He testified on the Kilgore bill to broaden the jobless pay coverage and raise the national maximum standard of \$50 week for 30 weeks. Uncle Sam has loaned \$1 billion dollars of the money he expected to receive this year from the Federal Reserve Bank of the Fed for war purposes—estimated at \$2 billion for the entire year. The bill would require the States to contribute to the cost of the program.

Bay, Altape, Wakde-Sarmi, Morotai, Sanapor, Mapia Islands, Asia Islands, and Mindanao, bring back memories of long hard marches, hardships that we have suffered together, wet, muddy foxholes, screams of enemy shells, anxious moments when fear brought cold beads of sweat to our faces. "The Dixie Division has given a good account of itself and it has an excellent record—of which we are now very proud."

Then the commanding general, serving in the absence of temporary duty in the States of Major General Clarence A. Martin of Columbia, S.C., reminded his men that it might take some time for them to get home.

"We are now thinking of home, loved ones and friends, peaceful pursuits, our return to the kind of living we have been dreaming about. We are much nearer to realizing that dream than we were 10 days ago, but we must face the fact that there is still much work to be done."

"Even though we get full cooperation from those who were our enemies it will take time to gather them together and to process them. Japan and other enemy-held territory will have to be occupied and many troops will be required. Redeployment and reduction of the Army will take time. The transportation home of our forces will be a mammoth and time consuming job."

"You have a trying time ahead of you. The period of waiting will test your patience. But we must sit tight and take it with the same fortitude you have displayed in combat."

"Exactly what we will do for the next few months I cannot tell you. You will be kept busy and I hope you will be very busy, for it will make the time pass more swiftly."

"Regardless of the time it will take, however, we can be happy in the thought that the danger of stopping an enemy bullet has passed, and that, eventually, we are going home. We will keep our spirits high. We will finish our job."

### The Selective Service Board

Last week in these columns we called attention to the excellent record which Selective Service enjoys in this county and to the fact that more than 51 percent of all Seminole County men entering the Army or Navy were volunteers. To those other volunteers who served without pay on the Selective Service Board, the Herald today pays tribute.

This tremendous responsibility of deciding who was to go to war, who was to be called first, who was to be deferred, who was essential to the Army and Navy and who was most essential to some essential industry, exactly whose mother's son was to run the risk of being shot at, and whose was to remain behind, fell largely upon the shoulders of four Sanford men.

So well did they handle their job, so confident of their judgment and fairness was the public, that out of five thousand registrants in this county, whose various classifications totaled over 20,000, each of which was subject to a hearing by the Congressional Appeal Board, only four appeals were taken from this county and the local Board was upheld in all four cases.

The members of this board to whom the public is indebted are Ralph B. Chapman, chairman, Joseph Leinhardt, secretary, L.A. Brumley and E.C. Harper, E.B. Carter has been clerk of the Board from the beginning and deserves great credit for a job well done.

The Board also had the assistance of an Advisory Board for Registrants composed of Judge Jas. G. Sharon, John G. Leonard, and the late S.J. Mix. It was their job to assist the registrants in seeing that they were properly classified. Fred R. Wilson early served as Government Appeal Agent for the Board and later became a member of the Appeal Board for the Fifth Congressional District, meeting once a week in Orlando. Judge Sharon then became Government Appeal Agent.

The Herald cannot commend too highly the generous co-operation of the local doctors, who at a time when they were seriously overworked by the civilian population, devoted many hours to giving free pre-induction examinations to registrants. Those who have been particularly active in this work are Dr. J.N. Tolar, Dr. G.S. Selman, Dr. W.H. Garner, Dr. J.A. Smith, Miss Mary Rawlins, Dr. J.W. Martin of Oviedo and Dr. Geo. H. Starke.

### Progress

While there seems no reason to doubt that civilized nations, especially our own country, are now coming into an age of unparalleled energy, it may be well not to put too much emphasis on this form of human progress. Material things are necessary, but immaterial things—human character, progress in the development of art, learning, human friendliness and cooperation in the finer aspects of life—these are the things that count.

Man will be really civilized when people have forgotten that there ever was such a thing as war, strife and all the petty distractions that keep him from realizing his highest aims.

Even in our greatest victories, military and material, it may well be kept in mind that these are not the ultimate goal of human effort. The most important things are learned in the quiet church, rather than in the noisy market place.

### THE ATOMIC BOMB

NEW YORK HERALD TRIBUNE

The first stupefying impact of the atomic bomb is passing, making possible a somewhat more measured estimate perhaps of this revolutionary new thing which has been introduced into our world society. From the Smyth report, the testimony of the unhappy Japanese and other hints one may assemble a statement of what seems to be the significant social aspects of the invention.

1. It is a weapon of altogether unparalleled destructiveness, against which there appears to be no present possibility of defense. It is small enough to be carried by a single plane, and no existing methods of anti-aircraft defense can prevent at least one out of even a small group of attacking planes from getting through. Even if delivery by plane could be prevented, it would probably not be too difficult to devise effective methods of delivery by electrically directed long-range rockets. Because of the peculiar manner in which it is detonated, there seems small hope of devising any adequate interception by means of rays, electrical fields or defensive guns.

2. The bomb can apparently be produced in significant numbers without prohibitive cost. The world contains very considerable stores of uranium, the essential raw material. The development cost of \$2,000,000,000 expended by the United States is not in itself very great—it is equivalent to our total expenditures for carrying on the war for about nine days—and now that the process has been established the cost of each succeeding bomb will, of course, rapidly diminish.

3. The bomb can be used with no danger to itself, the United States can now produce and store enough bombs to devastate most of the larger cities of the earth in a brief time.

4. Peace-time uses of the invention are still too remote to be of present consequence in themselves. The partial tapping of the atomic energy in two particularly unstable elements is only a tiny first step toward any general use of the energy locked in common materials—much as the discovery that first could be struck from flint was only a first step toward the present heat-energy age of coal and petroleum. The energies of the bomb explosion are today as useless industrially as the energies of a TNT detonation. Uranium-driven central power plants may be nearer to realization; but even so, their effects upon the world's economy would be only gradual and hardly as revolutionary, perhaps, as those of the introduction of the internal-combustion engine. The most important peace-time uses appear to be in the fields of therapeutics and investigation. But while none of these peace-time applications is immediately significant in itself, they have a considerable effect upon the social problem. They are so promising as to make it certain that research on all aspects of atomic physics must and will be pressed; they destroy any hope, in other words, that the genie can ever now be thrust back into the bottle.

4. The United States is the sole present custodian of the secret. Even our British and Canadian colleagues are not parties to the theoretical and bomb-making. On the other hand, all the basic knowledge is the common property of the scientific world; advances of

### Citrus Bureau Plans To Open on Sept. 17

WINTER HAVEN, Aug. 29. (Special) Florida's citrus inspection bureau, charged with the control of shipments from the state, checking every box of fruit packed for sale, as well as cannery offerings, will be ready to start the new season on Monday, Sept. 17.

George E. Copeland, the supervising inspector, said that while he was not trying to predict the actual start of the season or the first shipments, his district supervisor, manning 17, would be on duty, starting Sept. 17, ready to give inspection to any packer requesting the service and that inspectors would be added to the staff as fast as the demand warranted.

The district supervisors will be called to the Winter Haven headquarters on Sept. 15 for a discussion of the new season and a review of the laws under which the bureau operates.

Copeland said that early reports indicated the first fruit of the season, early maturing grapefruit, would probably come from the Lee county area, in and around Fort Myers, followed closely by shipments from Lake and upper Orange counties.

The return of servicemen to their former posts on the inspection staff will give Copeland sufficient manpower for the season, he said, without hiring and training new men. He expects a peak staff of 230 to 235 men to cover from 285 to 300 houses in the 32-county citrus producing area. Schools for the inspectors will probably get underway sometime after Sept. 20.

# U. S. Will Scrap Most Of Surplus Arms Overseas

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21 (AP)—Extra Supplies Not Be Sold To Others; Big Task In Pacific

WASHINGTON, Aug. 21 (AP)—Most surplus surplus of munitions items, such as ammunition, tanks and guns, will be scrapped rather than sold to foreign governments, Major General Donald H. Connolly, Army-Navy Deputy Liquidation Commissioner, said recently in an interview.

Sales of munitions that can be used immediately as instruments of war will be the exception rather than the rule, General Connolly said. Such sales can be made only by the office of the Army-Navy Liquidation Commissioner, which has charge of surplus material declared excess by the military and State Departments. This is a measure designed to prevent arms from falling into the hands of a hostile power.

General Connolly gave the impression that the United States, through its surplus agents, does not seek to speed the disposal of military items that can be put to a peace-time use, General Connolly said. Trucks, tanks, bulldozers, shovels, tractors, tents and thousands of similar items will be placed on the market, once they become surplus, the commission faces a stupendous task.

The commission has two representative groups now in the Pacific area gathering preliminary information on the billions of dollars worth of possible surplus of military supplies. Six more representatives will leave this country next week to speed the study.

With no local markets indicated for excess goods in the Pacific, the United States will turn chiefly to China, India, Burma, Australia and the Dutch East Indies. The commission has representatives in South America, however, looking for prospective markets.

If such sales are made, the Treasury Department must approve the money used to speed the disposal of goods sold, unless the Treasury gives its permission for goods to be sold directly to the Army or Navy.

The War Department today was unable to place a dollar figure on the total value of war supplies that have been taken to the Pacific and remain unexpended, but said this survey would be completed soon after the official V J Day.

reported to the fleet for duty. In 1917 the Naval Air Station at Pensacola started with a total complement of 38 officers, Capt. Easton continued. The complement of 38 as compared to the present complement at NAS Sanford shows the increase in size of Naval Aviation.

He then went on to state that in 1944 there were 1,135 students who were graduated from the Air Station at Sanford. During the operation of the field the average weekly flying time was in excess of 3,124 hours. The Station maintains 150 fighter planes, of which 78 to 80 per cent are always in commission.

The working hours on main tenance of aircraft are daylight only, he said. Accordingly, it is assumed that the base is now operating at about 60 per cent of its capacity. The Commanding Officer said he was of the opinion that the station will continue at this capacity until about June of 1946. The total number of fighter pilots graduated from the Station up to the present date is 2,987. To put this another way he said, this is enough fighter pilots to man over 50 carriers or about one-quarter of the carrier fleet.

Capt. Easton outlined the schedule of flying that was to be carried out yesterday afternoon. He pointed out that the motion pictures "Fighting Lady," "This Is It," and "China Sea Action" were being shown at the motion picture auditorium both yesterday and again on Labor Day, and suggested that those who had not seen the films bring their families and come out again to see them on Labor Day, at which time the Naval Air Station will hold another open house for the citizens.

Capt. Easton also thanked the citizens of Sanford for their kindness in helping the Station develop and grow during the period of war time, and hoped that the people who came out would see a little of what they have helped to accomplish.

## Pfc. James Partin Given Posthumous Bronze Star Medal

Pfc. James A. Partin, who died of mortal wounds incurred fighting with the Fourth Marine on Saipan, Marianas Group, in June 1944, was posthumously presented at the home of his wife, Mrs. Julia Belle McFarland Partin on Wednesday, his Bronze Star Medal for volunteering to carry mortar ammunition to the front lines.

General A. A. Vandegrift, commandant of the Marine Corps, wrote a personal letter of commendation to Mrs. Partin which accompanied the citation.

The citation from the President of the United States and the Secretary of the Navy states: "For heroic service while serving with the Second Battalion, Tenth Fourth Marines, Fourth Marine Division, in action against enemy Japanese forces on Saipan, Marianas Group, from June 15 to 22, 1944, consistently displaying skill and unflinching courage in the face of severe enemy opposition, when an emergency call for mortar ammunition was received from a front line company, promptly volunteered to make the hazardous trip and unhesitatingly made his way in the approaching darkness until he was intercepted by an enemy patrol and mortally wounded. Private First Class Partin's fearless determination and outstanding devotion to duty while keeping with the best traditions of the United States Naval Service. He gallantly gave his life for his country." Signed, James Forrestal, secretary of the Navy.

General Vandegrift wrote Mrs. Partin that the Marine Corps shares "your pride in the gallant action of your husband" and assured her of his "high appreciation of the heroic service of your husband, the late Private First Class James A. Partin, U. S. Marine Corps Reserve, in action against enemy Japanese forces."

## MacArthur Has Headquarters In Yokohama

How far from the imperial palace in the heart of the bomb-ravaged capital.

The Supreme Commander declared that there has been a long, hard road but it looks like the payoff. Surrender plans are going splendidly. In all outlying theatres fighting has practically ceased and every area is preparing to capitulate.

Without desiring to see Japanese liaison officers from the imperial general staff, MacArthur drove by automobile the 15 miles from Atsugi to his headquarters in the undamaged new Grand Hotel in Yokohama.

There as the first alien boss of Japan since it became a modern nation and embarked upon the ruinous career of conquest, the Supreme Commander will confront his old enemies of the imperial staff and give them orders which henceforth will supersede those of Emperor Hirohito.

Will Sign Saturday

The Sunday (Saturday) EWTS will come the supreme moment for the fighting general who vowed to finish the war in Tokyo—and made good his vow.

He will board the battleship Missouri in Tokyo Bay and as Supreme Commander for all the Allies sign the surrender articles sealing for Japan the loss of a war and an empire built by blood and steel and iron.

At 10 o'clock the battleship Missouri will march into Tokyo Bay and the Associated Press Correspondent Russell Brines, on the battleship's deck, reported that the people going about their work with shocked impassivity and no sign of hostility.

MacArthur's way into Yokohama since Japan's sixth greatest city had been bombed out, shell with at least half of its ruins was prepared by airborne troops who landed eight hours earlier at Atsugi.

Overhead the skies were clouded and Allied warplanes armed and ready to fire at the first hint of treachery.

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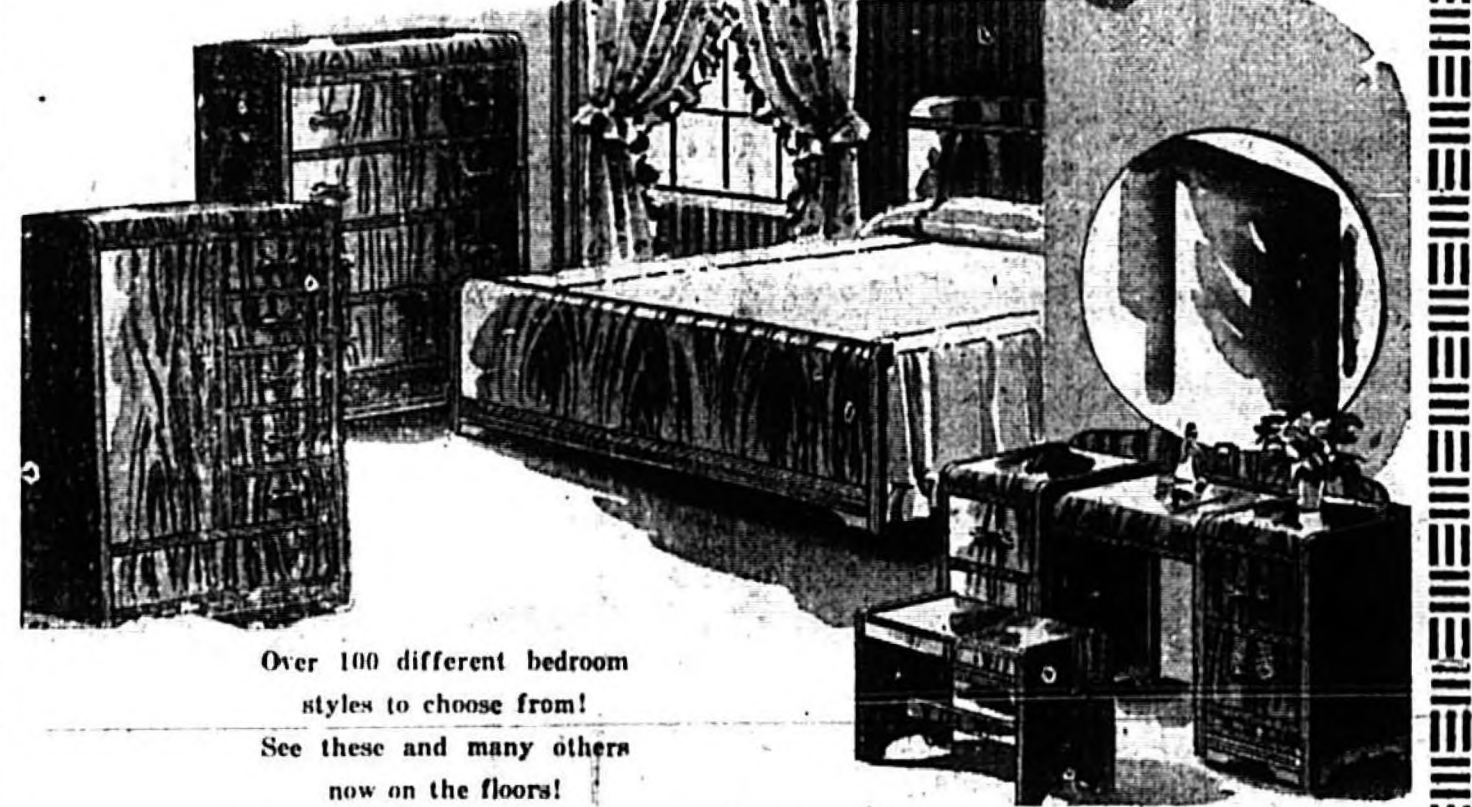

**Dewey Lashes At 'Prophets Of Gloom' In U.S.**

**Seek To Lead Nation To Totalitarianism He Says Ending Tour**

**HAMILTON, N.Y., Aug. 31.**—Governor Thomas E. Dewey, in dressing a large gathering of central New York business and professional men, farmers and political leaders here recently, cited the accomplishments of his administration and its peace-time preparedness as a challenge to "the prophets of gloom and doom."  
 Identifying the prophets of gloom and doom as those who seek to lead the nation into a form of totalitarianism, he said they "want us to forget the things we fought for in this war."  
 "We must not, we can not and we shall not surrender to their totalitarian ideas," Mr. Dewey said. "Having won freedom, we are going to keep it."  
 "New York State," he said, "is the best prepared state in the Union to go ahead and achieve stability in these years that now lie ahead of us. Our state stands as a living monument to the institutions for which this war was fought."  
 Mr. Dewey's appearance here was the climax of a five-day inspection tour in which he covered more than 1,000 miles.  
 Mr. Dewey told his audience that there was now in the United States "the greatest volume of unfilled needs in the history of the world, and at the same time the greatest skills in history."  
 "All we need," he went on, "is the ability to go ahead and make good a system of government which will give them an adequate reward and freedom if they do it."  
 "We need a government which, by its approach to our economic system will reward the business of making goods and making jobs, and make it possible for us to achieve what is clearly ahead of us the greatest production era in the history of the world."  
 "We need a friendly atmosphere in our society. We need a willingness on the part of business, labor, agriculture and government, an every element of society, to work together, and a willingness on the part of everyone—business, labor and agriculture—to produce to the maximum because we cannot enjoy the future ahead of us unless we produce vastly more than we ever have before. We cannot achieve the high standard of wages and income which are clearly ahead of us unless we produce the goods to sell."  
 "Lastly, government must insure a fair deal for every element of society, and see to it that that any government can, that monopoly is prevented and that every man has his own opportunity in a free society."  
 The Governor recited the major accomplishments of his administration as follows:  
 Saving of the largest surplus \$325,000,000 in the state's history; reorganization of the tax structure to encourage attainment of new business in New York State; adoption of a workable merit-rating plan in unemployment insurance and preservation of the unemployment insurance fund; enactment of an anti-discrimination law; establishment of a \$220,000,000 low cost housing program; adoption of an \$840,000,000 highway construction program; a friendly attitude toward both labor and industry; creation of a commerce department to aid business, and establishment of an agricultural research program designed to bring the state's farmers to a new height of prosperity.  
 "If men will use the resources we have," Mr. Dewey said, "New York State is ready for business in the post-war period. The state has done its part."

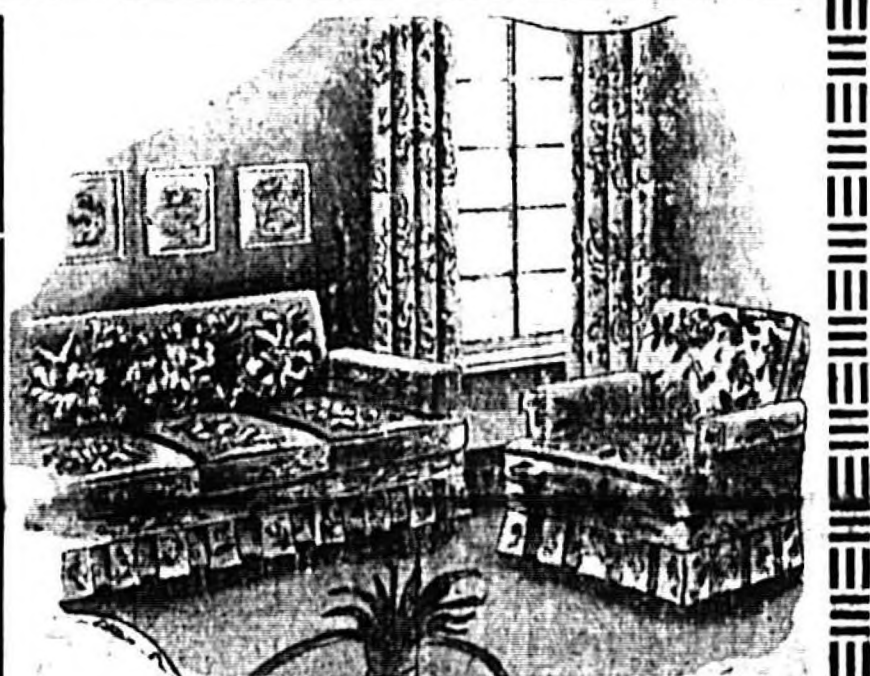
