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## National Figure Jumps 0.4% In Month

# Jobless Rate Continues To Rise, Now At 10.8%

WASHINGTON (UPI) — The nation's jobless rate jumped to 10.8 percent in November, another post-Depression record that brought the total unemployed to 12 million, the Labor Department said today.

November's jobless rate showed a sharp 0.4 percent jump from October's 10.4 percent unemployment rate.

The figures showed that the 440,000 additional unemployed in November included an increasing number of white collar workers but that factory workers continued to bear the biggest burden of the recession.

November was the eighth month this

year the jobless rate has gone up and analysts say nothing has happened yet in the economy to promise any big improvement in the near future.

The total number of people still working remained about the same at 99 million during the month.

While many of those listed as unemployed were people reentering the job market but unable to find work, 62 percent of the total were workers who lost their jobs, the department said.

The jobless picture for blue collar workers continued to deteriorate in November, reaching an unemployment rate for that occupational group of 16.5

### Seminole Unemployment Rate Is 6.3%

Unemployment in Seminole County continues to buck the national trend. The county's jobless rate jumped to 6.3 percent in October from the 5.8 percent rate in September but the double digit unemployment that has hit areas with heavy industry has not made an impact in the area.

In Sanford, unemployment com-

pensation claims are on the decline. Officials at the state's employment office here said many farm workers and citrus workers have been returning to work.

Seasonal employment is on the rise, state analysts said.

Seminole's 6.3 percent jobless rate is the lowest in Central Florida.

November, the department said. The department said factory jobs had declined by 2.2 million since the onset of

the recession in July of last year. White collar workers, a category that has fared much better during the recession, started to take its lumps in November, climbing to a jobless rate of 5.6 percent, up 0.5 percent in one month.

All figures were adjusted to compensate for routine seasonal layoff patterns.

The unemployment rate was 9.8 percent in July and August, rising to 10.1 percent in September and 10.4 percent in October. September's increase took the rate to the highest since 1940's 14.6 percent rate that reflected the remnants of Great Depression unemployment.

Thereafter employment improved rapidly with the advent of World War II.

The department said that as in the previous month, the unemployment rise in November occurred primarily among adult men, with a jobless rate of 10.1 percent, and adult women, at 9.1 percent. Teenage unemployment climbed to 24.2 percent. All three categories reached record high levels of unemployment in November.

Joblessness among white workers climbed to 9.7 percent from 9.3 percent in September.

Hispanic workers had an unemployment rate of 15.7 percent.

### Gas Tax Eyed For \$112 Million Road Work

Tough political decisions face Seminole County officials as they search for ways to finance more than \$112 million in highway improvements needed over the next 20 years.

Public Works Director, Jack Schuder said county officials will have to increase revenue sources from the state, federal and local levels to pay for the needed improvements.

Seminole County's needs assessment study identifies \$61 million in county highway projects needed immediately and another \$51 million in long range projects if the county's transportation goals are to be met.

Among the options are imposition of a 1-cent county tax on gasoline, removal of the state's exemption on gasoline from the state's 9 percent sales tax, an increase in license fees and construction of toll roads, Schuder explained.

The state's current 8-cent tax on gasoline is divided up between the state, county and municipal governments. The state receives 4 cents. Two cents go to the counties, the cities get 1 cent and the eighth cent is divided between the counties and cities.

But state law provides the option of levying an additional penny tax on the local level if approved by voters. Seminole County officials have expressed no interest in putting the matter on the ballot.

That extra penny could mean \$700,000 to \$800,000 a year to county budget makers.

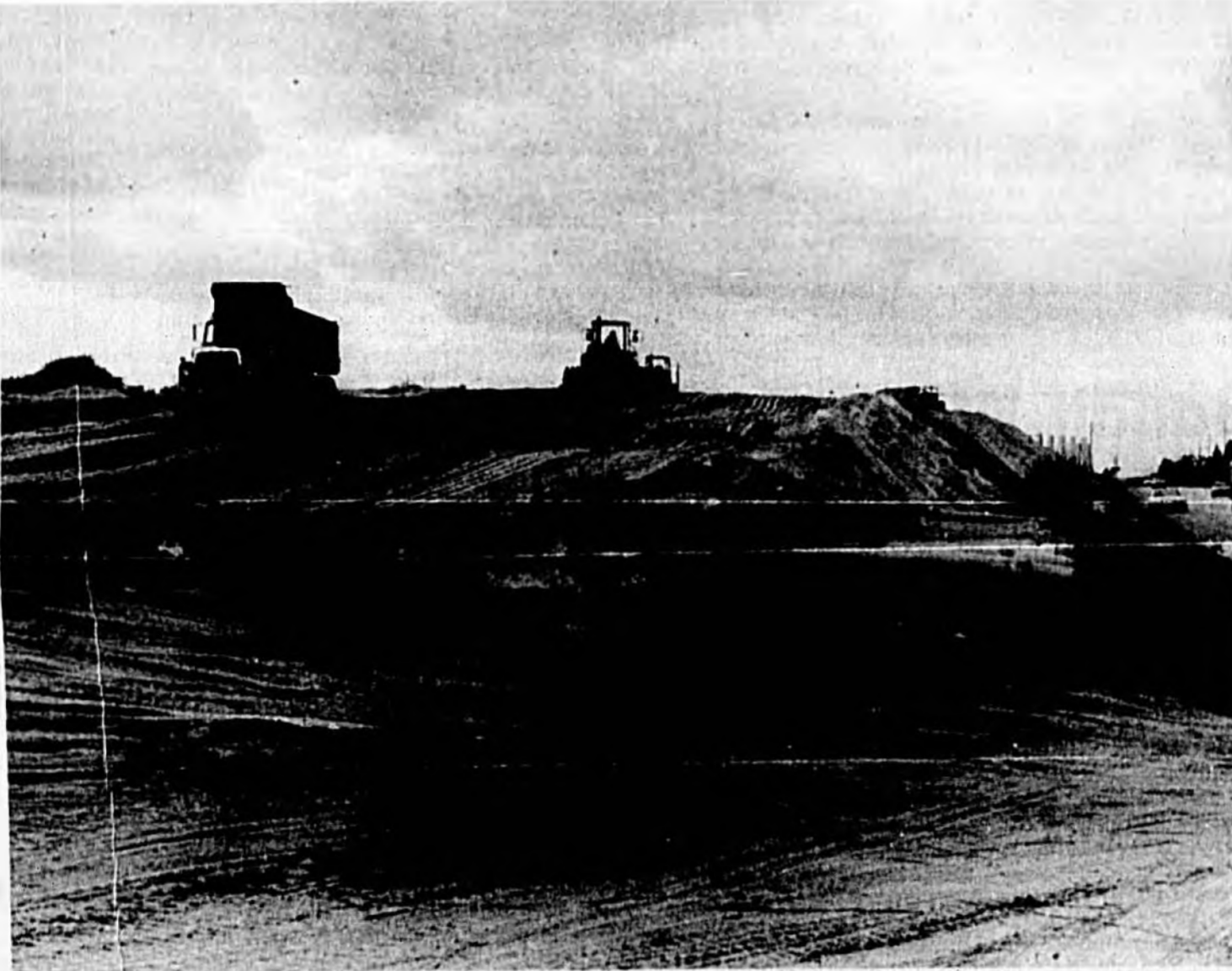
About the same amount of money would be generated by a removal of the sales tax exemption on gasoline. Schuder said a probable breakdown of money generated from that action would bring 1 penny to the county, 1 penny to the cities and 3 cents to the state.

Schuder said pressure is building on state legislators to take some action to free up funds for road development in areas which are experiencing rapid growth.

He recently attended a citizens' commission meeting in Orlando from which three recommendations emerged. Those recommendations were to remove the sales tax exemption, to allow local governments to impose the additional penny tax without holding a referendum and to increase license fees for all vehicles.

Under the proposal, license fees on personal vehicles would go up 50 percent, fees on vehicles over 5,000 pounds would double and on larger commercial vehicles the fees would triple.

An important source of new revenue for roads could be the 5 cent per gallon gasoline tax proposed by President Reagan, Schuder said. Depending upon the

distribution of funds generated by the tax, the county could receive \$500,000 to \$1 million annually.

That money could be used in a bond issue to finance construction, Schuder said.

Another potential revenue source is a toll highway.

"We should look closely at putting in some toll expressways. After some years that would generate some excess funds which could be pledged in a bond issue," Schuder said.

That concept would probably require the county to pledge a certain amount of money from its general fund to back up the receipts of the toll road for the first few years, Schuder said. But after that the toll road would likely become a money maker, helping to support other projects.

Seminole County has taken the first step toward creating toll roads by re-establishing its Expressway Authority. The five county commission members, Sanford Commissioner David Farr and Altamonte Springs Commissioner Lee Constantine serve on the authority.

Schuder said one toll road could connect Oviedo, one of the most rapidly growing residential areas in Seminole County, with the Westinghouse and Martin-Marietta facilities in Orange County, the University of Central Florida and Orlando International Airport.

Another potential toll road is a four-lane elevated expressway above state Road 436 in Altamonte Springs. That toll road was proposed by a citizens' group which studied development needs along that highway.

Schuder said commissioners may want to pick an independent expressway authority to reduce the political problems.

"Obviously there are some very tough political decisions to be made," he said. "Do we want to go to a 9 cent tax? Can we or should we design a tollway in the county knowing that initially it's going to take tax money as a back-up?"

Selecting and purchasing rights-of-way for new highways also will be a difficult problem. Some developed areas will have to be traversed for some future projects, Schuder said.

An important part of the efforts will be public support, he said.

"If they understand where we're going and what we're trying to do, I think they'll back us," Schuder said.

## Charges Pending In Death Of Girl, 5

Police said today they are confident charges will be filed against two suspects in connection with the death of a 5-year-old girl believed to be Ursula Sunshine Assaid, whose body was found Wednesday in a burlap sack at the bottom of an Altamonte Springs retention pond.

Suspects in the case are the girl's mother, Susan Barrett Assaid, 29, and her boyfriend, Donald Glenn McDougall, 26, who are being held by Riverside Calif. police.

Police discovered the body of the badly decomposed girl Wednesday in an 8-foot-deep pond near the Windsong Apartments on Ballard Street between Longwood and Maitland Avenues. Police and fire department divers searched the muck-filled water for about four or five hours before discovering the burlap sack, which contained the body as well as two, 10-pound metal weights.

Seminole County Medical Examiner Dr. G. V. Garay, said his autopsy has not yet been completed on the girl believed to be the young blonde-haired girl, but that he expects to finish the work today.

Garay said that because the body is so badly decomposed, "Dr. Thomas Hegert (Orange County's medical examiner) is also examining the bones and helping us try to make a positive identification of her and determine the cause of death. It takes longer to do an autopsy when the body is in this bad of shape."

Police first learned of the young girl's fate after Riverside, Calif., police contacted them this week and told them where the girl's body could be found.

Riverside police said Ms. Assaid, 29, the suspected dead girl's mother, walked into their station "extremely upset" and gave them information concerning the 5-year-old child.

Riverside police took Ms. Assaid and her boyfriend, McDougall, 26, into custody Tuesday night and are awaiting word from Altamonte Springs police as to whether or not charges will be filed against the couple.

If charges are not filed against the two, they will be released at 5 p.m. today under the state's attorney's speedy arraignment rule. The couple together with Ursula lived along Highland Street in Altamonte Springs just prior to leaving for California on Thanksgiving to seek employment.

"I don't anticipate that (releasing the couple) happening," said Altamonte Springs police Lt. Ed Overman. "We're working as fast as we can now to get things together and I feel we have a good case. I really don't believe they'll be freed."

Overman said that his department has received "numerous telephone calls from people who are concerned that the couple might be let go. Others have called saying they either knew the two or knew the little girl and have tried to help us by giving information on them."

"We even had one man who offered money if that's what it took for us to be able to make our 5 p.m. deadline today," Overman said. "He meant well but that isn't what it takes."

Police said callers have indicated that Ms. Assaid was a good mother but that since her involvement with McDougall, a self-proclaimed tennis pro with a violent nature, Ms. Assaid's personality changed.

Neighbors also told police there had been numerous loud fights at the Highland Street home while the trio lived in Altamonte Springs.

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# Lack Of Funds May Close Ala. Schools

**MONTGOMERY, Ala. (UPI)** — The mother of a high school senior has worried that her daughter may not graduate because of a financial crisis that threatens to close nine Alabama schools.

Another mother said she hopes her two children in elementary school will not have to repeat a grade because there is not enough money to keep classes operating.

Hazel Pemberton and Glenda Colvin, both of Evergreen, said they were concerned that a reduction in state funding could force their children out of public schools.

Their concerns arose from the financial problems of one south Alabama county, but officials claim the scene is similar to situations that could develop in other Southern states that are feeling the pinch of a tight economy.

In the case of Conecuh County, about 3,000 students and 180 teachers would be affected if schools close Dec. 10 as planned. The closings, approved by the local school board several weeks ago, were partially due to proration of the state's education funds.

Proration is an across-the-board reduction of disbursements that is made to accommodate a shortfall in revenues. Gov. Fob

James declared 10 percent proration in October because the state's primary education taxes — income and sales — were not bringing in revenues at anticipated levels.

Conecuh County School Superintendent Walter B. Hudson said proration contributed to the county schools' \$200,000 in debts, which are growing by the day.

He said his system receives about 7 percent of its money from local governments and about 93 percent from the state. So, when state funds were cut back 10 percent, the system was forced to borrow money to meet its obligations, he said.

"In a lot of counties, the local support is a lot higher," Hudson said, "but lots of people here are opposed to new taxes."

State education officials claim the situation is complicated by the fact that teacher salaries cannot be prorated, therefore budget reductions cut deeper into operational expenses.

In Conecuh County, a state evaluation team has been reviewing the school finances in an attempt to formulate possible solutions. The City of Evergreen has also contributed \$150,000 to the system to help keep the schools open.

But officials claim the county needs a continuous source of

revenue and not a one-time shot in the arm. The Conecuh County Commission has discussed a countywide one-cent sales tax for schools, but has not voted on it.

The search for a solution has revitalized old arguments over whether states or local governments should pay for educating children.

Randy Quinn, executive director of the Alabama Association of School Boards, proposed the creation of an incentive fund about four years ago that could be used to convince local governments of the benefits of increasing local educational support.

And state School Superintendent Wayne Teague has eyed reforms that would tie education revenues to more stable taxes.

The income and sales taxes, he claims, are unstable because they fluctuate with changes in the economy. Alabama property taxes, which are the lowest in the nation, are more reliable, he said.

While education officials continued to wrestle over possible solutions, the students and parents of Conecuh County waited anxiously for word on the school closing.

Prior to joining Harris Corporation, Boyd was a professor of electrical engineering and director of the Institute of Science and Technology at the University of Michigan for 13 years. He received his bachelor's and master's degrees in electrical engineering from the University of Kentucky and his doctorate from the University of Michigan.

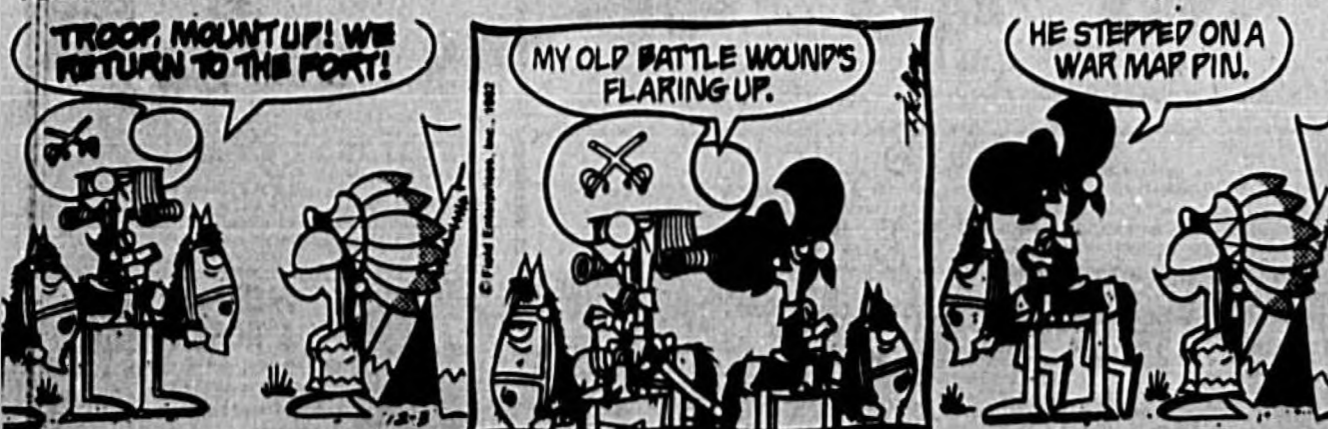

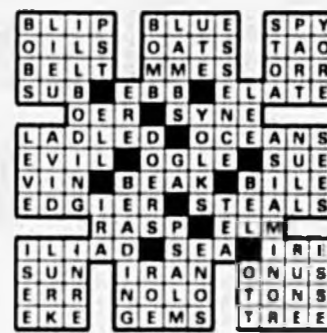

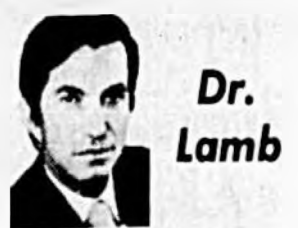

Insulin Pump Shows Promise; It's No Cure



DEAR DR. LAMB - I am a 12-year-old diabetic and I have heard news about an insulin pump. I heard that with this pump you only need shots in a span of three months and you do not have to follow a diet. Will you give me information on this pump? When will it be available?

DEAR READER - It is already being used on a trial basis. There is even more than one model. One is a simple syringe device, the other is automated. They really do offer some real advantages in treating diabetics who need insulin. The preliminary studies look good.

These then function like a normal pancreas. There are lots of different and some difficult facets to diabetes, including problems of insulin resistance, but these new advances may eventually change the lifestyle of diabetics.

Meanwhile, you need to know as much about diabetes as you can, so I am sending you The Health Letter 18-10, Hyperglycemia: The Diabetic Problem.

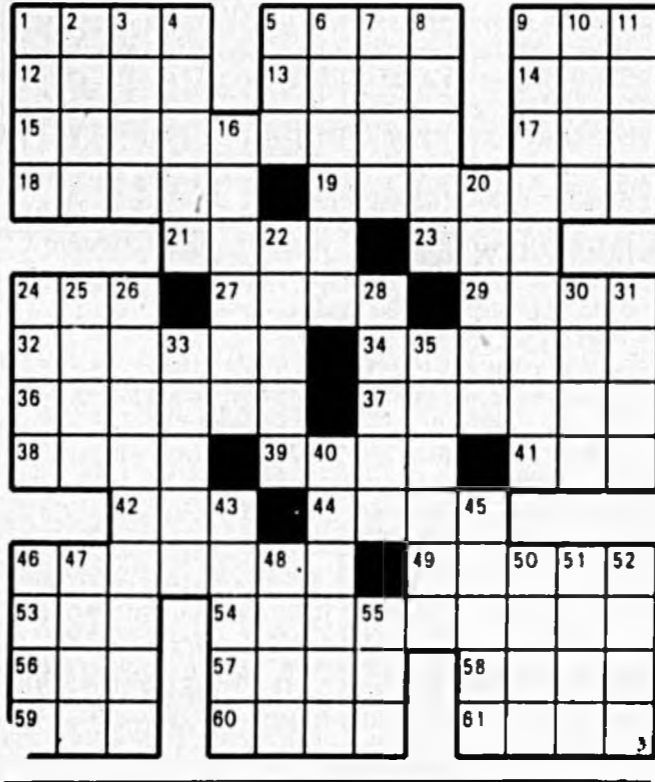
DEAR DR. LAMB - Can you tell me something about parathyroid hormone causing calcium to be elevated in the blood? I have recently developed this condition.

DEAR READER - The parathyroid glands are located on each side (para) of your thyroid gland in your neck. The parathyroid hormone is important in calcium and phosphorus balance. When too much hormone is produced it will cause your bones to lose calcium. The blood phosphorus level may fall.

The increased amount of bone calcium in your blood then must be filtered out by your kidneys, which can lead to kidney stones. In severe cases there may also be peptic ulcers. The combination led to the old medical aphorism to characterize overactive parathyroid glands of bones, stones and groans.

In less severe cases there may be no symptoms. But all cases of calcium kidney stones need to be studied for possible overactive parathyroid glands.

Often there is a tumor (usually benign) of the parathyroid glands that causes the overproduction. In such cases the tumor can be removed surgically.

this one from the October "Popular Bridge" magazine. He reaches six spades after a Gerber sequence pre-invented by Holmes. If he had also pre-invented the Jacoby transfer, North would play the spade slam and have a sure thing against any lead.

Holmes played dummy's queen of hearts at trick one. Betty took her king and led back the jack whereupon the combination of a 4-2 club break and two misplaced red kings cost Holmes the contract.

Holmes commented that he would have made the hand by playing dummy's deuce of hearts. Betty would be unable to knock out the heart ace and would lead back a diamond. Holmes would play as follows: ace of diamonds, king of clubs, club to the ace, ruff a club, ace of spades, ruff a club, draw trumps, ruff to the ace, discard his jack of diamonds on the last club and curtains.

That was an 84 percent play that would have worked, but Holmes' play that failed had been superior except for its failure. He needed to find both red kings wrong, that heart return and the 4-2 club break. That losing play had been better than 90 percent.

# How To Select And Care For Your Christmas Tree

The Christmas tree originated in western Germany several hundred years ago. German settlers introduced the custom into Pennsylvania in 1816 and by 1850 the Christmas tree had become fashionable in the eastern states. Today the Christmas tree is one of the most popular and beautiful symbols in Christmas.

It is important to choose a fresh tree and keep it as fresh as possible so that your tree will remain lovely throughout the holidays. First of all select a tree with good needle holding ability. Florida's warm weather causes trees

a full, bushy appearance.

Those skinny, "see-through" trees should be avoided. Most people also prefer a conical, symmetrical shape to their tree. The branches should be sturdy enough to hold ornaments and other decorations such as small gifts.

The more recent the tree has been cut the better. Freshly cut trees will have good needle holding quality and will have better resistance to ignition. These points are extremely important. Scotch and white pine and Douglas and Balsam fir naturally have good needle holding qualities. Spruce trees tend to lose

needles quickly. Bend the needles to determine the tree's freshness. The needles should be supple and springy. If the needles break, the tree is not fresh. Bounce the butt of the tree on the ground and see how many needles fall. If more than a few fall, the tree is old and dry.

Also feel the stump. The sap should be sticky and moist not hard and caked. After you have selected your tree, follow these tips to maintain color and minimize needle fall.

Stand the tree in a large bucket of water in a shady and cool place. The cooler the better. If the tree has to lean

against the wall, turn it daily to allow the branches to retain their shape. When you move the tree indoors, make a fresh cut across the trunk at least an inch or two above the old cut to allow the tree to absorb water.

Place the tree in a suitable container which contains water. In most homes a tree can absorb up to a quart of water a day so keep the reservoir filled. A floral preservative, such as those used for flower arrangements added to the water will help keep the tree fresh.

Place the tree in the coolest part of the room away from the fireplace, radiator or other heating units.

A well-watered tree in a cool location will hold its needles longer and retain its quality. It will also be the safest as far as a fire is concerned. Do keep the tree away from a hot TV set or candles. Also, carefully check all Christmas tree lights for loose connections or worn wires. Avoid over-loading lighting circuits and unplug lights when leaving the room.

Take the time to properly select and care for your tree this Christmas and you won't have to buy a second one before the great day arrives.

## Agent Killed, One Hurt In Drug Deal Shootout

MIAMI (UPI) — For the first time since the formation of the president's south Florida task force against crime, a federal agent has been shot and killed. Ariel Rios, 28, of four-year veteran of the bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms, died after being shot in the face during a gun battle in a "Little Havana" motel Thursday. Also wounded in the gun fight with suspected drug dealers was Alex D'Atri, 36, a 13-year ATF Veteran assigned to the south Florida task force shortly after it was formed in March. The two agents were inside the Hurricane Motel attempting to purchase 148,000 worth of cocaine when somebody started shooting, according to police.

## Miami To Stage 1992 Fair

MIAMI (UPI) — The U.S. Commerce Department has given a tentative green light for Miami's 1992 exposition celebrating the 500th anniversary of Columbus' discovery of the New World. "Basically, we've been told that if we don't compete directly with Chicago the government will recognize Miami's fair, which will make us eligible for federal funding," said Randy Coleman, president of the business-backed 1992 Florida Columbus Exposition Inc. Coleman's organization lost their bid to Chicago for President Reagan's nomination as the 1992 World Fair host city.

## New Call For Withdrawal Of Troops From Lebanon

Lebanese President Amin Gemayel urged President Reagan to help restore his nation's independence and the United States called for an immediate end to the "intolerable" foreign occupation of two-thirds of the nation. Gemayel issued his call for help in talks with U.S. envoy Norris Draper and officers of the 4,100-soldier tri-national, peace-keeping force including U.S., French and Italian troops stationed in the capital. Lebanon's president has called for an expansion of the multi-national force to 35,000 troops to speed the withdrawal of 40,000 Syrians, 10,000 Palestinian guerrillas and 30,000 Israelis occupying two-thirds of his country.

# Economy Still Staggering

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Factory workers are suffering under the 15-month-old recession that is stubbornly hanging on, but construction workers are getting a little hope from increases in new home sales. New factory orders, especially for large items like appliances and cars, dropped in October to the lowest level in more than two years, the Commerce Department said Thursday. At the same time retailers reported their sales were up in November compared to a year ago, but analysts said that was mostly because November 1981 sales were so poor. Construction workers could take hope from a separate report showing sales of new houses remained above the 400,000 unit-a-year rate for a second month, perhaps inspiring some new residential construction. Yet industry analysts said the improvement came too late to keep 1982 from finishing as the worst year for house sales on record.

On Wall Street the stock market finished mixed for the second day Thursday. The Dow Jones Industrial average gained 2.02 points to close at 1,033.11.

But gold buyers, reflecting some new economic pessimism, drove gold \$7 to \$11.50 higher an ounce on world markets as the dollar slumped against major foreign currencies Thursday. The factory orders report was particularly bad news for workers in the "big ticket" large durable goods industries who have already been hit hardest by the recession. While overall orders dropped 3.9 percent from September durables orders were down 4.65 percent.

For the auto and related industries, including mobile homes,



the decline in orders was a hefty 17.4 percent during October. Construction materials orders dropped 2.4 percent. The steel industry and other primary metals orders fell 12.8 percent. Machinery orders were down 4.9 percent. The total value of all new manufacturing orders was \$150.1 billion, down \$8 billion from September, the department said. It was the lowest value for new orders since June 1980's \$145.7 billion, despite inflation's increase in prices since then.

Clogging—it's an old American dance that's getting a lot of attention these days.

At the heart of the revival is the increased popularity in country music. As country music and cowboy hats have swept the nation, city and country folks alike have taken to the dance floors in ever-increasing numbers.

But traditionalists take note. Not everyone out there

who's clogging is doing the same steps as you are.

The traditional Appalachian folk dance has gone through a metamorphosis over the years. Now, everything from the two-step to line dances are going under the guise of clogging.

Perhaps that's because of the muddled past of the dance itself. According to historians, it's ancestor is the morris dance of England, France, Scotland and Ireland.

The morris dance is the predecessor of many American

folk dances and came with the immigrants to the shores of the New World.

Originally, the morris dance was a fertility dance, practiced by pagans for more than 10 centuries. Clogging, a step using three contact points—the toe, the ball of the foot and the heel—was devised to let one or two dancers show off their talents while the others got a drink.

The Scots-Irish settlers of the isolated areas of Ken-

**HOLLYWOOD (NEA)** — It is easy for non-Catholics, like Frank Yablans, the producer, and Christopher Reeve, the star, to shrug off the opposition of Catholics to their movie "Monsignor," but how do Catholics involved in the production feel about it?

"The script surprised and shocked me a little," says Genevieve Bujold, who was educated in a French Canadian Catholic convent school for 11 years. "I am not worried about what the sisters in the convent school will think about it — they will never see it."

She adds that the film's content, variously described as anti-church and simply anti-everything, won't bother her own family. She says they just care about her own performance.

As for Fernando Rey, the Spanish actor who plays a cardinal in the film, his Catholicism is no longer an issue.

"I was born in a Catholic family," Rey says, "but I don't practice it any more. The Spanish people are very Catholic, of course, but I don't believe they will have any special negative reaction to it."

Genevieve Bujold believes her convent upbringing helped her when it came time for her to play a postulant in "Monsignor."

"I didn't feel unfamiliar in that uniform," she says. "Those black-and-white, itchy stockings. I knew what they felt like! I loved the beauty of the convent, but, then, I have a tendency to remember the good things."

She lives, these days, in

Malibu, hard by the ocean, with her two sons — a teenager named Matthew and a pre-schooler named Emmanuel. She is primarily a mother, she insists, and acts only when that doesn't interfere with her maternal

joys. "I go to market," she says. "I do the housework, cook and clean and all that. I raise nice vegetables. My day to day is routine. I like my life, I think it is unfolding right. And yet, of course, I get moments of restlessness."

"When that happens, I go off and run at the Pepperdine track. Sometimes, you know, it's tough to be a mother. I have two hours a day to myself, from 4 to 6 in the afternoon, when a girl from Pepperdine comes in. Then I run, or do other things."

"Arambillet was too complicated a name for an actor. And Vega was much too common. So I took my fourth surname as my professional stage name."

tucky, West Virginia, North Carolina and Tennessee brought their dances with them and throughout America's colonial history, clogging was practiced primarily in those mountain regions while the rest of America was doing the waltz and the cotillon dances.

Perhaps because of various influences within the isolated pockets of Appalachia (the same ones which affected how we speak) different clogging forms emerged. In some areas, clog steps are tied into regular square dance moves. In others, cloggers are permitted to use only front and back movements of the legs. Others treat clogging as a free-for-all.

Today, the rule is anything goes. Cloggers still use the three contact points. Many also use metal taps on their toes and heels to create a rhythm similar to tap dancing.

Clogging groups compete in competitions and the dance is now taught along with other traditional folk dances. Many clubs which have country music also offer lessons.

The Barn, on U.S. Highway 17-92 in Sanford, offers lessons on Tuesday nights. Lessons are also available at 7 p.m. Thursdays at the Osteen community center.

With a little luck and some work, who knows, maybe you'll be good enough to enter the state championships March 18-20 at Auburndale.

# 'Remington Steele' Almost Makes It

NBC's "Remington Steele" is a frustrating show to watch. It comes so maddeningly close to being classy. Here's a breezy caper outing with flashes of suspense and sophisticated humor, as well as glossy production values and a nifty Henry Mancini score.

Meanwhile, here is a show that is so badly acted and so sexually outmoded that it often reminds you more of a Harlequin Romance than it does "The Pink Panther." Like I said, frustrating. Laura Holt (Stephanie Zimbalist) is a top-flight private eye and liar. She was unable to get work on her own, we are told, because "a female detective seemed so ... feminine." So she invented a high society male boss for herself — Remington Steele — and has been deceiving her cash-paying customers ever since.

She has successfully parlayed her little ruse into a winning concern. Her office is elegant and carpeted, and includes a legman with a broken nose, Murphy (James Reed) and a sexy secretary, Bernice (Janet DeMay).

While this gimmick might have played in 1958, I find it hard to swallow now. There are plenty of women private eyes. At least there have been on TV. If you're good, you're good.

And, as it happens, Laura Holt is not. At least not the way Miss Zimbalist plays her, which is as a ruthlessly ambitious, college-educated career woman, who is, at the same time, a fresh-faced, hopelessly naive coed — one who yells "Eek!" when somebody points a gun at her, and who lets her heart do her thinking for her. Particularly as concerns our male counterpoint, a tall, dark and handsome stranger (Pierce Brosnan) with no name, just "his blue eyes and his mysterious past." In our pilot, Laura (the Steele agency, that is) has

been hired to protect \$2.6 million in gems. Our stranger, a high-flying thief and con artist, is one of the people who wants to steal them. When he discovers there is no Remington Steele, he steps forward and convinces the client that he is Steele. Laura is stuck. She cannot say a word to refute it. "You're nothing but a cheap crook" she snaps later. "I'm an artist," he replies, grinning.

And, whoa boy, what a stiff! If I had to guess his past, I'd say it was spent modeling Botany 500 suits. I mean, Leonard Nimoy is jauntier than this guy.

Smelling a sweet deal, our con man sticks around. In spite of the fact that Laura doesn't trust him, that he runs up huge bills to the agency and that he threatens to destroy everything she has worked for, she lets him

stick — week after week. Why doesn't she throw him out on his ear? Because she has an uncontrollable case of the hots for him. "He's here, you're here," advises Bernice. "Go for it." "I can barely keep him in line now," says Laura, staring dreamily at his picture. "So where does that leave you?" asks Bernice. "Itchy," she replies.

He, in turn is smitten with Laura. Though it's hard to figure out why.

While "Remington Steele" has its lapse in logic and believability, they'd be easy to overlook with a better cast. Turn back the clock, put Audrey Hepburn and Cary Grant in the leads and you'd be grinning for a solid hour every week. Maybe that's not a fair way to assess a show's failings, but in this case it's the unfortunate truth.

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# Stand-Up Success Is Nothing To Laugh About

They dream about making it big on television — starring in a "Mork and Mindy" the way Robin Williams did or guest-hosting for Johnny Carson as often as David Brenner does. In between there would be the juicy bookings in Vegas and Atlantic City.

For now, however, they struggle along at odd jobs just to keep themselves fed.

"They" are the fledgling comics, most of whom were already competent as actors when some inner urge set them off on the much tougher path of stand-up comedy. They must hew out styles, hire writers when they run low on their own creations, develop the charisma to grab an audience and the savvy to woo the just-smilers into laughter. It ain't easy. Why do they do it? Also, how do they do it?

Here's the why and how of one: Barry Steiger, Kentucky-born, slender, dark hair, light eyes. He was ordained in his teens as a Baptist minister. Not his true vocation as it turns out, though he has not lost his religious faith even now. By 20 he was a successful radio deejay (he has a great speaking voice) and then he did TV news reading.

At off-hours he wrote a comedy routine good enough to get him a couple of Playboy Club bookings. He was hooked, quit the good jobs and declined part-time announcing when he moved to New York. "Afraid I might trap myself by security and lose

my motivation," he says. Now at 25 he's been paying his dues for four years, is no longer a neophyte and has a list of "thank-yous" as long as any Oscar-winner reels off at awards ceremonies. At the top are his mentor Shelley Berman and Silver Friedman, "den mother" of New York's Improvisation Club where Barry appears often. (The Improv, as it's known, nurtured such earlier talents as David Brenner and Bette Midler.)

The turning point for Barry was two years ago when his idol, Berman (who guests this week on ABC's "Star of the Family"), "gave me a real appointment, looked at my material, made on-the-spot suggestions." Berman still talks extensively with Barry by long-distance phone calls. And when he's away, Mrs. Berman pitches in.

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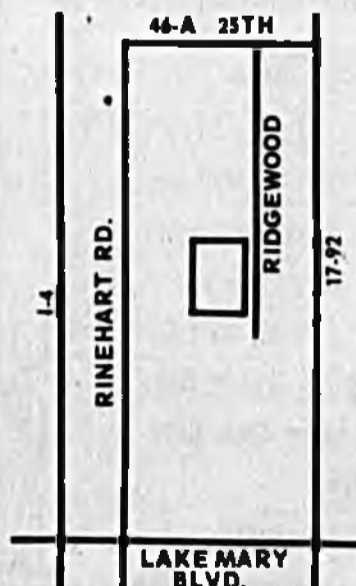
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
