

City offers assistance for condo project

Redevelopment agency OKs \$140K in aid, while Commission secures title to property

 SANFORD — A proposed multimillion-dollar project to develop Lake Mary's downtown area has received city approval. The city's assistance for the development agency, CR Development, includes \$140,000 in assistance for the development proposed by Suncoast Properties Inc. of Lake Mary, located on vacant property west of City Hall. The project would include construction of a 10-story office building and a 100-unit apartment building.

This is exactly the type of project Sanford needs downtown, and CRA board member Bob Carroll said he has already invested more than \$1 million in the area. "You've got a developer who put his money where his mouth is. When you do that, I don't have a problem with the CRA providing some incentive." The project is expected to have a value of \$12.5 million and generate about \$130,000 in annual tax revenue to City Manager...

The project would include three 10-story buildings, a parking garage and a small parcel of vacant land. The project is currently owned by Suncoast Properties Inc. and is being developed by CR Development. The project is located on the corner of Lake Mary and Light Street. 

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

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UCF wins national cheer title

UCF's varsity cheerleading squad turned in a flawless routine of tumbling, stunts and cheers Saturday to claim the Universal Cheerleading Association College Cheerleading National Championship in Denver's Wide World of Sports.

In the process, the Golden Knights earned the best finish of their year's season, a first and a testament to the hard work and

dedication of UCF's cheerleaders. The squad finished in 10th place in the national competition.

UCF's first national title and marked the ninth time in the 16 years UCF has finished in the top 10 in the nation. UCF finished behind Kentucky last year and also posted a runner-up finish in 1994.

Kentucky finished second in 1995. Other schools that have won the title include Alabama, Tennessee and Cincinnati, Penn State, Ohio State, Wisconsin, LSU and Mississippi State.

UCF's cheer team finished in 10th place in the national competition Saturday with a first place showing behind a quartet of Big 10 schools.

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Swartson get for Star Island Tennis Classic

WINTER PARK — Standing at the Winter Park tennis shop and stringing up a racket, Ted Swartson reflects on what he will take on this week. He's 39 now, pushing 40. The trouble was, he came to Seminole County in 1982 to attend Seminole Community College, who once beat the likes of injury-prone Ivan Lendl and Boris Becker, hadn't participated on the ATP tour in ten years.

But he still looks to be in great condition, which will help when he teams up with fellow former pro Richard Schmidt, 37, in the doubles competition of the Star Island Tennis Classic, at the Star Island Resort in Kissimmee, Jan. 17-19.

"I'm not sure when we stand socially," Swartson said. "We haven't seen that kind of pace in a while, we both play a little bit, but we don't play every day. So we'll see what happens. It's doubles, so there's not such a big piece."

After leaving the tour in 1993, Swartson, who was a top-100 JUCO All-American at SCC and a two-time NAIA All-American and National Singles Champion at Flagler College in St. Augustine, got into the health care business for a few years. Then four years ago that

market dried up and he found his way back to the tennis court. Three years ago he and a friend imported tennis strings from England and founded J.S. Tennis, Inc., a full-service tennis shop and Internet company located just in front of the Interstate 4 overpass on West Fairbanks Avenue.

But this weekend he'll take a break from the shop to play relatively close to home. Selected to the tournament as a wild card team, Swartson and Schmidt will likely rank as the oldest team in a field of players ranked between 200 and 400 in the world. The tournament qualifies as a United States Tennis Association Professional Circuit "Future" event, serving as a proving ground for young up-and-coming players.
