Winter Springs catches juvenile bomb suspect

Winter Springs police have taken a 14-year-old juvenile into custody after receiving information the youth had intentions of blowing up the city's police department.

Police officials say the threat apparently stems from the juvenile's previous arrest. During an investigation the police department discovered drawings of the police department that depicted explosive devices placed at different locations around the building on North Moss Road.

The juvenile has been charged with threatening to throw/displace or discharge a destructive device. The juvenile has been transported to the Juvenile Assessment Center in Sanford.

Starks ends Senate bid

State House Rep. Bob Starks, R-Casselberry, has decided not to run for the Florida Senate. Starks, a former Navy aviator, said Monday that he wanted to devote more time to his family and to be a pilot for Delta Airlines.

"I just don't have peace about being a state senator," Starks said. As late as last week, Starks had been making plans for a fund-raiser to boost his chances against Rep. Lee Constantine, R-Altamonte Springs in the senate race. The state term-limits law prevented Starks from seeking re-election to the House.

Residents against new zoning

When the Seminole County Board of Commissioners meets at 7 this evening it will consider a couple of zoning changes that will either allow or prevent a developer to put mini-warehouses near Bear Lake Road and change some Spring Valley land to industrial use.

Residents in both neighborhoods are fighting property owner-developer Bob Hattaway, who wants the Bear Lake Road property changed from low-density residential to commercial and the Spring Valley site from low-density residential to industrial.

City moves to condemn Ridgewood

SANFORD — The City of Sanford is moving forward with plans to condemn the embattled Ridgewood Villas apartment complex, located near Seminole High School.

Because of deteriorating conditions, the City Commission on Monday said the 60-unit complex should be placed on the fast-track for condemnation.

A state health and safety inspector issued a closure notice on the complex July 7 because of code violations.

"The wood siding is deteriorating

Sanford officials believe only seven people continue to live in complex

beyond belief," Sanford Mayor Larry Dale said. "Parts of ceilings have caved in. And, that swimming pool bothers me a lot. I don't think boarding it up is going to keep it safe."

The city is owed \$17,000 in unpaid water bills on the complex. Water remains on in just one of the five buildings of the complex because of unpaid bills.

City officials estimate that seven people are living in building two, where water remains on, and that no one is still living in the other buildings.

"No one is living without water that I know of," said Charles Rowe, director of community development.

Because there are condominiums as well as apartments in the complex, multiple owners would be involved in con-

demnation procedures. The state revoked the licenses for owners of the complex, including Jack Sirianni and James Shirkey on July 7 following the health and safety inspection.

The city has already performed an initial exploration into condemning the complex.

"Now, we will step up the ownership search and inspection process," Rowe said.

Animal control has been called to take care of dogs that were roaming the grounds of the complex. However, Rowe said that "a substantial number" of win-

Longwood begins update of city's development code

LONGWOOD — Longwood city commissioners spent nearly three hours Monday night poring over the language of a document amending articles in the city's Land Development Code.

The board discussed everything from what constitutes an inoperable motor vehicle to how large signs on commercial vehicles in the city should be. The workshop on amending Articles II, VIII, and IX of the Land Development Code was designed to remove discrepancies, inconsistencies, ambiguity, and conflicts between Land Development Code and City Code in Longwood.

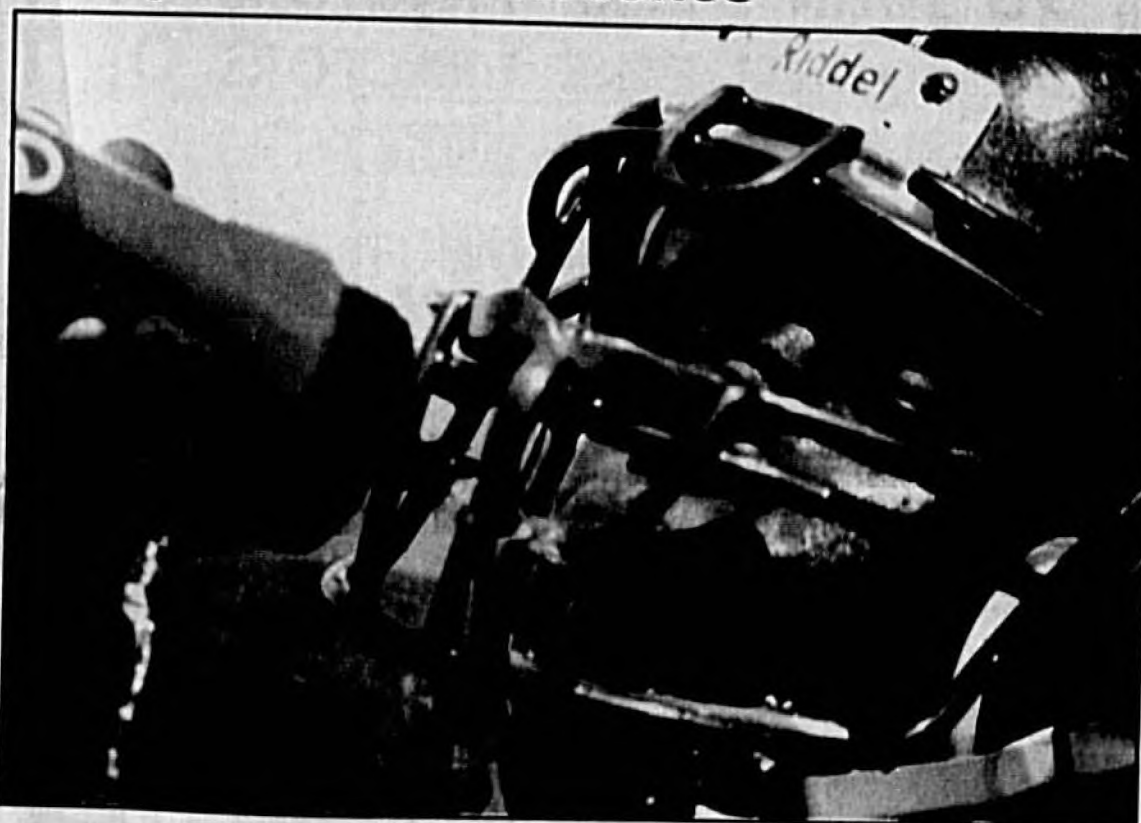
Commissioners plan to hire a code consultant this fall following adoption of the 1999-2000 fiscal budget to review, modify, and rewrite sections of the city code often in conflict with individual departmental rules and regulations.

One sticking point that was still left unresolved will be the enforcement and towing of the city's policy on abandoned vehicles. Mayor Paul Lovstrand as well as commissioners Annamaria Vacca and Dan Anderson all had problems with the latest language presented to the board dealing with amending the Land Development Code. The amendments were brought forward by city staff, an Ad Hoc Committee, and the city's Land Planning Agency.

Lovstrand suggested proposed amendments presented Monday evening on the issue of inoperable vehicles were too restrictive and made it too easy and too quick for the city to tow away vehicles.

"The way this is written suggests that if I run out of gas somewhere in the city of Longwood the police can tow my car away. The suggested language states if a vehicle is

Sanford denies request to rezone land for proposed development

SANFORD — Score one for rural homeowners.

The Sanford City Commission Monday faced a scene that is common throughout Seminole County, with rural homeowners angry about a proposed zoning change to pave the way for new development near their homes.

This time, the rural homeowners won, as the commission denied a request for 76.85 acres of property located at 4045 South Sanford Avenue to be rezoned

from agricultural to planned development. The rezoning would have paved the way for a 270-unit residential development.

"I think the rural integrity of our out-lying areas is very important to our community and what it represents," Commissioner Whitey Eckstein said.

The proposed Westlake Plantation-Rose Hill Phase II single family development would have allowed lots starting at 5,500 square feet, selling for \$100,000 and up.

More than 100 people, mostly residents opposed to the development, attended Monday's City Commission meeting.

Developer Michael Murray, CEO of Golden Florida Management, agreed to decrease the number density from the 334 units presented to the Planning and Zoning Commission this month, because 270 units met the city's proposed requirement of four units per acre.

However, Murray said a project of one unit per acre would not be profitable, and that the

and lively newspaper. People say they like our editorial stands and the well-placed barbs in the Meter - throughout the paper, in fact."

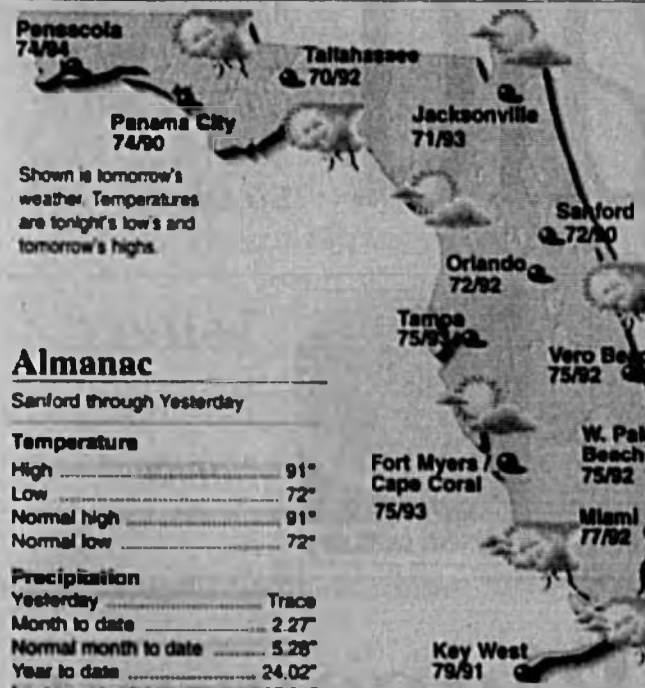

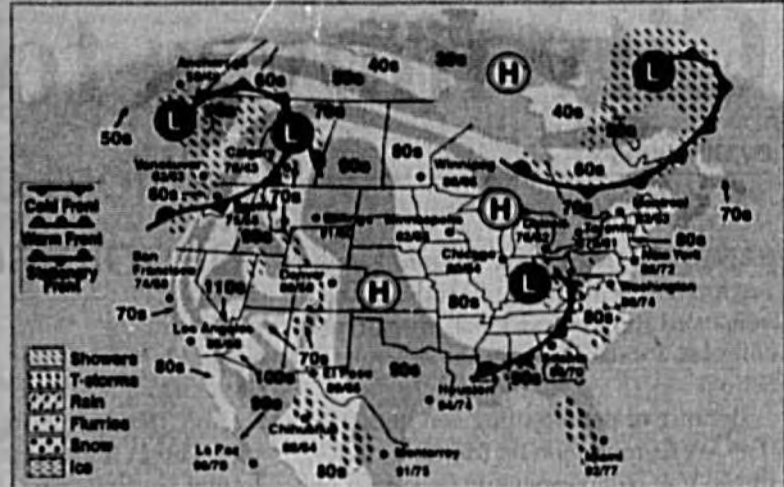

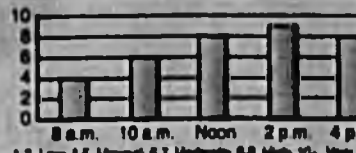

inoperable if it can not be immediately started and legally driven away on a public street." Commissioner Anderson stated he felt the language needed to be modified to allow reasonable time for a vehicle owner to affect repairs if the vehicle was not broken down in a right-of-way area.

"We need to change the language so people with minor car problems have an opportunity and a reasonable time period to get minor repairs done without having the city haul their vehicles off," Anderson said.

Commissioner Annamaria Vacca said the suggested amendments did not take into consideration homeowners on Longwood's East side who have neither car ports, garages, or drive ways. "We also have to think about Longwood's 'snowbirds' said Vacca. "Are we going to tow their vehicles out of their yards while they are up north on vacation?"

City attorney Richard Taylor posed a rhetorical question.

"What if I have a classic 1963 Corvette on my property that I don't want to necessarily drive all year round? Can the city come tow my car even though it may be the best looking car in the neighborhood?"

The board asked city staff to fine tune the criteria of an inoperable vehicle and development more reasonable language to address the problem of property owners littering front and back yards with broken down automobiles.

lowest density he would support is three to 3.5 units per acre. He said he will continue to pursue the project.

"I would like to work with the city," Murray said. "If I can't, then I will work with the county. I don't know what the City Commission is trying to do here."

The commission voted 4-1 to deny the request, with only Mayor Larry Dale supporting the rezoning.

Dale said he wanted to see a 25-foot landscape buffer installed, and the number of units reduced to 260 for a ratio of 36 units per acre.

"Somewhere down the road this property is going to be developed," Dale said. "It may be for a greater density in the future. I was looking for something in the middle."

Residents opposing the development said they lived on lots of 2.5 acres or more, and that only development of one unit per acre would be compatible with their community.

"I would be able to support a one unit per acre density, but nothing more dense than that," said Commissioner A.A. "Mac" McClanahan, who represents the district.

The residents also said they were concerned that the development could increase the risk of crime, cause traffic congestion particularly at the corner of Sanford Avenue and East Lake Mary Boulevard, and disturb their rural lifestyles.

"What we're looking for is to

keep our rural area," said Laverne Cox, who lives on seven acres of property on Rose Hill Trail.

The residents said they were concerned that a new development of increased density could reduce the value of their homes.

"We are here because we want the agricultural use of the land," said Julie Swift, who lives on five acres at the corner of Mellonville Avenue and Oak Way. "We have beautiful homes, beautiful properties that are well taken care of."

There would have been 84 acres of park and recreation area within the development. Refuse collection would have been handled by the city, and fire response times were estimated at less than five minutes.

"We are not against development," said homeowner Brian Flynn, who lives near the proposed site. "We are against the density."

Recollection of water and sewer also would have been available from the city. The city would have collected \$1.3 million in income from impact fees, Murray said.

"We think we would enhance the neighborhood and raise the property values," Murray said.

Murray said that engineering for development would reduce

the risk of flooding. However, residents opposed to the development said they were concerned that greater use of the land would increase the risk of flooding.

"My property in 1998 flooded so severely that it was deemed inaccessible," said Kathleen Carter, who lives on nine acres of property on South Sanford Avenue.

On Aug. 5, the city's Planning

and Zoning Commission unanimously denied the request to rezone the area, and recommended denial of the Westlake Plantation-Rose Hill Phase II Master Plan. The Zoning Commission said the proposed lots were too small in an area characterized by rural home sites.

The City Commission on Monday did approve annexing the site from Seminole County.



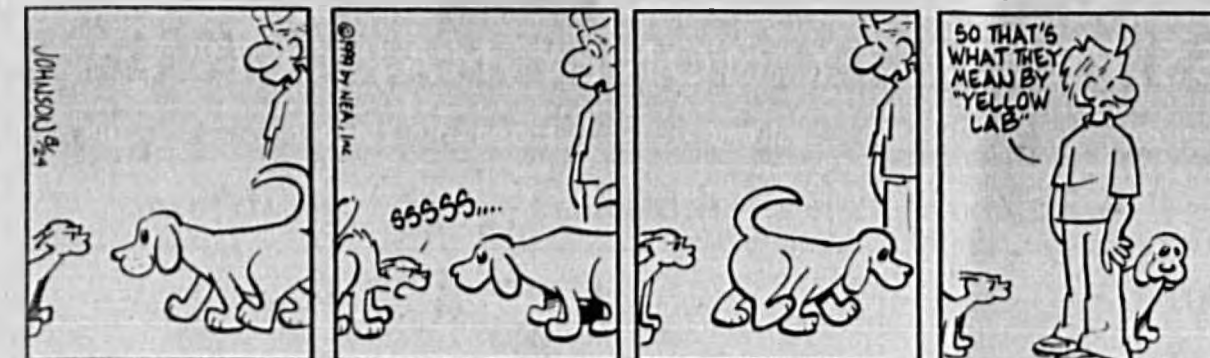

WIN AT BRIDGE

Only when it works?

By Phillip Alder

When an expert makes a strange-looking bid that works, it receives wide publicity. But if a disaster ensues, the expert tries hard to keep it quiet. Today's deal occurred some years ago in Paris. The declarer was Paul Chémia, a colorful character with a roguish sense of humor and a love of good food and wine.

Look at only the South hand. The responder on your right bids one spade, you opt to pass, the opener rebids two diamonds, and it is passed around to you. What would you do, if anything?

There is a natural reaction not to let the opponents play at the two-level. Yet rather than double, Chémia made an imaginative two-heart balancing overall. Shortly, West was delighted

to double three hearts, but was horrified when dummy tracked with the ace queen of trumps.

Chémia won the first trick with his spade ace over East's jack. From the bidding, West was known to have led a singleton. West surely had king-fourth of hearts for his double — not five, because he would have bid the suit. And West had to have six or seven diamonds.

Spotting the winning line, Chémia finessed dummy's heart queen, cashed the heart ace, and turned to clubs. West refused to ruff any of those winners, but at trick nine, Chémia calmly exited with a trump, endplaying West. Chémia had to win trick 13 with his diamond king, giving him nine tricks via one spade, two hearts, one diamond and five clubs.

I recommend that you not try to emulate Chémia!

ASK DR. GOTT

The five-year cancer benchmark

DEAR DR. GOTT: A friend of mine had breast cancer more than five years ago. Although the doctors caught it early, they did remove a breast and put her on anti-hormone therapy. Fortunately, she has had no recurrence. Does this mean she's home free?

DEAR READER: As a form of medical shorthand in assessing the treatment of cancer, doctors use the term "five-year cure." Some malignancies are cured in weeks and never recur. Other cancers may lie dormant or in remission for many years and then reappear. Therefore, in order to make comparisons possible, physicians refer to the five-year cure. Ordinarily, a person who is treated for cancer and shows no similar disease after five years is considered "cured."

I think it's important to realize that five years is not a magic number. Patients who are disease-free for more than five years still require periodic evaluation, because cancer is sometimes unpredictable and, unfortunately, can show up many years after having been apparently eradicated.

Moreover, due to presumed deficiencies in the body's cancer-detecting immune system, a person can

have a cancer cured, only to develop a malignancy — another "primary" tumor — in a secondary site. For instance, women with malignancies in one breast have a statistically much higher chance of developing new cancers in the other breast.

Despite this unpleasant fact, I believe that most patients feel justifiable relief at "making it" past five years. And they should. There is a very good chance that their disease will not return.

DEAR DR. GOTT: My 9-year-old son has been diagnosed with an allergy to eggs and milk. How can I replace the calcium he will miss by avoiding these foods?

DEAR READER: Children who are allergic to eggs usually have to avoid eggs in any form; this is ordinarily not too difficult. People who are sensitive to milk, on the other hand, are usually

reacting to milk sugar (lactose) which is present in many products. However, they can eat dairy products that have been pre-treated with a digestive enzyme, or they may be helped by using Lactaid, an over-the-counter remedy for the same purpose.

If your son cannot tolerate this option, he can obtain the calcium necessary for growth and development by using calcium supplements. There are a number of brands, including chewable tablets.

Muscadine grapes for your home garden

The muscadine grape is native to Florida and has been cultivated in the state for many years. It is harvested as single berries instead of in bunches and has smaller leaves and fruit with thicker skins than the bunch-type grapes. One reason for its popularity is that the muscadine grape is rarely affected by diseases or insect pests.

Varieties: There are five bronze-fruited varieties recommended for home gardens, Dixie, Doreen, Florida Fry, Granny Val, and Triumph. Black-fruited varieties are Albemarle, Cowart, Nesbitt, and Southland. The variety Southern Homes is an hybrid between a bunch grape and a muscadine that is highly recommended for home use.

Propagation: Layering is a common method of propagating muscadines. In June, peg a long cane into a trench dug in the ground leaving the cane attached to the vine. Make a slight cut at the bottom of the cane to promote root production, and cover the wounded part with soil. Leave the shoot tips exposed. The layers are uncovered and rooted shoots are separated from the mother cane in the winter.

Planting: Grapes are adapted to a wide range of soils, including most of those suitable for citrus culture. Fine sands and upland soils, especially those with underlying clay at about 3 feet, are ideal for grapes along with well-drained clay soils. Usual planting time is in the later part of the dormant season—February in Central Florida.



Gardening

Trellising: The 2- and 3- wire systems are the most common vertical trellises used for growing grapes. The wires are run at heights of 2.5 and 5 feet for the 2-wire type and 2, 4, or 6 feet for the 3-wire system. Pruning the vines on the 2-wire system is less time-consuming than on the 3-wire system which should be used only on small plantings.

Training: The first year set a 55 foot stake next to each plant space and tie the stake permanently to the top wire of the trellis. As shoots appear from the set plant, select the healthiest shoot and secure it to the stake with string. Remove all other shoots. The selected shoot eventually becomes the trunk of the vine. It is important to keep the vine growing straight up by the stake by (a) tying often and (b) removing all lateral and base sprouts often. Be sure to leave at least one lateral shoot to grow each way on the bottom trellis wire. The shoot should be cut off when it reaches the top wire so that laterals will grow each way along the top wire.

Pruning: Prune all branches that are less than 3/16 inch in diameter, leaving 2 to 3 buds per spur, depending on the vigor of

the branch. Remove most of the spurs located at the top of the trunk to prevent crowding and bushiness, which will interfere with harvest. Renew arms that are no longer vigorous. The approximate periods for dormant pruning in central Florida are January and February.

Fertilization: The first year apply 1/4 pound of 6-6-6 or 8-8-8, with 20 to 30 percent of the nitrogen from natural to organic sources, in lateral bands 1 foot away from the plant soon after growth begins. Repeat this application in May, June, July, and early September. The second year apply 2/3 pounds of the same mixture in late March, May, and just after harvest. Rates can be increased in future years, but should not exceed 4 to 6 pounds per vine per year. Split applications are more effective than a single application.

Irrigation: Many first year grape plants in Florida vineyards have died from lack of soil moisture. Apply 1 to 1 1/2 inches of water every 2 weeks during April and May. Older plants will also respond to irrigation.

Harvest: Muscadines mature in August and early September. They should be picked from the vines and stored at 40 degrees F if not processed into jellies, jams, or wine.

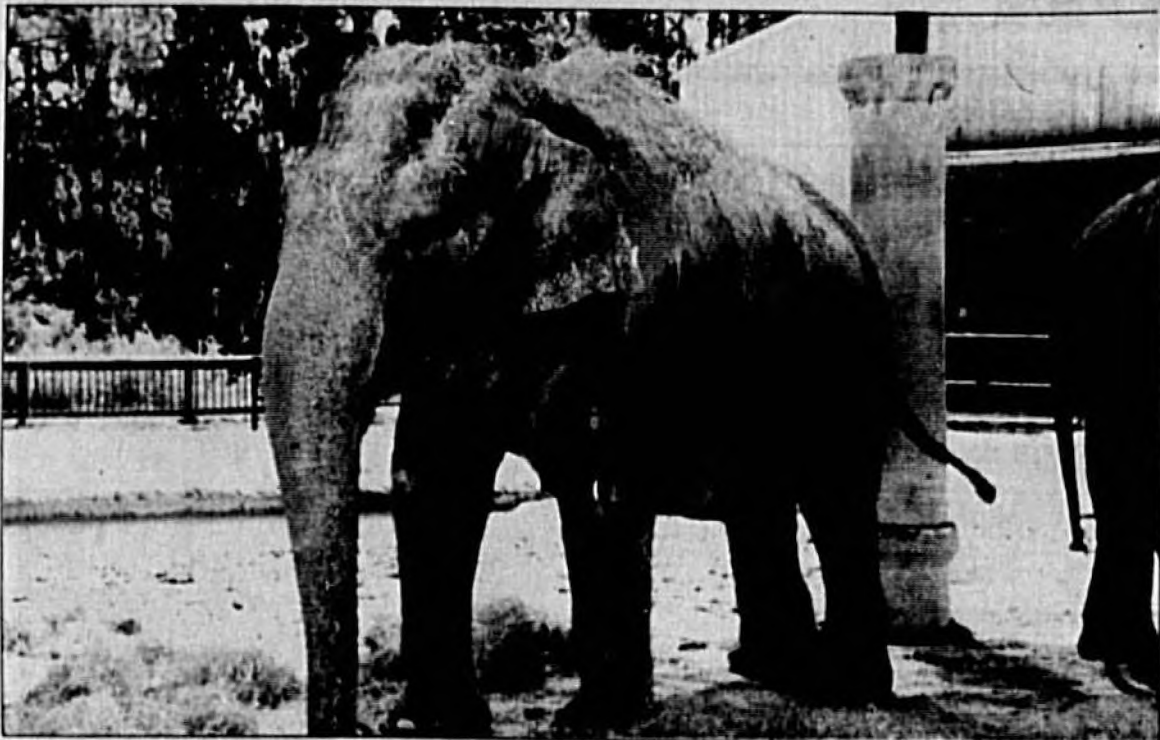

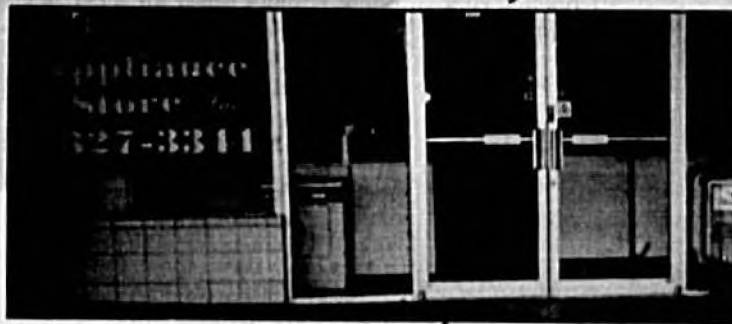

Largemouth bass update

SANFORD - There was a time when Florida's largemouth bass were world renowned. In the glory days from the 1950's into the 1970's, anglers came from all over the nation and the world to fish for lunker bass at Lake Jackson in Tallahassee, at Lake Apopka in central Florida, and Lake Okeechobee in south Florida. Eight- and 10-pound fish were considered to be trophy fish. It was not uncommon for more than 30 bass of 10 pounds or more to be caught each season on Lake Jackson.

Catching a 10 pound bass has become difficult since the 1980's, and nowadays a 10 pounder is a rarity. Fishing pressure, water pollution, destruction of habitat, and the over-use of herbicides and pesticides have taken a toll.

Stiffer regulations on bag limits have helped to restore bass stocks, and some lakes are designated as catch-and-release only.

The 6,000 acre Farm 13 in Indian River County is a vast shallow water impoundment with some of the best bass fishing in Florida. Catch-and-release regulations on Farm 13 haven't stopped crowds of anglers seeking to catch a lunker bass and have their picture taken with the trophy before a live release.

Modern taxidermy has also allowed the release of large bass, because fiberglass reproductions are as good as the real thing.

SHUPE'S SCOOP

Big bass are still present, but it takes persistence to catch them. Fish waters that are known big bass areas and use shiners or large lures. Heavyweight bass prefer to be near cover, a reliable food supply, and easy access to deeper water.

FISHING FORECAST

Bass, and especially big bass, are still lethargic due to the intense heat. Bass action will gradually improve with cooler weather. Bream and catfish are the only freshwater species that remain active in the summer months. Fish deep river bends for good action with bass and catfish.

Sebastian Inlet has good catch-and-release action with snook to over 20 pounds. Large live shrimp and small baitfish are top baits. Also expect a few trout, redbass and flounder.

Captain Jack at Port Canaveral reports inconsistent offshore action. Wahoo and dolphin continue to be scarce. King mackerel are in close and will hit live baits. Sheepshead and flounder are biting in the Port, and redbass and trout are rated as fair on the flats of the Banana and Indian rivers.

Ponce Inlet has fast action with sheepshead, drum, redbass, and jack crevalle. Live or dead shrimp is the top bait. Trout and redbass are rated as good in Mosquito Lagoon.

Finishing with a flourish

Solar Bears tab Peter Horachek head coach

ORLANDO - The Orlando Solar Bears (International Hockey League) have named Peter Horachek their new head coach, announced General Manager John Weisbrod Monday. Per team policy, terms of the deal were not disclosed.

Horachek takes over for Curt Fraser, who was named head coach of the National Hockey League's Atlanta Thrashers on July 14.

In addition, the Solar Bears have named Jim Hughes to be Horachek's first assistant, and added former Orlando center Hubie McDonough to the hockey operations staff as the second assistant coach.

"As an organization, we are tremendously excited," said Weisbrod. "Peter (Horachek) has distinguished himself from a strong list of candidates. I am certain that he is the man to lead our team into this new era."

Horachek, 39, was originally hired on August 29, 1995 as assistant coach and has been an integral part of Orlando's success.

He has helped the Solar Bears reach the Turner Cup Finals in both 1996 and 1999. In their four-year existence, Orlando has compiled a 192-111-25 record (.623), the second-best mark in the IHL over that span.

"I'm extremely excited about this new opportunity and the challenges that lie ahead for both myself and my staff," said Horachek. "I look forward to continuing the success and winning tradition that we have already established, and we will remain focused on our ultimate goal - to bring a championship to Orlando."

Prior to his arrival in Orlando, Horachek spent two seasons as head coach and general manager of the Flint Generals of the Colonial Hockey League, leading them to the league semifinals in his first season.

He held the same capacity with the St. Thomas Wildcats, also of the CHL, for two seasons. Horachek took the club all the way to the league finals in both years with St. Thomas, and was named CHL Coach-of-the-Year in 1991-92.

During his eight-year playing career, Horachek was originally signed by the Buffalo Sabres in 1979.

He spent three seasons in Rochester under then-head coach Mike Keenan. As team captain, Horachek had his name inscribed on the Turner Cup, winning the championship with Flint in 1983-84. While with the Generals, Horachek re-

ceived the Wes B. Mumford Memorial Award for outstanding character on and off the ice.

Hughes, 32, was an assistant coach for RPI of the ECAC during the 1994-95 campaign, and served in the same capacity with Providence College in 1992-94.

He also spent his collegiate career at Providence from 1985-89, where the defenseman was named First Team All-Hockey East and All-New England in 1988-89. Hughes finished his career as the Friars' fifth-highest scoring defenseman of all-time with 23 goals and 62 assists for 92 points in 132 career games.

He played for Albany of the IHL (1990) and Springfield of the AHL (1991), before playing professionally for two seasons in Europe, first for a First Division Team in Sweden, then for a Second Division Team in Austria. He also has spent the last three years as the Vice President of Marketing & Sales for V-Formation, an in-line hockey company.

McDonough, 30, was one of the original players remaining from Orlando's inaugural season in 1995-96, before retiring back on July 27.

He appeared in 280 games with the Solar Bears, the fourth-highest total in franchise history. McDonough is tied for first in franchise history with 108 goals. He is also tied for first in shorthanded goals (five), was second in scoring (231 points) and power-play goals (40), and third in assists (123).

McDonough played in 955 games during his professional career, including 195 NHL contests with Los Angeles, the New York Islanders and San Jose. He also appeared in 570 IHL games, tallying 246 goals and 336 assists over that span.

Orlando will hold a joint training camp with the NHL's Atlanta Thrashers at the RDV Sportsplex, with their first on-ice workout on September 5th.

The Solar Bears open the 1999-2000 season on October 1 at Houston. Their first regular season game at the Orlando Arena will be on Friday, October 9 vs. Manitoba at 7:30 p.m.

like on the next level."

The 33-year-old Akers has a trophy case containing gold medals from the 1999 and 1991 World Cups, the 1998 Goodwill Games and the 1996 Olympic Games.

The 1990 and 1991 U.S. Soccer Female Athlete of the Year also claimed the World Cup Golden Boot and Silver Ball awards in 1991.

Prior to her 14-year membership with the U.S. National Team, Akers took the UCF women to the NCAA final four in 1987 where she was named offensive MVP and to the NCAA quarterfinals in 1988. Akers, the all-time leading scorer for UCF, was inducted into the university's Hall of Fame in 1998 and received the inaugural Hermann Trophy in 1988.
