High finance is in the headlines  
 these days. We just voted to give  
 India a couple of hundred million  
 dollars worth of wheat; today we  
 read that a record tax boost  
 measure has been cleared by a  
 House group; and our share of  
 aid to Tito's regime has been set  
 at 65 percent of \$200,000,000.  
 We wonder if all this has anything  
 to do with the big bargain in  
 aspirin tablets in New York where  
 you can buy a hundred for four  
 and a half cents.

Almost anyone can come up  
 with an answer for the main cause  
 of accidents on our highways. It  
 usually is too much liquor, fast  
 driving, slow driving, faulty  
 brakes, passing a car on a hill or  
 a curve of fading to stop at a  
 "stop sign." Besides the one main  
 factor of not being naturally  
 skilful we can think of no more  
 important contributory factor than  
 the personality element, namely  
 selfishness and rudeness and a  
 bad temper. Many times we have  
 seen drivers bearing that mean  
 look, acting as if they owned the  
 entire road and at times yelling  
 invectives at passing motorists or  
 pedestrians. A person driving a  
 car in this state of mind is a  
 deadly menace.

President Truman strikes out  
 at our inflationary trend, blaming  
 it all on lobbyists and stating that  
 if things keep on as they are  
 going we will be handing Russia  
 the "easiest victory the Kremlin  
 could ask for." What the Chief  
 Executive doesn't say is that the  
 government itself is responsible  
 for the very inflation about which  
 he complains. Throughout its  
 entire tenure the present party in  
 power has spent money so freely  
 that as of the present time our  
 national debt is around 300 billion  
 dollars, a debt which can only be  
 sustained by inflationary policies.  
 This the President well knows and  
 he also knows that any de-  
 flationary trend in the country  
 could be countered by some  
 governmental action such as  
 raising water in the milk,  
 which in the end would be  
 harmful to our economic system.

Helpful Initiation

There is growing favor of the idea of doing something constructive with the final testing period for the pledges of college fraternities and sororities. This is the period commonly known as "hell week," during which life is made as miserable and tortured as possible for the pledges, presumably on the theory that thus it will be determined whether they have sufficient fortitude to become worthy members of the organization.

A few fraternities and sororities have abandoned the traditional form of hell week in favor of a period of work which will do someone some good. For this last period before final acceptance and initiation, the pledges are assigned to work in hospitals, park development or some other project where their labors will produce something worth while. This may be as good a testing as the older way. Some of the drudge work in a hospital, for example, is just as wearing and soul-testing as the most fiendish artificial ordeals a group of upperclassmen can devise.

A program of back-bending work may lack the glamour of hell week, but it can yield a sense of accomplishment which mere endurance of misery can never offer.

Nisei Fighters

One of the most deserved tributes ever paid by the motion picture industry is that of the movie "Go For Broke" which honors the 442nd Regimental Combat Team of the Army. The movie must stand or fall, of course, on its merits as entertainment, but the idea of recognizing the heroism of this team of Americans is praiseworthy.

The 442nd was made up of Japanese-Americans. It took part in some of the bitterest and bloodiest fighting of World War II and won the praise of the entire country. After Pearl Harbor many people held unreasoned prejudices against all Japanese, and these men were determined that they would demonstrate that Nisei citizens were worthy of respect and admiration. The great number of Purple Hearts and other military decorations won by this group did much to dispel the general prejudice against the Japanese in this country.

It is important to remember that Americans may vary in physical appearance and in many other ways, and be no less Americans. It is also good to know that essentially they are the same when courage, devotion and service to their country are considered.

Modern Rainmaker

Although the practices of voodoo and witchcraft have fallen into disfavor in most parts of the civilized world, there are still certain rites which if performed faithfully seem to produce certain effects. Since man first turned to planting seed and cultivating the earth, as a surer means of getting food than depending on wild fruit and berries, the problem of getting rain at the proper time has troubled him.

Rain gods have played an important part in the primitive religions, and methods of pleasing these idols have varied from human sacrifices to less extreme ceremonies. Modern man in his highly industrialized life has unwittingly created a rainmaker which seems to be far more effective than those used by his cave-dwelling ancestors. He calls it an automobile.

The actual rainmaking ceremony entails more than ownership of this oversized charm. A sponge, a bucket of water, a can of automobile wax and various other articles of equipment are needed in the performance of the rites. But as surely as man garbs himself in old clothes and goes through the washing ritual, rain will follow.

reception and people poured into the city streets after it had looked as though the turn-out would be only 100,000 or less. MacArthur declared that if the heroes of the Alamo—the 187 men who died in the Texas revolution—and others like them had lost their spirit then "liberty would long ago have perished."

The General has charged in earlier Texas speeches that he has become alarmed over the spread of fear throughout the country by "insidious forces" waging a campaign to pervert the truth and confuse the people. On this theme he said: "Let us, therefore, beware of a dangerous tendency assiduously propagandized to under-rate our own strength and to over-rate that of others. Let us have the courage and faith of the Alamo."

"I know of nothing more inspiring than to witness the clear demonstration I have seen since my return that the mass of American people do not support false concepts: That they still cherish the fundamental ideals which built this great country, still harbor within themselves the self-reliance and invincibility which has been ours and our fathers since the independence of the republic was proclaimed."

Then MacArthur lashed out again at the Truman Administration with which he has tilted since President Truman ousted him from his far-eastern command last April. He said: "What, I have been asked, is

### Scholarship Offer To FSU Accepted By Sonny Powell

TALLAHASSEE, June 15—(Special)—Sonny Powell, outstanding player on Jackson High School of Jacksonville's State championship basketball team this past season, has accepted a scholarship offer from Florida State University, Florida State Coach Bud Kennedy, who made the announcement today, said that Powell would enroll in September.

The agreement with Powell brings to three the number of Florida high school seniors who plan to attend Florida State next year on basketball scholarships. The other two are Dick Benson of Maitland and Billy Cost of Fort Lauderdale, both first prospects.
