### Absent Children

Some cities report more pupils absent from school these days than ever before, and the peak is still rising. The tendency is found almost everywhere.

The resulting "absentism" is sometimes legitimate and sometimes not. There are large numbers of children working for pay when they should be in school. So great is the demand for them that bills are presented to some state legislatures to reduce limitations and allow the full-time employment of children 14 years old.

The main cause of trouble, says one observer, is too little supervision of children in the home. War conditions especially make it hard for many mothers to look after their children. They naturally tend to "run wild" and get into bad company and bad habits.

England had similar difficulty in the early war days, but seems to have got the problem pretty well under control. American experts are insisting that the muddling must stop, that children shall be protected not only against juvenile delinquency but against many parents' desire to have them prematurely at work.

### Candy Doomed?

Is candy disappearing from American life? There are some indications of that. For years the bulk of the candy business has been, it is said, not the impressive one, two and five pound boxes done up with fancy ribbons to impress the girl friend, but the humble candy bar or roll containing several dime-shaped pieces.

The sale of these small units is so great that eventually it overtakes the larger packages, and such bars and rolls become the majority of all candy sold. These tiny packages are disappearing from drugstores and slot ma- chines.

For years the petition of the American small boy or girl has been for a penny or a nickel to buy a bar of candy. It is hard to imagine the gap in their lives if this indul- gence is out for the duration.

### Discontinuance Of Sports Announced By State College

GAINESVILLE, Mar. 22 (Special)—The University of Florida last night announced the discontinuance of intercollegiate sports for the duration.

University Pres. John T. Tigert made the announcement following a week-end meeting here of the board of control which accepted a faculty committee recommendation for discontinuing athletics until after the war.

Percy Beard, director of athletics and track coach, Tom Lieb, head football coach, and their assistants will remain on the Gator campus to handle the university's students physical fitness program and to train army air corps cadets.

Lieb has two contracts, one expiring in June and the other for two years, coming into effect in June. He has a \$7,500 annual

rollment decrease as far as the His salary has been paid by the university, but now will be paid by the university and the U. S. government, it was said.

Regarding discontinuation of football, Lieb said "I'm in charge of the student physical fitness program and training 750 flying cadets and will be in charge of a contingent of army engineers to arrive soon."

"Many students have left for the armed forces and many more will leave, but army students sent here compensate the student enrollment decrease as far as the athletic work is concerned. Plans now are that my staff and I will continue next year and until the close of the war on the present basis."

Only 12 football players were prospects for next year's team and all of them likely are to be called into service. They are Walter McJae, Harry Platt, and Bob Ryan, Jacksonville; Frank DeAnulla, New Britain, Conn.; Stan Cary, Nutley, N. J.; Hug Miller, West Palm Beach; Phil Kaplan, Brooklyn, N. Y.; Charles White, New Smyrna; James Horsey, Clearwater; George Sutherland, Bartow; Arnold Tucker, Miami; and Harry Hancock, Clearwater.

The basketball, track and swimming squads also have been riddled by losses to the armed forces.
