Finch Trial Postponed Again

LOS ANGELES (UPI) — The handsome doctor, his once-tanned face now pale from 10 months in confinement, comfortingly patted the arm of his tearful mistress as he was led back to jail.

The doctor was socialite-physician R. Bernard Finch, 43. He was returned to his jail cell Thursday to wait nearly one month more before he and his mistress return for retrial June 30 on murder charges.

Finch and Carole Tregoff, 23, are accused of the July 18 gunshot slaying of his estranged wife Barbara Jean, 33. Finch has been in jail since the day after the slaying.

He and Carole were ordered to return next month after the state Supreme Court rules June 12 on Carole's challenge to disqualify Superior Court Judge Le Roy Dawson from presiding at their retrial.

Carole remained calm during the brief court action while Dawson again refused to step down as prejudiced and continued the retrial. But as Finch was returned to jail she broke into tears and received her former lover's pat on the shoulder. She has been freed on \$25,000 bail.

The district attorney's office refused to retry Finch separately in order to avoid a long delay while Mrs. Tregoff's attorneys challenge Dawson. The retrial of the couple originally was to have started last Monday.

The first trial of the couple lasted three months and ended March 12 when the jurors favored convicting Finch and freeing Carole but were unable to reach a unanimous verdict.
