\$380 Million To Be Spent In Two Years

WASHINGTON (UPI)—Administration forces worked on last minute changes today to boost the federal government's anti-inflation program. 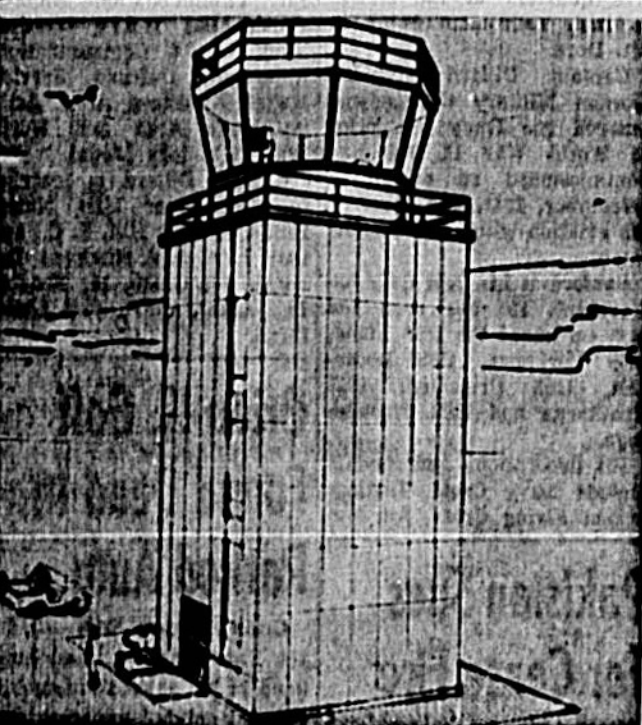

Death Benefits Upped By VA For Widows

ST. PETERSBURG (Sp) — M. T. Dixon, of the Florida Department of Veterans Affairs announced today that survivors benefits were increased effective Sept. 1, for widows of Armed Forces members who die, or have died on active duty, of a service connected cause after leaving active duty. The higher rates—ranging from an increase of 41 per cent for the widow of a recruit with less than four months service, to 815 per cent for the widow of a top ranking military member. This result from Congressional approval of new pay scales for active members of the Armed Forces. The basic amount widow receives, under the Survivors Benefit Act, is the determining part on the basis of the amount of pay the husband would be receiving if still alive and on active duty. The widow receives 120 per cent plus 15 per cent of the active duty pay which goes to a member of the Armed Forces with the same rank, and same years of service as her deceased spouse. 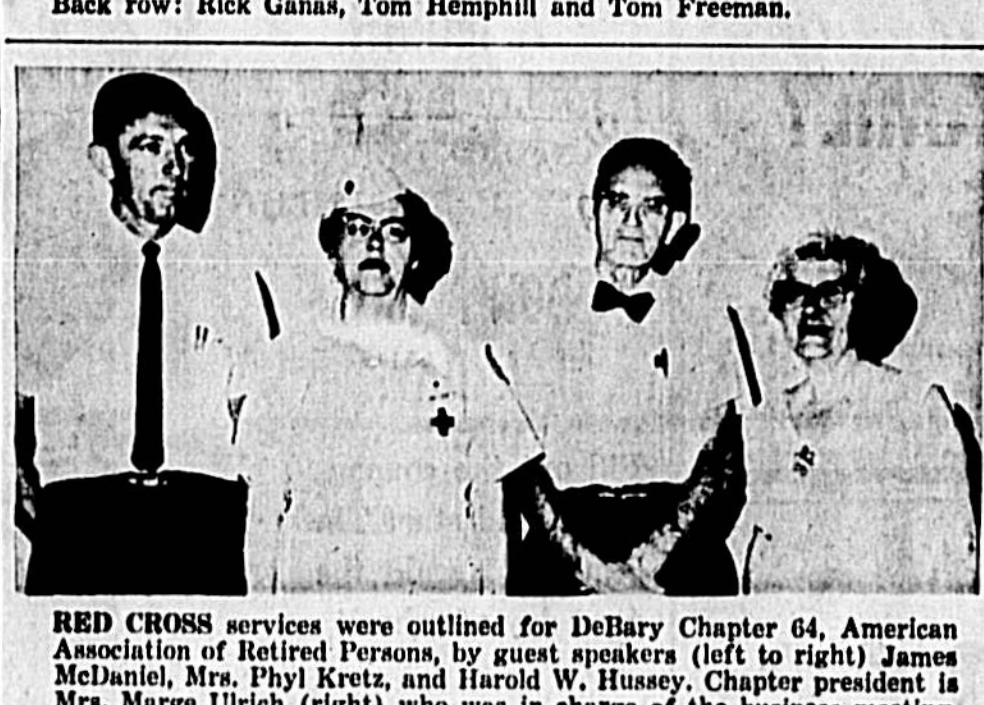

LOS ANGELES (UPI)—The recreation and parks department received an untimely letter from a youth with a troubled conscience.

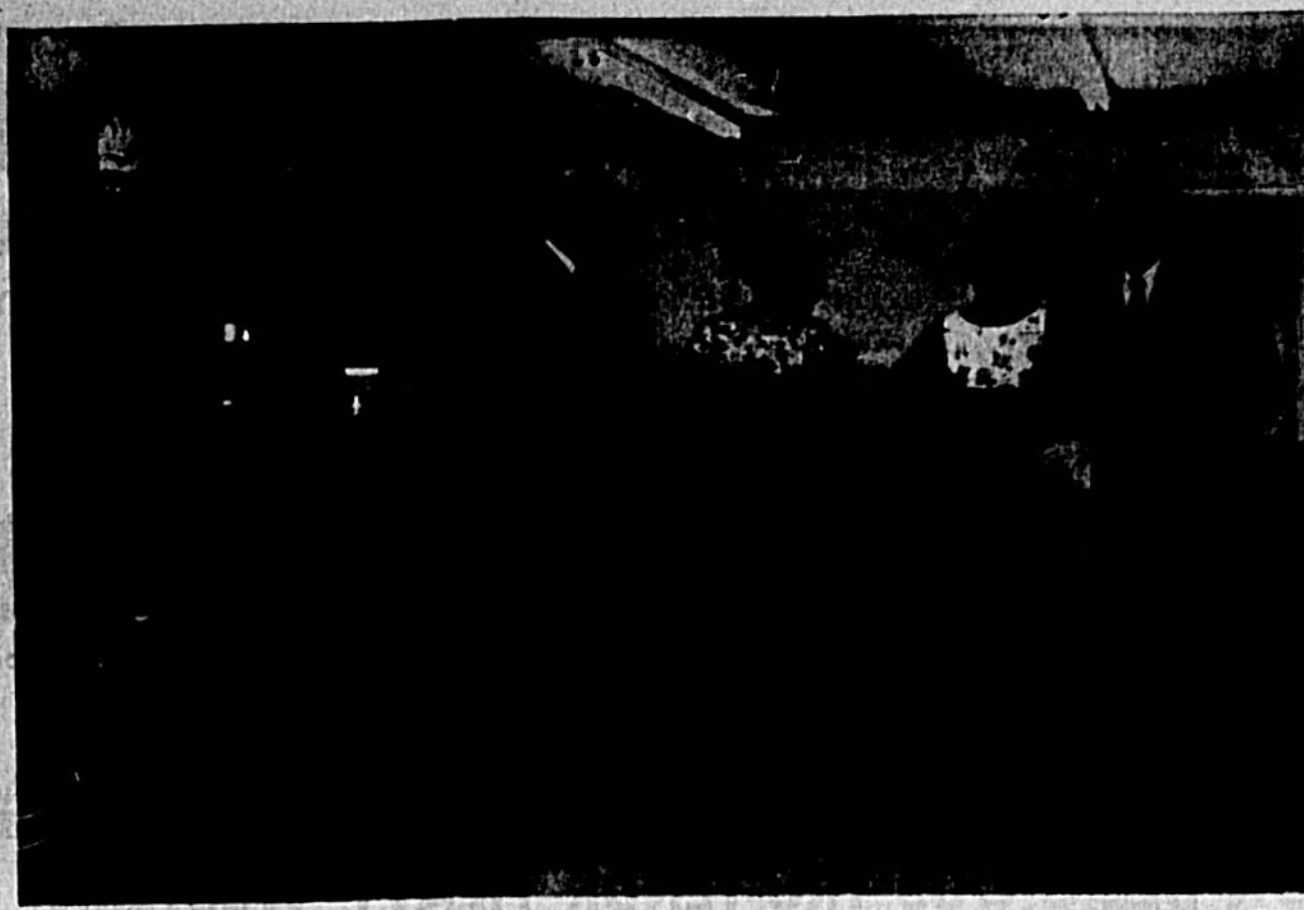
"Approximately one month ago I stole some sporting goods . . . I have told my parents about this," the letter said.

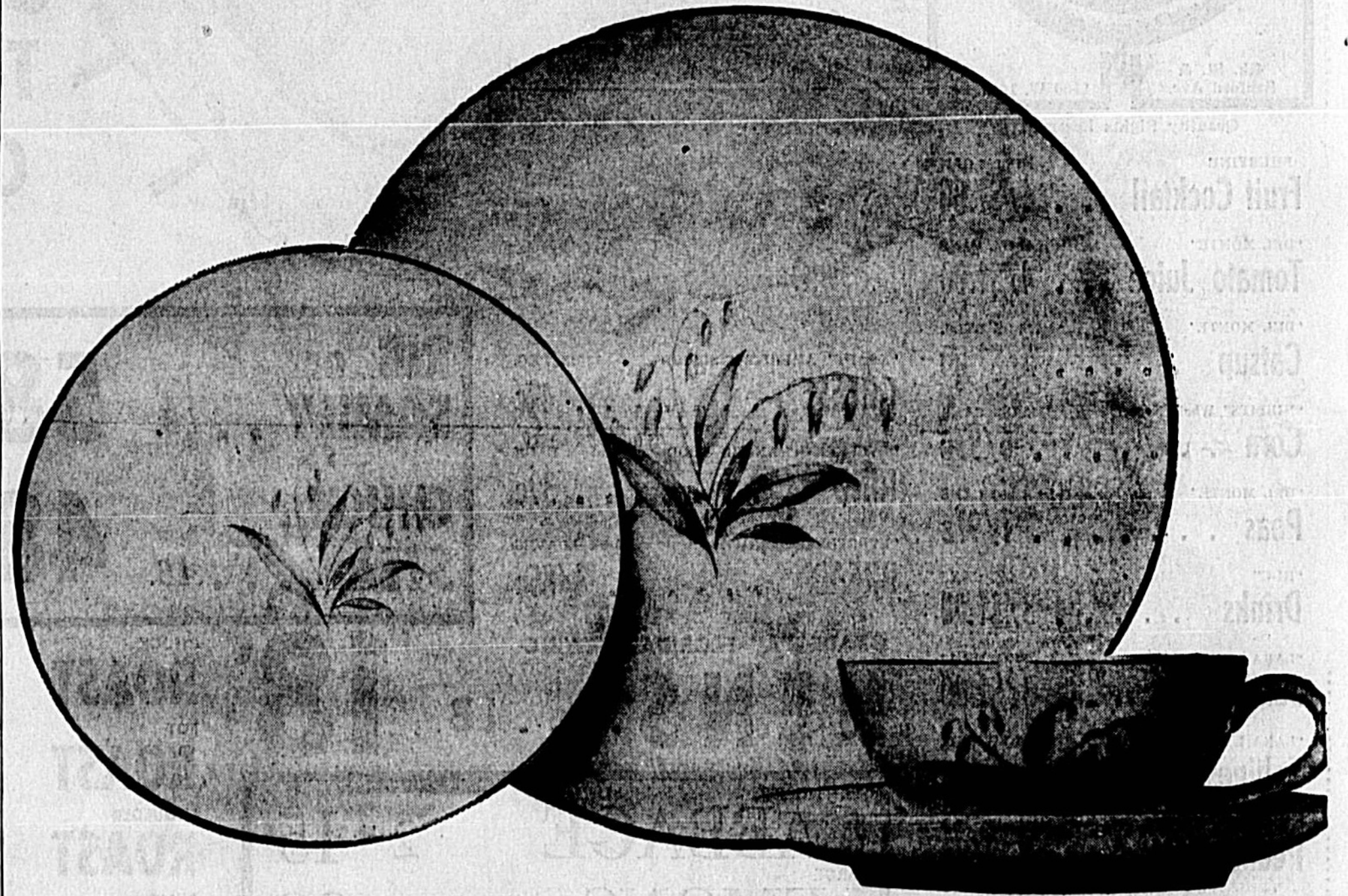
