# Cop picnic irks pols

SANFORD — A decision by Seminole County's leading law enforcement officials to prohibit candidates from a harmony-building barbecue next month has led to grumbling among some politicians looking forward to attending the event.

"I'm somewhat bothered by it," said sheriff's candidate Charles Fagan, a retired Sanford police captain. "I was not going to attend as a candidate. I was going to attend as a retired police officer and part-time Sanford police officer."

"I am saddened that as sworn law enforcement officer serving the citizens of Seminole County I am not able to celebrate the day with other law enforcement officers with my family," said sheriff's candidate Harvey Morae, a reserve Florida Highway Patrol trooper.

Morae said he had previously scheduled a campaign barbecue of his own for June 27 and may not have been able to attend the countywide event.

The June 27 event at the L & L Acres Ranch near Heathrow is expected to draw up to 1,000 law enforcement officers, corrections officers and support staff with their

families from each agency in the county. Invited are employees of the seven police departments, the sheriff's office and Florida Highway Patrol troopers working in Seminole County.

The costs of the barbecue which will feature live entertainment are being financed with \$10 per family ticket sales and the proceeds from t-shirts.

The idea for the get-together was originated by two FHP troopers, Sgt. Michael Tindel and Cpl. John L. Smith, said their commander, Capt. Bill Sanders. Tindel could not be reached.

Sanders said the two troopers

wanted to build harmony among law enforcement officers in the county and he urged them to contact the police chiefs to organize the event.

"Sometimes troopers get upset when they don't get called in to assist on a bank robbery or something," said Sanders. "But we don't have radio communication with the sheriff's department. And I know some of our people may want the deputies to help them out. But I agree the sheriff has his jurisdiction in criminal areas and we have ours in traffic."

## State recognizes volunteers

SANFORD — Three Sanford residents have been honored by the state Department of Education for their volunteer work in local schools.

Yesterday Betty Castor, the commissioner of education, announced that Maurice Terrell, Ray King and Annie O'Neill were the Region III winners in the state's Outstanding School Volunteer awards.

Region III includes Seminole, Orange, Volusia and Osceola counties.

Terrell, a senior at Seminole High School, was the winner in the Youth category. A Peer Counselor at Seminole, Terrell volunteers one hour a day at Pinecrest Elementary School, 405 W. 27th St., Sanford, where he works with kindergarten students and third graders. His main goal, he said, is to help the youngsters build their self esteem.

"I think if I can help these kids build up their self esteem they can concentrate more on their education," Terrell said.

King, who is confined to a wheelchair, volunteers his time at the Crooms School of Choice, 2300 W. 13th St., Sanford. He was named the winner in the Adult category.

King works in a variety of capacities at the school, working where he is needed on a daily basis. In addition, he leads the activities of the industrial arts club and the computer club.

O'Neill, a retired teacher, spends much of her day still teaching at Goldsboro Elementary School, 1300 W. 20th St., Sanford. She was named the winner in the Senior category.

## First Federal to cease operations today

SANFORD — First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Seminole County was to have closed down operations in all six of its local branches by the end of today. The banking operation has been taken over by Federal Trust.

First Federal in Sanford has been operating at 312 W. First Street for many decades. The others in the Seminole County group include operations in Longwood, Oviedo, and Fern Park, as well as DeBary and Orange City in Volusia County.

RTC, the Resolution Trust Corporation, took over the First Federal operation in April, 1991, and has

subsequently turned it over to Federal Trust, which is closing the local operations.

A group of former First Federal employees has been circulating a letter urging people to write to their legislative representatives, complaining about the closings and the loss of jobs for up to 80 employees in the combined operations. The

letter states, "The handling of this whole situation was an abuse of public trust."

As of 3 p.m. yesterday, over 30 people, former employees and officials as well as long-term customers, had attached their signatures supporting the measure.

## Junior Women's Club rewards Sanford cop

SANFORD — The Junior Women's Club of Sanford Thursday night honored a Seminole County law enforcement officer chosen by his chief for exemplary performance.

Sanford Police Officer Victor L. Burns was the recipient of the Fifth Annual Officer of the Year Salute. Tina Lee, project director for the woman's club announced.

Officers from four other cities and from Seminole County were also recognized. They include Ofc. Stephen Shea, Lake Mary; Sgt. Rosemarie E. Pell, Casselberry; Sgt. Dale Coleman, Oviedo; Sgt. Mike Deal, Altamonte Springs and Sgt. Brent Davison, Seminole County. Longwood and Winter Springs did not participate.

"The reason we do this is that we feel like these officers provide so much for the community through their law enforcement jobs. They make our community better, which is what our club is all about," Lee said.

Lee said letters requesting nominees were sent to police chiefs and to Sheriff Don Kalinger. Sanford Police Chief Steven Harriett nominated Burns, whom he said, has great "compassion and concern for his community."

Burns is a resource officer at Crooms School of Choice. He has just completed his Drug Awareness Resistance Education, a program targeted at elementary and high school students. He will use his DARE training this fall in the fifth grade classrooms at Goldsboro Elementary School. Burns also monitors youth gangs in the area as a gang liaison officer.

### Retiree donates social security checks

TAMPA — A 76-year-old Sun City Center retiree said he hopes to make a difference and inspire others by donating his annual Social Security benefits to charity.

The donor, who asked to remain anonymous, sent a check for \$4,500 to the United Way of Greater Tampa, along with a letter promising more every week, until the amount sent totals his \$10,000 annual Social Security earnings.

"It's wonderful," said United Way spokeswoman Mary Ruth Austin. "It's incredibly generous."

The retired research chemist said he was moved to give by a church sermon on Christian love and a newspaper article he read about the Social Security system distributing more than \$55 billion a year, a fifth of its benefits, to households with incomes of over \$50,000.

"I realized, hey, they're talking about me. Then I made my decision," the man said. His letter and first check arrived Tuesday.

### Schools to use metal detectors, dogs

INVERNESS — A sharp rise in violence startled officials of the rural Citrus County schools, who plan to curb campus crime with hand-held metal detectors and more searches by drug-sniffing dogs.

Citrus County Sheriff Charles Dean told school board members Thursday that since December 1991 school resource officers have dealt with eight "hands-on weapons incidents" in Citrus schools.

In 1991, Citrus deputies responded to 935 school-based complaints, arrested 31 students and provided 188 instructional programs. Through March 1992, deputies responded to 1,041 complaints, made 49 arrests and provided only 137 instructional programs, Dean said.

### Democrats cry foul over expert

TALLAHASSEE — House Democrats are crying foul over a college professor who helped shape Florida's proposed new congressional districts because of his links to Republicans.

Theodore Arrington, chairman of the political science department at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte, testified as an expert for the Common Cause public interest group in recent federal court hearings.

Some of Arrington's testimony about creation of black and Hispanic congressional districts was cited by Senior U.S. District Judge C. Clyde Atkins in recommending a 23-district plan this week.

The Democrats say Arrington has distributed resumes in various states that are quite different.

In South Carolina, for example, he said he was a paid consultant to the Florida Republican Party and was once president of the Young Republicans organization. His Florida resume doesn't mention either.

### Researcher: Insect bugs blueberry crop

GAINESVILLE — A newly discovered bug is one of the major causes of the low yield of Florida-grown rabbiteye blueberries, reducing the crop's yield by up to 80 percent, a University of Florida biologist said Thursday.

The destruction of rabbiteye flower buds is the work of the blueberry gall midge, according to Paul Lyrene, fruit crops professor at the university's Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences.

"We can look forward to having a more profitable rabbiteye shipping industry in Florida," Lyrene said, "after we know how to control for the gall midge."

# GED diplomas awarded tonight

SANFORD — This evening's graduation ceremonies at Seminole Community College will send 283 students away with General Educational Development (GED) diplomas.

That's not a record number of graduates, according to Nancy Williams, the GED program coordinator, but it is a good number.

"We have quite a few this time," she said.

The graduates have been studying for the high school equivalency diploma since January.

Many of the students are already enrolled in college courses at SCC, but Williams said that others take the course just so they can have a high school diploma.

The diploma is often the first step toward a new job or a pay increase at the job they presently hold.

"The GED helps these people upgrade their resumes," Williams said.

Included in Friday's ceremony will be the awarding of four scholarships to the top students in the program.

The Bertha B. Valentine GED Scholarship will be presented to Chavella Williams of Sanford and Michael W. Thompson of Longwood.

The scholarships, valued at \$300 apiece, will pay for 12 credit hours of classes at SCC. That is usually the equivalent of one semester's work.

Usually, only one Valentine Scholarship is presented during a graduation ceremony, but thanks to a cash award given to the GED program by Walt Disney World, an additional scholarship will be given at each ceremony.

"The Disney money has helped us help one more person," Williams said. "We are very pleased about that."

Two Sheelah M. Ryan scholarships will also be presented on Friday night. Stephanie Willinson Frechette of Oviedo and Colina I. Ketter of Altamonte Springs were the winners of those awards.

The Ryan scholarships are also for \$300 each.

In addition, Leslie Geiger will receive the GED Honor Graduate award for having the class' high

## Alternative to public school leads to scholarship, college

SANFORD — Chavella Williams and the public school system just didn't get along.

"It wasn't Seminole High School," she said. "I just didn't get along in the typical public high school situation."

Feeling coddled by teachers and stifled in her ability to learn, she none-the-less wanted to complete her high school education so that she could pursue her goal of becoming a paramedic.

Williams, 18, just completed the work to earn her GED (General Educational Development diploma). She is a winner of a \$300 scholarship to attend Seminole Community College.

A native of Longwood, Williams moved to Sanford five years ago. She attended Lakeview Middle School and began her studies at Seminole High School, but she said she was doing poorly in school and decided that high school was not the way for her to learn so she dropped out.

"I wasn't doing well in school at all," she said.

Her sub-standard work, she believed, was a result of her being unable to take responsibility for her own learning process.

By the time she reached her 10th birthday, midway through her sophomore year, she withdrew from Seminole High School

and enrolled in the adult high school program at Seminole Community College.

"It's just like regular high school," she said. "Only better."

The teachers she said, were able to give her what she needed to learn. She said the course work was similar to that at Seminole High School, but the responsibility to learn was placed squarely on her shoulders.

"If you weren't in class, you didn't get the work," she said. "It was that simple."

A move to Texas for about three months last year, threw a monkey wrench into the works, however.

"I was hoping that I could enroll in the adult high school out there, but the program at the school out there was nothing like the program over here," she said. "So I never enrolled."

When she returned to Sanford, she decided that she was ready to move on to the next level of her education so she decided to take her GED.

Williams plans to enroll in the Emergency Medical Technology (EMT) program at SCC in the fall.

"I'm just taking this one step at a time," she said. After being an EMT for two years she plans to become a paramedic.

The money she will receive from the Bertha B. Valentine GED scholarship will pay for one semester at SCC, which consists of 12 credit hours of work.

"I'm thrilled," she said of the scholarship.

# House Republicans blast tax plan

TALLAHASSEE — Florida House Republicans said Thursday they can spend more on schools, medical care and the elderly — without raising taxes.

State GOP leaders scheduled a "Florida Tea Party" protest on the opening day against Gov. Lawton Chiles' \$1.35 billion tax proposal, asking Floridians to send tea bags to show opposition. Chiles will push legislators to approve his tax plan in a special session starting June 1.

"The ... plan follows the vein of other liberal spenders who brought us the New Deal, the Fair Deal, and now we have the raw deal," state Republican Chairman Van Poole said.

Hawkes unveiled an updated version of a budget House Republicans proposed in March that he said would trim state jobs to

raise money for schools, prisons, medical programs and programs for the elderly.

"The people of Florida have set their priorities. They want classrooms funded; they don't want bureaucracies funded," Hawkes said.

Chiles vetoed the \$30 billion no-new-taxes budget passed in the regular legislative session, saying its spending cuts for education, social services, corrections and environmental programs were too severe.

Hawkes said the "priority budget" proposal he and 36 other House Republicans signed would put more into those areas without new taxes.

It would raise about \$100 million by eliminating 2,000 state positions, 2,000 fewer than the earlier proposal; \$40 million by cutting expense and travel money, and \$10 million by cutting spending for new furniture and equipment, he said.

Cabinet members' salaries would be cut \$10,000.

Spending increases would include \$200 million, or about \$100 per pupil, for education, \$20 billion for the medically needy, \$2 million for community care for the elderly and \$1 million for child day care for working families, Hawkes said.

Like the budget Chiles vetoed, the GOP version wouldn't provide money for settlements the state has agreed to in federal lawsuits over treatment of foster children.

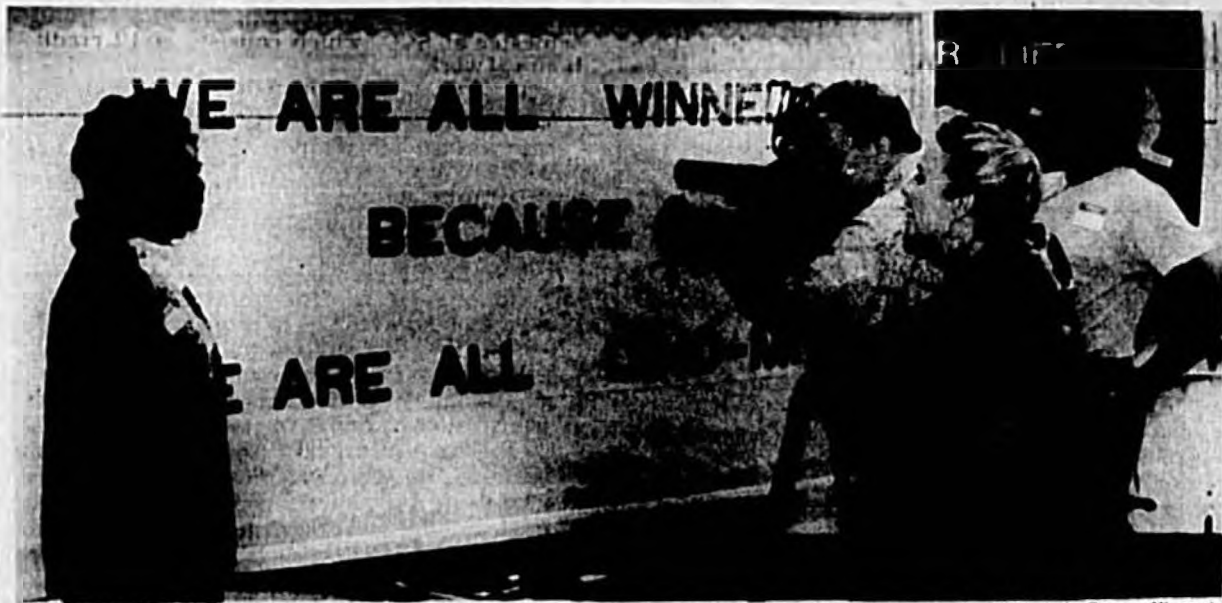

## Work on Rinehart Road way ahead of schedule

SANFORD — Traffic may be driving on the extension of Rinehart Road this July, months ahead of schedule.

"They are currently way the hell ahead of schedule," said Jim Pullen, county construction management engineer.

Pullen said road builders Briar Construction Corp. of Lake Monroe were scheduled to open the road to traffic by mid-November and be complete with their work by mid-December.

But Pullen said Briar has been able to speed up work with additional manpower and equipment and have completed the two-mile new road to the point where the first layer of asphalt has been laid throughout. Work continues on

the roadway drainage system, a signal at County Road 46-A and other work, said Pullen.

When the remaining work is completed, the final layer of asphalt can be laid and striping added, Pullen said.

The \$1.5 million Rinehart Road construction is part of a county vision of a twin-road Interstate 4 bypass intended to allow local traffic to avoid the busy interstate and to promote development of the corridor between C.R. 46-A and B.R. 46. Construction of Grantline Road west of I-4 is slated to begin by 1995.

Rinehart has been built so it can be widened to four lanes to accommodate traffic to a proposed mall and other development near I-4.

## Buying Congress

Nearly everyone agrees on the need to reform the way congressional campaigns are financed. So, after much haggling, Congress sent to President Bush a bill that was supposed to eliminate the system's most glaring abuses. As promised, he vetoed the measure, in part because he viewed it as an incumbent protection act.

Mr. Bush no doubt is justified in being wary of Congress on this issue.

The last time lawmakers set out to improve campaign financing was in 1974 in the wake of the Watergate scandal. Supposedly to reduce the clout of special interests, a law was enacted banning corporate contributions and limiting individual donations to \$1,000 per campaign. A \$5,000 ceiling was placed on political action committees, which until that time largely had been the exclusive preserve of labor unions.

Since then, the number of PACs has swollen from 608 to 4,172. In fact, PAC money now accounts for 25 percent of the campaign spending of candidates elected to the Senate; in the House, the figure is 50 percent. Not surprisingly, PACs seldom invest much money in challengers. This one-way cash flow helps explain why, between 1974 and 1990, the rate of victories for Senate incumbents increased from 85 percent to 97 percent and for House incumbents from 80 percent to 96 percent.

It doesn't require a political scientist to understand why special interests invest so heavily in congressmen. Sen. Don Riegle, D-Mich., summed it up when he wrote that those "interests that contribute to a successful campaign also expect consideration. And all too often, they get it." Riegle ought to know. He was one of the five senators who received large donations from savings-and-loan operator Charles Keating in exchange for helping to fend off federal regulators from his falling thrift.

Big money buys access on Capitol Hill. And there is a direct correlation between the generosity of PACs and the favors they seek from lawmakers.

President Bush called for a flat ban on PAC contributions from businesses, labor unions and trade associations. In response, Congress concocted voluntary spending limits in exchange for the use of public funds to pay for campaigns.

The bill approved by lawmakers was a bad idea for two reasons. First, disaffected voters are not eager to help pay for the re-election campaigns of unpopular incumbents with tax dollars. Second, public financing of congressional campaigns almost certainly would require a tax increase.

The measure did not even deal with the chronic abuse of free congressional postage and the carry-over of excess campaign funds from one election to the next. Both of these practices give incumbents an unfair advantage over challengers.

By failing to clean up the campaign finance mess, Congress once again has demonstrated that it is isolated from the voters it is supposed to serve.

## Celebrating a crossover generation

PEMBROKE, N.C. — "This is a day that the Lord hath made. Let us rejoice and be glad in it," the Rev. Jerry Lowry prayed.

If God is a multicultural advocate (and she is), then it just doesn't get any better than this: a Native American Methodist minister, quoting a psalm by a Jewish king at a predominantly white southern university that is located in the Lumbee tribe's heartland and whose commencement speaker is a black Baptist.

Even the surrounding landscape is a partner to Pembroke State University's uniqueness. In a state blanketed by green-foliated hills and guarded with abundance of towering pine sentinels, Robeson County is a flatland.

The Lumbees are America's second largest tribe. But because of opposition by North Carolina's courtly antediluvian, Sen. Jesse Helms, the Bureau of Indian Affairs has refused to recognize the Lumbees as a legitimate tribe.

Writing that last sentence, I was struck by how silly it is. Here we are celebrating a 500th anniversary of the historical nonsense that Columbus "discovered" a land where people had thrived for centuries, and we're still talking about whether or not they should be "recognized!"

For decades, the three races — white, black and Indian — in Lumbee heartland, Robeson

County, mostly went their separate ways. But all three paused long enough to indulge in some serious libidinal multiculturalism. Sex can be a true equal-opportunity leveler.

Like Bob Dylan sings, "The times, they are a-changin'." Today's a Simi Valley, Calif., has replaced yesterday's Montgomery, Ala., as the national symbol of racism. Women finally are going for the gold in politics. College campuses are reawakening to off-campus problems.

Under Dr. Joseph B. Oxendine, Pembroke State University's indefatigable chancellor, theampus has been forging closer ties between the three races. Pembroke State's student body is 64 percent white, 24 percent Indian and 11 percent black. So it was

an exquisitely appropriate setting for my commencement tribute to "the crossover generation."

"Before you," I told the radiantly multicultural faces of 503 graduates, "there were the free speech activists, the civil rights activists, the Vietnam War protesters and the 'me' generations."

"But you are the crossover generation."

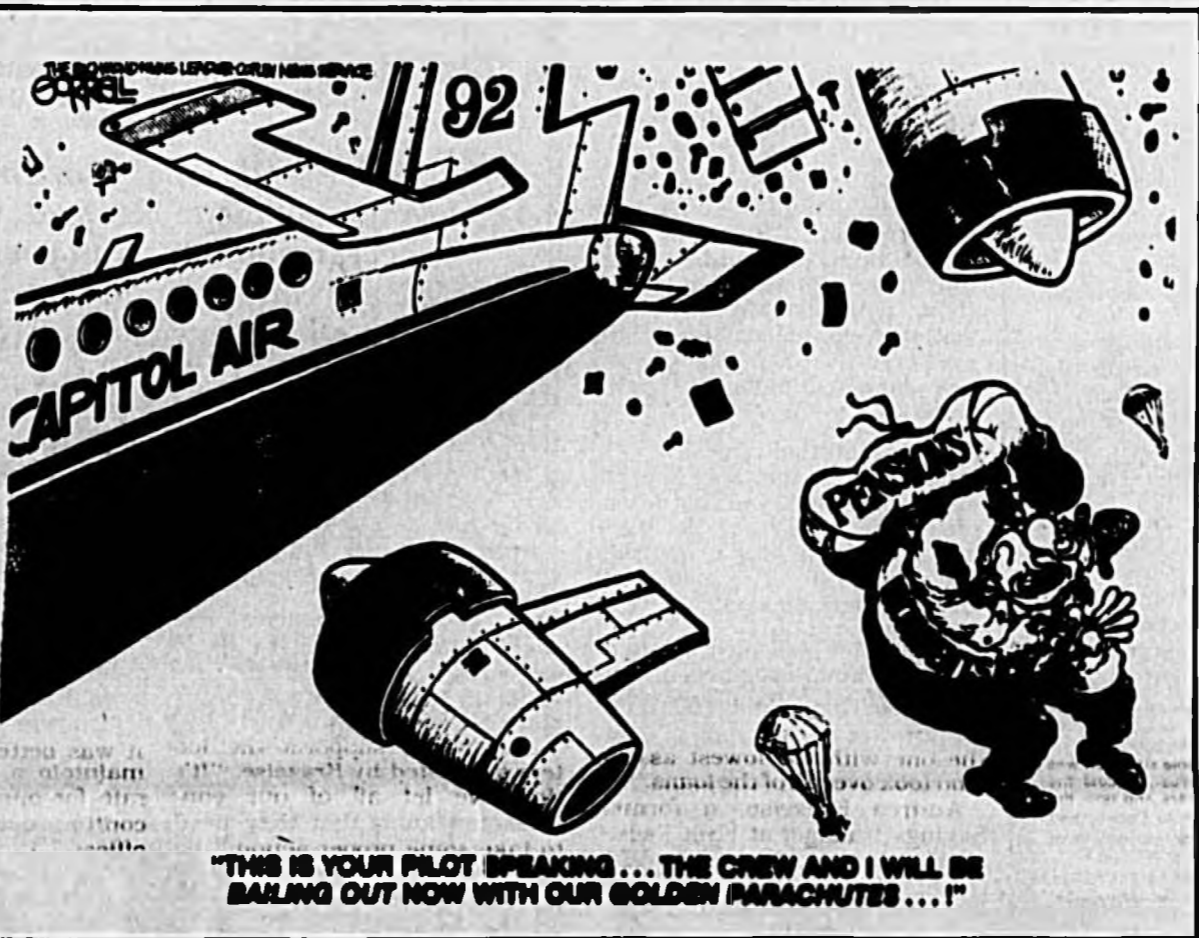
"As the crossover generation, you are a moral locomotive for progress — an insistent voice for multiculturalism in the university curriculum — laid-back partners in interracial marriages that have tripled in the last 25 years."

"This is a wonderful nation, blessed with extraordinary wealth. But it is also a nation of hopeless homeless, rural poverty, racial polarization and sexist oppression. It has a federal budget deficit that places a higher priority on tanks than schools. And our national mindset callously permits thousands to die every year because of no health care."

"You can change those dismal statistics.... This is a time of testing. Jobs are not plentiful. But the crossover generation is well-endowed with brains and bravery. We expect you to succeed where we have failed."

## GOP trying to tarnish Perot

WASHINGTON — A combined White House and Bush-Quayle '92 effort to radically diminish Ross Perot's stature in the eyes of voters has begun full-force.

GOP polling determined that Perot's attraction to voters is their perception of him as a conservative outsider who will bring radical reform to Washington. So the plan is to position Perot as another tax-and-spend Democrat pushing a huge, expensive social welfare program; and as a consummate inside wheeler-dealer who got rich through buying influence in Washington.

In the last several weeks, a number of reporters have received phone calls and faxes from Bush-Quayle sources. They suggested that it might be worthwhile to take a trip out to the National Archives depository in Suitland, Md., to see a wide range of documents from the Nixon era. These include transcripts of oral histories dictated by high-ranking former Nixon aides as part of an ongoing project.

Surprise: The documents deal with contacts, meetings and phone calls between Perot and the Nixon White House. They paint Perot as the consummate inside manipulator, constantly in contact with the White House, asking for major favors — including intervening with the IRS and saving a major government claims processing contract his E.D.S. company was losing — and making big-money promises in return.

Meanwhile, columns written by conservative commentators with close ties to the Bush White House have started to appear in newspapers and magazines. They say — surprise again — that Perot is actually a big-spending Democrat who will have to raise taxes to support his plan for social spending and deficit reduction. He will actually take votes from Clinton, not Bush, these commentators predict.

Given the anti-incumbency mood across the country, the record number of incumbent retirements and the most extensive congressional redistricting in the last 50 years, this year's congressional elections are shaping up as the most interesting in recent memory.

With filing periods still open in a number of states, already 891 non-incumbents are running for House seats. This is twice the number that threw their hats into the ring at the same point in either 1988 or 1990, and well above the modern era record of 823 non-incumbent candidates who ran in 1982, the last post-redistricting campaign.

It's already clear that this will be the most expensive congressional campaign cycle ever. The Federal Election Commission reports that House incumbents have raised \$92 million so far, up about 10 percent over 1990. Ten incumbents have raised \$1 million or more.

However, more interesting, challengers and

candidates for open seats have raised 16 million, up more than 85 percent over what challengers were able to raise in 1990.

But to show the power of incumbency: At the end of March, House incumbents had \$88.2 million in the bank; challengers had only \$4.6. In the first quarter of 1992, political action committees gave 91 percent of their donations to incumbents.

One of the first skirmishes of Campaign '92 will be fought in the 19th District of Pennsylvania this November. GOP Rep. William E. Goodling — an 18-year veteran and ranking Republican on the House Education and Labor Committee — is running for a 10th term in what should be a safe GOP district. But Goodling has "Rubbergate" problems: He is the incumbent Republican with the most check overdrafts — 430.

Goodling has been very close to the White House and among George Bush's chief supporters on the Hill. Reportedly, the White House leaned hard on local Republicans not to abandon Goodling, who ran unopposed in the GOP primary.

But now along comes none other than Jack Kemp to, at least indirectly, challenge Bush and the White House. One of Kemp's top aides, Thomas Humbert, has resigned from his post at Housing and Urban Development and moved to Pennsylvania to challenge Goodling in the November election. Kemp's assistant secretary for public affairs, Mary Brunette, has also resigned to run Humbert's campaign.

Humbert — who calls himself a "Reagan-Kemp Republican," a clear slap at Bush's suspect standing among conservatives — says he would have run in the GOP primary, but it was too late to file after Goodling's check-kiting history became known. So he will enter as an independent "to give Republicans a clear choice in November."

Kemp says he will do all he can for Humbert. The White House says it is standing by Goodling. Insiders are saying this could end up being one of the preliminary skirmishes in a war for control of the soul of the Republican Party in 1992. It's a war between conservatives like Kemp and the moderates who now surround George Bush.

## Doctors reaping drug firm spoils

WASHINGTON — Bribes — the word is one of the most loathsome in the language, certainly not one ascribed to professional healers and care-providers such as physicians. But mounting evidence increasingly implicates doctors in a variety of suspect schemes that all smack of bribery.

To be sure, the number of doctors involved is small, but big enough to cast a cloud over the entire profession, one in which credibility with patients is central.

Investigators found that "studies have shown that physicians prescribing practices are affected by promotional efforts of pharmaceutical companies." One expert familiar with physician entertainment claimed that doctors who are wine and dined increase their pre-

scriptions 80 percent of the time. Of the doctors who wrote 50 or more prescriptions a week, 94 percent were offered gifts or payments from manufacturers.

"If a judge, sitting on an important case, were bribed by one of the two parties involved in the case in order to influence his or her decision, we would all be outraged and the judge, if discovered, would be criminally prosecuted," according to congressional testimony by Dr. Sidney Wolfe, a health advocate.

Investigators for the Department of Health and Human Services are homing in on the scandal. One study they conducted, based on a representative nationwide survey of 617 doctors in one recent year, details how 82 percent of physicians were offered inducements by drug companies.

They came in many shapes and sizes. Most took the form of gifts, entertainment, vacation junkets and even cash. Sometimes the payoff is delivered in the form of bogus scientific studies, according to investigations. It works this way: A doctor prescribes a drug, which profits a firm. In return, it pays the doctor lavishly for help in the so-called study. It has the veneer of professionalism, but none of the scientific worth.

For example, government investigators found that a gastroenterologist from Los Angeles was offered payment for each patient he enrolled in an unscientific study of Zantac, a drug for patients with ulcers manufactured by Glaxo Pharmaceuticals.

For the most part, most of the gift-giving falls into the garden-variety of graft. Some examples recently unearthed by Health and Human Services watchdogs:

- An estimated 37 percent of American doctors were extended meals or drinks an average of eight times each in the survey year, normally to nicer restaurants.

- Pharmaceutical firms pay travel and other expenses for physicians and their guests to attend seminars and conferences in such honeymoon hot spots as Hawaii, the Caribbean and Florida. Some 11 percent of physicians were offered expense-paid junkets an average of twice each during the survey period.

- At most major sporting events, there is an entourage of doctors and drug salesmen. Doctors are offered complimentary tickets to entertainment and sporting events. Six percent of physicians received such freebies an average of twice each in the sample period.

- Drug company representatives are always calling on doctors to sell products — and they often leave with a Christmas stocking behind full of small gifts, sometimes as small as calendars and pens. Half of all doctors in the survey were offered free samples the companies were selling. It can also include medical texts, office equipment and cash.

## The employees' letter

As former employees and Board members of First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Seminole County, we urge you to consider the following and take action to stop this outrageous waste of your money.  
 On April 5, 1991, First Federal Savings and Loan Association of Seminole County was taken over by the Resolution Trust Corporation, due to the thrift's negative net worth, which was a direct result of the Federal government's failure to stand by its promise to First Federal. That promise was to allow the thrift to write off losses incurred when it sold a group of low interest rate loans over the remaining life of those loans. The Federal Home Loan Bank Board, of that time First Federal's governing body, went as far as to encourage the Board of First Federal to sell these loans.  
 If the Board and management of First Federal were guilty of anything it was in violating the integrity of the agencies governing the thrift industry. When regulations changed requiring the loss to be written off immediately, First Federal became a "troubled thrift." However, as soon as the month following the write-off, the institution showed a profit and continued to do so until RTC's intervention on April 5, 1991. Management also began seeking investors to provide the thrift with the needed capital to make the institution "healthy" again. At the time of RTC intervention, one investor group was in the process of being formed and another investor was also interested and both the RTC and the FDIC were aware

of this.  
 However, the Federal government, in its wisdom, chose to take over the bank and sell it off to the best bidder. Taking this course will cost the American taxpayer over 16 million dollars. Even simply giving First Federal the capital it needed would have cost less than that! If the regulators would have waited until the investors were approved and allowed them to provide the capital, the cost to the taxpayers would have been nothing. Moreover, the careers of 88 hard-working and loyal employees (some of whom had worked there for over 20 years) would not have been cut short.

 years on First Federal's Board of Directors, and as chairman of the board since 1979, observed, "The whole selling was totally and improperly done."  
 He explained, "When RTC first came in and took over, we had no indication that they would sell. But during the past year, they sold a lot of the good assets, dropping it from over \$200 million down to \$136 million."  
 Green added, "Then they put it out for bids, and ended up taking the highest bidder, but the one with the lowest assets, who took over all of the loans."  
 Andrea Kraeclac, a former Savings Manager at First Federal, and Donna Mauldon, EDP Coordinator and Nelson for First Federal, have been circulating the letter, seeking as much support as possible, through public complaints sent to their legislative leaders.  
 "We don't know how many people we will be able to get to

help in contacting their senators and representatives," Kraeclac said, "but we believe this is a problem that needs to be brought out for their consideration."  
 Sanford businessman A.K. Shoemaker, a long time customer at First Federal was angered by the entire take-over. "It's a shame that our congressmen and senators would allow something like this to happen," he said. "The losses will probably be astronomical, but it's too late to do anything about this situation now."  
 Shoemaker supports the letters suggested by Kraeclac. "It's time we let all of our congressmen know that they need to take some proper action," he said, "and avoid this from happening again anywhere else around the nation."  
 Federal Trust President George Foster, contacted at the former First Federal facility in Longwood yesterday, refused comment. "Any information will have to come from the

spokesperson at our Amelia Island offices, north of Jacksonville," he said.  
 The spokesperson, Anne T. Coonrod said, "As of the end of business Friday, all six offices will close permanently." She commented, "When Trust took over, we looked into the possibility of keeping some, or even all of the facilities in operation, but leases on a number of the buildings were nearing an end, and it would have been rather costly to continue their operation."  
 Coonrod commented, "We felt it was better to close them and maintain a competitive interest rate for our customers, than to continue operating costly branch offices."  
 The closure involved the laying-off of approximately 35 employees. Coonrod said, "We have contacted many of them to determine if they would relocate to our Winter Park facility." She added, "We will try to keep as many of them as possible on our payroll."

RTC spokesperson Andrea Plater said this morning, "The actual buildings will be turned back to our control now, and we'll be getting appraisals on them, then put them on the market." She added, "Actually, the First Federal operations have already been closed, but we have kept the offices open until today for last minute work."  
 In making the initial announcement, Federal Trust suggested people could handle their accounts through its Winter Park facility at 1211 Orange Avenue.  
 "Most of the accounts that have been transferred to Winter Park," Coonrod said, "were mostly savings and CD's, which require very little transportation. Most of them can be handled through the mail."

### Johnny bids farewell

BURBANK, Calif. — The studio audience laughed, then cried. So did Johnny Carson.

Thursday night was the end, as America knows it, of three decades of "The Tonight Show Starring Johnny Carson."

He ends his reign as the undisputed king of late-night TV tonight, but he will not have guests on the finale and the show will be taped before an invitation-only audience of family members and celebrities.

On Thursday, despite a numbing avalanche of media hype, Carson was somehow able to sit back and come through with one of his greatest shows.

The finale will include a monologue and clips of old shows, as well as farewells from sidekick Ed McMahon and bandleader Doc Severinsen.

### Urban aid bill may be political trap

WASHINGTON — Big-city mayors say a \$2 billion emergency urban aid bill working its way through Congress is a good first step, but Republican critics warn it may be a political trap for President Bush.

"We're creating a political ambush for the president," Sen. Thad Cochran, R-Miss., said Thursday as the Senate added \$1.45 billion in summer programs to the city aid bill and

returned it to the House. "There's no question he's put in an awkward position."

If the House goes along with Senate changes, Congress would be presenting Bush with the option of extending his emergency budget declaration to provide the \$1.45 billion to cities across the country.

Bush can block all or part of the money by withholding the emergency declaration. Should he do that, said Sen. Trent Lott, R-Miss., "then he's going to be bashed for not spending these funds every time there's a little incident this summer."

### Americans extinguishing cigarettes

ATLANTA — Americans are extinguishing their cigarettes in record numbers, leading federal health officials to predict the nation will meet its health objective on smoking by the year 2000.

The Centers for Disease Control reported Thursday that 25.5 percent of Americans smoked in 1990, the lowest level in 37 years. 1990 is the latest year for which figures are available.

If smoking continues to fall at a rate of 1.1 percentage points a year — as it has since 1987 — the country will reach its goal of 15 percent within eight years, the CDC said.

"This tells us that Americans are responding perhaps in even greater numbers to the public health education campaign that's occurring," said Gary Giovino, the CDC's chief smoking epidemiologist. "An awareness of the health consequences, the increased cost of cigarettes and the declining social acceptance all contributed to this."

### Landlord charges little rent

WASHINGTON — Business seemed good at the Mount Vernon Inn outside the nation's capital. One year the restaurant earned \$4.3 million — thanks in part to its landlord,

who charged only \$115 a month in rent.

A busy art studio in California sold \$2 million in artwork the same year and did even better, paying \$265 to use six buildings all year.

Nothing wrong with cheap rent. But this time the landlord is the U.S. government. And some members of Congress wondered Thursday why Uncle Sam has been so generous.

### Japanese rush in for AIDS tests

TOKYO — Newly released figures show scared young Japanese are rushing in for AIDS tests after a wave of publicity about the deadly disease followed basketball star Magic Johnson's announcement that he has the virus.

The Tokyo Metropolitan Government said Thursday that 2,839 people took AIDS tests at medical institutions in Tokyo in April — compared with 5,535 in all of 1991.

"Many people are beginning to realize that it is not someone else's disease," said Makoto Yasukawa, spokesman for the metropolitan government's AIDS Prevention Division.


Aside from Johnson's announcement last November, recent television talk shows and telephone hotlines have contributed to AIDS awareness among young Japanese, he said.

**Duany plan progress reported**

SANFORD — Work is continuing on a study of new codes suggested as part of the Duany project. Members of the Sanford Historic Downtown Waterfront Association heard of the progress from officials of the Sanford Historic Trust earlier this week.

Following an extensive study of Sanford's historical residential district, Andres Duany presented a suggested master plan for revitalization of the district before a meeting at the Sanford City Hall on April 1. Some of his suggestions and

comments also deal with the commercial area of the city.

Since the codes were received, the Sanford Historic Trust has been giving it's individual suggestions a close study. Trust President Warren Skipper said, "We have a small committee headed by Laura Strachla, that has been doing a great deal of work, and they expect to be finished with their review by possibly late June, but probably late July."

Skipper said, "After that, we'll be presenting our findings to the Sanford City Commission, but at an informational level, before we start working with the Sanford city planner's department."

The City Commission had previously approved a joint review of Duany's master plan by the trust, city planner and other city staff members who may be required for an in-depth look at the suggestions.

SHDWA President Chris Cranias said, "The Historic Trust made an excellent presentation and we found it very informing."

Duany was hired by the Historic Trust, with funds supplied by several persons and organizations including the City of Sanford, to create a master plan for the revitalization of the historic district.

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**Municipal services close for holiday**

Municipal services will close Monday for the official observance of Memorial Day. Most, but not all, of the facilities that will remain in operation, are entertainment or recreation in nature.

Among closures for Monday, May 25, are the following:

Other operations: The Central Florida Regional Airport Authority offices, Seminole County Branch of the YMCA, The Greater Sanford Chamber of Commerce, and the Senior Citizens Center at the Sanford Civic Center will be closed Monday.

The First Street Gallery is not normally open on Mondays, and the St. John's River Cruises will not be operating that day.

Services that will be operating Monday include Lake Mary's Cherry Park, the Central Florida Botanical Park, and Rivership and Romance Cruises.

**Refuse to be collected as usual Monday**

Most people will have Monday off work for the Memorial Day holiday. Refuse collections however, will go on as scheduled.

Both the cities of Sanford and Lake Mary have announced that pickups of garbage, yard trash or recyclables will go on as normally scheduled on Monday. Areas normally scheduled for certain types of waste pickups will have the same service as during a non-holiday Monday.

The City of Longwood, which utilizes Industrial Waste Services, will not have any waste collections on Monday. Public Works Director Bill Temby explained, "We don't have them normally scheduled for any holiday, so the holiday won't bring about any change." He added, "IWS will be following their regular schedule for the rest of the week."

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## Remediation program to aid students

SANFORD — Fifty students, a majority of them expected to be from the Croome School of Choice, 1300 20th Street, Sanford, will be participating in a remediation and enrichment program this summer.

Sponsored by the Seminole County Private Industry Council (PIC), the Remediation Educational Support Systems (RESS) classes will be offered to students who are 14-years-old or older.

The PIC will pay the students between \$2 and \$2.50 an hour to take part in the program which will offer basic skills remediation and a pre-employment/work maturity segment.

"It is a program designed to help students who might be ill-prepared for the workplace to learn some basic skills to make them more employable," said John S. Bakken, director of educational programs with RESS, which is based in Newton Square, Pennsylvania.

The program will run from June 22 through July 31 and will provide instruction five hours a day, five days a week.

A great portion of the time will be spent teaching a functional literacy curriculum that will allow students to fill out job applications and perform basic job tasks.

Other employment skills, including interviewing techniques and job-related testing skills will also be taught.

If 50 qualified students can not be found at Croome, students will be recruited from Sanford Middle School, 1700 French Ave., Sanford to make up the difference.

Students involved in the program will be given some school credit for their work as well.

The PIC is a business partner with the Croome School of Choice. Principal Barbara Kirby is pleased that an outside agency is willing to pay for such a project at the school.

"This is a milestone for Croome and the Private Industry Council, who is a business partner, and is willing to fund such a project," she said.

According to Kirby, the business community may also become involved in the program by helping the PIC work with RESS to develop a locally-tailored curriculum. Bakken said that is the key to the program's success.

"That enrichment portion of the program is the most significant portion of the curriculum," he said. "We are making plans for that now."

The six-week program will also include testing at the beginning and the end of the course to evaluate the success of the training.

## Frustrations still festering in Thailand

BANGKOK, Thailand — The king's intervention has defused the immediate confrontation between military powerbrokers and protesters. But the frustrations that brought tens of thousands of Thais into the streets have been allowed to fester, seeds for future turmoil.

The demonstrators, tired of the military's domination of politics, wanted army-backed Prime Minister Suchinda Kraprayoon's immediate resignation. Suchinda, a former army chief, led a military coup last year that overthrew an elected government.

The protesters retreated without a pledge from Suchinda to resign any time soon. Parliament was to take up reform legislation, but not until the end of the month.

That culture simply doesn't put a high priority on justice or retribution; it stresses face-saving compromise. In the past, military officers who led abortive coups have been pardoned, even promoted, then come right back to try to seize power again.

# Candidates file petitions at same time

SANFORD — Two candidates for Seminole County clerk of circuit court submitted petition cards Monday to have themselves placed on the Sept. 1 primary ballot — at the same time.

Both incumbent Maryanne Morse and challenger Mona McGregor submitted petition cards Monday morning which they say will entitle them a place on the ballot without paying the \$5,784 filing fee. Elections supervisor Sandra Goard said

1,898 signatures of registered voters will be needed to place a candidate for partisan county office on the ballot.

McGregor said she had "over 1,900" signatures but expected to submit a total of 2,000 or more. Morse said she submitted 2,001 signatures.

Both Republican clerk candidates said card signers often needed an explanation of the petition process. But both said they enjoyed meeting people and explaining their candidacies to them.

"It was a lot of hard work, but a good opportunity to meet

people," said Morse.

"Going door to door, I found a lot of people were genuinely interested in county government," said McGregor.

The two clerk candidates are the first of a dozen county candidates following the petition alternative to paying high qualifying fees. Goard, along with Republican opponent Theresa Coker, are both seeking signatures. Sheriff's candidates Larry Conniff, Steven Durkovic, Charles Fagan, David Locker, and Harold "Beau" Taylor are circulating the petition cards.

County commission can-

didates Jennifer Kelley, Art Davis and Gerald Korman are seeking signatures.

The candidates site high fees, much of which goes to state party organizations, as their main reason for taking the labor-intensive but pocket-pleasing petition route.

Among the candidates for state office, state representative Art Grindle is taking signatures for the current Senate District 15. Mike Horner is taking signatures for the proposed House District 33, which includes Sanford.

Four candidates living in House District 36, which includes a small portion of Seminole County, are seeking signatures. Incumbent Bob Starks of Maitland and Royal E. Higgins and Harry Lowman, both of Winter Park, are seeking signatures. Starks' son Bill is also seeking signatures for a place on the District 36 ballot.

Bob Starks said he anticipates redistricting will place his son in a Seminole County district and he will move to Orange County to run for re-election.

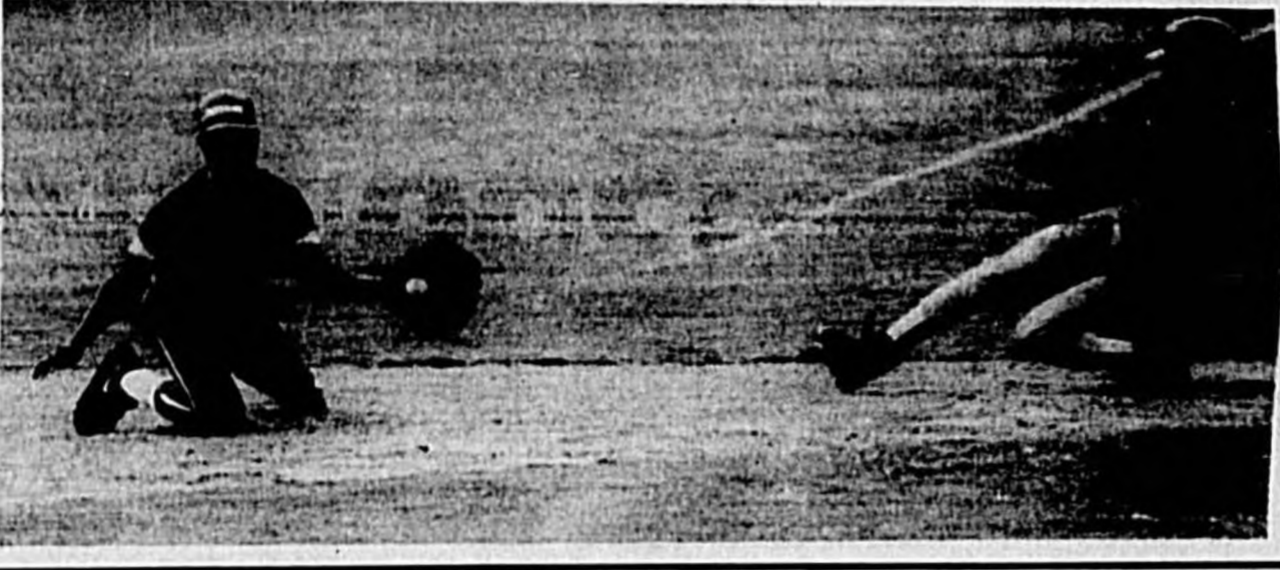

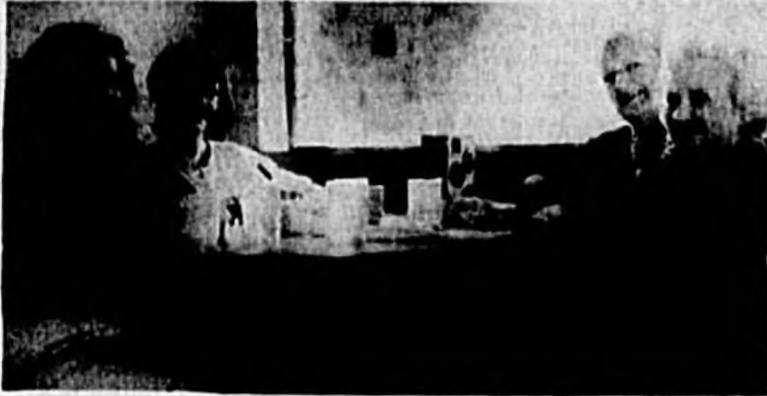

## Tips on avoiding loan scams

The Federal Trade Commission (FTC) is investigating complaints about companies that guarantee loans for financially-strapped consumers and small business owners.

### How to recognize loan scam

Advertisements that promise loans generally appear in the classified section of local and national newspapers, magazines, and tabloids. However, simply advertising through recognized media outlets does not ensure the legitimacy of the company behind an ad. In addition, such companies often use delivery systems other than the U.S. Postal Service, such as overnight or courier services, to avoid detection and prosecution

by postal authorities. Legitimate credit grantors may charge fees to process your loan application, but they will not guarantee that you will qualify for a loan. Illicit advance-fee loan schemes, on the other hand, either promise or strongly suggest that a loan will be provided in exchange for an up-front fee.

### How to protect yourself

The FTC suggests the following precautions before you respond to ads for advance-fee loans.

- Be wary of advertising that claims that bad credit is no problem in getting you a loan. If money is not available to you through traditional lending institutions, it is unlikely to become available in response to a classified ad.

- Be cautious of lenders who use "800" and "900" numbers.

- Check out the company. Contact your local consumer protection agency and the state Attorney General's Office to learn if they have received any complaints about companies offering advance-fee loans. Just because your local consumer protection agency has no complaints on file does not mean that an advance-fee loan business is legitimate.

- Be careful about making any loan agreements over the telephone.

- Do not give your credit card, checking account, or Social

Security numbers over the phone unless you are familiar with the company.

### If you are a victim

If you believe you have been victimized by a fraudulent advance-fee loan operation, contact your local consumer protection agency, state Attorney General and Call For Action (202/537-0585) to report the company.

You also may file a complaint with the FTC by writing to: Federal Trade Commission, Division of Credit Practices, Washington, D.C. 20580. Although the FTC generally does not intervene in individual disputes, the information you provide may help to indicate a pattern of possible law violations requiring action by The Commission.

# Retired star testifies for the Lord

LONGWOOD — Shelly Burch, of Longwood, nationally recognized as Della Garretson on the daytime soap opera "One Life To Live," will return to the bright lights after two years of retirement at Calvary Assembly of God, in Winter Park.

Even though she has turned down a television series and three Broadway shows since moving to the Central Florida area, Burch has agreed to play the female lead in the patriotic musical "America" at the church on June 28 at 6 p.m.

She started in show business at 14 when she performed in her first stage production of "Pajama Game" at St. John's Military Academy in Washington, D.C. At the age of 19, Burch moved to New York to follow her dream.

That dream brought the success Burch, an accomplished dancer, singer and actress, had worked so hard for, starring roles in three Broadway shows, including "Annie," "Nine," and "Stop the World I Want to Get Off," with Sammie Davis Jr., she also was in the film version with Davis.

Burch made guest appearances in several television series including "Spencer for Hire" and "Miami Vice." She also starred in an off-Broadway performance of "Show Boat," which aired on PBS' "Great Performances," and two movies, "Cat's Eye" a Dino De Laurentiis/Stephen King production and "Identity Crisis" with Mario Van Peebles.

At the same time she appeared in the daytime soap opera, Burch sang in New York nightclubs. She also sang the national anthem at major sporting events and performed

at the last three Republican national conventions.

Born in Tucson, Ariz., Burch moved as a child to Washington, D.C., where her late father, Dean Burch, was chairman of both the Federal Communications Commission and the Republican National Committee. He served under presidents Nixon, Ford, Reagan and Bush.

Burch, her family and Sandi Patti, also a resident of Longwood, were all invited to a

gathering of 70 close friends and their families by President Bush at Camp David last fall. The two singers performed together for the crowd.

Today, Burch speaks and sings in churches, Bible studies, prisons and appears regularly on Christian television. She reveals how she was delivered from a defeated lifestyle of bulimia, anorexia, compulsive overeating, manic depression, drugs, alcohol, stays at two mental

hospitals and several suicide attempts.

She recounts how she came back to the Lord and how she walked away in her teen years through a series of small compromises. By the time she arrived in New York, she said she had trained her heart so well that she could close her eyes to the loneliness, coldness and darkness of sin around her, and to sin that eventually crept into her own life.

Then God reached out to her. "God was wooing me back to His heart and for that I am very grateful," said Burch. "There were many nights I cried out to God — 'Help me, save me.'"

In June 1989, Burch came to the Orlando area for a rest. While here, she attended Calvary Assembly of God in Winter Park where she found again her first love — Jesus.

"I knew I needed Jesus," Burch said, who first became a Christian at age 12. "I was just doing things out a vacuum — just trying to fill this hole inside with success, but I wasn't happy."

Within a few weeks, she decided to move to the area.

She is now married to Dayne Bennett, also a member of the church, and the mother of a son, Joel Robert Bennett.

Burch teaches voice, sings in the church choir, volunteers at the church's counseling center on the prayer line and regularly visits women in a local jail.

She will be traveling to Washington in June to sing at a benefit, "Race for the Cure," a cancer research fundraising group founded by Marily Quayle, wife of Vice President Dan Quayle.

## At the cross

### Yale's new chaplain hopes to revive civil rights era of King, Coffin

BRIDGEPORT, Conn. — Worshipers must pass by the foot of the cross to enter the sanctuary at Mount Aery Baptist Church.

The 85-foot-high cross weighing 7 tons sticks out from the church lobby to proclaim the Christian faith to an inner-city neighborhood and for miles around.

For the Rev. Frederick J. Streets, who rose from gang-ridden streets in Chicago to recently being named the first black chaplain of Yale, the cross is an important symbolic statement.

When people gathered at his church on the Sunday following the Rodney King verdict, they first passed by the cross to hear Streets challenge them "to not only face the ugly, but to embrace it."

And as he prepares to pass by the cross a final time before assuming one of the nation's most influential pulpits, Streets is already planning how to restore religion to a prominent role in the life of the university, and to bring the school beyond its ivy-covered walls to face its responsibilities in one of the poorest cities in the nation.

"What the university is saying to itself

and the world is that even in this place where the mind is highly valued and nurtured, it also recognizes a place to assist people in nurturing the spirit," Streets said in a recent interview.

Yale was founded for the purpose of educating the clergy. But like many similar universities, religion has slowly lost ground within the academic community until the last vestiges of the founder's faith may be found at the divinity school and the chaplain's office.

For a few brief shining moments in the 1960s and 1970s, religion became a powerful moral influence on campus as the Rev. William Sloane Coffin used his influential

pulpit as Yale chaplain to lobby for civil rights and against the Vietnam War.

In 1992, with the nation in racial turmoil and the work of the late Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. only "half-addressed," Streets hopes to again lift up religious and spiritual inquiry as a significant part of the dialogue around issues in public life.

His model for ministry is the Rev. W.N. Daniel, pastor of the Antioch Missionary Baptist Church in Chicago where Streets spent much of his youth. Along with preaching biblical values, Daniel at one time ran for Congress and his church reached out to the community by sponsoring multimillion-dollar housing projects.

He remembers receiving a call to preach at age 13, and after practicing in front of his grandmother, he got up the courage at age 14 to tell Daniel.

"I went in very boldly and told him I felt I was called," Streets remembered.

The pastor took the youth seriously, and after several talks on the nature of ministry and a period of study, he was licensed by the church to preach at age 16.

Today, the teacher says the pupil has learned his lessons well.

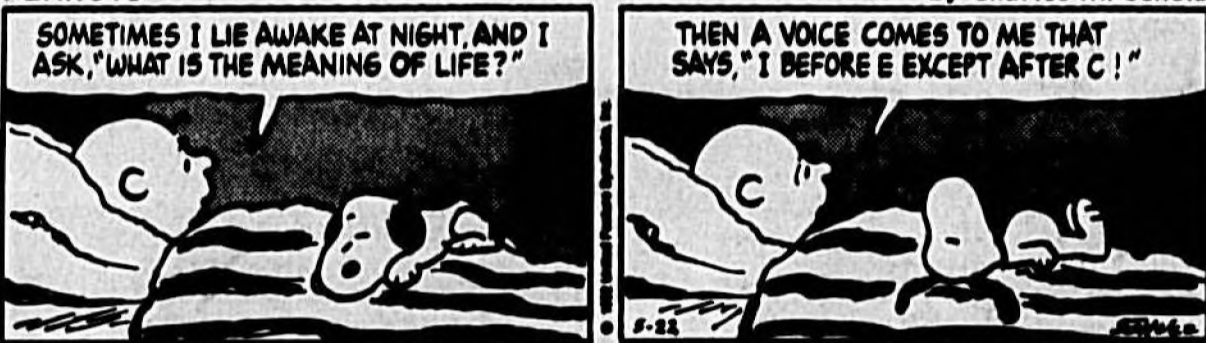

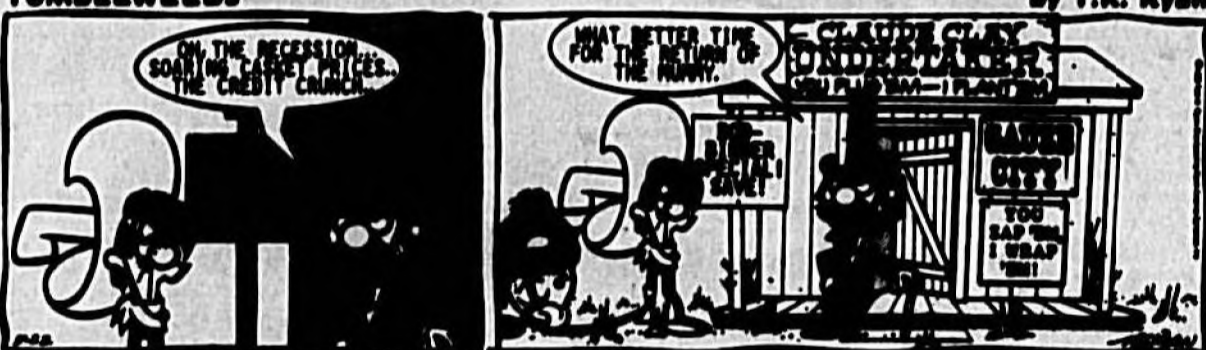

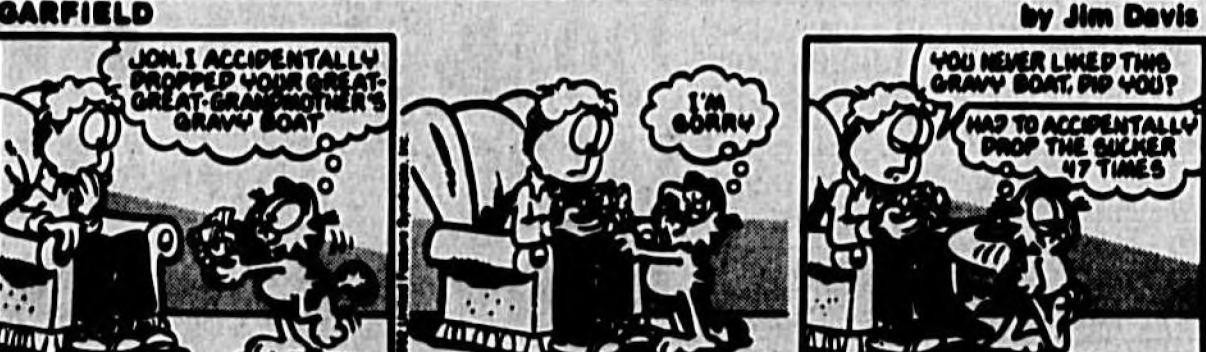

# Cataplexy is linked to emotional upset

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** A 40-year-old friend has cataplexy, a condition that causes him to pass out after experiencing any strong emotion. Since this condition has recently appeared, could it have been caused by a past emotional trauma that has been suppressed? Would psychotherapy be plausible treatment?

Women with fibrocystic disease have a higher risk of breast tumors. Therefore, the major problem with this ailment is to differentiate it from breast cancer. This may require frequent examinations and mammograms. Biopsy may be necessary for confirmation. Fibrocystic disease is the most common disorder of the female breast. Women with this condition should follow their doctors' recommendations about appropriate supervision and monitoring.

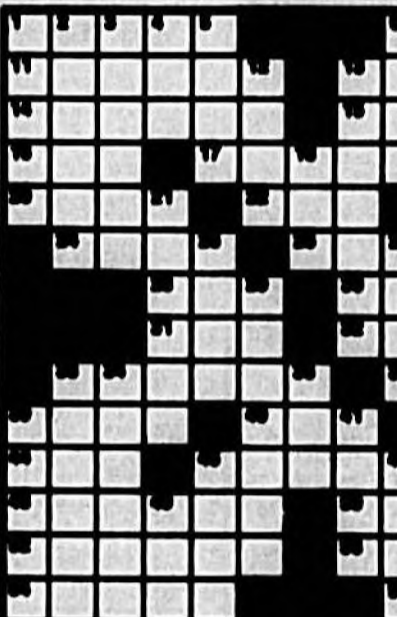


**DEAR READER:** Cataplexy is a strange and fascinating condition: People with it experience sudden (temporary) paralysis in response to highly emotional situations. For example, such patients may precipitously fall down if they laugh or are startled. I've often wondered if the phrase "to die laughing" may have originated years ago when medical unsophisticates observed a cataplectic patient. Most cataplexy is associated with narcolepsy, sudden, uncontrollable attacks of sleep. The cause is unknown. Treatment consists of anti-depressant medication, such as Prozac. Past emotional trauma plays no role in this disorder; psychotherapy is not a plausible treatment, although it might be useful in helping your friend deal with the emotional problems stemming from cataplexy. To give you more information, I am sending you a free copy of my Health Report "Sleep-Wake Disorders."

**DEAR DR. GOTT:** I've been diagnosed with cystic breasts and am told there is no help available. Please provide information on my condition.

**DEAR READER:** Women commonly experience isolated swellings of portions of the breast, usually the milk-producing glands and surrounding tissues. This is harmless but uncomfortable. Usually called "fibrocystic disease," the condition can be helped by avoidance of coffee, tea, cola and chocolate. Vitamin E may reduce symptoms.

When an archer breaks the string of his bow, he stands no chance of hitting the target with his arrow. Sometimes a bridge player is faced with the same problem. He has one chance to make the contract. If it works, he succeeds; if not, he fails. But often the bridge player will have a second string to his bow - if he can spot it and take advantage of it.

Cover the East-West cards in the diagram. Against your contract of six spades, West leads the heart king; ace, 10, six. You cash dummy's spade ace and lead a spade to your king, but West discards a heart. How do you continue?  
Faced with a trump loser, South thought he needed to find East with at least three clubs (so that he could discard his heart loser before East ruffed in) and West with the diamond king.

Consequently, South finessed the diamond queen at trick four. But East won with the king and returned his last heart: two down.  
South might have deduced from West's vulnerable pre-empt and the play to trick one that East had started with a doubleton heart. (With eight hearts, West would probably have opened four hearts.)

As East must have at least three clubs, declarer should try that suit first. And when East turns up with four clubs, declarer should discard his heart loser, ruff the heart three in hand, play a spade to dummy's queen and lead dummy's last club.  
If East ruffs, he must return a diamond into dummy's A-Q. So he discards. But declarer exits with dummy's last spade, endplaying East anyway.
