Seminole deputy suspended

- SANFORD — A Seminole County sheriff's deputy who fired six shots at a fleeing traffic offender has been suspended for two weeks without pay. The suspension came after sheriff's Investigators determined Thomas Johnson was not justified in shooting at the suspect during the March 10 incident because the officer had not determined whether the suspect was armed.

Investigators said they do not feel Johnson's life was in danger when he fired at Terrell Gadskin, 23, of Sanford. Police reports indicate Gadskin abandoned his car and was running from Johnson on foot on Jitway Avenue when the officer fired six rounds from his service weapon. Gadakin, who had stopped and faced Johnson and reached into his own cost before Johnson fired the shots, fled and was not injured, Capt. Roy Hughey said.

Johnson is a three-year veteran of the department. He has given up two weeks of vacation and is still on the job. He chose that option over taking two weeks off without pay.

Spill costs Exxon \$15 million

VALDEZ. Alaska - Under an agreement between Exxon Corp. and four government agencies, the oil company has agreed to pay \$15 million to state and federal agencies to determine the damage costs in the worst oil spill in U.S. history.

The agreement requires Exxon to turn over \$8.5 million by Monday and turn over the rest when it is needed, said Hal Alabaster, spokesman for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration. The NOAA is one of the federal agencies involved in spill work and

the one that won the agreement Thursday from the world's largest oil company.

Exxon's promise to turn over \$15 million just to assess the Iliniy damage costs and expenses does not release Exxon from any potential future liability.

Emotional pleas made to scrap inmate early release program

TALLAHASSEE - A House committee voted Thursday to boost supervision for inmates granted early release from prison, despite emotional demands from crime victims' families to scrap the release program entirely.

When the Legislature approved early release, "You signed a death

warrant for my child," said Cherry Bainbridge of Sarasota, who said her daughter was killed by an early release inmate.

But the Committee on Corrections. Probation and Parole gave unanimous approval to a proposal (HB 300) amending the program to require up to a year's supervision of early release inmates, rather than the 90 days' maximum oversight provided for under cutrent law.

Chairman Douglas "Tim" Jamerson, D-St. Petersburg, sald the panel feels trapped between a federal consent decree to eliminate prison overcrowding and Gov. Bob Martinez' insistence the Legislature can draft a responsible budget without new taxes.

"They are responding from anger and hurt and pain that I am

certainly sympathetic to. But they have to look at the overall posture Florida is in with the overcrowding we have in our prisons," Jamerson told reporters following the vote.

Under the program, certain prisoners nearing the end of their sentences are released early when prison populations approach limits established by a federal court.

Letter creates brouhaha P&Z commissioner's criticism sparks questions, controversy By J. MARK BARFIELD Herald staff writer SANFORD - A scathing letter from a Seminole

County Planning and Zoning commissioner to the president of the Friends of the Wekiva River Inc., has led County Commissioner Jennifer Kelley to question the propriety of the planning official's actions.

It also has led to a rift between two organizations

that often work closely together.

At issue is the letter P&Z Commissioner Frank;
Shelton wrote to Jim Thomas, president of the Friends of the Wekiva, Inc., on March 7. Shelton: wrote that he felt betrayed over the Friends' support for smaller, "clustered" lots in the Plantation! development adjacent to the Wekiva River.

Shelton is a member of the board of directors of the Markham Woods Association, which opposed the clustering on the grounds that it increased the concentration of housing in the rural area. Thomas's group is the leading private environmental organization dedicated to protecting the Wekiva River.

Thomas brought the matter to Kelley's attention and on April 6, she sought a legal opinion on the matter from County Attorney Bob McMillan.

Airport requests \$43.500 to help construct center

SANFORD - Sanford Regional Airport has applied for tourism development funds to build a welcome center at the terminal.

Aviation director Mack LaZenby said the application filed with the Tourism Development Council requests \$43,500 to build an information booth and welcome center at the airport terminal. Sanford Airport Authority authorized LaZenby to apply for

the grant at a meeting last month.
"It is imperative that this program start as soon as funds are available so people coming through this gateway' know where they can spend their money in Seminole County," LaZenby wrote in the application.

LaZenby calls the airport a gateway for northern tourists into Central Florida. Tourists who land at Sanford Regional Airport have an opportunity for exposure to sights in Seminole County they wouldn't have if they landed at Orlando International, he said.

The counter would be staffed by one paid employee and other volunteers, LaZenby said, and additional

County will fight FDCA appeal

SANFORD - Seminole County will fight an appeal of their controversial approval of a convenience store across State Road 48 from the Wekiva River Aquatic Preserve by the Florida Department of Community

The appeal, which was filed with Gov. Bob Martinez and cabinet members April 7, claims the county failed to meet the requirements of the Wekiva River Protection Act by allowing the store to be built on five acres owned by Miller Enterprises, Inc. of Crescent City at the southwest corner of S.R. 46 and Longwood Markham Road, less than a mile from the Wekiya River. County commissioners voted unanimously Tuesday

to defend the county in the appeal. County attorneys said they have until May I to ask for a hearing in the

Regardless of whether the commercial land use designation is defended by the county, no store may be built at the site. Seminole County Circuit Court land records show on March 29, Miller Enterprises received a deed from Southland Corp. for another commercial property located at the southeast corner of Lake Markham Road and S.R. 48 that has not been challenged by the state.

Neither Ed Teuton, Miller Enterprises vice president of real estate, nor their attorney, Miranda Fitzgerald. could be reached to determine whether Miller Enterprises plans to pursue development of the challenged

The commercial land use designation at the Longwood Markham Road alte has been opposed by residents of the Markham Road area who do not want more convenience stores along S.R. 46. Two are already in business west of Interstate 4. Environmentalists said the store site is too close to sensitive Wekiva River-area

commercial to a low-density designation such as suburban estates or rural, which would allow no more than one home to be built on the site.

Lonnie Groot, deputy county attorney, said the county's comprehensive plan requires all land uses in the Wekiva River Protection Area, which extends east from the river to about Orange Boulevard, must comply with the requirements of the protection act. Groot said the state's protection act does not prohibit commercial uses in the area.

The protection act requires that all land uses in the protection area maintain the rural character of the area. It also states that any type of development other than low-density residential uses must have less impact on surrounding areas than residential uses. The act also requires that development must have no impacts on adjacent state lands.

Union, analyst doubts Eastern's strategy

MIAMI - An airline analyst and the leader of the machinists union at strikebound Eastern Airlines cast doubt Thursday on plans by Texas Air Corp. to rebuild Eastern as a smaller,

profitable carrier.

Union leaders syntinued to push instead for the sale of Eastern, insisting that former Baseball Commissioner Peter Ueberroth still may have a shot at acquiring the company, along with other bidders.

Meanwhile, an advisor to Carl Icahn, chairman of Trans World Airlines, said Icahn would talk shottly with Eastern's

Union officials said there are a number of interested bidders.

but they declined to identify any accept for Icahn. They also scoffed at the company's plans for rebuilding Eastern, formerly the nation's seventh largest airline.

"That is a pipe dream," said Charles Bryan, president of District 100 of the International Association of Machinists, which struck Eastern on March 4, triggering the current

corporate crisis.
"I don't think in this industry you shrink your way back to profitability," said Louis Marckesano, an airline analyst with Janney Montgomery Scott Inc. in Philadelphia. "I think that is a subterfuge for dismantling (Eastern)."

Stuart urges study of state salaries

TALLAHABSEE — With Gov. Bob Martines budgeting no pay raises for thousands of state employees, a Democratic opponent of the governor's Thursday called for a state study of comparable pay scales in the private sector.

Sen. George Stuart, D-Orlando, said his bill to bring state salaries up to 90 percent of pay rafes for similar jobs in the private sector had nothing to do with his campaign for

governor.

Martinez infuriated state workers Feb. 15 by announcing a \$22 billion budget with no pay raises for most employees—and by saying he made cuts to eliminate "lard bricks" that had built up in state spending.

"It's unfortunate that this 'lard bricks' thing occurred," said Stuart. "If we can have better-trained, more motivated and contented state employees, the public can expect better

Stuart said state government salaries have for many years lagged far behind those in the general labor market, and that the public could not expect reliable government, services if state agencies have a high turnover rate.

Stuart said a recent study indicates salaries for state jobs are as much as 30 percent below those for similar jobs in the

Assault weapons ban debate continues

TALLAHASSEE - Banning assault rifles without infringing on the rights of law-abiding citizens is a delicate task that may not be possible, the chairman of a key House

committee said Thursday.
"They (supporters of the bill) don't want to take away weapons from people who are using it for legitimate means, for hunting or for use on a personal range or whatever the case may be," said Rep. Ron Silver, D-North Miami Beach. "What we're trying to do is come to some sort of solution to that problem and still protect society from the unlawful use of these weapons.
"I don't know if it's attainable or not."

Silver, a noted gun control advocate, chairs the House Criminal Justice committee, which spent much of Thursday morning hearing testimony on a bill banning sault weapons.

The bill (HB 573) would ban any gun found to be an assault weapon, including

usi's, AK-47s and many other semi-sutomatic weapons that fire 20 or more rounds without reloading.

citizens of their right to keep and bear arms."

Supporters of the bill say it would not

A person who already owns an assault rifle could keep it, but would have to register it with the Secretary of State's office. Assault weapons could be handed down to heirs or sold out of state, but could not be re-sold in Florida.

Sponsors say the bill is designed to stop the proliferation of guns best suited for mass slaughter, guns that are widely used by drug dealers. But opponents, most notably the National Rifle Association, charge it would take legitimate weapons away from average citizens.

"You're giving law-abiding citizens who legally own firearms the option — turn in your weapon, register it, or go to jail for 15 years for possessing it." said NRA

spokeswoman Marion Hammer.
"It only seeks to deprive law abiding

restrict hunting rifles or any other legiti-mate weapon. But assault weapons, they say, are designed for only one thing killing as many people as possible in a short period of time.

"They are not hunting weapons unless you include people as part of the game," West Palm Beach Police Chief Bill Riggs told the committee.

The committee did not vote on the bill Thrusday, largely because of the difficulty in deferentiating between an assault weapon and a legitimate weapon. The bill includes a list of specific assault weapons — including uzl's and AK-47s — but also has general descriptions that Hammer said could apply the serve assault automatte hunting rifles. to some semi-automatic hunting rifles.

Silver said the committee would take more testimony on the bill next week in hopes of finding an acceptable definitifion of

assault weapons.

not contacted the Markham Woods Association to inform the homeowners of the Friends' nomeowners of the Friends' support of Plantation's clustering plan. "They simply came into a developer's meeting a few days before the P&Z meeting and said, 'We're going to support clustering' and that was that," Shelton said. "R's a shame they couldn't have set down with us before and talked it over."

Planning commissioners voted

Planning commissioners voted 5-2 in favor of Plantation, with Shelton and Planning Commissioner John Tracy opposing. County commissioners approved the plan on March 28.

"I have never felt so used and betrayed," Shelton wrote to Thomas. "No matter how much I believe in most of your organization's objectives, you have shown me that you would walk over your best friend to schieve

over your best friend to achieve them.

"As a member of the Planning and Zoning Commission. I supported your questionable exchange of Lake Forest wetlands for dedicated lands at Sabal Point and made an im-passioned plea for reverting the commercial property at S.R. 46 and Longwood Markham Road back to suburban estates land

"Our reward when we asked "Our reward when we asked your support this time to protect our soning and quality of life as well as the river, was your assisting the developer and county in the demise of our area's soning as we have known it for the last 20 years."

Shelton's letter also referred to the association's efforts to raise \$11,000 for the Friend's legal defense fund to fight AMCOR's original 1964 plans to build up

original 1964 plans to build up to 1,600 homes on the site. Thomas said Wednesday many of the Friends members are also association members so the association could not take sole credit for raising the \$11,000. Shelton also wrote the

association "bit our tongues" and supported the Friends of the Wekiva's position that the western portion of the Seminole County Expressway should be located along County Road 46-A — through the Markham Woods area — and not along S.R. 46, which could be harmful to the Wekiva River.

Thomas responded on March 24 with a letter calling Shelton's comments an "emotional tirade" and defending the Friends' stances on its efforts to protect the Wekiva River.

"It becomes obvious to us that you either do not understand the facts in these issues or that you are completely willing to ignore them." Thomas wrote, "In either case, I would personally ques-tion your qualifications to sit in such an important position as a member of the planning and aoning board.

"We urge you to re-evaluate your behavior in this case and hope that you will not again castigate members of the public who happen to disagree with your personal position." Thomas sent copies of both Shelton's letter and his own



Escapee recaptured three years later

SANFORD - A Seminole County prisoner who escaped from a work detail in Altamonte Springs three years ago has been recaptured. The man was iden-tified while being booked into the Seminole County Jail on an unrelated shoplifting charge Wednesday.

Since Wednesday's arrest, to which a charge of escape was added, sheriff's investigators have determined the man has used at least 26 different aliases and has been arrested about 20 time in Florida, Georgia, New York and South Carolina since 1969. He always uses a different

name, with some of the names being various spellings of similar names, investigators said.

Investigators believe the suspect's real name may be Juanathan Thaddeus Nables, He is believed to be 40 years old.

Sheriff's Capt. Roy Hughey said the escapee, the only escapee from the Seminole County jail to be at large at the time of his capture, was identifled Wednesday when he was being booked into fail as an accused shoplifter. He was being booked as Craig Holt, 28, of Orlando. While Holt was being processed at the Jail, corrections Sgi. George Morris and guard Cleo White thought his face was familiar, but they couldn't place his name. Officers from the

City offers water deal to utility customers

SANFORD - At the end of this month, 10,000 utility customers in Sanford will receive an invitation to subscribe to a reclaimed water service.

This week the city commission approved a \$1.850 printing contract for a reclaimed water subscription promotion. The mailing will be sent out within three months, said Bill Simmons, city director of engineering and planning.

The reclaimed water program is part of a city effort to end dumping of treated effluent into Lake Monroe.

The city is offering a promotion through the months of May and June. Customers who re-

turn their subscriptions during that 60-day period will receive a waiver of the \$160 hook-up fee and one free year of service, Simmons said.

"We believe those incentives will certainly get people to thinking about filling out a rather simple form and getting it returned to us," Simmons said.

The city will hold public meet-ings at the Sanford Civic Center in mid-May and mid-June to explain the service to utility customers.

When the promotion ends, the city will determine the feasibility of offering the service on a neighborhood by neighborhood basis, Simmons said. Costs-per-gallon to the city will be determined by the number of requests, the size of lots and resource conservation, he said.


Corrections



Junk bondage

Junk-bond genius Michael Milken in-novated the use of high-yield, low-quality bonds to finance hostile corporate takeovers. He permitted little companies to buy big companies using the assets of the preyed-on cosporation as collateral for the buyer. He found a way to leverage deals that gave greed away, over rational business sense. He made corporate chairmen tremble.

Seiling junk bonds, Milken earned more last year than McDonalds did seiling hamburgers. He changed the landscape of corporate America in the 1980s. For these accomplishments, some might think Milken deserves an award. In a sense, Michael Douglas won it for him, with his Oscar last year for playing a character like Milken in "Wall Street." Ironically, as this year's Academy Awards were being announced, Beverly Hills-based Milken won another kind of distinction: He was nominated by a federal grand jury for the role of most fraudulent racketeer on Wall Street.

"I am enormously proud of my 20 years with Deexel Burnham Lambert, and it has been an honor to work with the company's dedicated employees," Milken said in a statement announcing he would plead not guilty. "Together, we have been privileged to help create value for hundreds of companies and thousands of men and women who work for these."

The privilege of allegedly stealing billions of dollars, wreaking havor in corporations and reducing employees to junk bondage may cost Milken dearly. The feds want him, his other Lowell and an associate, Bruce Lee revosed to pay \$12 billion in penalties. If convicted on all counts, Milken could receive a 350-year prison term. Meanwhile, Milken has hooked Wall Street

en junk bonds.

'The financial revolution that this maverk unleashed will endure for a simple reason: embraced by the establishment that once hunned them," James Sterngold writes in The New York Times.

Junk bonds are like sugar. They taste sweet for investors. They create a lot of frenzied activity. But they soon enervate the system, wasting energy and promoting economic

In the boom days of the 1980s, junk bonds helped feed — and feed on — America's expansion. But when the economy eventually contracts, as some economists predict may happen within a year, high-risk bonds could turn many former solid corporations to junk.

Milken is a symbol of an era gone awry. He now wins boos, as he once won applause, but the gaudy show that he inspired goes on.

Deal leads to bad policy

WASHINGTON — James L. Sundquist, the Brookings Institution's thoughtful scholar of American government, has an easy in the winter issue of the Political Science Quarterly, Secretary of State James A. Baker III needs to read it.

Sundquist's theme is the difficulty of making hard decisions stick in what he calls "the new era of coalition government in the United States." He makes a convincing case that when the ticket-splitting minority of voters (about one-quarter of the electorate) give Republicans the presidency but put Congress back into Democratic control, as they have done with increasing frequency in recent decades, the result is often costly to

good policy and good government.
In my view, the reason this pattern produces bad government is that it frustrates the people in the executive and the legislative branch to the point that they try to usurp the other's

we've seen spectacular examples of that in the White House, including the whole Irancontra affair. Now we are beginning to realize that Congress may be showing symptoms of the same disease. Frustrated at their party's continuing inability to win the White House, some Democratic members of Congress are seeking to exercise presidential powers themselves.

The latest example is the agreement forged between the congressional leaders and Baker on American aid to the Contras. The deal includes an extraordinary provision enabling any of four congressional committees to override legislation to be passed by Congress and signed by the President providing \$4.5 million a month of "humanitarian" or nonmilitary assistance to the Contra forces challenging the Sandinista government in

Baker recognized that this side-agreement was such an obvious invasion of presidential power that it could not be put into the basic legislation. So he arranged to handle it through a letter to the lawmakers - a subterfuge so transparent that White House counsel C. Boyden Gray properly but belatedly protested that it damaged presidential pre-

To make my own bias clear, let me say that I never supported President Reagan's effort to finance an anti-Sandinista army in Central America. I never had believed that, given our imperialist history in Nicaragua, the United States had the right or the capacity to control that country's political development. So in policy terms, I have no problem with what the Democratic members of Congress have done.

I also can see the practical advantages in the agreement, as outlined by the President and Baker and even by such staunch supporters of the Contra cause as Rep. Henry Hyde (R-III.) and Rep. Mickey Edwards (R-Okla.). Democratic control of Congress dooms any effort to revive military aid to the Contras — even though Bush indicated after the election he would seek such

assistance. Better to have one policy, en-dorsed by Congress and the administration, than to continue to battle endlessly over what that policy should be. But the cost of this agreement la unac-

ceptably high. I have to agree with Rep. Vin Weber (R-Minn.), who says that this is a distorted version of bipartisanship and a blow to both the Bush presidency and the authority any Chief Executive should try to pre-

"There are two kindsof bipartisanship." Weber said. "There's

the 'greater good' kind where people agree to put saide their parochial concerns and work together for some national purpose. But there's also 'a lowest common denominator' kind, which avoids responsibility and avoids making hard de-cisions. And that's what we've done here."

We've seen spectacular examples of that in the

White House

Weber continued: "I'm not a lawyer, so I won't say it's unconstitutional to gove four seperate committees (the foreign affairs and appropriations committees of each body) authority to suspend a program passed by Congress and signed into law by the President. But it's certainly extra-constitutional and an erosion of power. They (the administration) may think they have a good deal in the short run, but this is their first foreign-policy decision, and they're going to have to live with

that precedent a long time."

Weber called the concession by Baker 'almost a reverse Gulf of Tonkin," referring to the resolution President Johnson got Congress to pass and which he later used as a legal pretext for fighting an undeclared war in

Vietnam. By making it easy for voters to split their tickets, such campaigns feed the very policy breakdown that Sundquist correctly describes as the byproduct of "coalition government.

Navy reluctant to give details of F-18 crash

WASHINGTON — Marilyn Ginsberg has been waiting for two years to bury her husband. Thanks to the secrecy of the U.S. Navy, she may never put to rest the mystery

Capt. Daniel Ginsberg was one of the Navy's esteemed "Top Guna." On May 20, 1987, his F-18 jet crashed into the Sierra Nevada Mountains in California on a routine

training flight. The Navy claimed it spent 1,388 flight hours searching for the wreckage. Then ttgaveup. But Marilyn

Ginsberg, the petite widow with two toddlers, wouldn't give up. The more she read of the Navy's search re-cords, the more hollow they sounded and she grew de-termined to find the plane herself.

A year after the accident she did, and it took only seven

Using the same information the Navy had, Mrs. Gimberg had reward postern and maps hung in ranger stations, at

trail heads and in sheriffs' offices. With reluctant help from the military, she initiated a search. On June 18, 1968, after a half-day hike, a search team found the plane east of Yosemite National Park near the Nevada

Finding the plane so easily raised far more questions than it answered for Mrs. Ginsberg and the family of the dead co-pilot, Lt. Michael Mueller. Why hadn't the Navy spotted it? Was the Navy hiding something? Why would a pilot, respected for his caution, who had flown in the 1986 bombing raid on Libya, crash on a routine flight across California?

The Pentagon has locked the records of the crash in a vault for top secret material and will only release a sanitized version of its conclusions.

Our associate Jim Lynch pored over documents and interviewed more than a dozen people privy to the crash and the search. We found convincing evidence that the Navy may have known exactly where the plane was, and decided to leave it there.

The plane crashed on a ridge behind Green Creek Canyon. The Navy records show that no search sircraft were near the canyon on the day of the crash. Yet a hiker and a forestry worker swear they saw Navy planes fly in and out of the canyon just hours after the crash. A deputy at a nearby sheriff's department saw a helicopter equipped to pick up wreckage a couple of days after the

A hiker reported an "explosion" near the crash site and the last radar reading from the F-18 was less than three miles from the crash site. But the Navy focused its search 30 miles away on Glass Mountain. The Navy stuck to the Glass Mountain theory, even to the point of putting it on Capt. Ginsberg's death certificate.

A Navy spokesman told us the official search was thorough and that the wreckage could not be seen from the air.

The Navy should thank Mrs. Ginsberg. Until she found the F-18, it was the only military jet lost inside the United States in the

past 10 years. If the Navy found the plane, why was it kept a secret? It may have something to do with chronic mechanical problems in F-18s, including aparadic engine fires. Three more F-18s crashed after Capt. Giraberg's ill-fated flight. Five months after his death the Navy shelved half of the Pacific Fleet's F-18s for work on engines with more than 800 hours flying time. One of Capt. Ginaberg's engines had 1,482 hours, the other 955 hours.

Agreement on federal budget goes to president

WASHINGTON - Congressional and administration budget negotiators, "almost certain" they have reached agreement on a fiscal 1990 spending plan after two months of talks, presented it to President Bush at the White House today.

The seven negotiators were scheduled to meet with a larger group that included Bush and the congressional leadership of both parties at the White House this morning to present their final package.

"We have an interesting offer that people want to think about (overnight)," Rep. Bill Frenzel, R-Minn., said as budget talks broke up about 11:15 p.m. EDT negotiating session that participants said was filled with offers and counter-offers.

"It's possible we'll have an agreement." Foley said Thursday night. "If the numbers check out, we may well have a recommendation to make" to the larger White House and congressional leadeship group.

He cautioned that no agreement on a spending outline for the fiscal year that begins Oct. 1 will be presented to Bush "if the numbers don't work." But he said budget negotiators would meet with the larger leadership group headed by Bush Friday morning at the White House whether or not they had reached a final accord.

No details of the apparently final agreement were immediately available.

Bush canceled a planned vacation to his Kennebunkport, Maine, home to be available in Washington should a budget agreement be reached before the unofficial April 15 deadline, A White House spokesman said Bush was ready to meet with negotiators whenever the

Negotiators hoped to agree on five key fiscal 1990 budget numbers — revenues, defense, non-defense domestic spending. foreign aid and entitlements. such as Medicare.

They were expected to pro-\$14.2 billion in revenues - the Reagan and Bush earlier this year.

The final proposal also was expected to include another \$14 billion in spending cuts, includ- investment,

ized by reducing the rate of growth in Medicare next year and a nearly \$2 billion cut in agricultural programs sought by the administration.

The total of \$28 billion either raised in new revenues or saved duce a package that will raise through spending cuts would be enough to trim the deficit to same amount proposed in about \$100 billion in fiscal 1990 budgets submitted by Presidents and meet the deficit-cutting targets of the Gramm-Rudman balanced budget law.

CHICAGO - Two highpowered sports agents accused of using threats and illegal gifts to aign college athletes to pro-fessional contracts were con-victed Thursday of racketeering. conspiracy and mail fraud in a trial that featured the testimony of stars from the sports and entertainment worlds.

The defendants, Norby Walters and Lloyd Bloom, wept as guilty verdicts were read on five of seven counts contained in a 1988 indictment. They were acquitted of two mail fraud counts.

Each was convicted of two counts of racketeering, one count of conspiracy and two of mail fraud. Each faces up to 55 years in prison and fines up to \$1.5 million when they are sentenced the week of May 23.

The jury was to return Friday to decide any forfeitures of Walters' or Blooms' assets under the federal racketeering statute. Walters could be liable for forfeiture of up to \$500,000, Bloom up to \$200,000.

"We're going to make a very vigorous appeal," added Robert Gold, Walters' attorney.

The prosecution, led by U.S. Attorney Anton R. Valukas, charged the agents conducted a broad scheme to lure top college athletes into signing professional contracts, victimizing the athletes and their schools.

"I'm hopeful that this verdict sends a message to the sports agency community, as well as to the collegiate athletic communi-ty, that federal laws apply to fraud in those communities as well as everywhere else." Valukas said.

The indictment accused Walters, 58, of New York, and Bloom, 29, of Los Angeles, of giving cash, cars and other payments to 43 athletes, who

pleaded guilty and cooperated. They also were accused of threatening physical harm to

prospects.

Individual victims included National Football League players Maurice Douglass and Ron Morris of the Chicago Bears, Tony Woods of the Scattle Scahawks and Everett Gay of the

Douglass testified he signed while at the University of Kentucky-Lexington and received 89,000 in cash and a sports car. When he later tried to break the deal, Bloom threatened him.







FERN PARK - Here comes that curve again. Bracing yourself and elenching the wheel, you decide this time you won't brake for it.

As your engine drones on and the track ahead bends sharply. you determinedly turn the wheel into it. You feel the rear wheels sliding out from under you, and you jerk the wheel to compensate. The car steadles, and you shout, "I made it!"

The Daytona 500? Surprisingly, no—the car is actually a kart, and the track is slightly less than a tenth of a mile.
Lil' 500 Go-Karts, located off

U.S. Highway 17-92 at 150 Atlantic Drive, Fern Park, offers Seminole County residents the thrill of maneuvering a racecar.

"There's a race here every five minutes," said Randy Kline, assistant manager of the business, which has been in operation since 1968.

For a price of \$2.50, children aged 12 and older can get behind the wheel of a go-kart and steer through approximately 12 laps of Lil' 500's fast track.

"The track has slippery concrete curves, which give the illusion of a lot more speed," said Lil' 500 employee Don Schmidt.

However, the fun park does not cater only to future Mario Andrettia; it offers a slower. 'family' track as well.

For \$2, children aged 6 and

older can maneuver their way through 10 laps on the slow course, while those younger than 6 can ride free with a parent.



Pope names new bishop

John Paul II has accepted the resignation of Archbishop William Borders of Baltimore and named Bishop William Keeler of Harrisburg, Pa., as his successor, the church announced Tuesday.

Borders, considered one of the most liberal bishops in the American hierarchy, resigned on his 75th birthday in accordance with church law. He had led the Baltimore archdiocese - the oldest Catholic diocese in the United States - since 1974. The first Catholic bishop in

the United States, Bishop John Carroll, was appointed in Baltimore 200 years ago

Keeler, 58, is one of the church's most prominent ecumenists and is the immediate past chairman of the Catholie Bishops' Committee for Ecumenical and Interreligious Affairs. He has been the bishop of Harrisburg since 1983, said Apostolic Pro-Nuncio Pio Laghi, announcing Texas, Keeler grew up in Philadelphia and Lebanon,

Hyperactive heart comes in all paces

DEAR DR. GOTT: I have paroxysmal tachycardia. Please tell me what this is, what causes it and what the best treatment

DEAR READER: Paroxysmal means sudden bursts of un-predictable activity; tachycardia means rapid heart rate. Therefore, I conclude that you are experiencing periodic episodes of rapid pulse.

In order to answer your question, I have to detour into some

basic cardiac anatomy.
The heart is divided into four muscular chambers: two lowpressure atria and two highpressure ventricles. These chambers contract in sequence because of rhythmic electrical charges that begin in the heart's natural pacemaker (the sinoatrial node), pass through the atrial muscles, intensify in an area called the AV node (the junction between the atria and the ventricles) and then spread through a conduction system into the ventricles.

All along the route of the electrical-impulse conduction are areas of cardiac tissue that can initiate their own bursts of electricity, in competition with the normal mechanism. On occasion, one of these areas will fire off a series of charges (paroxysms), causing the entire heart to contract at an accelerated rate.

Thus, doctors recognize three major sources of paroxysmal tachycardia: atrial, junctional and ventricular.

Atrial tachycardia is, by and large, harmless. It lasts from a few beats to a few minutes and is frightening because a person has the sensation that his or her heart is beating out of control. The tachycardia can usually be terminated by the Valsalva maneuver, during which the patient strains hard for a moment or two, as though having a difficult bowel movement. This maneuver attimulates the vagus name ver stimulates the vagus nerve in the chest to slow the heart

rate and re-establish a more normal pattern.

Paroxysmal atrial tachycardia can often be prevented with certain drugs, particularly




