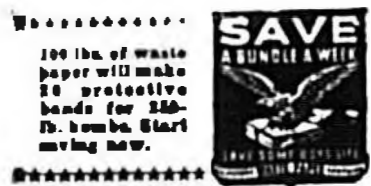

## Fire Department Pumps Out Scales At Farm Market

Members of the Fire Department Tuesday pumped out the pit of the fire scale at the Sanford State Market for the weighing of trucks and produce.

During the height of the storm the whole platform was under water, according to Market Manager J. J. Lehman. About two feet under the small shed that houses the Howe scales there is an electric pump and a system of pipes that normally carries off all the water from the platform.

The scale is a marvel of accuracy and balances as delicately as that of a pharmacist. It can handle a weight up to 40 tons, although 48,000 pounds is probably the maximum weight it has recorded. In event of a shiver, the boards of the platform may sink an several hundred pounds of extra weight, but the scale can be balanced to offset this, in fact is balanced every morning, according to Mr. Lehman.

### Sixty Thousand Strikers Prepare To Go Back To Work As 40,000 More Strike

WASHINGTON, June 29. (AP)—The War Department announced today that four thousand soldiers will be furnished for work on U. S. railroads "to prevent a breakdown of rail transportation" during the redeployment of troops to the Pacific.

A new crop of disputes broke out on the nation's labor front yesterday, spoiling an otherwise improved picture on the troubled labor scene. More than 60,000 of the 93,000 workers idling yesterday by strikes and work stoppages prepared to return to their jobs today. Over-shadowing the brighter side was the additional 40,000 mark.

Increased Airmail Volume Wipes Out Years Of Deficits

WASHINGTON, D. C. (Special)—In the last three years the domestic airmail of the United States has carried a great volume of airmail for the Post Office Department that has wiped out the deficit accumulated in the first quarter of a century of airmail operation, it is interesting to note from a report of the Air Transport Association.

While placing airmail in the enviable position of being a department of the Post Office operating in the black, the airlines have scaled down their carrying charges on a pound-mile basis until the rates are now only one-tenth of what they were in 1932.

Looking back, it is hard to believe that 28 years ago, in the first year of its existence, airmail amounted to only 18,000 pounds. Today the airlines, with their mail payloads, which amounted to 420,522,529, transported 870,000 pounds of airmail.

Congressmen Are Praised For Vote Against Tariff Cut

LAGAELAND, June 29 (Special)—The vote by the House of Representatives on Monday against cutting the tariff on vegetable products has won the acclaim of local vegetable growers.

It was pointed out that after years of effort and more than 100 different types of meetings, tariff commission hearings, congressional committee sessions, etc., a duty was imposed on foreign produced vegetables coming into the United States.

The growers in Florida know that Cuba and Mexico can produce a strong six grow in Florida and do it cheaper because of cheap labor, cheap transportation, little or no use of fertilizer, etc.

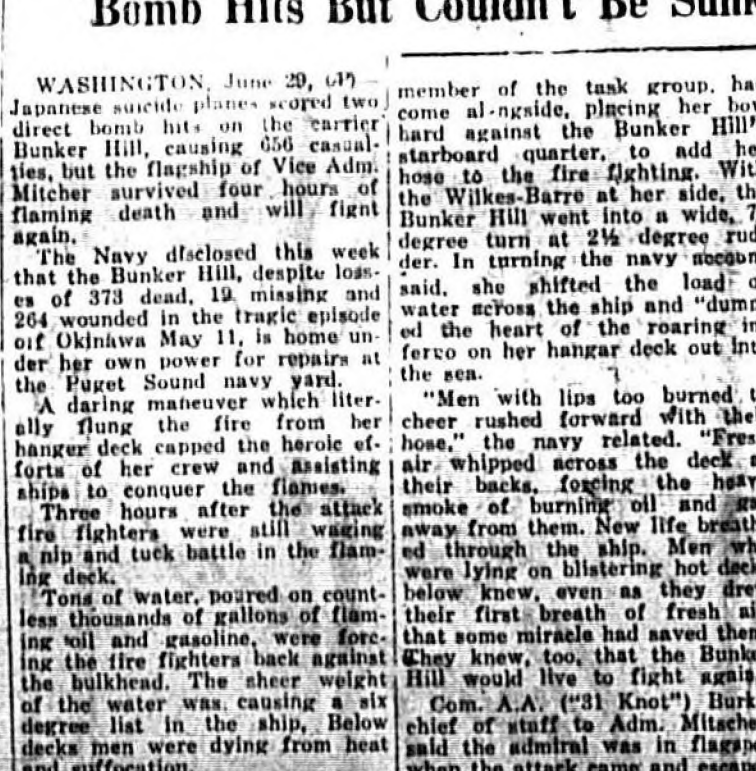

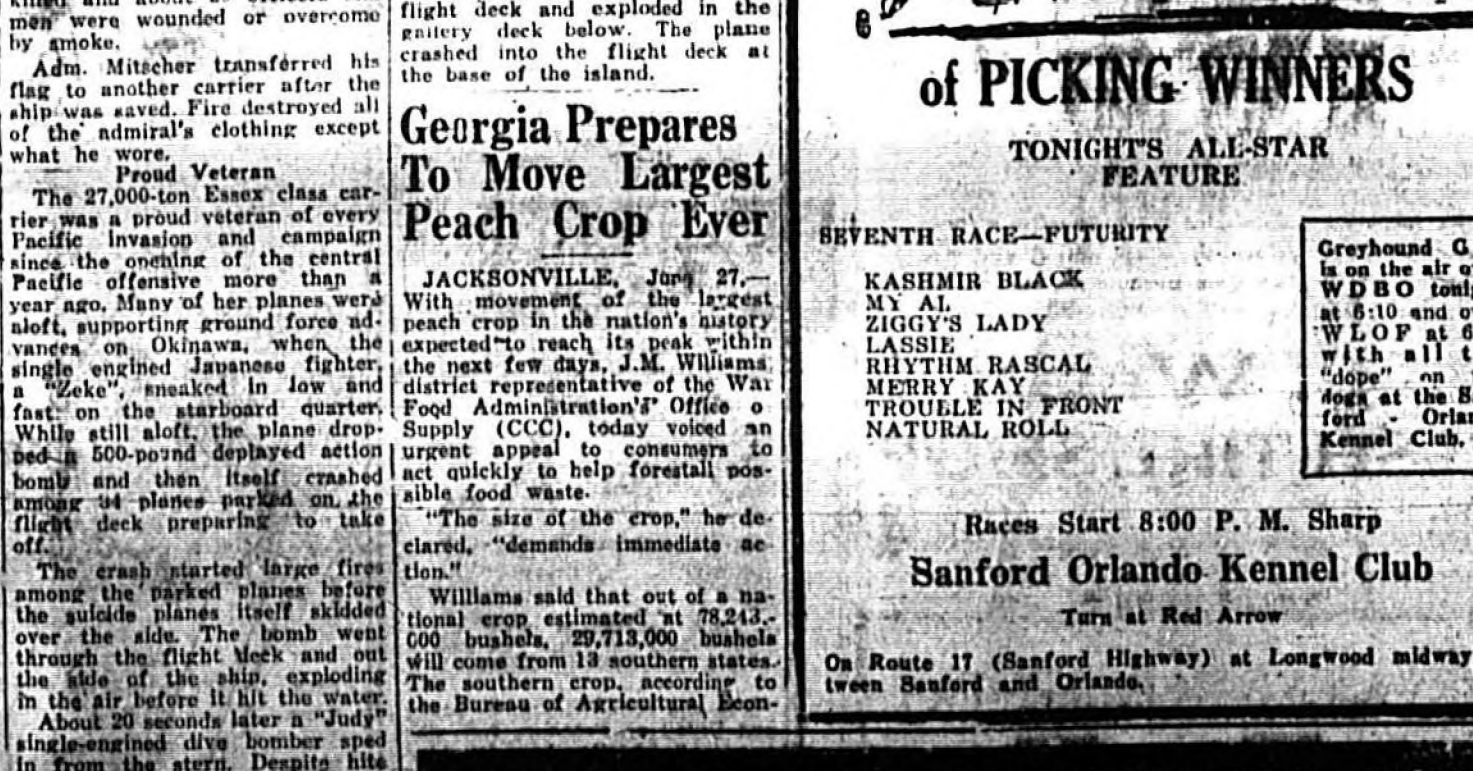

The picture, in direct contrast to the highly colored pictures in recent issues of national magazines, was painted by a special senate committee in the concise and factual report of its investigation of the national defense program.

The word "horse trader" is written into a chapter dealing with the acquisition of Miami Beach hotels by army agents. It is the story of the army's occupation of some 350 Miami Beach hotels and it is prefaced with this statement: "At the peak, Miami Beach alone accommodated 82,000 men in 349 hotels and apartment houses. The total annual cost, including rent, of these accommodations was \$20,000,000. Construction of a cantonment to accommodate this many men would have required at least six months and would have cost a minimum of \$100,000,000."

But, according to the report of the senate investigating committee, they waited in vain until March 14 "when the persons in charge of the army real estate program began efforts to acquire accommodations for 4,000 men by March 22, and 10,000 by April 15."

Lease Signed This, to the hotel owner, was somewhat more than "gradual" but negotiations got off to a shaky start. Within six days, 10 out of the 18 desired hotels were leased. Negotiations with the other six were slower. One hotel owner couldn't accept the price offered by the army because it wouldn't cover obligations. Two hinted that April 1 would be a better date to vacate than March 20. Three expressed a desire "to negotiate further as to price."

The story begins back in January, 1942. In Miami Beach, as in every American community, the anger engendered by Pearl Harbor was running high. The exciting news that the air corps might come to Miami Beach seeped out of an army request for a list of facilities available in Dade county. A month later the news became official. Then, during the week beginning Feb. 14, air corps representatives conferred with the hotel owners and found them willing to co-operate. From a practical standpoint the hotel owner was in a ticklish position. His hotel was full of guests with folding money in their pockets. On the other hand the war might blow the tourist business higher than a kite, and army rental might come in handy, indeed. Some of the owners frankly said that the financial difference between March 15 as an occupation date and April 1 was the difference between being in the red and in the black. But the air corps men said that notices would be given and that, anyway, the first stages of their program would be gradual.

Figuratively biting their nails, the hotel owners stipulated for the notice. But, according to the report of the senate investigating committee, they waited in vain until March 14 "when the persons in charge of the army real estate program began efforts to acquire accommodations for 4,000 men by March 22, and 10,000 by April 15."

It is in this hurried atmosphere that Uncle Sam, as embodied in army representatives emerges as a horse trader without peer. The dry and factual record, duly set down in a book entitled, "additional report of the special committee investigating the national defense program," states that the army air forces took the position that because a few owners had attempted to negotiate with them, the training program was being thwarted. "Military Secrecy" Army appraisers did their appraisal on the basis that rental value would be lowered by the war. They took off for furnishings; they subtracted for public space, like lobbies. They calculated on a yearly basis in spite of the fact that the army had a 30-day cancellation clause. Army representatives refused to discuss with owners the basis of their rental offers. They talked to financial owners about "military secrecy." They talked "glibly of blocking" roads to hotels that didn't co-operate, they hinted of long delays and pointed out that claims from the first world war were still pending. "We negotiated for a fixed number of occupants, and then doubled

Keeping Weeds Cut Called Aid To Hay Fever Sufferers

JACKSONVILLE, June 27. (Special) An appeal to its sanitary and health efforts to operate as far as possible with local clean up methods groups was issued by the State Board of Health. Dr. George Dams, director of local health services, pointed out that various weeds growing on vacant lots, crab grass, and others such as hayfever and other complications. He asked that local health personnel work as much as possible with property owners, contractors and municipalities in campaigns to eradicate these nuisances. "We usually think of public health in connection with communicable diseases, but actually anything that affects a community to the extent that it is a problem of such and every citizen and public minded group. "Actually, allergic diseases do not materially affect our mortality rate, but the important factor for the play in morbidity is tremendous. There is a great loss of time and a heavy economic toll on the part of the wage earner, while industry suffers from absenteeism at a time when manpower cannot be spared.
