

Almost All Major Crimes In Nation 'Pulled' By Thugs

Hoover Tells Of Bad Effects Of Parole System Now Used

WASHINGTON, June 21.—(AP)—In more than two-score crimes, including 37 kidnap cases, that have attracted national attention in the last three years, the criminals sought almost invariably had prison records showing no motions suspended sentences, paroles or jailbreaks, Department of Justice agents say.

In almost every case, when names of the principals were learned by college trained federal investigators through fingerprints, ransom money or confessions, they were found among the millions of criminal records on file here.

Recently an ordinary appearing young woman in a boudoir dress handed the check of a popular price store in all Lake City, Utah, a banknote. The serial numbers on the bill matched one on a list of men had prepared on the Weyerhaeuser Kidnapping case.

Within a few hours the nation knew the names of the two men who allegedly had sold a woman bailed \$5,000 to back up the safety of his home for \$200,000 and that both are Harry D. Waley, 38, and William Mahan, 32, were former convicts who had been paroled.

Waley in the course of his

the kidnapping had received sentences that could have kept him in jail 48 years, says J. Edgar Hoover, chief of the federal division of investigation of the Department of Justice.

Mahan, wanted before the kidnapping for a bank robbery in the same state, Washington, had been sent to prison twice for 24 years and freed both times.

Four of the so-called "G-men" on the trail of known hoodlums have paid with their lives in the last two years, and each time the criminal who handled the death dealing machine gun had been given his freedom by parole or executive clemency, Hoover says.

"Baby Face" Nelson, whose gun belched death for Agent Carter W. Baum at the Little Bohemia resort in Wisconsin and Agents Samuel P. Cowley and Herman E. Hollis later in the "Bloody Battle of Barrington, Ill." when the misnamed "Baby Face" also suffered fatal wounds,

Hoover said the records of most of the other 22 in this gang were similar. Bulletins from straight shooting "G-men" stopped three of them, Russell Gibson in Chicago and "Ma" and Fred Barker in Florida.

Hoodlums with suspended sentences and paroles or jailbreaking records were credited by federal agents with the bloody Kansas City, Mo., train station massacre.

Roosevelt Will to Outdo Old Canute's Idea

On Maine Coast Will Be Harnessed Make Electricity

PORT, Me., June 21.—President Roosevelt is just about to have a long-considered King Canute see

The general principle is simple. You build a series of dams across all the inlets from Bay of Fundy into Cobscook Bay. The inner basin inside the dam, is to be maintained at or near low tide levels. There are gates and a power house in the main dam.

The tide starts to rise in the sea and the Bay of Fundy. But the dam prevents its usual rush into Cobscook Bay. Pretty soon it is five feet higher outside than inside the dam. With the vast volume of water, that is enough to generate power as you let the water drop from the outside level to that inside the dam.

The water outside continues to rise to a mean level of 18 feet, then begins to subside as the tide falls. But it continues to be higher than the inside level until toward the end of the falling process, for the bay inside has risen only two or three feet from the water passing into it through the generators.

When the outside level falls even with that inside, the gates are opened, and both levels fall together to the low tide point. Then the process is repeated.
