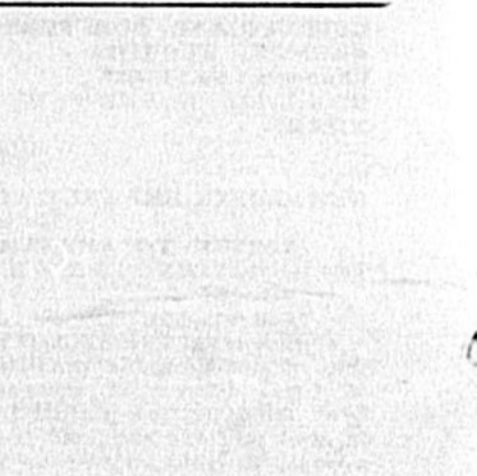

'It's Mad Dash For Bus Seat,' Student Opines

(The school bus situation in Seminole County—Part 6)

"Conditions on the school buses aren't nearly as bad as some of the parents think and not nearly as good as the drivers would have you believe," a student at South Seminole Junior High told The Herald Tuesday.

"When school lets out," the young man said, "we all make a mad dash for the bus so we can be first in line and get a seat, but lately the bus has been leaving a lot of the guys behind."

"When you have to call your mom and tell her you missed the bus, man, that's really tough because she sure tips her lid," he said.

"Riding the bus isn't really too bad if you get a seat," the youthful ninth grader remarked. "If you have to stand, though, that's miserable. The kids cough on you, sneeze on you and knock your books out of your arms."

"Did you ever try to pick books up in the crowded state of a bus while it was going around a corner?" he asked.

The student complained, "You know you just can't win. On the bus and at school, the drivers and teachers say we're too old to act like kids. At home, Mom says I'm too young to have my own motor cycle."

"I'm not driving myself to school. Yet Mom won't drive me to school herself, she says it's too much trouble. Still, she says she worries about me riding the bus."

Buses observed at South Seminole Junior High were packed with standing room only being the case in most instances and with five of the 30 not even having any spare standing room left when they departed the school.

Movie House Report Is Imminent

Carl Floyd, movie chain operator of Haines City, told The Herald today he would have an announcement about the new movie house for the Sanford area "in about 48 hours."

"I am walking now on a call about this matter," Floyd said in a telephone conversation this morning.

The Ritz Theater, which had been in operation here for 41 years, was closed 10 days ago. Speculation has it that the proposed "modern, luxurious, cinema-type" new movie house would probably be located at Sanford Plaza.

No confirmation of this has been received from any of the investors involved, however.

Estimated opening date of the new theater has been projected for "about six weeks."

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JC Building Appropriation Nixed By Court

TALLAHASSEE (AP) — The Florida Supreme Court today ruled unconstitutionally a 1965 legislative act appropriating \$50,000 for construction of permanent headquarters of Junior Chamber International at Miami Beach.

The high court reversed Circuit Court Judge Ben C. Willis of Leon County, who had upheld the act passed by the 1965 Legislature.

The Supreme Court, in a close vote, disagreed with Judge Willis that the headquarters would have a public purpose as its primary aim.

The suit brought by a group of private citizens named Gro. Hayden Burns as a defendant.

The act appropriated the \$50,000 from general revenue sources of the state to the Board of Commissioners of State Institutions to be paid to Junior Chamber International for creation of the headquarters.

The plaintiffs charged that the act constituted a pledge or a loan of the credit of the state of Florida in violation of the state constitution. They also contended that the act constitutes an unconstitutional delegation of legislative authority.

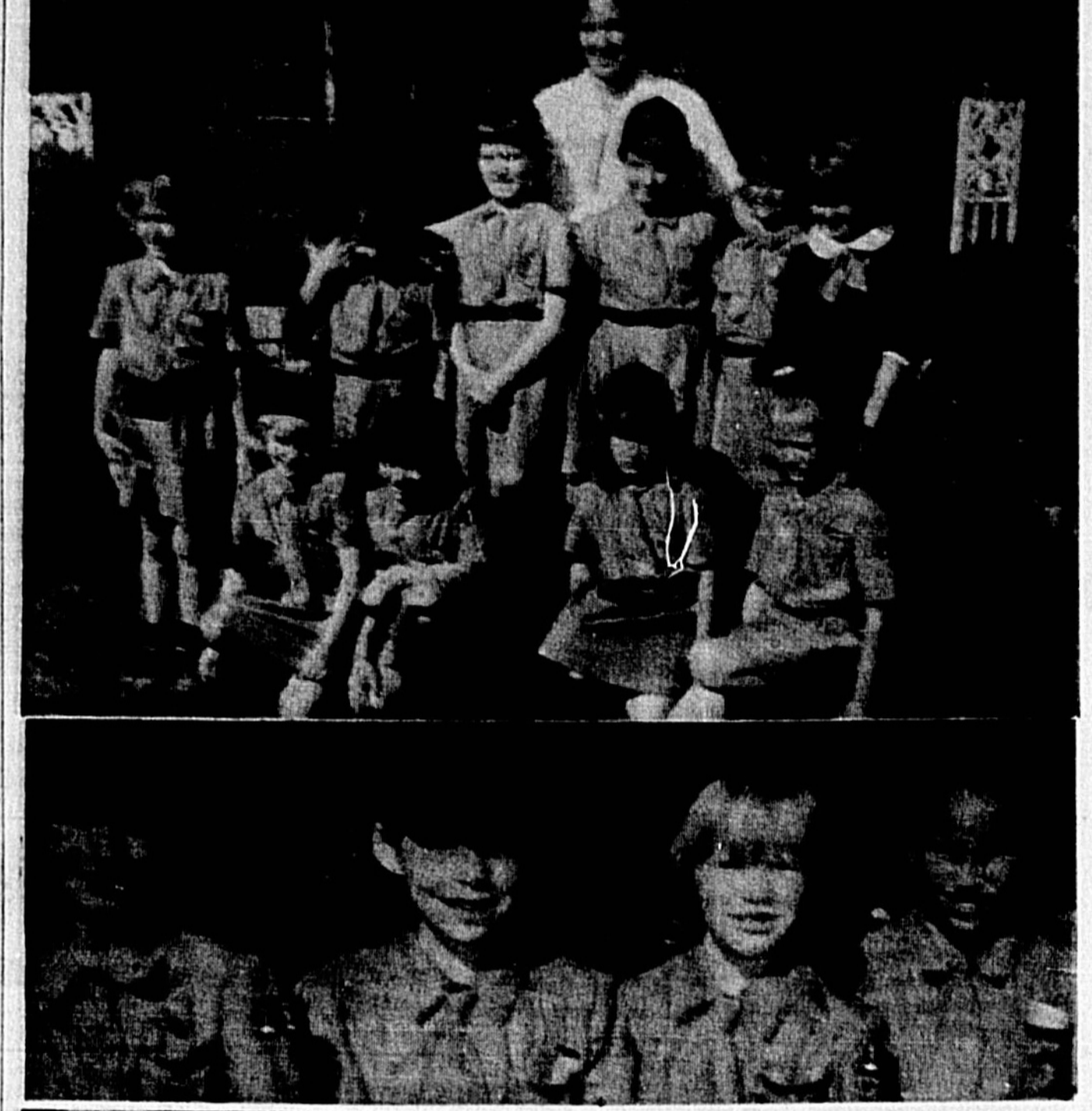

really is a Canada. It is big, beautiful, populated, friendly and prosperous, just like the one we know. Furthermore, the Canadians are the bravest people I have ever met.

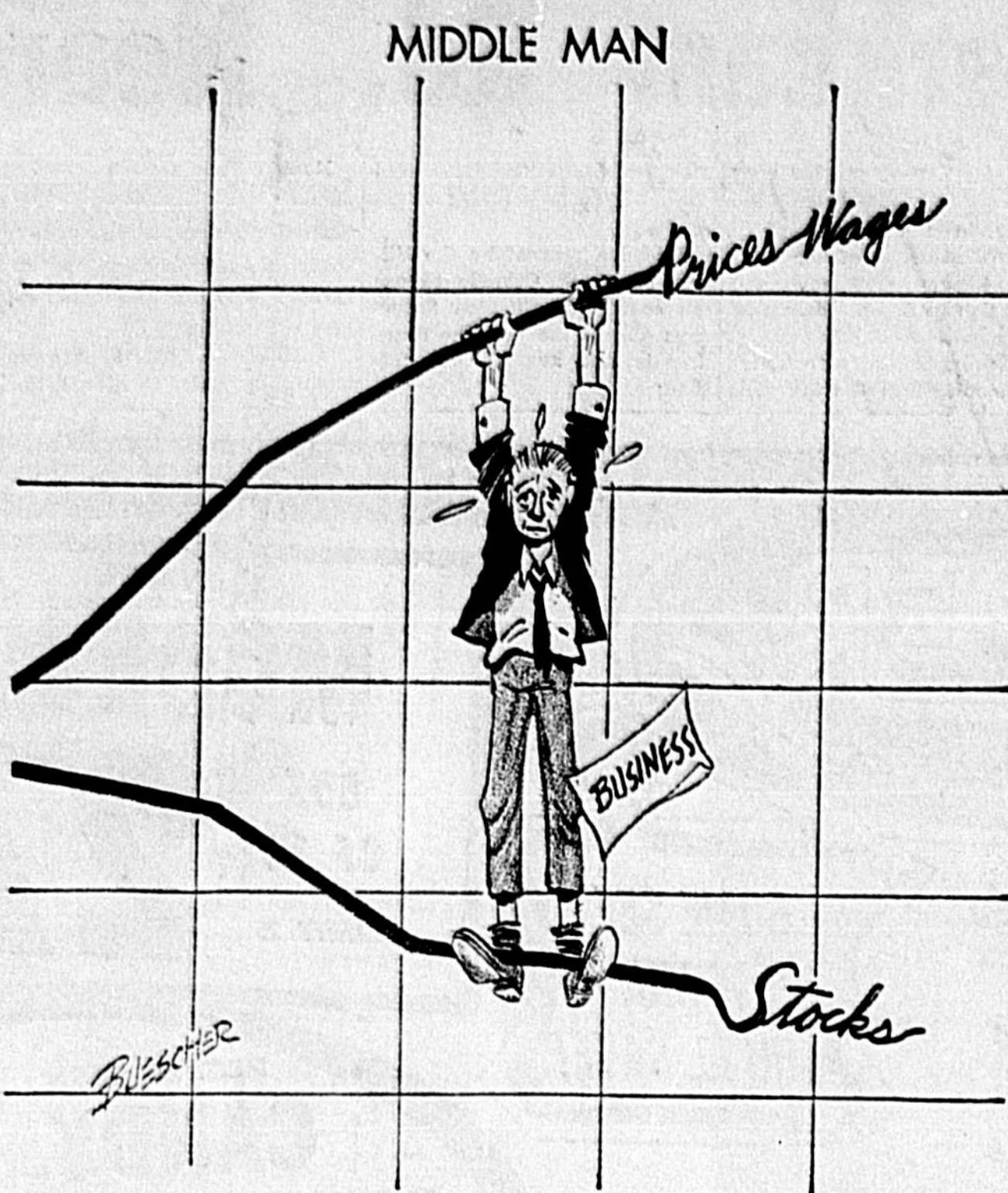
They are getting ready to open a world's fair here next year. Considering what happened in New York in 1964-65, that takes courage indeed.

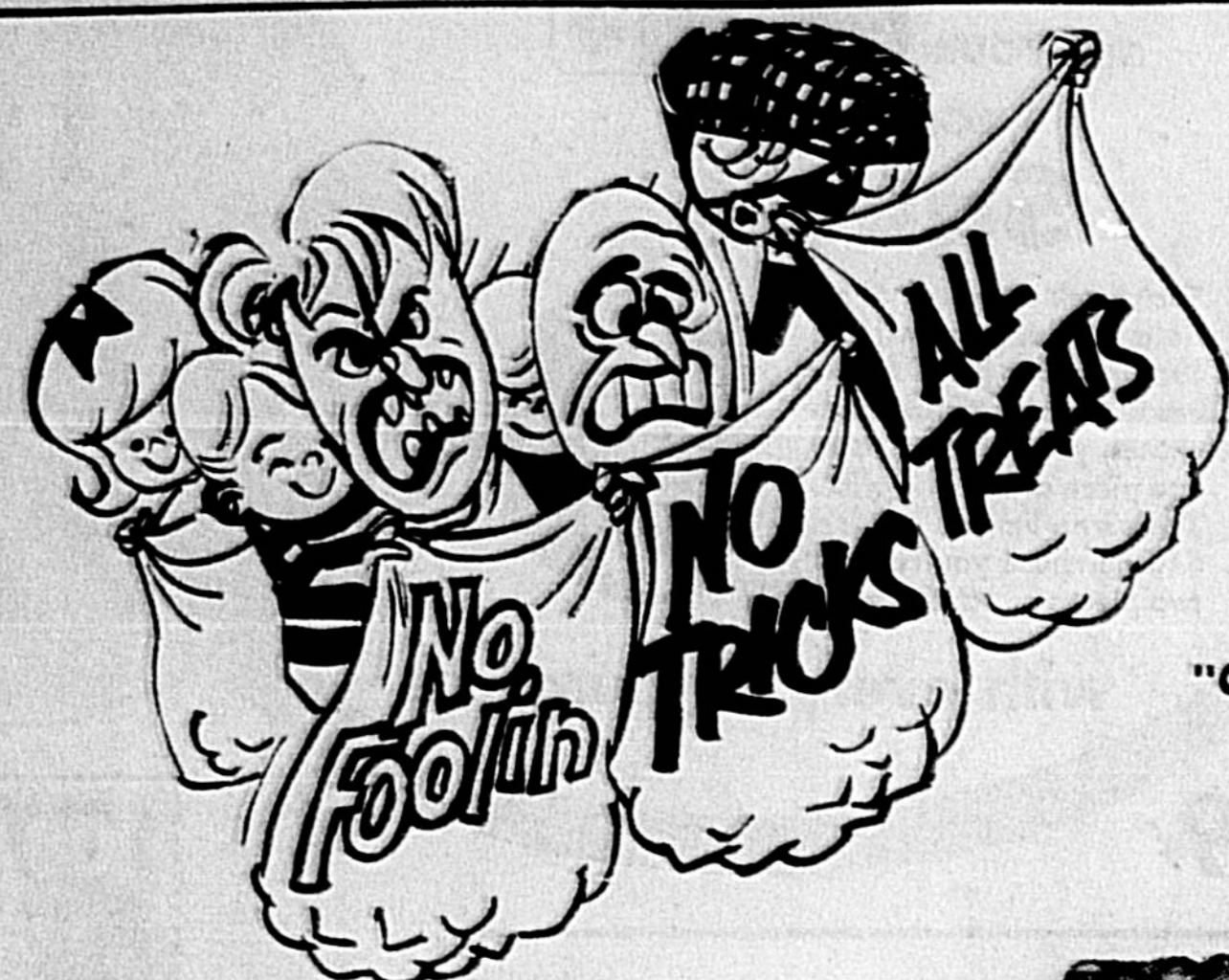

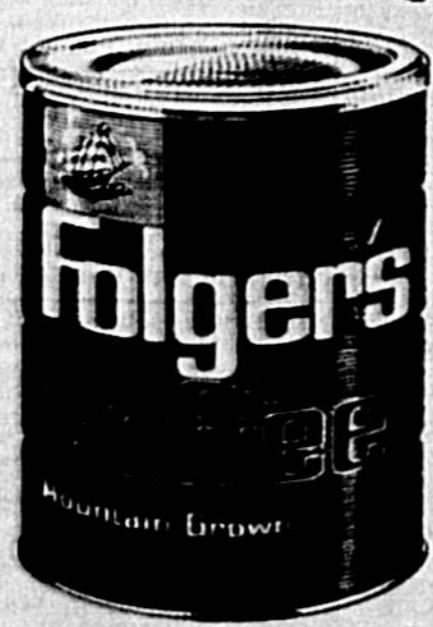

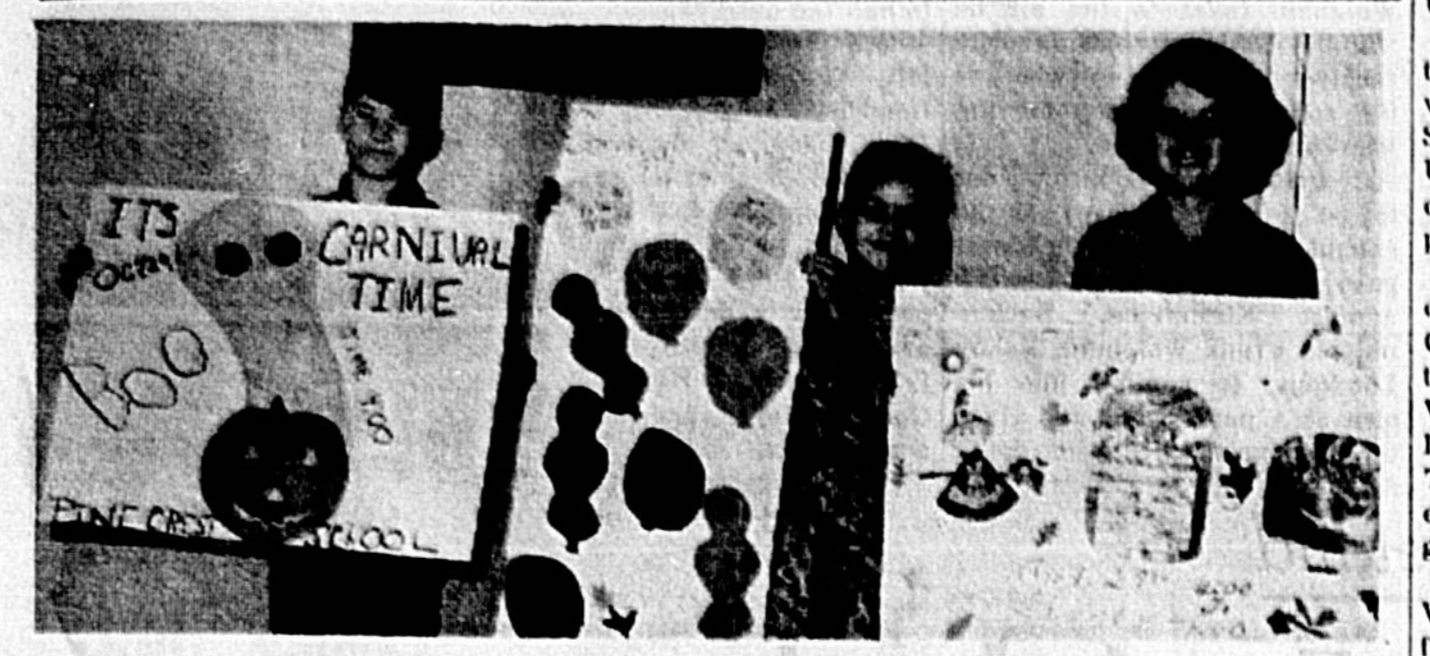

SAIGON, South Viet Nam (AP) — U.S. air cavalrymen and supporting planes routed a company of Viet Cong in a two-hour battle on the coast 110 miles northeast of Saigon Tuesday and reported 48 enemy killed and two captured. Casualties among the cavalry were wounded, a U.S. spokesman said.

A second helicopter — a troop transport — was knocked down by ground fire in another engagement 35 miles northwest of Saigon. The spokesman said there were no casualties among the crew or troops aboard.

The helicopter losses brought to 218 the total downed in the war thus far. 215 of them in South Viet Nam. Losses of other U.S. planes reached 540 Tuesday with disclosure of two not previously announced.

In the coastal fight northeast of Saigon, a company of the 1st Cavalry, Airborne, Division fought with an estimated 150 Viet Cong 16 miles northeast of Phan Thiet, capital of Binh Thuan Province. It was the first engagement reported in the region in recent months.

A U.S. spokesman said the Viet Cong fled after a two-hour fight. Air strikes were called in to hit the escape routes.

Air strikes against North Viet Nam again were sharply curtailed by bad weather Tuesday, but U.S. Air Force pilots reported damaging a pier and destroying three barges near Dong Hol.

Navy pilots from the carrier Constellation said they destroyed three barges and set off numerous secondary explosions in a raid eight miles east of Thanh Hoa.

U.S. headquarters also announced the start of a new operation, called Thayer Two, by several brigades of the 1st Cavalry. In the first day of the operation, about 28 miles northwest of Qui Nhon on the central coast, the cavalrymen reported killing seven Viet Cong while taking light casualties.

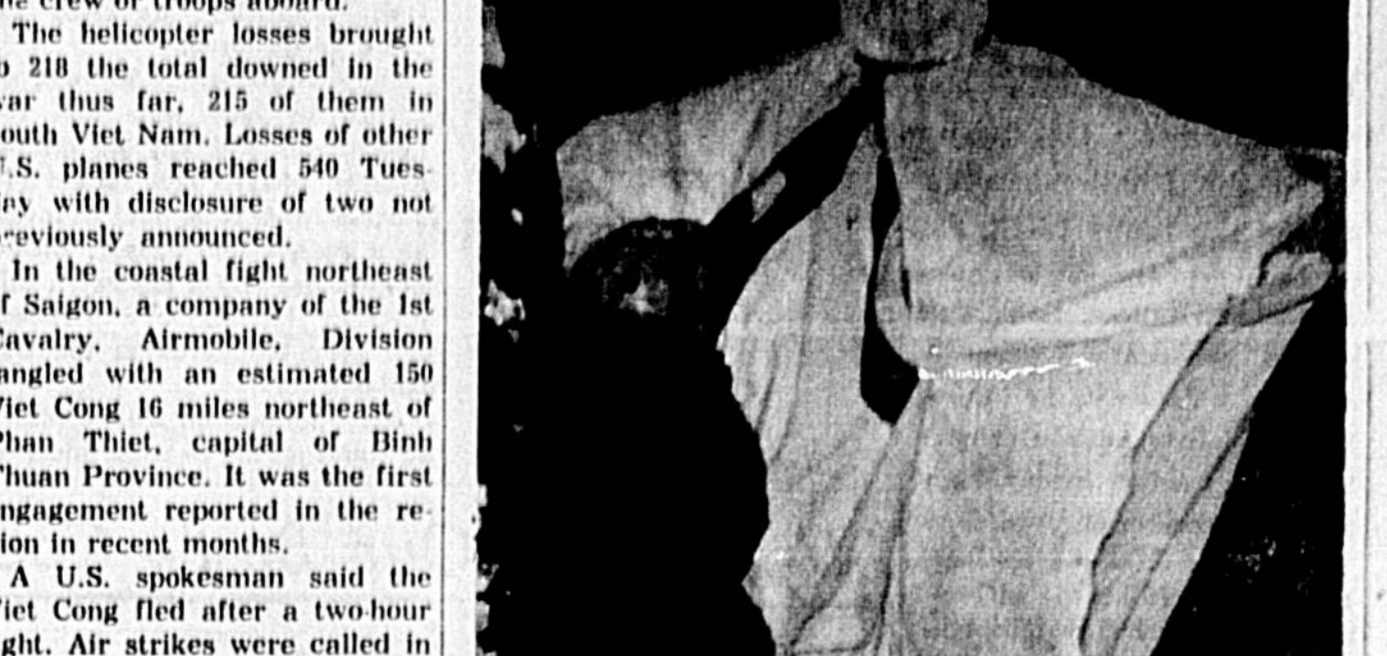

NEW YORK (AP) — It is the midway point in the college football season and perhaps this fall's season's 20-20 vision is blurred by the twinkling banners of the halftime ceremonies, but not a single upset is in the offing.

Here is a half of the schedule: Notre Dame over Navy; The Irish can go by land or air while Navy can only go by sea — and they are playing this one on the turf of John F. Kennedy Stadium in Philadelphia.

Michigan State over North-western The only possible threat to the Spartans on the coast is even if its schedule is Notre Dame over Duke; UCLA over Air Force Gary Bezen and Mel Farr will be in much for the Michigan State-Alabama over Mississippi State; Mississippi State's new flip-flop offense has done more flopping than flipping this season. Wayne Trimble has found the range as the Tide's quarterback.

Georgia Tech over Duke; The Blue Devils aren't as bad as they were last year and the margin won't be much greater this time around.

Wyoming over Colorado State; Charles Brown will frighten the Cornhusker fans but not the Nebraska football team. Nebraska won 16-14 a year ago and the margin won't be much greater this time around.

Lifts Mustang Suspension NCAA Slaps Two Schools

NEW YORK (AP) — Southern Methodist University has an extra incentive in its battle with Texas A&M for the Southwest Conference football championship now that the National Collegiate Athletic Association has lifted its two-year probation of the Mustangs.

SMU now is eligible for the host role in the Cotton Bowl — a spot that traditionally goes to the SWC champion. And even if the Mustangs — now trailing the Cotton Bowl bid away, the Aggies are still serving a probation that will bar them from postseason play unless it is lifted.

In other actions Tuesday, the NCAA slapped Bradley and Purdue with one-year probation for violations of its athletic codes. But neither action was accompanied by sanctions and thus both schools will still be eligible for bowl games.

This is particularly important to Purdue, tied for second in the Big Ten race. The Big Ten champ gets a bid to the Rose Bowl and first place Michigan State, which played in Pasadena last year, is ineligible for a return trip even if it wins the conference title.

SMU drew its two-year probation from the Southwest Conference in May, 1964 for football recruiting violations. The NCAA Council, which supported the SWC's action, now has reviewed the case and terminated the probation effective immediately.

The NCAA action against Bradley and Purdue was announced Tuesday.

White House Shadow Boxing With Guideline

WASHINGTON (AP) — White House economists appear to be shadow boxing with the illusion that President Johnson's budget would slash 3.2 per cent wage guideline is still alive.

And organized labor, which trumped the guideline with several recent major wage hikes of 5 per cent or more, is angry that the old figure is still even a conversation piece in high government circles.

The old guideline, designed as a weapon against inflation, was based on estimates that the amount of production per man hour in U.S. industry rises an average of 3.2 per cent a year.

The Labor Department's percentage stem from figures collected by government statisticians. The productivity increases presumably stem from better techniques and machines. If, for example, these factors netted a 3.2 per cent increase, a button factory worker who was turning out 100 buttons an hour last year

would now be averaging 103.2 per hour.

Under the guideline theory formulated by the President's Council of Economic Advisors, wages could go up 3.2 per cent yearly without price hikes.

Labor never liked the idea, but became infuriated last year when the government's own figures showed productivity increasing at 3.6 per cent a year while the council clung to the 3.2 per cent figure.

"We slapped them hard," recalls a high AFL-CIO official of

the big labor federation's criticism at the time. Labor then set out to crack the guideline at every opportunity, and succeeded in big contracts affecting airline machinists, telephone equipment installers and electrical workers.

Now comes Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz, saying productivity is up even higher — to 3.8 per cent.

Where did he get the higher figure?

From Gardner Ackley, chairman of the President's Council

of Economic Advisors and chief proponent of the now defeated effort to hold a 3.2 per cent lid on wage hikes.

"Back where? To 3.6 per cent or to 3.2 per cent?"

"There was a shadow figure of 3.6 per cent," the council spokesman said, "but it was not a figure we acknowledged."

The council, he added, still holds to the position that the "estimated trend" in man-hour productivity is still an increase of 3.2 per cent a year. And thus into account later revised man-hour estimates from the Labor

Department that "returned all the figures back where they were."

Perhaps? To 3.6 per cent or to 3.2 per cent?

A spokesman for the council said Ackley did use the 3.6 per cent figure in recent congressional testimony, based on revised, higher estimates of the gross national product.

But, the spokesman said, the 3.8 per cent figure didn't take into account later revised man-hour estimates from the Labor Department that "returned all

U. S. Deeply Committed Self At Manila Summit Confab

MANILA (AP) — The Manila summit conference produced something for everybody and probably wholly satisfied nobody.

One of the results is likely to have strong and lasting impact on this area of the globe. The United States deeply committed itself, as a Pacific Ocean power, to the future of the whole Asian area with all its dread problems

of poverty, disease, illiteracy and hunger.

That appeared to be one of the things America's allies not only wanted to hear, but wanted to have set down unequivocally and irrevocably on paper.

Perhaps the Viet Nam peace drive has progressed a little bit farther toward communication with the Communists in Hanoi. The summit conferees offered to withdraw "foreign allied troops from South Viet Nam

within six months of the time that North Viet Nam meets their conditions. There was an element of challenge in this, since it emphasized the U.S. rejection of a contention that it never intends to get out of South Viet Nam.

This proposal, however, fell far short of a proffered solution, a real peace formula, or a rock-bottom final offer to the Communist side. It was vague with respect to the Viet Cong and

what elements of the insurgency should also withdraw to the north.

It made no mention of a Viet Cong role at a peace conference.

The impact of the conference's "Goals of Progress," the "Declaration on Peace and Progress in Asia and the Pacific," and the final joint communiqué will suffer from a widespread attitude of skepticism and even cynicism with which the summit conference was regarded.

Many — not only in Asia — suspect that there is more than coincidence in the fact that four of the allies at the meeting have elections in the near future: the United States, Australia and New Zealand in November, and South Korea next April.

The impression in Manila, however, is that President Johnson is reasonably happy with what was achieved. Possibly
