

Pre-Operation Diet Proposed For Fat Patient

PHILADELPHIA (UPI) — Fat patients should be put on a diet a month or more before surgery, unless the operation is urgent, a prominent anesthesiologist recommended today.

Dr. Alred Catenacci, head of the anesthesiology section at Hahnemann Medical College, told 40 physicians that unless urgency is a major factor "obesity should be considered the prime disease, rather than the condition requiring surgery."

Catenacci emphasized strongly in a panel discussion that surgical patients 25 per cent or more overweight should lose a considerable amount before surgery.

"If time is not a factor, and from 60 to 70 per cent of all operations can be done more or less at the convenience of patient and physician, the obese patient will fare better without some of the excess fat," he said.

"No matter how skillful the anesthesiologist is, his skill is taxed to the limit. It is more difficult to find the vein in an obese arm to start an infusion. It is very difficult to find the spine through the fat for a spinal anesthesia."

Special Act Is Cited

County Judge Vernon Miss Wednesday afternoon dismissed the case against North Orlando Mayor Frank Fasula on charges of failure to open the books and records to the citizens of the town.

The charges were dropped, according to County Prosecuting Attorney Karyl Housholder because the legislative act under which Fasula was charged is "contrary" to the provisions of a special act passed in 1959.

The case is the outgrowth of a series of mass meetings and personal differences between W. W. Anderson, town treasurer, and the mayor, who Anderson alleged refused to release the town books and checkbook to Anderson's custody.

At a series of mass meetings held last summer, Anderson claimed he and his

wise had received numerous anonymous telephone calls of a threatening nature, and at one gathering Anderson displayed a large piece of cloth on which was printed a threat to the life of his daughter.

As a result of these threats, Anderson had a warrant issued for the arrest of Fasula under Florida Statute 165, the general legislation covering the incorporation of municipalities which stipulates that all town books are to be turned over to the treasurer, and failure to do so constitutes a misdemeanor.

Fasula, when informed of the preliminary hearing on the charge against Fasula, Cleveland cited that the Special Act of 1959 creating the Village of North Orlando contains in Article 3, Section 13, of its charter a provision for charges to be made against any town official or officer

of the village of North Orlando before the Town Council and sets forth a full and complete procedure for the Town Council to hold a trial of any charges brought against any official or officer of the village and to determine the guilt or innocence of any such person and provide a penalty if such person should be found guilty.

The General Legislative Act under which Fasula was charged is contrary to the provisions of the Special Legislative Act and where this occurs it is the law that the Special Act shall control and be the deciding factor. In view of this and since there is a provision provided in the Special Act, the charge pending against Fasula in the County Judge's Court must of necessity be dismissed.

Soviet Working Again In Congo

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Soviet Union, which was rebuffed in an attempt to put Russian military and economic groups in the Congo in 1960, seems to be waiting in the wings for another try.

And, not entirely content with waiting, it appears to be working behind the scenes to encourage the downfall of central Congo Premier Cyrille Adoula, which could create the kind of vacuum the Communists like to fill.

The Soviet ambassador in the Congo is reported to have been making the rounds of Leopoldville, hinting at offers of military aid and generally behaving as though the time soon would be ripe for Soviet intervention.

Leftist deputies in the Congo parliament have teamed up with deputies representing the Conakat party of Katanga Premier Moïse Tshombe in an effort to topple Adoula.

Their line has been that Adoula, with Western and U. S. support, had been unable to unify the Congo and that stronger measures may be necessary.

The possibility of renewed Soviet designs on the Congo has been a major factor in President Kennedy's decision to increase U. S. military equipment aid to UN forces and to dispatch a military team to the Congo to survey equipment needs.

Police On Duty In North Orlando

North Orlando's police department has been reactivated and the town limits are being posted to forbid hunting in the village, it was announced today by Sgt. Bob Stephenson.

Patrolling of the town started Wednesday night and every effort will be made to prevent the shooting of firearms in the town, Stephenson said. He added that violators of the ordinance will be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law.

A speed limit of 35 miles per hour has been set for the Longwood-Oviedo Road and strict enforcement of this also is promised.

Tanker Crashes

NAHA, Okinawa (UPI) — A United States Air Force KB50 tanker plane crashed during a landing attempt at Kadana Air Force Base today, killing seven persons. Five of the victims were American crewmen and two were Okinawan civilians.

Tax Council Sets Up Request For Review Of Land

LAKELAND (UPI) — The Florida Agricultural Tax Council, a statewide non-profit group, will ask all county tax assessors to re-evaluate agricultural and horticultural lands in January in light of the severe economic damage from the freeze.

The group had its organizational meeting here Wednesday and elected Latimer H. Turner, Sarasota County cattleman, as president. Other officers are Thomas K. McClane Jr., of the Florida Farm Bureau Federation, vice president, and Frank D. Trevillion, Florida Citrus Mutual, secretary-treasurer.

The council was formed to try to obtain uniform and fair taxation of land used for agriculture and horticulture.

"Loss of our crops and damage to agricultural land throughout the state will have a far-reaching adverse effect on Florida's entire business and financial community," Turner said.

Cities Planning Apportion Battle

TAMPA (UPI) — A committee of representatives from urban areas of the state will formulate plans for a fight for better state apportionment led by municipalities.

The committee, with St. Petersburg Mayor Herman Golden as chairman, was named here Wednesday at the organizational meeting of a mayors conference on apportionment.

Freeing Prisoners Appears Set

HAVANA (UPI) — New York Attorney James B. Donovan returned to Havana today with two unidentified companions, apparently to put the finishing touches to the Cuban invasion prisoners exchange deal.

Havana radio indicated today that negotiations will be successful soon for the release of 1,113 prisoners of the Bay of Pigs invasion of Cuba in April 1961.

In a broadcast heard here, the radio said that "officials of the revolutionary government and members of the committee who have come to Havana, headed by American lawyer James P. Donovan, renewed negotiations for the liberation of the 'mercenaries' of Playa Giron."

"Everything seems to indicate," the broadcast said, "from reports gathered, that the indemnification demanded by the revolutionary courts, made up of clinical and medical equipment, will be positive shortly."

Donovan slipped into Miami International Airport Wednesday night after announcing in Havana he had received Castro's answer regarding the release of the men captured 19 months ago in the abortive Bay of Pigs invasion.

In Havana, a relative of the prisoners said they might be freed at any moment, although it probably will be early next week before they are released.

Chamber Supports Orlando Jet Port

A resolution to support the establishment of a jetport facility for Central Florida at McCoy AFB, was adopted by the executive committee of the Seminole County Chamber of Commerce Wednesday.

The meeting was a follow-up to the Orlando meeting Tuesday attended by chamber president Richard Deas, Clifford McKibbin, Merle Warner and manager John Kridler at which Orlando Mayor Robert Carr explained the need and the opportunity to expand the terminal facilities at McCoy currently being used by two airlines to provide jet service from Orlando to the West and Southwest.

It was claimed that there is no other location feasible because of the amount of traffic originating in the Orlando area for the jet service currently offered and if the available service was expanded the traffic would be greater.

The support of the local group was asked because a check revealed that last year over 3,000 Seminole County residents used the jet planes out of McCoy.

It was brought out during the discussion that a facility equal to the McCoy base could not be duplicated for less than several hundreds of millions of dollars, and the Air Force command is co-operating to the utmost to fill the needs of the area in providing space and facilities for the jet service.

The citizen's prospects naturally improve when wider circles are drawn. In the United States the ratio is 1 in 100. But in the Pacific states as a group it drops to 1 in 60 and in certain states it is 1 in 46.

This is just one way the FBI measures the impact on the average citizen of today's great and continuing rise in major crime.

The periodic evidence of that upward spiral is duly recorded by the FBI. The latest report shows U. S. crime for nine months of 1962 8 per cent higher than the same period in 1961.

Yes the long-range look tells better what is happening. From 1940 through 1961, the climb in serious U. S. crime was 170 per cent, though population in the same span was rising just 38 per cent.

Much has long been made of the enlarging role youthful offenders play in these increases. Individuals under 18 commit two of every five serious crimes. Most staggering is the fact that last year children under 15 committed 32,000 burglaries and 62,000 larcenies. The latter total was nearly four times that in the 25-29 age bracket.

Some students of crime, law enforcement specialists and psychologists argue that the well remarked increases are more apparent than real. A point frequently stressed is that reporting and tabulation of crime is far more complete and accurate than it used to be.

While conceding the point, FBI authorities question whether it goes very far toward explaining the crime rise. They put a finger on two

big historical changes—the steady growth of urban centers, with resulting heightened population density, and the social instability arising from the constant movements of people from farm to city, city to city and state to state.

In the view of government criminal experts, these changes are creating conditions for crime which never existed in similar measure before.

An important element in these conditions is opportunity, and present-day U. S. urban life offers magnificent opportunity.

There are more people tightly packed together today, and they can be victimized in crimes against the person. The rise in street assaults and robberies shows this opportunity is being seized.

Likewise, in this affluent country, material standards are still going up. Consequently there is more money and more jewelry, furs, cars, television sets, cameras and other goods to offer temptation.

This abundance, spread from city centers out to swelling suburbs, is too great for any police force to keep close watch upon. FBI men say, too, that many of these tempting prizes are carelessly guarded by their citizen owners.

The agency notes, for example, sharp increases in thefts from parked cars, from residences left unlocked, from shops which know the peril of "lifting." If big banks today are hard to crack, the swiftly multiplying suburban branch banks and savings and loan offices are vulnerable targets. Their safeguards are limited.

Even if these attractions were not steadily proliferating, FBI officials suggest crime rates would be sharply up. Here they turn to the cited social instability, the parental breakdown, the breakdown of neighborhood controls, interracial conflict, the city-ward rush of rural folk ill-equipped to live and hold jobs in the complex urban centers.

The net of all this, it is argued, is to heighten the urge to crime at a period in history when the prospect of acting upon the urge is maximized by the nation's unparalleled growth.

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Shakespeare, they say, had a word for everything.

Earlier this month, I received a letter from Willie, the senatorial hand to show how he might have "it about the tax cut issue soon to come before Congress.

Since then I have been glancing through his works on the subject for quotations that might be applied to the Christmas shopping. I found some on almost every page.

The phrase "brisk and giddy-paced times" sums up the season quite nicely although it may be a trifle on the conservative side. The British, you know, are prone to understatement.

I thought Shakespeare was in better form with a line that describes my wife's appearance when she comes home from a shopping trip:

"How like the prodigal doth she return, with overweather'd ribs and ragged sails."

My wife, I might add, is aware that "all that glitters is not gold." She is no snapper-up of unconsidered trifles. As a shopper, her Shakespearean motto is "let every eye negotiate for itself and trust no one."

But anyone who has encountered the "many-headed multitude" in a department store cannot help but wish "that this too too solid flesh would melt, thaw and resolve itself into a dew."

I went out once to get my wife a gift, but the expedition resulted in "a beggarly account of empty boxes." The exclaiming "a horse! a horse! my kingdom for a horse."

After 30 minutes of looking for a parking place, I said to myself "let us make an honorable retreat." I figure "I were better to be slain to death with a rust than to be covered to nothing with perpetual motion."

Rather than make a second attempt — "what! would thou have a serpent sting thee twice? — I let Shakespeare solve the problem for me. His gift suggestion "sweets to the sweet."

"I stopped by a neighborhood drug store and bought her a box of candy. It is not only the crowds and traffic that overpower me. I object to the "straining harsh discords and unpleasing sharps" of recorded Christmas carols. "That way madness lies."

To me they sound like "the vile squeaking of the wry-necked fife." I agree with the Shakespearean assertion that "silence is the perfect herald of joy."

As for my own voice, "I have lost it with hallooing and singing of anthems." Which leaves me with just enough breath to say with Shakespeare "enough, with ever-measure."

Bryant Says He's Desperate For Apportion

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Farris Bryant said Thursday he's desperate for a solution to the reapportionment problem — and said chances are "pretty good" for another special session next month on the subject.

The governor told his news conference he was desperate—but not desperate enough to call a special session without "fairly strong assurance" of success.

And, although he said he doesn't have such assurance now, he commented "We are closer to it than I thought we would be at this time."

Bryant said he hoped to get from the Legislature both a statute to carry through the 1963 session convening next April and a companion constitutional amendment that would go before the people in 1964.

"But if we can get the votes for a constitutional amendment, I'll settle for just the statute," he said.

Representatives of seven of the state's largest cities agreed Wednesday to fight in court any attempt to bypass the people and reapportion the state.

"If they do this, they will have a heavy responsibility on them if we come to April without a valid Legislature," Bryant told his news conference.

The governor said he is prepared to go on television and warn the old folk and the teachers that the Legislature's failure to reapportion could jeopardize their welfare checks and salaries after the present appropriations act expires June 30.

HAVANA (UPI) — New York attorney James E. Donovan put finishing touches today on lists of medicines, drugs and food offered in exchange for 1,113 imprisoned Cuban invaders.

Longhairs in the Florida city were working around the clock leading the freighter African Pilot with goods which have been piling in by truck and plane.

Although Cuban refugees in Miami hoped the captives would be freed on or before Christmas Day, their relatives here said it is unlikely they will be out of prison much before New Year's "unless a miracle occurs."

The relatives of the prisoners said negotiations for their release have been completed and nothing remains to be expected but the "big announcement" of Castro's agreement.

Tito Goes Home

MOSCOW (UPI) — Yugoslav President Tito ended his Soviet "vacation" today and headed home, apparently with Premier Nikita Khrushchev's promise of more Soviet aid and political co-operation.

Still Blasting

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Soviet Union set off another nuclear device Thursday in the atmosphere at its Arctic test site. The U. S. Atomic Energy Commission said the blast was low-yield, the equivalent of less than 20,000 tons of TNT.

Satellite Dies

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Navy's new Transit 1A navigational satellite has gone dead, apparently because of trouble in its power supply, the Defense Department announced Thursday. The satellite was launched Tuesday from Point Arguello, Calif.

More Job Funds

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Negotiators, working under a weekend strike deadline and appeals by Labor Secretary W. Willard Wirtz, resumed talks today in the maritime dispute that threatens shipping from Maine to Texas. Wirtz has warned the walk-out could "cripple the country."

Controls Refused

GENEVA (UPI) — The Western powers will refuse to join any controlled moratorium on nuclear testing no matter what Russia does during the Christmas recess of the disarmament conference, it was learned today. The 17-nation conference went in recess Thursday until Jan. 15.

Reports Doubted

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Sen. Kenneth E. Keating, (R-N.Y.), said Thursday night he was not satisfied that all Soviet offensive missiles had been removed from Cuba. Keating said that he felt there was an "excessive amount" of Soviet arms and men in Cuba and "guns, tanks and MIG planes are still coming in — this past week."

Injuries Fatal To Oviedo Man

J. W. Bedenbaugh, 62, died Wednesday from injuries received in an automobile accident near St. Cloud when he ran into the back of another truck in the fog.

Bedenbaugh was born April 2, 1900, in Americus Ga., and had been a resident of Oviedo for 34 years. He was a wholesale flower grower and distributor and a member of the Baptist Church.

He is survived by his widow, Mrs. Viola Bedenbaugh; one daughter, Mrs. Frank Jones of Sanford; one sister, Mrs. L. E. Bland of Orlando and several nieces and nephews. Services and burial will be held at the Oviedo Cemetery at 2 p. m. Saturday, with Brinson Funeral Home in charge.

Board Backs Sarepta Drive

The County Commission today lent its support to the idea of public subscription of funds to assist the Sarepta Home in carrying on its work of caring for the aged. The commission has been unable to find a suitable solution to financing any program to help the home renovate its facilities to keep up with state licensing requirements or to expand.

The idea of a drive for volunteer contributions to a fund to give Sarepta a boost has been proposed by several individuals and organizations. Commissioner Verbal asked that the Sanford Herald be requested by the Commissioners to act as receiving and dispensing agent for donations for a Sarepta Home Improvement Fund, and led off with a personal donation of his own. Duma's recommendation, which was in the form of a motion to the board, was seconded and passed.

The Sarepta Home has been given moral support by the commission as the most reasonable and acceptable solution to the problem of providing a place to care for the aged and indigent of the county. The present county home has been condemned by the State Board of Health as being totally inadequate, due to the rigid and stringent requirements for homes for the aged recently passed by the state board.

Britain To Get Polaris As Big Weapon

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The Kennedy-Macmillan conference has come up with either a far-reaching shift in nuclear weapons policy or a face-saving compromise to an issue that had chilled Anglo-American relations.

Both claims will be heard. In advance of a communique expected today, spokesmen at Nassau revealed that Britain agreed to drop its interest in the experimental bomber-launched Skybolt missile and accept instead the proven submarine-launched Polaris.

It was not yet clear, however, just how Britain would use the Polaris. She has no means of employing it right now, whereas she does have jet bombers that could have carried Skybolt. It remained to be seen whether Polaris would be adapted for land-based launchers, surface ships or submarines yet to be built, and, if submarines, whether they would come from America or be built in Britain.

Beyond that the two government chiefs for the first time have drawn up a blue print for bringing France—and possibly other European nations in the future—into their nuclear club.

Kennedy planned to take off between 3 and 4 p. m. for Palm Beach, where he hoped to spend the Christmas holidays with his family. The big two conference, which began here with an informal meeting late Tuesday, covered a broad range of subjects but the major share of attention was devoted to Western defenses.

Stocks Higher

NEW YORK (UPI)—Stocks opened irregularly higher today in routine trading. Brokers believe that, in the light of Thursday's action, any further upside movement in the weeks ahead will not come as easily as in the first month and a half after the Cuban crisis.

Revocation Of License Asked

City Manager W. E. Knowles said today that he has instituted action to bar further activity in Sanford by an exterminating firm charged with questionable practices.

Two more cases were reported to Knowles this morning concerning the local operations of the Saxon Termite Control of Holly Hill.

The company has been doing exterminating work in Sanford and a number of local elderly people had to put mortgages on their homes, furniture and other property to pay for it. A number of the mortgages reportedly have been foreclosed and the property deeds picked up

when the people were unable to make demand payments. Knowles said today the company is now anxious "to have the heat taken off" and have made arrangements through a local attorney to have the deeds returned. He also said he was writing to the State Board of Health informing them of the unsatisfactory service rendered by the Saxon company and exorbitant charges made. He will ask that the state license of the firm be revoked on the basis of their actions in Sanford. The City Commission will

Holiday Is Gay, But Be Careful!

United Press International Americans begin observance of Christendom's most famous holiday tonight in gay spirits but with a grim warning that 150 may die in traffic accidents.

From a tiny church in the heart of Chicago's slums to jammed air terminals in San Francisco to a janitor in Erie, Pa., who plays Santa Claus every year, Americans prepared to celebrate the birth of the Baby Jesus.

There was a frenzied rush to buy last-minute presents and get of overlooked Christmas cards. And thousands upon thousands prepared to take to the highways to spend the long Christmas weekend with friends and loved ones.

The National Safety Council said between 650 and 750 persons could lose their lives in traffic accidents during the 102-hour period from 6 p. m. tonight until midnight Tuesday. From 27,000 to 30,000 could suffer injuries, the council said.

Machines Have Hallucinations

REDONDO BEACH, Calif. (UPI) — A machine suffering from hallucinations collapsed into hysteria Thursday and spewed out 1,600 plastic reindeer in front of a startled little boy.

The machine is supposed to ring bells, flash red and green lights and deliver one freshly made reindeer—all for a dime. "The points are set too fine and it gives the machines hallucinations," the owner said. "They think they're getting paid."

"And it's contagious," he added. "It's had calls on other machines, all making free reindeer like crazy."
