, State Fire Marshal from Virginia, who took me to Wasatch Mountain campground for the night. I finally got to bed about 2 a.m. ET. I stayed in a small motor home for the first night, no TV or phone and all alone in Utah.

I awoke at dawn to a light snow, about a half-inch. It was really beautiful since I hadn't seen snow for a few years since I transplanted to Central Florida from Pittsburgh in 1984. I was picked up by Farr at about 9 a.m. and taken back to the check-in center then to my new home in Cowboy Village in Heber, Utah. That is where I am staying now.

Still no phone or TV. At least I'm in a larger trailer, sort of like

History mystery

Museum specialist searching for clues about former Sanford Turpentine Co.

Two coupons are creating a stir at the Museum of Seminole County History. The company store coupons are from the Sanford Turpentine Co., and appear to be from the 1920s and 1930s. According to the two vouchers, which were worth 50 cents and \$3 at the time of distribution, the company was located in Paola.

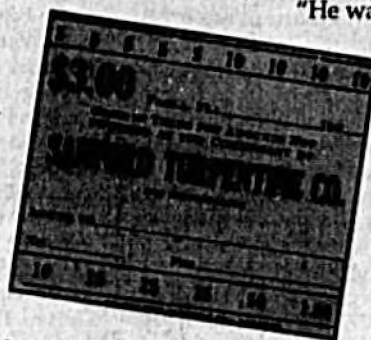
That's about all Museum Specialist Karen Jacobs knows about the Sanford Turpentine Co. Now, she's asking the community for answers about the mysterious business.

"I've asked everywhere and everyone, and I can't find anything about the Sanford Turpentine Co.," Jacobs said. "I don't know who owned it or where exactly it was located."

The museum specialist said she was aware other timber and turpentine companies were located in Seminole County during the late 1800s and early 1900s. It was Carroll Butler's visit to Seminole County, however, that began Jacobs' research into the Sanford business.

Butler, an expert in the field of pines naval

stores, recently gave a presentation on the history of the timber and turpentine industry during a Seminole County Historical meeting. During a slide presentation, he projected onto the screen an image of the two coupons from the Sanford Turpentine Co., much to the surprise of the people in attendance.



"He was showing us the slides, and the name Sanford Turpentine Co. popped up," Jacobs said. "It took us a few seconds to realize what it was, and he had already moved on. We asked him to go back to the Sanford slides."

"We didn't even know the company had existed," Jacobs said.

The pine naval stores industry is one of the nation's oldest industries. After almost 400 years of existence in the United States, however, only one plant still exists today, and it is closing at the end of this year.

Pine naval stores is the term used to describe the products, including turpentine, obtained from the sap of pine trees. The term originated from the days when wooden sailing ships, including naval ships, were waterproofed using pitch and tar and other

Seminole captures first at state fair

Seminole County beat out many of its neighbors, including Volusia, Brevard and Orange counties, last week capturing the first place ribbon for urban county exhibits at the State Fair in Tampa.

"The whole purpose (of the exhibit) is to tout what we have available in Seminole County and to let the people across the state know about it," said county extension director Barbara Hughes.

The fair theme for exhibits was "The more you know, the more you love." The county exhibits highlight information about tourism and recreation, natural resources, historical points of interest, industry, and agriculture. Many of the exhibits will also be on display again at the Central Florida Fair from Feb. 28 to March 10 in Orlando.

"We started with the theme and just brainstormed on the idea how do you know more," said Armen Silverbach, a private Winter Park graphic artist contracted by the county.

She developed the idea of opening doors to learn more about the county. The exhibit features 5 doors that can be opened with each theme. Door "knobs" are representative of each door theme. The tourism knob is a canoe paddle, the agriculture knob is a shovel, the natural resources knob is a piece of wood, the industry knob is a cell phone, and the historical knob is a piece of rod iron.

Inside each door are facts about each highlighted theme. Many of the facts are portrayed through a collage of three-dimensional items that can be touched and interacted with by participants. For example, a soft plush animal represents the Central Florida Zoo and when squeezed the sounds of the particular animal are heard. The interaction of opening doors and seeing the representative items helps participants really visualize what makes Seminole County different, Silverbach said.

"Ultimately my job is to sell

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Family donates state of the art chimes to church

SANFORD — Things are a little bit more melodious at Sanford's Central Baptist Church.

A new, state of the art, chime system was recently installed at the church. Every 30 minutes, a different tune is played for the parishioners and community surrounding the church.

The carillons were a donation to the church in the name of Slaton Bradley. Bradley's wife, Maggie, three daughters and friends, Richard and Marcelle Bradley (no relation) raised and purchased the chime system for their church.

"I've received a lot of comments

about the chimes from the church and the community," Maggie Bradley said. "People have sent cards to me, and one lady who lives by the church told me how much she enjoyed hearing the chimes."

It was Marcelle Bradley who first came up with the idea for the chimes, Maggie said. Realizing it would be nice to have a carillon system at the church, she thought it would also be nice to donate them in the name of her friend, Slaton.

"We wanted the bells since the church was built," Maggie said.

According to the Rev. Jimmy Dale Patterson, pastor at Central Baptist, the original church was built in 1936. However, the church was built on its

current 1st Street location in 1989. The Bradley's donation is the first of its kind for the congregation.

Slaton's friends and family donated about \$6,000 to purchase the chimes, which were ordered from a company in Colorado. The carillons are actually various musical CDs run by a computer within the church. Four speakers, two actually donated by the Colorado company, magnify the sound.

Slaton is currently a resident at Sanford Healthcare and Rehabilitation. Sadly, he has not been able to hear the chimes ring, Maggie said.

"The church has always been important in our lives," Maggie said. "So, we've been lucky to be able to do this."

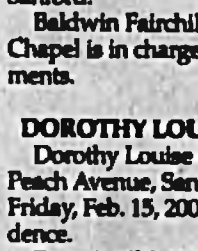

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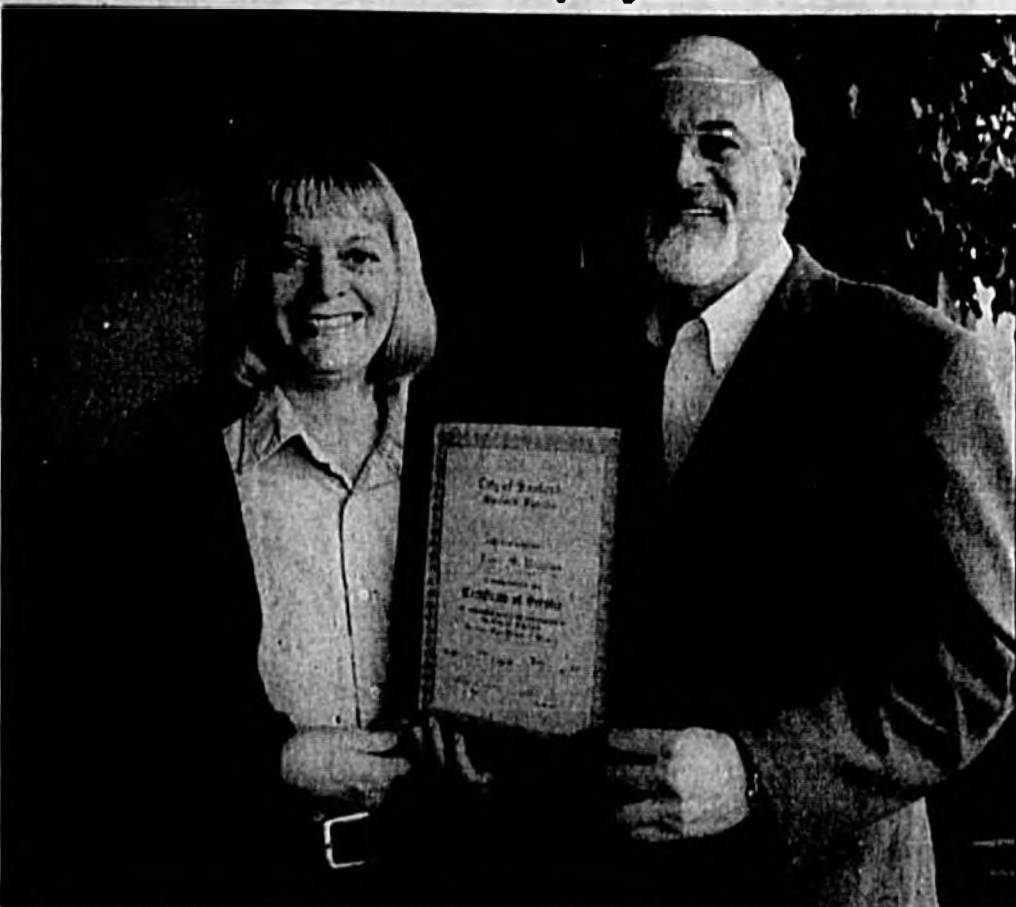

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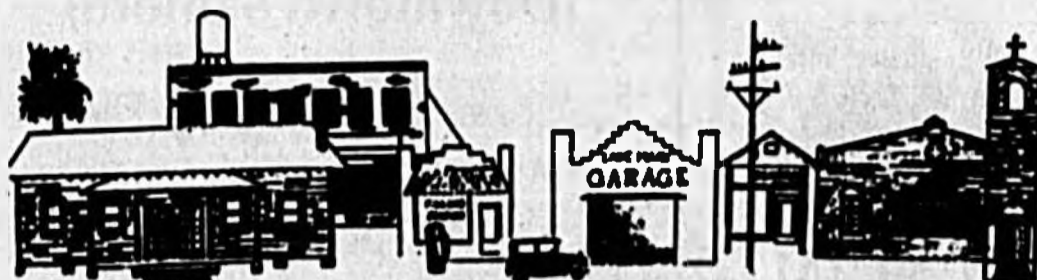

booster dress, similar to a carpenter's apron, was modified with large pockets to hide merchandise, Thorpe said.

The woman had only an unofficial identification card on her possession. The card identified her as Teresa Wyglewska with a Chicago address, but that is probably not her true identity, Thorpe said.

"In reality we will never know who she really is," Thorpe said.

Traveling criminals or gypsies tend to be of Polish decent such as Wyglewska. They confound the criminal justice system by frequently changing identities. According to Thorpe, if they can bond out quickly and change identities they flee prosecution and the "citizens end up paying the bill."

Police know Wyglewska has a previous arrest in Manatee County, but the information she gave Manatee police and the Seminole County Sheriff's Office differs. She is also wanted by Immigration and Naturalization Service.

"The information she gave INS and us is not the same - go figure," Thorpe said.

After Seminole County gets done prosecuting her, Thorpe believes the INS will deport her, but that still is not the answer to the problem, he said. In some instances, deported traveling criminals return to the U.S. within six months and with different identities, Thorpe said.

Wyglewska is currently being held without bond as her identity is checked with the FBI, however, even after the FBI check the sheriff's office can assume it's still not her real name, Thorpe said.

Generally, traveling criminals used to be more prevalent in Florida during the winter. Due to the increasing tourism market and ethnicity, police are finding traveling criminals in the state year round, Thorpe said.

"They fit in and they don't dress any different than anyone else," Thorpe said. "The females wear long dresses, but that's accepted in our society."

Thorpe urges retail stores to look for individuals appearing to work in a team. Traveling criminals usually work in groups with several of them watching the store exits and security. Another tip suggested by Thorpe in identifying traveling criminals is their broken English similar to Wyglewska.

resinous products from pine trees.

The industry reached its peak in the early 1920s. Seminole County had about 20 to 30 turpentine stills/naval stores in the area. Before 1914, 50 to 60 percent of the industry's products were exported to Europe. However, as a result of blockades during World War II, the demand for the products declined, as did the county's industry.

During the peak year's of the pines naval stores industry, several stills were located in

Sanford, including Wilson Cypress Timber and Overstreet Turpentine Co., Jacobs said. With the discovery of the two coupons, which Butler later donated to the Seminole museum, another company can now be added to the list.

The coupons are standard issue documents used by employees. Like many of the larger companies during the turn of the century, it appears people working for the Sanford Turpentine Co. were given the coupons as part of their wages. The vouchers were only good for the company's store.

"The coupons are a great piece of history, and now they are our newest acquisition," Jacobs said. "We would just like to learn some more about the company they came from."

they use for disaster victims. In fact these came from FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Administration) after the floods in Minnesota. Right now, I am staying with a fireman from Utah and a fire inspector from Fernandino Beach. I never see the firefighter because he works a 48-hour shift, then he's off 24.

My first day consisted of going to Park City Fire District Headquarters, then to Salt Lake to get my credentials, back to Park City then to main street to start routine inspections with two partners, from Michigan and Wisconsin. I'll get a better count of how many states are represented here later, but there are eight fire marshals from Florida. That's more than any other state.

Up again at 4 a.m. to join the rest of my car pool for breakfast, and then to Park City for our 7 a.m. briefing. My assignment on the 15th was Deer Valley and the aerial practice. I went with two other inspectors - one from Massachusetts and the other from Wisconsin. We arrived at 10 a.m. and started inspections.

I found an unattended Coleman cooler under the grandstand and called security to check it out. That's our procedure for unattended packages. They brought their German Shepherd dog and did their thing. It turned out to be someone's lunch.

The rest of the day was uneventful just doing routine inspections and showing our presence, which gives the public a sense of security. Being there gave

me a chance to observe up close the events and athletes.

My shift concluded at 4 p.m. I went back to HQ and meet up with other inspectors to return for dinner and back to Cowboy Village and bed around 9 p.m.

Day three, Feb. 16, up again at 4 a.m. for breakfast at Wasatch Village and to use a computer to send this.

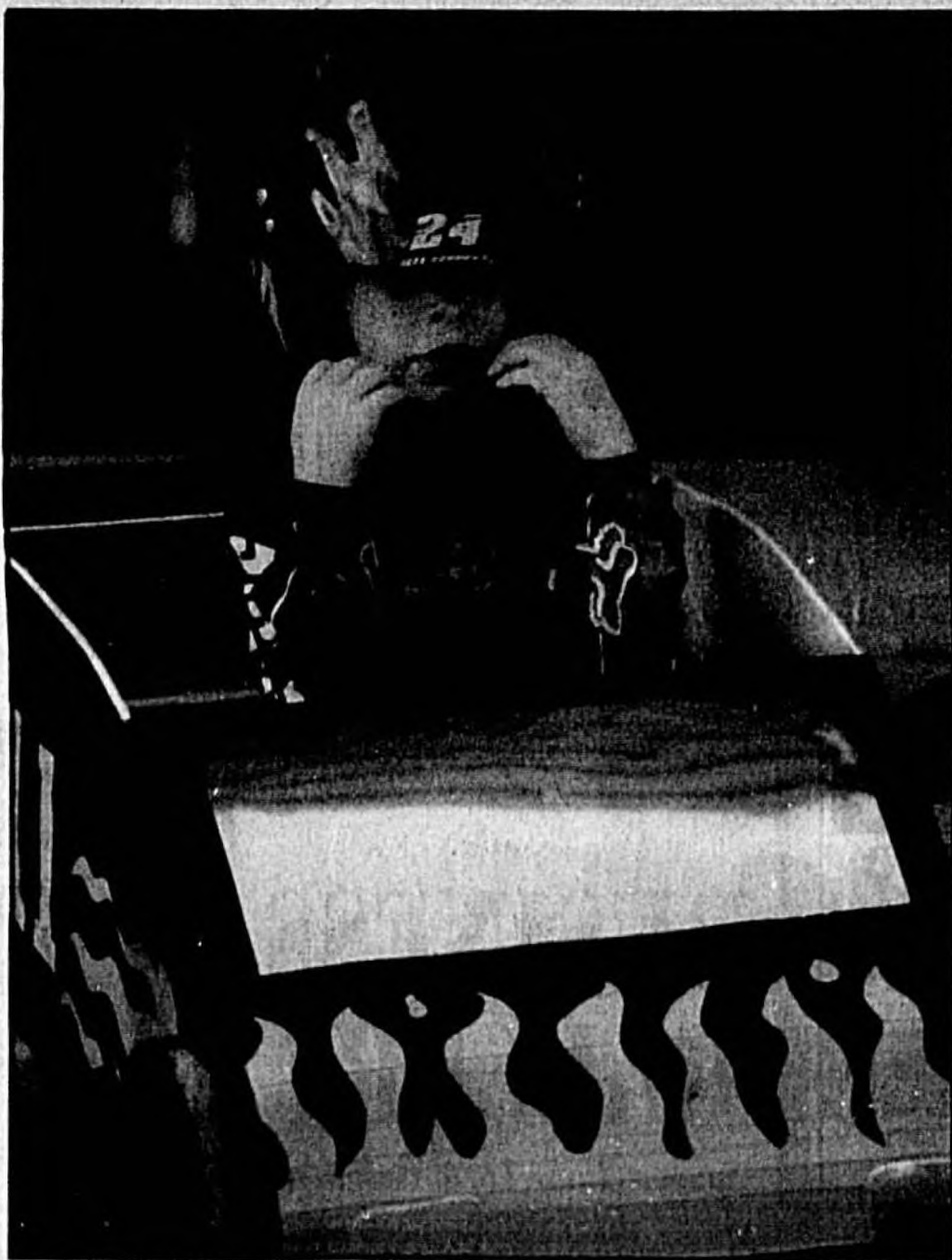

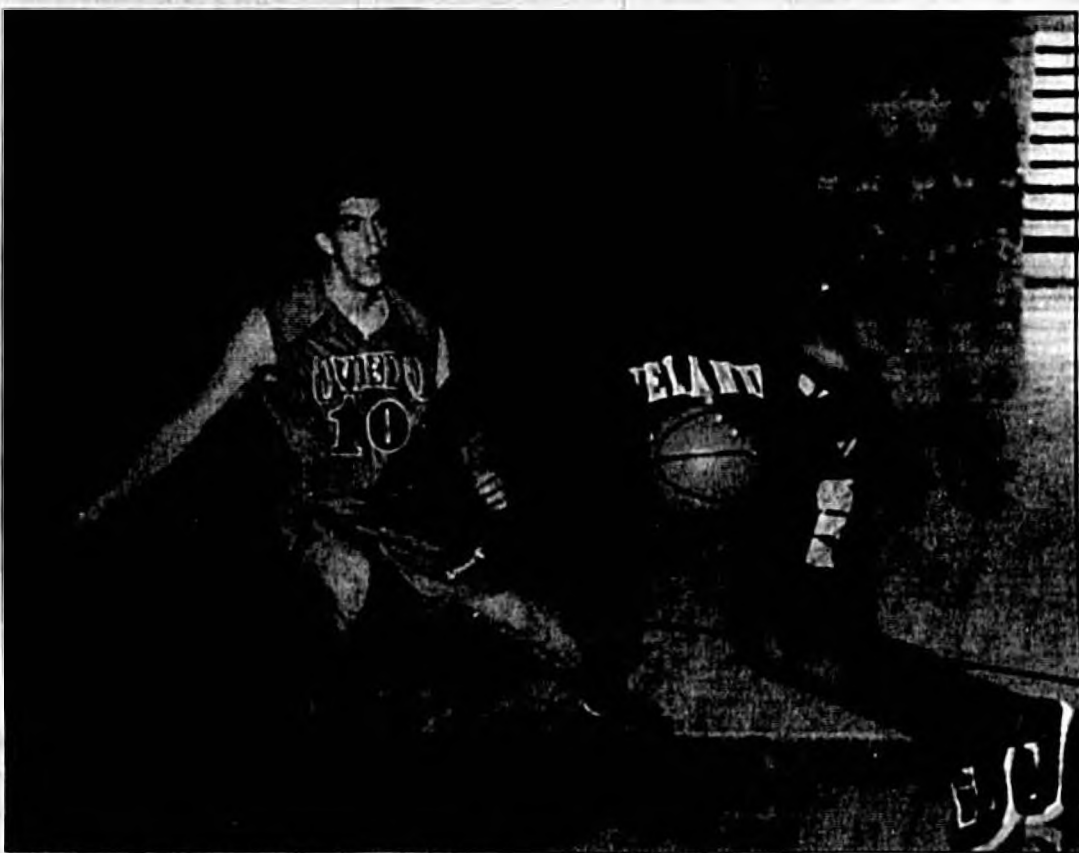
SANFORD — To the victors go the spoils.

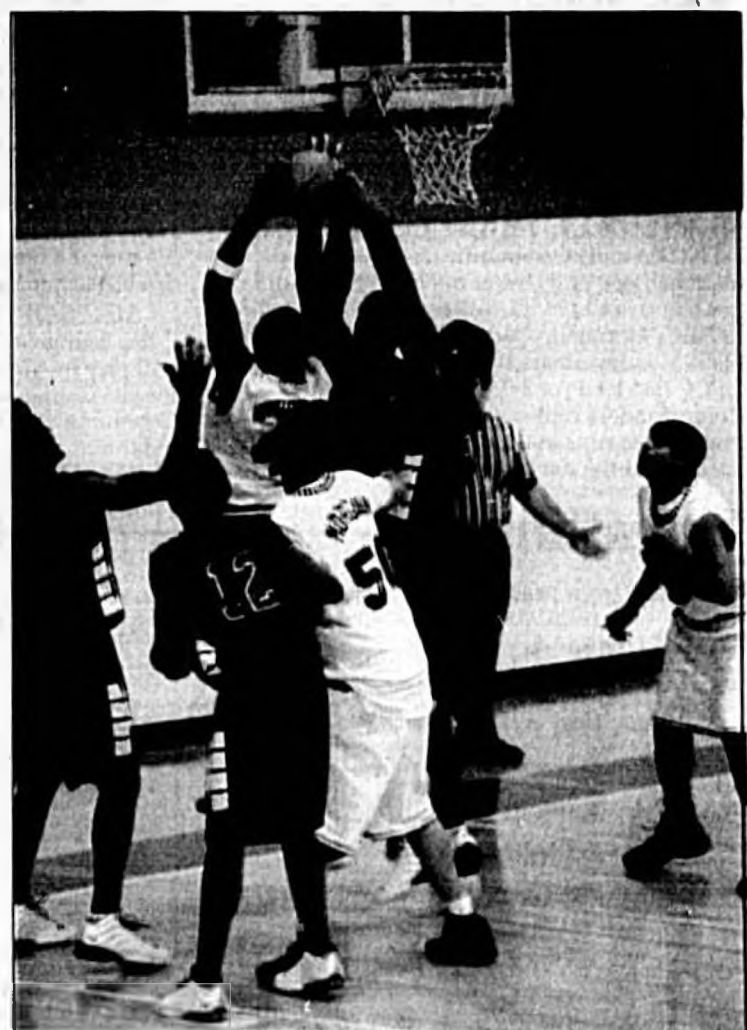

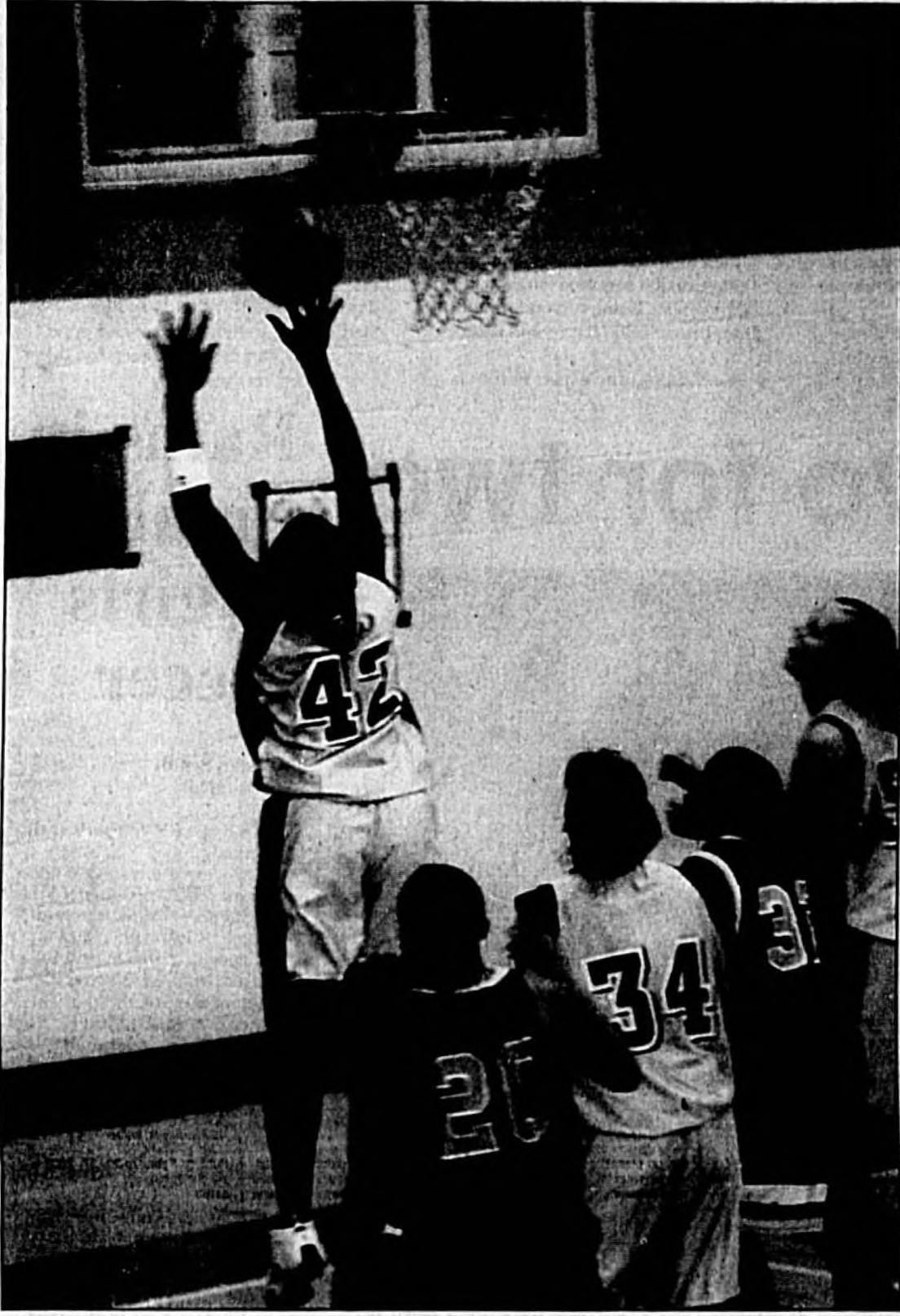

Convicted arsonist back in jail

SANFORD — Tensions at the John E. Polk Correctional Facility eased Thursday night when a haunting week-long mistake was rectified.

Sheriff's office deputies arrested Gilberto Roman, 47, at about 6:30 p.m. Thursday at the Lake Kathryn Motel in Longwood. Roman, a convicted arsonist who was awaiting trial

on an attempted first-degree murder charge, was mistakenly released from the jail Feb. 14.

"I can not tell you how good I feel now that he is back in jail," said jail director David Diggs. "Last night was the best sleep I've had in three days."

The error went unnoticed for five days until Orange County paperwork arrived Tuesday at the jail authorizing his transfer to a state prison. Roman was convicted of arson in Orange County after he set his ex-

wife's home on fire in 1999. He was sentenced to approximately three years of prison time. Roman was awaiting a retrial in the Seminole jail for another 1999 incident where he allegedly tried to run over his ex-wife with a vehicle.

Welcome Home

With a Scrabble board, a deck of UNO cards and other personal belongings, Roman was released from the jail at about 11:30 a.m. last Thursday. Five days later, as

the jail was learning of their mistake at about 10:30 a.m., Roman was leaving the state Department of Motor Vehicles office in Sanford with a brand new drivers license.

Armed with a license photograph that was practically still wet, a special task force of deputies and investigators created a plan of attack and implemented it around noon, said sheriff's office spokesman Steve Olson. The plan included around-the-clock protection of Roman's ex-wife at an undisclosed location.

"They wanted to go out and work the streets without him knowing he was wanted," Olson said why the sheriff's office waited.

when the towers collapsed. Of the 343 city firefighters who lost their lives that day, 89 were senior officers. Those numbers become more significant when you consider that in the 150 year history of the FDNY, 175 firefighters lost their lives in the line of duty,

Blind man claims self defense in stabbing incident

SANFORD — A blind elderly man almost stabbed another man to death Thursday night at the Outreach Rescue Mission located at 1701 West 13th Street.

Police responded to the mission at approximately 10:30 p.m. to find Brian Stanley, 36, sitting in a chair covered in blood. He was stabbed twice with a kitchen knife. Once in the chest and another time in the back of the head.

Almost an hour beforehand, police responded to the mission in reference to a disturbance. According to the reporting officer, Stanley appeared intoxicated as his eyes were bloodshot and his speech slurred. The mission advised police they just wanted Stanley to go to bed and leave the others alone. The officer reported Stanley went back to bed. Apparently he didn't stay there

long. In their second visit to the mission, officers followed a blood trail through the mission to find the suspect in the center of the main room, sitting in a brown chair. The suspect admitted to the crime, but stated he was only protecting himself after Stanley threatened to do bodily harm to him, according to the police report.

"The suspect is alleging he was threatened," said Sanford police spokeswoman Cleo Cohen. "We have the suspect, but no arrest has been made."

Stanley allegedly grabbed the man and that's when the suspect stabbed him with the kitchen knife that he had hidden underneath his pillow. The knife was later found by police wedged between the suspect's chair and cushion.
