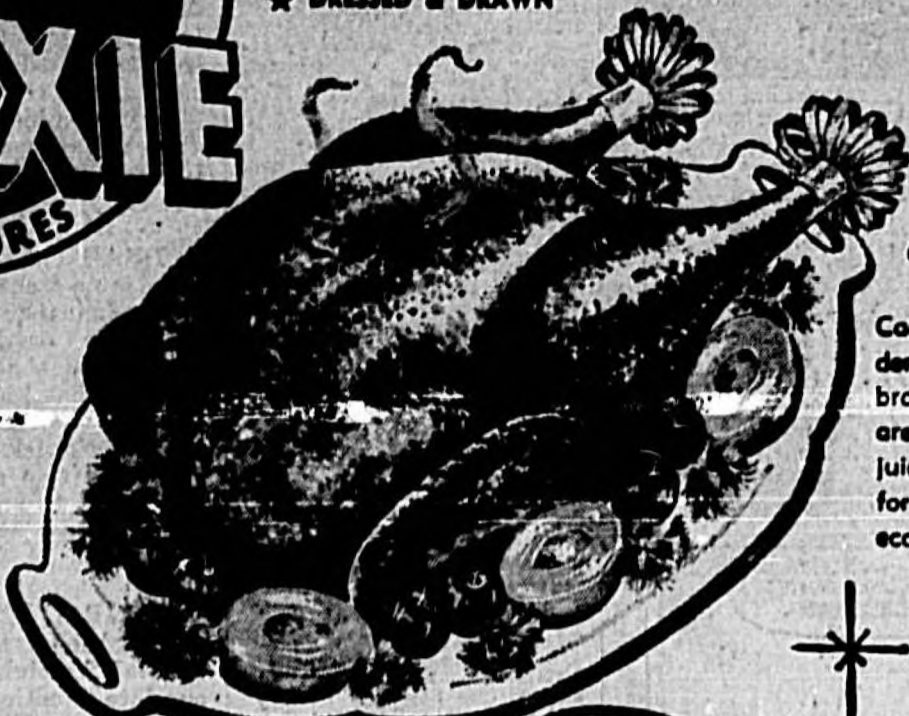

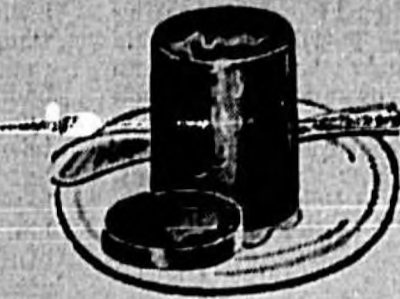

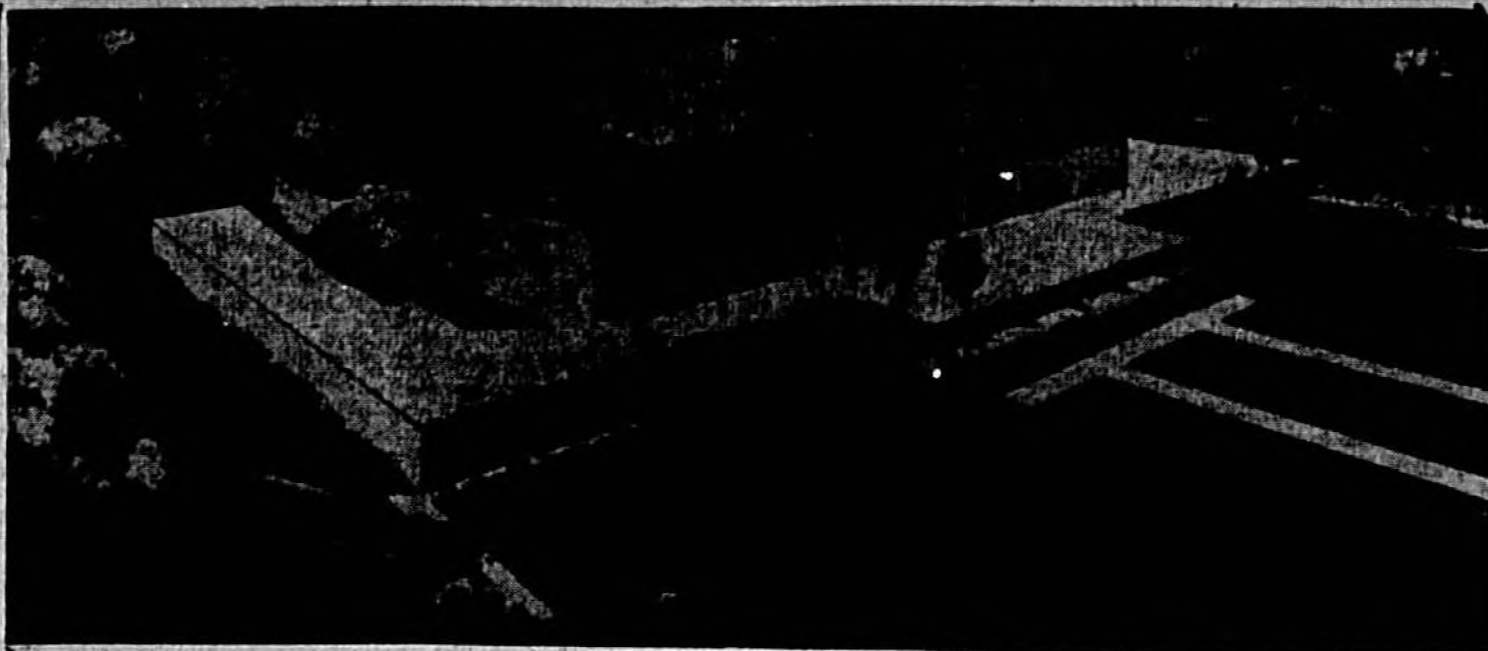
### UAW Plans New Contract Move

DETROIT (UPI) — The United Auto Workers tried Wednesday to win American Motors as a lever to buy new contract concessions from the industry's Big Three companies which already have handed the union package offers they priced at nearly \$700 million.

This was seen as the reason behind a decision by UAW President Walter P. Reuther to ignore new

contract negotiations at General Motors, Ford and Chrysler and concentrate instead on AMC.

The Big Three—with contracts expiring in eight days—presented their first economic offers to the union Tuesday. Industry statisticians pegged the total cost at \$685 million, but the UAW called the proposals "totally inadequate" and all but rejected them outright.

### Spade Cooley Gets Life In Jail

BAKERSFIELD, Calif. (UPI) — Former western music star Donnell (Spade) Cooley, who used to be Roy Rogers' stand-in and arranger, was sentenced to life in prison Tuesday for the fatal beating of his wife.

Superior Judge William L. Bradshaw set the penalty following Cooley's withdrawal of an innocent by reason of insanity plea. Spade also waived the jury hearing on penalty.

Under California law, the 50-year-old Cooley will be eligible for parole in late summer of 1968. He was convicted Saturday of first-degree murder in the death April 3 of his wife Ella May, 37. The prosecution had charged he beat, stamped and burned her with cigarettes on the night she died at their Willow Springs ranch home.

Pete Carlson swam the backstroke in the 200 yard relay and finished second in the 100 yard freestyle. Darwin Shea, swam breast-stroke in the relay and did well in the 50 yard backstroke.

David Martin swam the freestyle in the relay and the 200 yard breast-stroke. Mike Thompson, fourth member of the team, did the side-stroke and also entered the 50 yard free-style.

The boys also participated in the 200 yard free-style relay. This was the first time in swimming competition for the Casseberry Scouts, who placed fifth in the senior division and received a yellow ribbon.

### FAA Boss Denies He's Quitting

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Federal Aviation Administrator Najeeb E. Halaby today found himself exposed to the Washington illness known as "resignation rumors."

It is a disease that is never fatal but can be embarrassing to public officials, particularly those who have no intention of resigning. And Halaby has no such intentions, despite widespread rumors — including one published report in a trade magazine—that he wants to quit.

### Berlin Is Termed Gravest Threat

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Undersecretary of State Chester Bowles said Tuesday the United States has never been "more directly and dangerously challenged" since the end of World War II than it is now in Berlin.

But Bowles warned against letting the Berlin crisis obscure long range U. S. policy goals around the world. He said that could result in success in Berlin but failure elsewhere.

Bowles said in a speech, prepared for the National Press Club there is now "a direct, total confrontation between the two greatest nuclear powers" in the heart of Europe.

"This is a challenge to which only one response is possible —

we must adhere to our treaty rights, we must honor our commitments," Bowles said.

"Our word has been pledged to the free people of West Berlin. Unless we stand by that pledge, our word will not again be trusted by threatened peoples anywhere."

Bowles, who returned last week from a 20-day trip through Africa, the Middle East and South Asia, said the people there view Berlin in a different light than Americans.

People enjoy stopping to chat with old acquaintances, trying on clothes and shoes, banking, dining out and planning Christmas gift purchases.

Each week finds new faces downtown, especially more and more men, who thoroughly enjoy having three and a half hours or more to make their purchases, often long delayed because of working hours.

## U.S. Reinforces Garrison

BERLIN (UPI) — The U. S. Army has reinforced its Berlin garrison with an artillery battery — the first such American unit stationed here since the early days of the occupation — a spokesman said today.

The Army spokesman said the battery of 150 men and six 105mm howitzers arrived from West Germany Sunday as part of the reinforcements ordered into the beleaguered city by President Kennedy.

The battery traveled through East Germany to West Berlin unhindered over the Helmsdorf-Berlin highway through East German territory with the convoy of the 1st Battle Group of the 18th Infantry Regiment, 1st Infantry Division.



### Soviets Told Blockade Would Mean Aggression

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The United States has told Russia that an attempt to blockade Berlin would be an "aggressive act," and the Russians would be responsible for the consequences.

In one of its toughest statements in recent years, the United States Thursday accused Russia of slander, deception, attempted intimidation, cynicism and irresponsibility.

The White House said charges contained in a recent Soviet note were false. The Russians had charged that West German spies and saboteurs were being flown into West Berlin.

The White House said the United States would send Moscow a formal reply in a matter of days, but issued a statement promptly because "we wanted to make our position known."

The statement said the Soviet charges cannot be taken seriously. What must be taken seriously by the whole world, however, is the scarcely veiled threat of aggression against the Allied air routes to and from West Berlin.

"The United States must serve solemn warning to the Soviet government," it said, "that any interference by the Soviet government or its East German regime with free access to West Berlin would be an aggressive act for the consequences of which the Soviet government would bear full responsibility."

### Board Meets To Discuss Welfare Surplus Program

The board of county commissioners and representatives of the county welfare department met informally today with E. Lee McCubbin, Director of Commodity Distribution for the State Department of Public Welfare, to discuss the proposed plan for surplus assistance grants of food for distribution here.

Plans were discussed in relation to costs, amounts, certification, and handling of the food grants.

Storage was a point of discussion as well as eligibility, responsibility of the commissioners, certification, reports, quotas, and regulations.

"It is the desire of the President that the basic needs of unfortunate people be met," McCubbin stated. "Hence, this greatly expanded program of availability and distribution of surplus foods."

Commodities which are available for public assistance as well as public school lunches and the county home, include peanut butter, butter, cheese, corn meal, dried beans, lard, flour, chopped meat, dried milk, rice and rolled oats.

After the meeting adjourned, the commissioners took McCubbin on a tour of the proposed storage site at the Memorial Stadium.

## Jaycees Hear Boat Marina Plans

Some of the plans for a marina to be built on the Sanford pier were outlined Thursday at the Jaycees weekly luncheon.

A diagram of a clubhouse and boat service facilities on the pier and floating storage docks was explained by Jack Trim, who will lease the pier from the city.

Plans call for the old bandshell building to be knocked down and a clubhouse built on the site.

The clubhouse will have food and bar facilities, with take-out box lunches available for boaters.

In addition a wing will contain restrooms, shower rooms, and laundry for family cruisers.

Near the docks, a stand will provide supplies for boats and fishing and sports equipment.

The docks will be equipped with electrical power outlets where boaters can hook up for electricity and phones, television and all the comforts of home.

Landscaping of the pier and marina will make it look as much like a tropical island as possible.

"A program of water sports events is planned," Trim said, "which will bring in boaters and water sports enthusiasts from all over the state, and we hope other states as well."

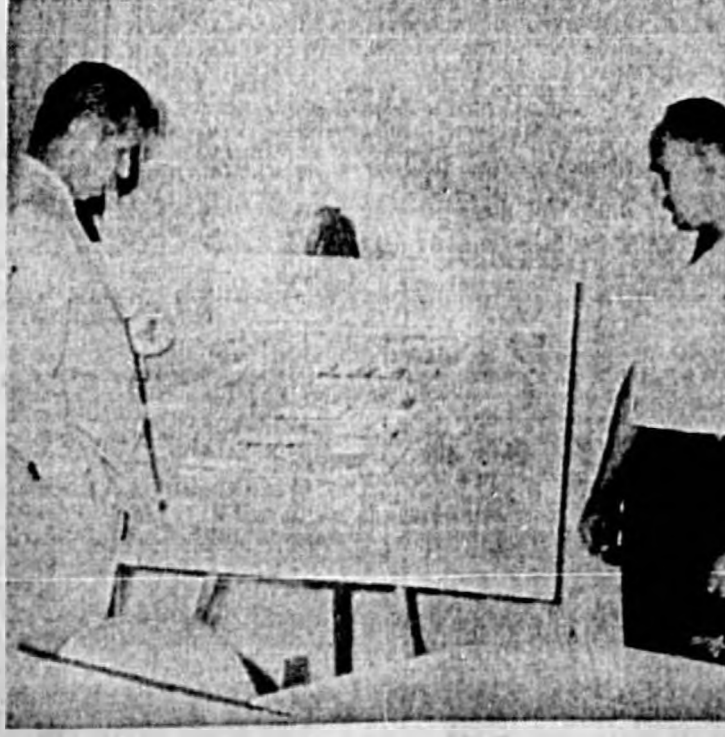
"There are 24,000 registered boats in the seven counties between here and Jacksonville that border on the St. Johns River," he said in outlining the potential for marine business.

Boat parking spaces will be available for boat owners, with additional services for craft of all sizes.

Boating inside the marina area, enclosed by the pier and breakwater will be carefully supervised and safety precautions enforced.

The present boat launching ramp at the foot of Palmtoe Ave. will remain a free ramp, although improvements are planned to make it easier to get boats into the water.

Trim was introduced to the group by program chairman Jack Wilber. In other business, the Jaycees were reminded of the Fishing Festival to be held at Port Mellon Park, Wednesday, beginning at 2 p. m. for all children between the ages of 1 and 14.

## Baby Mixup At Seminole Hospital

(Ed. Note: The Herald has no intention of using the names of the persons involved in this story for the stigma it might place on the youngsters and parents.)

There was a baby mixup at Seminole Memorial Hospital Thursday with a Sanford mother given the wrong baby. The mistake was discovered three hours after the mistake.

Here's the way Harry Weir, hospital administrator told the story after the Herald found out about the incident:

"It's the first time anything like this has happened in my 13 years in hospitals and the head nurse can't remember anything like this happening in 30 years of hospital work."

Weir explained that at noon Thursday a Sanford postnatal patient was released at the hospital. Through an error by one of the nurses, she was given the wrong baby.

Weir said that in most circumstances the identification bracelet on a baby's wrist is checked for identification. Apparently this was not done or, as Weir said, there are a lot of occasions when a name is misspelled.

The woman went home with the wrong baby and discovered it about 3:30 when she noted the bracelet.

Weir said the incident proves the success of the hospital's practice of not removing the identification bracelets from new born babies at many hospitals do.

"It was an unfortunate mistake, but I'm gratified that our system is as fool proof as it is," he added.

## Nova Assures Sanford Canal In 5 Years - Krider

Choice of Cape Canaveral as the nation's moon-port was called the greatest news for Seminole County in years by Chamber of Commerce Manager John Krider today who said this project assures construction of the Sanford-Canaveral Canal in the immediate future.

Krider added that "we can look forward to seeing this canal a reality within the next five years" and that the county will be the center of all waterways traffic from the west.

The chamber manager also said it would give the county's economy an incalculable shot in the arm as a great portion of the billion of dollars that will be spent will find its way into the economy of our area.

"This is something so large it is of tremendous economic significance to all Florida," Gov. Farris Bryant told his news conference Thursday as the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) announced in Washington that U. S. manned moon shots would be launched from the Cape.

Bryant said expansion of the 17,000-acre missile test center by 80,000 acres, at an initial cost of \$60 million, would bring big economic increases in the area of Cape Canaveral.

Bryant said the move should also boost chances of NASA picking MacDill Air Force Base at Tampa for its new headquarters, and for a long talked-of cross-Florida barge canal.

The governor pointed to the difficulties of bringing the giant Saturn moon rocket booster by barge from Alabama around the Florida Keys to the Cape. He said choice of the Cape as permanent launching site for the moonshots should have "a considerable impact on the need for a large canal."

It could also lead, Bryant said, to a need "for development in the Canaveral area of production facilities to alleviate the necessity of these long hauls."

MacDill Air Base is one of several spots under consideration as a site for NASA's new headquarters. A group of NASA officials toured the area this week.

Bryant's backing of MacDill, however, drew criticism Thursday from State Rep. George B. Stallings Jr. of Duval County.

Stallings said in Jacksonville he felt Bryant should support the Green Cove Springs Naval base near Jacksonville as the site of the headquarters.

"I believe the governor owes us the consideration of placing it here," Stallings said.

Charles W. Campbell, president of the Jacksonville Area Chamber of Commerce, also criticized Fred O. Dickinson, head of Bryant's Council of 100, for backing MacDill as a NASA site.

Bryant, meanwhile, praised Florida's congressional delegation for being "really on the ball" in efforts to have the moonport located at the Cape instead of the other areas under consideration.

### Chicago Acts To Halt Relievers' Subsidy To Owners

CHICAGO (UPI) — City and Cook County authorities acted today to penalize and withhold rents from slum landlords of nearly a fifth of the county's 104,000 families on relief.

County Public Aid Director Raymond M. Hilliard said the program had full official backing and was directed at "money-mad slum landlords" who extract "exorbitant rents for unsafe, vermin-infested, filthy, overcrowded fire-traps."

The program was launched on two fronts:

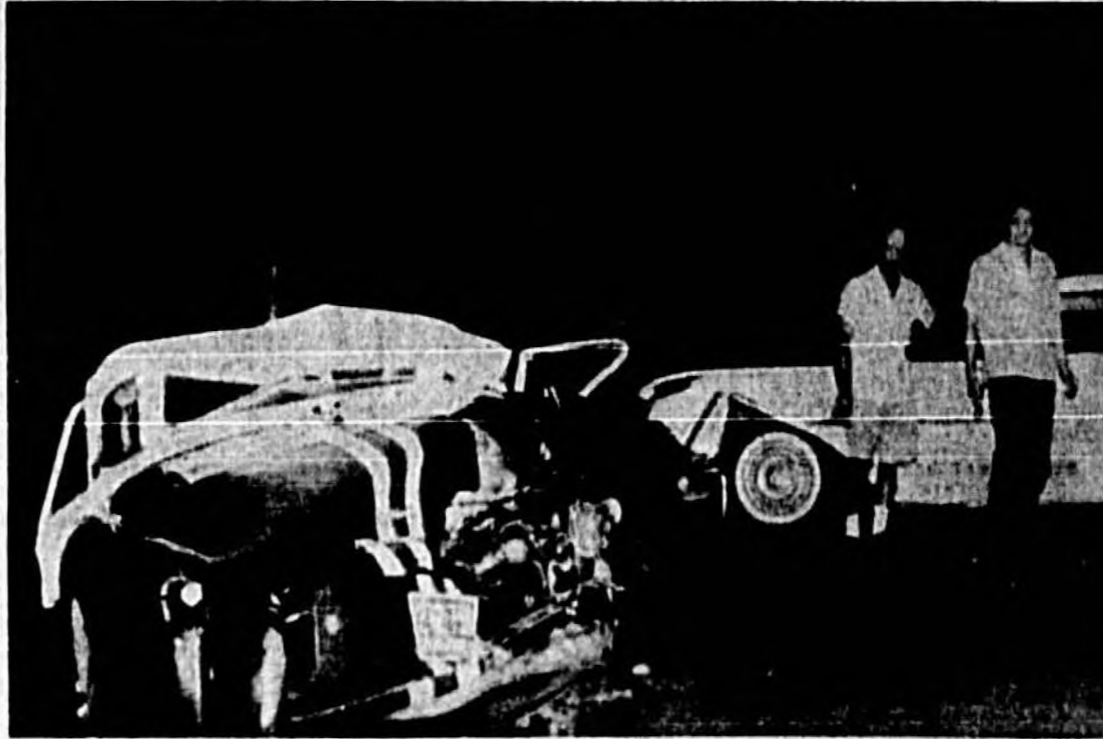
—In Superior Court, the city stepped up its attack on building violations with a suit against operators of an apartment it charged was illegally converted to house a double load of tenants, many of them on relief.

—The Public Aid Department told relief roll tenants of substandard buildings their rent allotment would be withheld from September relief checks.

Hilliard said landlords would feel the pinch within 30 days. They will face these alternatives: bring the buildings up to minimum standards; silently suffer the rent loss; or sue for eviction under risk of disclosing true owners' names in court.

Landlords' identities frequently have been hidden by trusts, complicating the task of forcing conformity with building standards. The apartment named in Thursday's Superior Court suit is held in trust by a downtown bank.

Short of an eviction suit, there is little way to learn the basic owners' names, officials said. Hilliard said slum apartment rentals are as high as \$108 a month.
