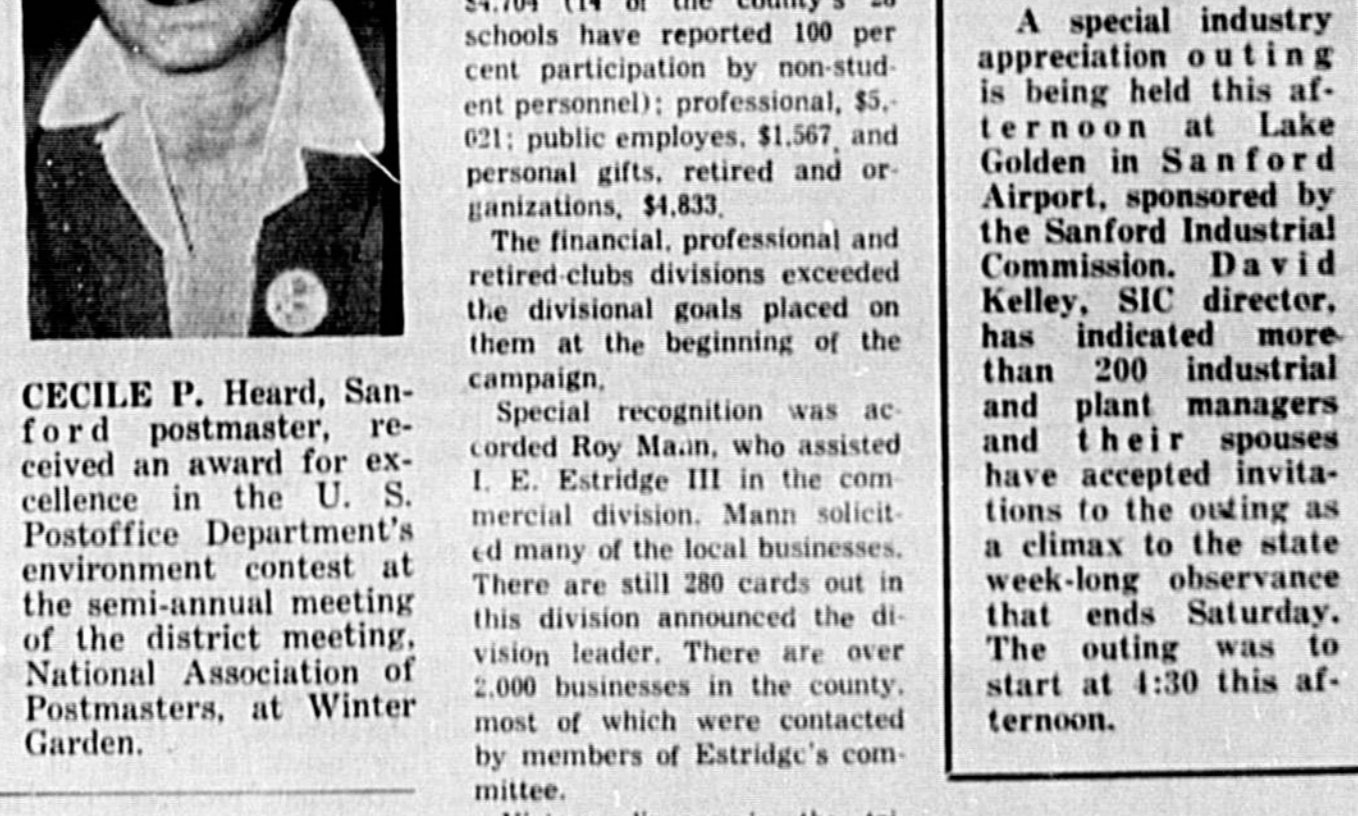

### Beside Still Waters

The symbolism of still waters is that of tranquility and calm. For many of us there is very much of peaceful quiet or serenity of spirit. Some of us seem especially vulnerable to the world's storm and stress. Like a ship at sea, caught in a storm, we are in need of a shore, a harbor — a haven.

Yet we cannot lie down beside still waters and dream our days away. A ship if it is to fulfill its purpose for which it is built has not only its safe harbor but also the wide stormy sea. It cannot be a useful vessel if it knows only the harbor. But though there is no guarantee of safety and security, we can truly find a calmness and trust and strength in a disturbed and uncertain world. Jesus did that, and he did it supremely. He lived an untroubled life in a troubled world. He was always tranquil. Let me suggest some ways in which I think he was able to do this. Maybe we too can gain a new measure of tranquility in our lives.

Jesus knew calmness of mind because he had a proper perspective. He was not absorbed by little things. He took the long view. He said to his disciples that they should permit the tares to grow with the wheat. The final harvest would take care of the weeds. Jesus believed in the ultimate vindication of right and righteousness. He did not condone evil doing but neither did he fret. He saw life in proper perspective. Jesus lived one day at a time. He appreciated the present. He knew for a certainty a cross loomed before him. He knew many things he needed to do before he was called to it. Yet again and again he said to his disciples, "Let us go apart and rest awhile." He was not in a hurry.

### Church Nixes Approval To Women As Ministers

The major surprise to come out of the General Convention of the Episcopal Church, held Oct. 11-22, in Houston, Tex., was the proposal to ordain women to the full ministry of the church. Most important issues coming before the convention are anticipated well in advance but the proposal came as a surprise to many delegates, according to Rev. Allen B. Purdon, administrative assistant to Rt. Rev. William H. Fowler, Bishop of the Diocese of Central Florida.

Few people outside the official Commission on the Ministry knew the resolution was being considered. The official action would be requested. Surprising also is the manner of implementation. Most people would have assumed the action would require six to nine years to pass that large number of constitutional, canonical and Prayer Book provisions that have existed for hundreds of years through the Anglican history and tradition. Instead, the Commission proposed a simple resolution dealing with interpretation only.

By a majority vote on one motion, all references to the title gender have been proposed to mean a person, male or female. The House of Deputies debated the issue for five hours until Saturday, October 17th. In a dramatic ending in mid-afternoon, the motion was defeated. The vote was close. Lay Deputies passed the measure. Clergy Deputies barely defeated it only by having a large number of divided votes. The House of Bishops therefore did not receive this resolution for consideration during this convention. The matter will no doubt be presented again in three years. Only a few votes will be necessary to change the results. This unusual method of changing the church's policy by interpretive resolution remains itself to be tested.

The Bishop passed nine resolutions of the Standing Liturgical Commission, but spent more than an hour in debate on the proposed Title Use of the Rite entitled "Holy Baptism with the Laying on of Hands." This proposed initiatory rite combines Holy Baptism, Confirmation and Holy Communion into one service administered by a Bishop. The Commission intended that infants be initiated into the Body of Christ as full-fledged communicants. The Bishops were not of a mind to move so fast and agreed to endorse the study. The Bishops concurred with the Deputies' action in passing legislation providing for biennial conventions beginning with 1975.

### Catholic Women Attend Fall Meeting

The Central Diocese of the Orlando Diocesan Council of Catholic Women met recently at the Ramada Inn East in Orlando. The fall meeting was hosted by St. Joseph's Guild of Orlando. Mrs. Donald LeFils, president, conducted the business meeting. Rev. Thomas McGinnis served as moderator for the program which included a discussion on "Religious Education in the Diocese of Orlando" by Richard Corrado, Superintendent of Education.

He said that the potential for good held by all affiliated clubs in the Diocese was not sufficiently used as a resource for selling programs in Catholic education. 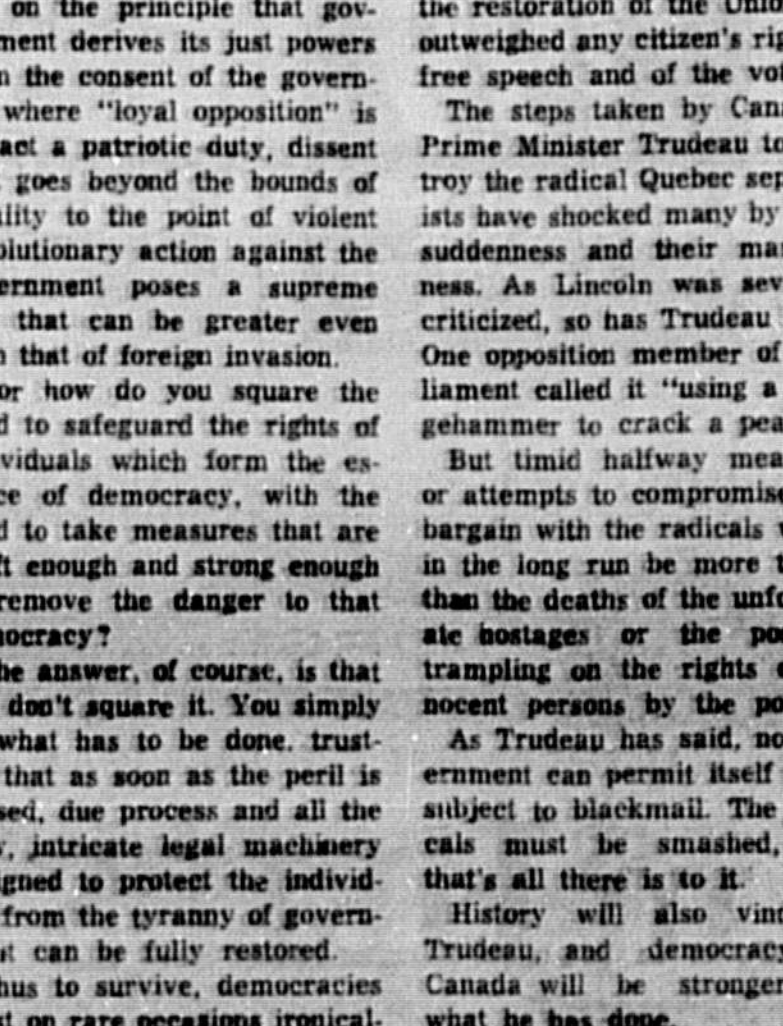

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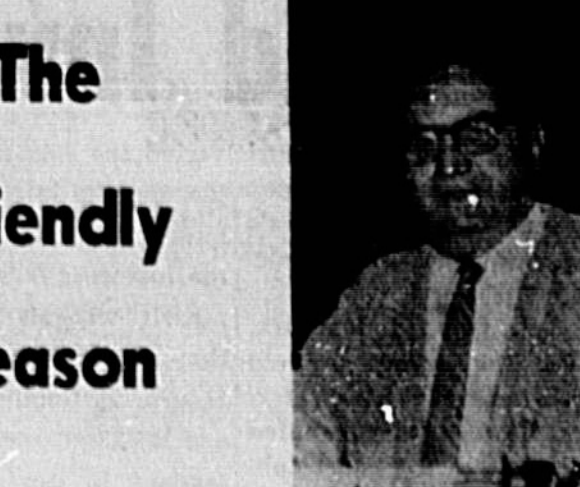

County Commissioners on a dangerous highway. The owner of the property for the right-of-way was ready and willing to make the necessary right-of-way involved. A culvert may be necessary to cross the straight highway route, but it would be necessary to put in a new culvert to use the roundabout highway route. Curbing the ditch is entirely unnecessary as there are no drains or ditches. Eventually the road water would have to run into driveways and stand in the groves. It will be necessary for the County to put in seven twenty-foot drive ways to accommodate loaded fruit trucks. Also they will have to solve the problem of placement of our rural mailboxes.

I am in complete sympathy with the parents as I also have a child who waits to school. I would much rather have him walk the back route and I do not believe the danger of molestation is as great there. Any person who is considering a sinister crime would want to be assured of a fast getaway and could do this much easier by the highway. Are the parents aware that if the commissioners proceed with their plan, there still will be bicycles in the street, children crowding and manhandling on the adjacent sidewalk, and the speed limit probably would be raised to 40 MPH due to the improved road?

My final decision to stand firm came after I witnessed a fiasco at the County Zoning Board meeting last Wednesday night. Over the vehement and legitimate objections, both verbal and written, of more than seventy property owners, and against the recommendation of the Seminole County Planner, the board voted to recommend a zoning change to permit a huge 100-acre trailer park amongst agricultural properties. There were only three people for the change. One was the owner of the land being sold for the proposed park, and the other two were nearby property owners who presently have temporary trailer permits. I don't know how many millions of dollars a year we clean up our air and water.

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is spending for the next 12 years \$16 2/3 million a year to pollute the land and water of nine Southeastern states with a carcinogenic chlorinated hydrocarbon, subjecting the people to possible cancer, killing fish, shrimp, birds, animals and a few ants. What price consistency?

This is the \$200 million Fire Ant Program for 120 million acres of the nine Southeastern states. A previous fire ant program was evaluated in 1967 by National Research Council, composed of leading scientists from around the country, and the conclusion was that fire ants rank below mosquitoes, dog flies, love bugs, midges and stinging caterpillars as a nuisance to man and cause no great inconvenience to farmers—none that they could not take care

## State Conservation Corps Advocated By Candidate

Harvey Mathews, Republican 20th district candidate for the Orange-Seminole legislative delegation, told his fellow Republican legislative candidates and the Sanford City Commission attending this morning's "fact acquainted" breakfast for Republicans, that he favors the establishment of a conservation corps for Florida (CCF) for young people 16-20.

Modelled after the old Democratic "New Deal" days of Franklin Delano Roosevelt's Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC), the CCF would afford persons from poor welfare families the opportunity of aiding their youth to enter into the program for a set period of time and devote themselves to fighting pollution and cleaning up the environment.

Striking at the area's drug problems with the youth, Mathews said he would like to see a five-year mandatory prison term given all persons convicted of selling narcotics. "I believe this would do a lot toward helping eliminate some of the drug problems now encountered by today's law enforcement," Mathews reasoned.

Other GOP candidates attending the session called by Mayor Lee P. Moore of Sanford included Walter Sims, William Gorman, E. Pope Bassett, Bernard Bender, Lewis Earle, William Gibson and Eugene Monary.

All candidates agreed with Mayor Moore, Sanford City Council member and legislator. The public is invited to attend the groundbreaking ceremonies for the \$3.9 million courthouse facility at 1 p.m. Wednesday on North Park Avenue, opposite Sanford City Hall. The invitation is extended by the Board of County Commissioners, who also is inviting local dignitaries.
