During a brief talk before presenting the picture, Mr. Smith stated that the students of Seminole High School had convinced him that, like all REAL Americans, we have the spirit to do a job because it needs doing—not for selfish aims, but for the good of everyone.

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Parliament Hits At Churchill And His War Cabinet

Seeks More Co-operation From Armed Forces, Avoidance Of More Failures Press Attacks Prime Minister Criticism Is Result Of Successful Run By Nazi Warships

LONDON, Feb. 14.—(AP) —The reorganization of Prime Minister Winston Churchill's War Cabinet to increase fighting co-operation among the army, navy and air force and to avoid further British failures such as the escape of three German warships was forecast in informed Parliamentary quarters today.

At the same time, there was a strong demand for an official inquiry into the American investigation after the Pearl Harbor incident, into the responsibility for allowing the huge Nazi ship, the Bismarck, to escape, and for the failure to sink the German fleet's dash through the channel, and one newspaper suggested bluntly that Britain had been "hypothesized by the force of his rhetoric."

The prime minister, who heretofore has had to defend only his policies, this time found himself attacked on the merits of his conduct. The News Chronicle said: "His methods of government must be recast quickly and with a single aim in view to retrieve a situation as any that yet confronts us."

"We have not been hypnotized by the force of his rhetoric, by the force of his personality, by the force of his house of commons. Have we not been dragged by the force of his personality, by the force of his house of commons, into a frame of mind in which we've lost our grip on reality?"

The Herald remarked "we look pretty foolish" and added the British public "now feels apprehensive about the whole strategic direction of the war which no more formal request on past events will remove, however, thoroughly conducted."

The Mirror asked, "Is it any longer true to say we trust the prime minister though we do not trust his government?"

The Daily Express also put in a word of caution against "rotting heads in the sand before knowing all the facts."

Wickard States Farm Machinery May Be Rationed

WASHINGTON, Feb. 14.—Secretary of Agriculture Wickard today said that the government might ration farm machinery, such as tractors, trucks, and other equipment, if necessary to increase crop production.

Wickard said that the government was already rationing other materials, such as fuel, tires, and lubricants, and that it might have to ration farm machinery if the situation worsened.

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Second Test Of New Air Raid Siren Will Be More Complete

Sanford's new air raid siren, which was tested for the first time last Wednesday, will be given another chance, so to speak, with the announcement this morning that the siren will be tested for an all day test some day next week.

H. James Gut, assistant chairman of the Civil Protection Division of the local Council, stated he will ask the Defense Council if the test may be conducted according to his present plans, which include a test of several hours with the machine being placed at several vantage points throughout the city.

Reports conflicted on the recent testing of the siren, which was hung under the water tower.

In some cases, statements were received from people as far as six miles away who said they could hear the blast, while others, who were but a mile away, declared it could not be heard.

Noise in the downtown area drowned out the siren tones in many cases during the recent test, it was stated.

"Every town has its own problems," Mr. Gut said, "and they will have to be worked out. The general opinion is that the siren is not satisfactory from its present location, although it was a bad day when we blew it, and this possibly could have affected the sound."

"However, we haven't given up on it yet," he added, "I hope we can try an all day test some time next week from different points in the city. Then we will know more about it."

Public Interest In Local Politics Reaches New Low

Public interest in local politics has reached a new low. In spite of the fact that the last day for candidates to qualify for the May 5 primary is only a little more than a month away, not one single candidate has yet announced for local office.

Two years ago on this date six different men had announced their candidacies for one seat on the County Commission. Nearly a hundred candidates in 1940 had qualified for the various offices which were to be voted upon in the Spring.

Jap Convoy Is Said Heading for Australia As Philippine Invaders Settle For Siege

American Troops Occupy Curacao-Aruba Islands

This action was by request of the Netherlands Government who asked our protection for their rich oil fields at Curacao and Aruba against a possible grab by the Axis Powers. Curacao and Aruba are islands in the Dutch West Indies off the coast of Venezuela.

Nipponeese Drive Toward Burma Road As Chinese Reinforcements Arrive

LONDON, Burma, Feb. 14.—An army commander, a source today that after two days of heavy fighting in the I-pan area action has slackened along the whole front. The source said that the Japanese are attempting to break the Salween River line.

The Melbourne radio reported a number of Japanese warships and supply vessels were sighted off the New Britain Islands today. A thrust is believed aimed at Cape York on the Australian mainland.

The Nipponese renewed their drive toward the Burma Road attacking in the Pan area, north of Mataban, as thousands of Chinese reinforcements poured in to bolster its defense.

Japanese parachute troops were dropped in a large scale attack on Pelenbang, the vital strategic air center today. The Dutch said they saw 1000 of the air-borne enemy by the dozens. The British disclosed Imperial reinforcements, had landed at Java.

In Washington, heavy artillery shelling on the Bataan peninsula in the Philippines and the resumption of the Japanese siege-firing on Corregidor fortifications were reported by the War Department.

On the Bataan fighting front the Department said the enemy is entrenching in some sections. This might mean the Japanese are settling down to a long siege of the fortress. The Japanese have been obliged to take few precautions against attacks by the defenders. Little of the enemy's air force, however, is in the Philippines. The Japanese must be continuously on the alert against enemy bombers, and quick to take cover in foxholes and camouflaged shelters.

Miggins Reveals Production Plan For Business Men

Companies Affected By Priorities May Secure Materials

A modified production requirements plan has been received by the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce designed to aid small business manufacturers, Edward Higgins, secretary, revealed today.

Anyone interested in securing material under this program may apply to the local Chamber of Commerce, and the matter will be taken up with the Small Business Section of the War Production Board at Washington.

The plan as received from the Chamber of Commerce of the United States follows: 1. Any manufacturer whose annual volume was less than \$100,000 in 1941 whether or not he is engaged in war production may make application for priorities assistance.

2. Consideration will be given to (a) the importance of the product to the war program or the national welfare; and (b) the fact that the release of a small quantity of scarce materials may help maintain employment or free available materials now tied up.

The applicant must fill out a form (PD-25-X) on which priorities assistance will be requested for the purchase of scarce materials as specified by the War Production Board (Materials List No. 2).

Report On County Water Systems Is Satisfactory

Reports from State laboratory on 16 samples of water in Seminole County, sent in by S. M. Rogers, county sanitary engineer, disclosed the general condition of water supplies was satisfactory.

Mrs. Rogers disclosed today. A check was said to have been made of public water systems in the county for the purpose of drawing up plans for their protection should an emergency arise.

Mr. Rogers stated, however, that the water supply is not as good as it used to be. The water is now being drawn from the Suwannee River, which is a long distance from the county seat.

T. W. Miller, district sanitary officer, paid a routine visit here recently and discussed with Mr. Rogers the sanitary problems in the county. Information on any question concerning sanitation can be obtained at the office of the Health Unit by any Seminole County resident, Mr. Rogers added.

Senator Brewster told interviewers: "I know Donald Nelson and his associates in the War Production Board are far from satisfied with the way delivery of Congress. James H. Doolittle has handled the synthetic rubber situation."

Senator Brewster said that the rubber situation is a serious one. The United States is dependent on foreign sources for rubber, and the Japanese have cut off our supply.

He said that the War Production Board is not doing enough to increase the production of synthetic rubber. He called for a more aggressive approach to the problem.

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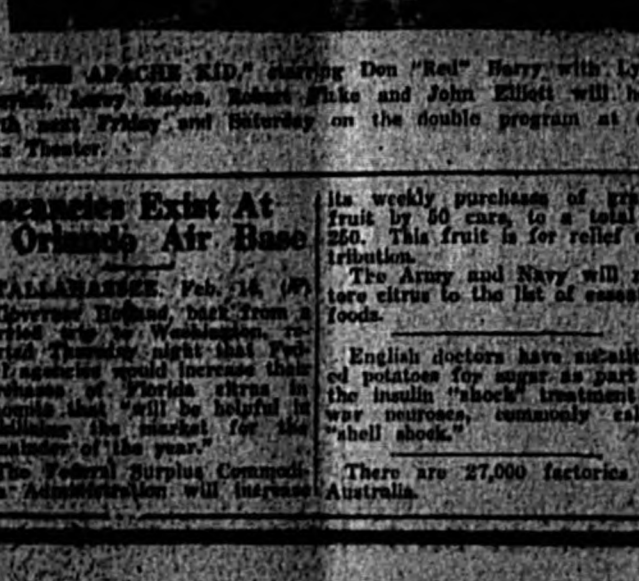
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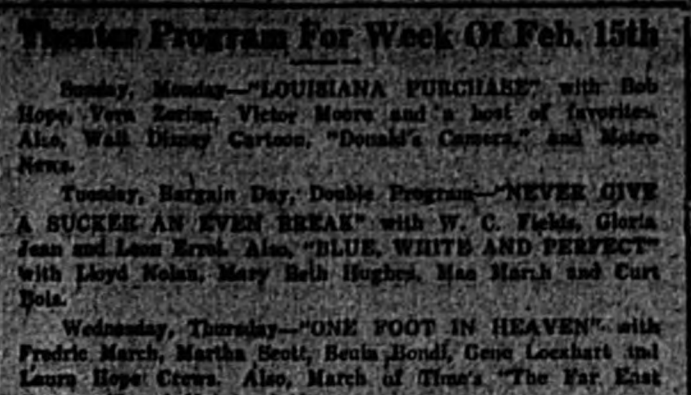
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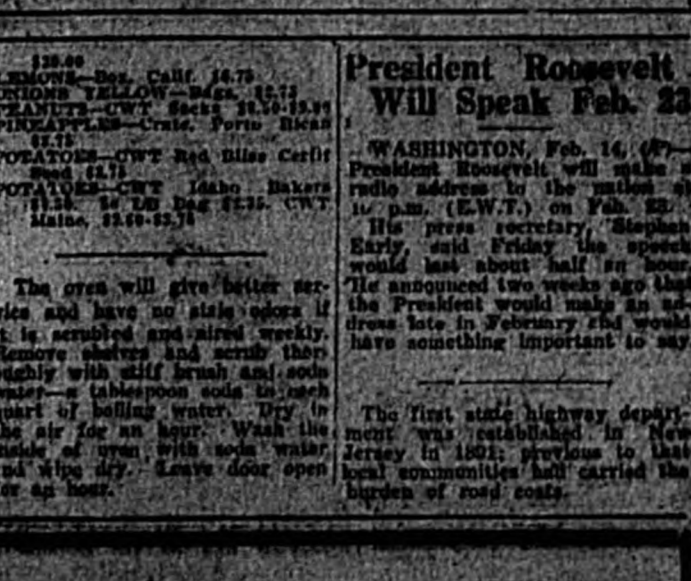
