Four Marines die in crash

SEOUL, South Korea - A Marine Corps CH-46 helicopter crashed during a joint U.S. South Korean military exercise Friday, killing four crewmen, a U.S. armed forces spokesman said.

The spokesman said the helicopter went down in rice paddies about 1:30 p.m. (11:30 p.m. Thursday EST) at Toksok-ri, near the town of Pohang. 170 miles southeast of Seoul.

The two pilots and two crewmen were killed. Their names will be released after their families have been notified, the spokesman said, adding

that there were no other casualties.

The CH-46 helicopter was assigned to the 13th Marine Expeditionary Unit, Camp Pendleton, Calif.

Soldier charged with spying

BONN. West Germany (UPI) — A U.S. soldier who disappeared for nearly two weeks has been charged with espionage for allegedly giving defense documents to East Germany, the Army

Michael A. Peri, 21, of Laguna Niguel, Calif., who was originally believed to have defected, also was charged with illegally entering a communist country and unlawfully removing and transferring classified information, the 5th U.S. Army Corps in West Germany said in a statement Thursday.

Col. John Dye, 5th Army Corps spokesman, said the charges were brought against Peri Wednesday and his parents were informed.

SHA changing course

SANFORD - In spite of petitions from tenants in five housing projects, the Sanford Housing Authority last night voted to turn over its administration to professional management.

The commission voted 5-0 to adopt professional management of the authority after the secretary of Seminole Joint Tenant Council presented a protest of the concept.

Rhonda Flagler, tenant council secretary, called the move to adopt professional manage-

ment prejudicial. "There is no reason to believe the blacks can't continue to manage the Housing Authority's operations as they are doing now. she wrote in a letter to the commissioners.

Commissioner Bob Ball Sr. explained to the commission that the concept was one of management by a team of professionals, rather than by one individual. He said, "I would hope we would have team management either way we


Ball said that U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development did not prohibit professional management of public housing authorities. "The only reservation they had - if they had any at all

was the fact that at two or three places, it hasn't worked well," he said.

Interim Executive Director Linda Williams said the commission would begin advertising for professional services after a workshop to develop. an operating budget for 1989-1990.

The commission voted to table until March 27 approval of a \$1 million budget submitted last night. Because the professional management concept was adopted, Williams said, estimates for those services would have to be entered in the

Expansion at airport hits snag

SANFORD — Expansion of San-ford Regional Airport met a snag last night as the city engineer cautioned the planning and zoning commission against approving site plans for additional hangars.

The planning and zoning com-mission approved the site plans for 17 new T-hangars at the airport at a meeting in November. But last night Bill Simmons, director of engineer-ing and planning for the city, said he had not seen engineering plans for the construction.

Simmons said the building official would not issue a permit until he had reviewed the engineering plans. Such a review normally takes place 20 days before site plans are reviewed by planning and zoning. he said.

Mack LaZenby, aviation director at the airport, told the commission that because the hangars would not use city utilities and because they would be located within an aviation area, no further review by the city is necessary. Runways and surrounding ramp space in the enclosed area are within the jurisdiction of the airport authority, he said.

Lake Mary approves beautification

LAKE MARY - City commissioners modified and tghen unanimously adopted the Lake Mary Boulevard

beautification plan last night. The modifications were in response to the changes Seminole County commissioners made Tuesday evening when they, too, approved then plan.

The ordinance regulates such things as landscaping. building heights, setbacks and signs along Lake Mary Boulevard in conjunction with its widening by the county to begin this year. The standards would be required along a corridor 250 feet on either side of the road's right-of-way.

The boulevard plan was developed over one year by 12 people who made up the Lake Mary Boulevard Study Committee. The plan is an interlocal agreement between Seminole County, Sanford and Lake Mary, the boulevard's jurisdictions.

Although the Sanford City Commission has not yet See Beautify, Page 5A

The changes made Thursday by the Lake Mary commissioners were relatively minor compared to the For example, the county made major alterations in

the area of signage. County commissioners deleted the non-conforming sign issue. This would require that signs not meeting height and size standards as set forth by the ordinance would have to be removed a maximum of seven years from the time they were installed. Lake Mary commissioners, however, decided to keep that regulation. Lake Mary will be the only one of the three municipalities which will retain the nonconforming sign issue. No signs higher than 15 feet above the elevation of the nearest sidewalk will be allowed in the city.

County commissioners also changed building setbacks to a uniform 50 feet from the roadway regardless of the size of the property. City commissioners stuck to

Senate unimpressed by Hastings appeal

WASHINGTON — The Senate voted over-whelmingly to order a trial of federal Judge Alcee Hastings on impeachment charges that he sold the honor of his office in a bribery and conspiracy

Hastings, a U.S. district judge from rural Altamonte Springs, appealed to the Senate in an open session Wednesday to dismiss the articles of impeachment based on the findings of a jury that acquitted him of the charges in 1983.

Hastings said the Senate should dismiss the charges on the basis of the Constitution's protection against double jeopardy and fundamental fairness.

The Senate discussed the motions for dismissal in a closed session Thursday, and then voted in public to reject the request and order a trial. It voted 92-1 to reject the motion to dismiss 15

articles of impeachment alleging Hastings conspired to obtain a bribe. Only Sen. Howard Metzenbaum, D-Ohio, voted with Hastings. The Senate then voted 93-0 to reject Hastings' motion to dismiss an article of impeachment that

he undermined confidence in the judiciary and betrayed the trust of the people by his actions. Hastings, 52, did not contest a trial on a 17th

charge, that he improperly disclosed confidential information about a 1985 wiretap over which he

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Tax bytes speed IRS refunds

More than 40,000 Floridians have already filed their federal income tax returns through a new electronic system that the government says cuts the waiting time for refund checks from

Even those filing the old fashioned way - with paper and ink — are mailing in their returns slightly earlier than last year and getting larger refunds, the Internal Revenue Service reported.

The IRS has already received 2.6 million Florida tax returns

out of an expected total of 5.6 million.

"We're very pleased with that," said Holger Euringer, spokesman for the IRS Jacksonville district, which covers 49 counties in the northern two-thirds of the state, including Tampa. Orlando and St. Petersburg.

In the Fort Lauderdale district, which covers the remaining 19 counties across southern Florida, the returns were coming in just slightly ahead of last year's rate, said IRS spokeswoman

Taxpayers are getting an automatic two-day extension this year. Since April 15 falls on Saturday, the filing deadline has been moved to midnight Monday, April 17.

Mercury levels in fish not critical

TALLAHASSEE - Mercury levels found in most freshwater

game fish throughout Florida are not high enough to pose a health risk, state officials said Thursday.

Tom Atkeson, an environmental epidemiologist for the Department of Health and Rehabilitative Services, said that except for base and warmouth caught in the Everglades, mercury levels found in most game fish did not warrant issuing

a statewide health warning.

State health officials earlier warned against eating bass and warmouth caught in the Everglades, a major attraction for bass fishermen throughout the nation.

Fiorida health officials have found mercury levels as high as 2 parts per million, double the federal safety standard, in bass and warmouth caught in the Everglades. Levels just over 1

ppm have been found in fish caught in rural north Florida and in the Hillsborough River near Tampa.

But Atkeson, who said he cats fish he catches in the lakes and rivers near Tallahassee, said the federal standard includes a high safety margin. Eating fish at or just above the 1 ppm level would be a risk only if a person ate substantial amounts of fish on a regular basis, he said.

FDIC assumes control of nine thrifts

MIAMI — Federal regulators assumed control of nine troubled savings and loan institutions in Florida Thursday. including three thrifts in Miami, as part of a nationwide sweep involving 47 institutions.

The Federal Deposit Insurance Corp. was named managing agent for the nine insolvent thrifts in Florids, and management teams were moved into each institution to oversee operations, said Rebecca Vail, a spokeswoman for the Federal Home Loan

Federal regulators took control of the institutions under an oversight plan for the nation's troubled thrifts announced Feb. 6 by President Bush.

The Florida institutions are: Brickellbank Savings Association, Lincoln Savings and Loan Association and Miami Savings Bank, all of Miami, First Venice Savings and Loan Association of Venice, and Royal Palm Savings Bank of West Palm Beach.

Also, Firianciai Security Savings and Loan Association of Delray Beach, First Federal Savings and Loan Association of the Florida Keys in Key West, Liberty Federal Savings and Loan Association of New Port Richey and Community Federal Savings and Loan Association in Tampa.

Professor: Problem banks need attention

GAINESVILLE - The nation's thrift crisis could trigger similar headaches in the banking industry if regulators fail to monitor problem banks, the recipient of a new banking chair at the University of Fiorida said Thursday.

"If we've learned one thing from this crisis it's that you need very close regulation for institutions in trouble," said Christopher M. James, a banking and finance professor at the University of Oregon.

James is the first recipient of the \$1 million William H. Dial Chair of Banking at UF, sponsored by SunBanks Inc. in July and named for Florida banker and statesman William H. Dial.

"What I'm concerned with now is that the FDIC (Federal Deposit Insurance Corp.) is going to continue to focus on thrifts while a number of banks — particularly smaller banks — have their own financial problems," he said.

"The net effect may be that we temporarily solve the thrift problem while we create another problem with the banking industry," he said.

Many savings and loans got into financial trouble by following government policies and not because of criminal activities, James said.

All systems go for crystal experiment

SPACE CENTER, Houston NASA said all systems are go with a crystal growth experiment aboard Discovery that is attracting little atten-tion but could hold the key to development of "designer druga" to battle cancer, emphysema and AIDS.

NASA spokesman Charles Redmond said Thursday the crew "had a few minor glitches with hardware for some of the other experiments. probably leaving the protein crystal growth unmentioned

only because it is working." By using X-rays to study ultra-pure crystals formed in the weightlessness of space, researchers can create a three-dimensional map of an enzyme's complex molecular structure. That information

can be used to design drugs

that can block or alter the

enzyme's function.

"Protein crystallography is a field that's having immense impact," said Dr. Charles Bugg, of the Center for Macromolecular Crystallography at the University of Alabama-Birmingham.

furloughed.
On the 13th day of a crippling strike by the machinists union. the airline also resumed service on its non-stop run linking Washington and Boston in an effort to rebuild its schedule in the wake of the walkout.

in a later development, Re-publicans blocked action on a bill that would temporarily end the strike by requiring President Bush to appoint an emergency board to negotiate a settlement. The move by the GOP ended any hope of action until April 5, after an Easter recess Sen. Bob Graham, D-Fla., said

the Senate action. "virtually assures that we are looking at a death warrant for this airline."

Eastern cancelled virtually all flights, laid off 9,500 workers and filed for bankrutpcy last week after ground workers struck the company March 4 and pilots refused to cross picket

Jim Ashlock, a spokesman for Eastern, said an unspecified number of Eastern's remaining 1,500 workers will be told the company has no work for them in their traditional job categories.
"There are not enough jobs



Man charged with rape

LONGWOOD - A man who allegedly raped a woman after he offered to help her repair her diabled car in Longwood on Thursday was arrested after the victim led Seminole County sheriff's deputies back to the man's house where she said the rape occurred. /

The attack stopped when the doorbell rang, the woman said. She was ordered to re-dress and was taken back to her car, where she fled from the suspect, a sheriff's report said. She reported the incident and pointed out the man's house to deputies. Bond for Ditolla is \$10,000.

Carli complained that boaters who leave for three-day excursions up the St. Johns River on Fridays have no place to park when the municipal lot is full. "Are you telling me that I'm going to be towed away because I had no place to park?" he posed.

Dressed to kill in ivory jewelry

Poachers are killing off vast numbers of elephants and hacking off their tusks. They do it to make a quick buck and satisfy our

taste for Ivory jewelry and trinkets.

According to TRAFFIC (U.S.A.), a wildlife trade-monitoring group, the number of ele-phants in the African wild was cut by nearly half in the past decade to fewer than 750,000. More than two-thirds of the decrease is attributed to poaching.

The federal government limits ivory im-"ports. In fact, former President Reagan signed 'a bill that strengthens these restrictions. The measure should prevent poachers from d'laundering' their illegal ivory wares Athrough Hong Kong.

Nevertheless, our government still allows some Ivory to enter the United States if the traders can produce a certificate of origin bsaying it was exported legally from a foreign

Why not close the loophole? The African Wildlife Foundation has petitioned Manuel Lujan, the new interior secretary, to place the hAfrican elephant on the endangered species blist, just as was done in the past for the Asian elephant. Once on that list, ivory imports would be banned in the United States.

Take care of the fleet

We Americans trade in our cars every few years for a new one. But we think nothing of climbing aboard an airplane that may well be 15 years old or older - an aircraft that has made thousands of takeoffs and landings.

But we are beginning to think more about the safety of those airplanes, especially in light of the recent tragedy in which a hole was ripped in the side of the oldest 747 in the United Airlines' fleet. Nine people were sucked out of the airplane and hurled to their


Unfortunately, the United Airlines tragedy that took place following a takeoff from ionolulu was not the first instance in which a plane partially disintegrated in midair. A stewardess died last April when the top of a passenger compartment was ripped from an Aloha 737 after it has taken off from Hawall. Similar but less deadly incidents have occured in recent years.

While the airline industry's contention that person is safer on a commercial aircraft that in the family car on a neighborhood street is still accurate, the public perception about the safety of flying still could change quickly.

Thousands of people are killed in automobile accidents each year in the United States, but nobody is talking about banning the car. A few more incidents like the one a few days ago, however, and millions of people could turn their backs on flying. That could spell economic disaster not just for the airline industry, but for large segments of the economy that depend on the rapid movement of people and goods.

An \$800 million program to upgrade older airplanes was proposed recently by the Aging Aircraft Task Force, a group composed of atritue industry officials and government safety experts.

When completed, such a program could cost more than proposed. But the repair program would be less expensive than replacing the airplanes with new ones. And it would be much cheaper than having the public lose confidence in the airline industry and letting such an important segment of our economy suffer crippling damage.

Tax rates leave elderly seeing red

When elderly Americans began raging against the latest tax to lay waste to their incomes - the Medicare surcharge - they were quickly re-

buked for undignified greed.

Don't these old folks understand there is no free lunch, responded prickly members of Congress and the media? If the elderly won't pay for a mandated expansion of their federal health insurance, who will? Why should we sympathize anyway with an age group that already soaks up one-fifth of all federal spending and nearly 70 percent of transfer payments?

Ironically, however, if most Americans were taxed at the rates borne by a growing number of today's elderly, they'd be in open revolt as well. The Medicare surcharge equals 15 percent of an individual's income taxes. Partly as a result, many of the elderly will endure astonishing rates of taxation this year - far higher than rates imposed on the rest of us before the Reagan tax cuts of 1981, let alone before tax reform of two

You'd have to return to the early 1960s, in fact, to find an era when many Americans labored under tax rates equal to those now imposed on large segments of the elderly middle

The Medicare surcharge isn't the sole culprit. In 1983, Congress for the first time exposed one-half of Social Security benefits to the income tax, too. But instead of simply lumping those

benefits with other taxable income the sensible option -Congress devised a system that uniquely punishes individuals of middle income. The tax on Social Security kicks in only when those benefits plus addi-tional income reach \$25,000 for Individuals and \$32,000 for couples. The effect of this formula is nothing less than grolesque.

According to the National Center for Policy Analysis in Dallas, "Overall, elderly workers face marginal tax rates

that are at least 10 percentage points higher, and in some cases 65 points higher, than those faced by their younger counterparts in the labor


No wonder growing numbers of elderly withdraw from the labor market. If you can't keep much of your earnings, why work?

As the Dallas think tank points out, 83 percent of all men and 92 percent of women over 65 are now completely retired - percentages that have been on the rise for decades. Meanwhile, the retirement rate for people 60 to 64 doubled in the last 20 years, at the very time economists began predicting future labor shortages.

Rather than encouraging the elderly to stay on the job, we're actually throwing obstacles in

There's only one way for the elderly to remain working and escape the high-tax trap: Rake in a lot of money. Both the Medicare surcharge and the tax on Social Security hit the middle class far harder than, say, an elderly couple with an annual income of \$80,000. But if most of the elderly are no longer poor, they're also far from rich, meaning they don't really have a choice: They either continue working and take home a silver of their salaries or they quit and make do with savings and pensions.

The thin-wallet dilemma

needs handlers as much as he disdains them. deepens suspicions he sought to allay when he bounded, yet again, into the press room and quickly found himself denying that his administration is in disarray. It does him no good to give the country more exposure to himself than he can fill with interesting or merely plausible things to say, so he should go

The substantive thinness of his presidency was guaranteed by his way of winning it —
"no new taxes" — and the thinness was
proclaimed as policy in his inaugural address: "We have more will than wallet." Today's \$5 trillion economy is 75 percent larger (40 percent bigger per capita) in real terms than in 1967 when Bush became a congressman. The nation's wallet is remarkably thick. The government's wallet is thin by political choice and will be kept so by Bush's policy.

Hence the imaginative energies of the political class here are increasingly squandered on intellectual dishonesties to justify evasions of the deficit problem. And the centrality of that problem guarantees a Bush presidency hollow at its moral center.

In "The Public Interest," Joseph Wright and Aaron Wildavsky denouce, with passionate disgust, the stultification of political debate by the deficit, which, like anti-communism in the 1950s and civil rights in the 1960s, has been the issue shaping debate on all other issues, from aid to friendly governments to help for the homeless. The Bush administration looks bewildered because its goals number 2,3,4,5 through the full list all are nullifled by goal No. 1: keeping the government's wallet thin - "no new taxes.


This guarantees more governmental monomania. Washington usually has at most a one-track mind and Bush's taxophobia guarantees that the deficit will stifle rational debate about choices for the public household. And such debate as there is, about meeting Gramm-Rudman deficit-reduction requirements, is surreal. Bush's economic forecasts incorporate GNP growth assumptions wildly incompatible with Federal Reserve policies that are necessary to achieve Bush's projected inflation rate (1.7 percent by 1994).

Interest rates are ever-larger levers on events in a nation addicted to debt. Total debt government, business, household - has risen 200 percent in a decade, and much of the debt is pegged to the prime rate. In this decade interest, not defense, has been the fastest growing portion of the federal budget. Rising rates make that portion grow faster while the consequence of rising rates - slower GNP growth — causes revenues to grow slower than Bush's budget presupposes.

Compounded intellectual incompatibilities administration assumptions incompatible

with one another, and with predictable Federal Reserve policy - are by now a Republican ritual. This is an odd ritual for a party that

The Reagan administration's first forecasts, made in March 1981, assumed that between 1980 and 1986 there would be a rate of GNP growth (25 percent) and a decline in unemployment (from 7.2 to 5.6 percent) and a balanced budget (by 1984, no less). These forcast were utterly in-comaptible with the

monetary policies that would be necessary to achieve serious progress toward the Reagan administration's most serious goal, reduction

of inflation from 13.5 to 1.9 percent. As things turned out, by 1986 real GNP growth had been just 16.5 percent, unemployment was not much below the 1980 level (6.9 percent) and the 1984 budget has been \$185 billion dollars out of balance. The problem was that the Fed had practiced what Reagan preached, emphasizing the primary goal of suppressing inflation.

And today? There they go again, those

Republicans. The administration projects declining interest rates. They are rising. Even if they remain where they were when the administration made its projections, the deficit-reduction projection would be \$9 billion off because rates did not decline. The administration projects 3.5 percent real growth in GNP for five years. Fed chairman Alan Greenspan says such growth "presupposes an increase in productivity which could conceivably happen but is quite unlikely."

Bush wants America to think beyond quarterly reports and annual budgets, to the long term. Good idea. Let's start.

The deficit, which today is larger as a percentage of GNP than ever before in peacetime when unemployment was this low. is sopping up in government borrowing a debilitating share of domestic savings.

Because of investment neglected and growth forgone, Herbert Stein says: "For every \$100 billion of deficit we run, we reduce national income by \$15 billion a years forever." Forever. That is a long term.

American missionary imprisoned in Nepal

WASHINGTON - Imagine being thrown in jail for selling religious literature.

David McBride knows how that feels. The American missionary sat in prison for four months in Nepal after he was arrested because he carried Christian pamphiets into that Hindu country.

McBride and a companion. Canadian missionary Melvyn Rudd, were charged with preaching Christianity. They were held

without ball until a judge decided to release them three weeks ago. The judge, who did double duty as the prosecuting attorney. said he wanted all Christians out of the country.

McBride's case spotlights the hazards of bringing an unwelcome religion to a foreign country a concept that puzzling.

When religion and government are intertwined, a threat to one is a threat to the other. Salman Rushdie can testify

to that. He offended Islam with his book "The Satanic Verses," and was suddenly public enemy No. 1 of the Islamic nation of Iran. Rushdie will spend the rest of his life looking over his shoulder. Americans whose freedom to worship, or not to worship, is constitu-tionally protected, are appalled to see a man sentenced to death for an offense against religion.

McBride's first mistake was to carry that American naivete to Nepal. The Asian country nestled between China and India does not put up with religious mingling. Nepalese law forbids people from trying to convert anyone to another religion "so as to disrupt the traditional religion of the Hindu community." Violators can face up to six years in prison.

McBride knew the law, but he didn't think that it covered the selling of religious material.

McBride, 33, a member of an interdenominational church, is now safe in West Germany. In an interview with our associate Scott Sleek, he described where Nepal ranks missionaries in the hierarchy of thugs and thieves. "We had one fellow in (prison) with us who was arrested for burglary. He got caught by the owner. He grabbed a knife and sliced the guy. Because he admitted it, he got four years and nine months. We were facing six years."

McBride's parents, Richard and Shirley McBrice of Columbia, Pa., turned to Capitol Hill for help. They got it from Rep. Robert Walker, R.Pa., Sen. Richard Lugar, R.Ind., Sen. Claiborne Pell, D-R.I., and the Congressional Human Rights Caucus chaired by Rep. Tom Lantos, D-Calif., and Rep. John Porter, R-III. The congressmen put pressure on the Nepalese government and wrote letters to King Birendra Bir Bikram Shah Dev.

More than 170 Christians are awaiting trial for religious crimes in Nepal. Amnesty International and other human rights groups say Christians in Nepal have been beaten and tortured.

McBride and Rudd were not tortured, but their mail was censored and they had no lawyer. After four months, the court decided there was insufficient evidence to convict them. There were no witnesses to back up the charges.

Shirley McBride says her son will be home soon, and plans to tell Congress about his experience. She is keeping a letter he wrote

from prison last November: We live in a dorm room shared with 24 other Nepalt men at present. ... Most of these guys are pretty gentle and a number of them don't belong here, but the lack of evidence and witnesses is no hindrance to being thrown into the slammer.





Oil drilling in Arctic approved

WASHINGTON - The Senate Energy Committee approved a bill Thursday to open the environmentally fragile coastal plain of the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge in Alaska to oil drilling but prohibit the export of any oil found there.

The export prohibition was added at the last minute in an amendment offered by the bill's sponsor and chairman of the committee, Sen. Bennett Johnston, D.La., before the panel passed the main legislation by a 12-7 vote.

But Johnson and other supporters of the bill fought off a "killer amendment" offered by Sen. Timothy Wirth, D-Colo., that would have required the Interior Department to devise a comprehensive national energy policy before Congress could open the refuge to oll development.

Instead, the committee adopted an amendment introduced by Sen. Mark Hatfield, R-Ore., mandating such an energy plan without linking it to oil drilling in the refuge.

Bush mum on FSX agreement

COLORADO SPRINGS, Colo. — President Bush, facing opposing views from his advisers, is keeping quiet on whether he will let Japan use American knowledge to build the new generation FSX jet fighter.

White House officials said the president, who was to return to Washington today from a brief political swing through Texas and Colorado, may announce a decison on the FSX within a week, or perhaps sooner.

Seen as the first foreign policy dispute within his 8-week-old administration. Bush has been confronted by those who oppose the project on grounds it would give away U.S. technology.

Cheney confirmation imminent

WASHINGTON - The Senate, eight days after rejecting John Tower as defense secretary, was ready today to bestow the job on another of the Capitol Hill's own, six-term Rep. Dick Chency, R-Wyo.

The full Senate was expected to parallel the unanimous endorsement Cheney got Thursday from the Senate Armed Services Committee, which voted 20-0 to recommend him as the 17th leader of the Defense Department since its inception in 1947.

Cheney's rapid approval came slightly more than a week after the Senate voted 53-47 to turn down Tower, a former Texas senator, following two weeks of the most bitter personal and partisan debate heard on the floor in years. Cheney's nomination reached the Senate floor a week after President Bush chose him for the job.

The White House said Cheney, 48, was national security strategy and join the

expected to be sworn in early next week. But he was already effectively in charge of the \$300 billion Pentagon and its 2.1 million uniformed personnel and 1.1 million civilian employees worldwide.

Federal agents break major drug syndicate

SAN ANTONIO - Federal authorities said they broke a major drug syndicate that funneled tons of marijuana and cocaine from Mexico to the United States with the aid of bribed Mexican police officials.

Thirty four people in California and Texas were accused in a 12-count federal indictment of moving 46,000

pounds of marijuana and 1,900 pounds of cocaine through a sophisticated pipeline involving more than \$7.6 million in various financial transactions during the past five years.

Twenty-five of the suspects had been arrested by midasternoon Thursday, Charlie Parsons, director of the FBI's San Antonio office, said at a news conference.

U.S. Attorney Helen Eversberg said the 18-month, multi-agency Jet Set" tracked the distribution of drugs and currency through Texas, California, Pennsylvania, Illinois, Florida and Masschusetts.

"We will make it so difficult and so dangerous for these people, they're going to have to peddle their drugs elsewhere," Eversberg sald.

U.S., Chile look for safeguards

WASHINGTON - U.S. and Chilean officials, after vowing to work together to resolve the tampering scare that has shut off Chilean fruit exports to the United States, looked for ways to ensure that saboteurs do not strike again.

Chilean Foreign Minister Hernan Felipe Errazuriz met for half an hour with a top U.S. health official Thursday to discuss security steps that could be undertaken in Chile.

Even before the meeting, the Food and Drug Administration said it would send a small team of its inspectors to Chile "to check fruit security and other matters."

The FDA also called a new round of meetings with fruit importers and Chilean officials in hopes of devising a plan of what to do with the tens of thousands of cases of Chilean fruit that have piled up since two cyanide-tainted grapes were found. Since the discovery, all Chilean fruit has been detained.

Importers have hoped for a speedy decision whether the fruit can be sold or must be destroyed. One FDA spokesman said the obstacle to releasing the fruit is how to ensure it is safe.

The government could face a monumental task in handling the fruit. It was estimated that 1.1 million cases of fruit have been loaded at Chilean ports for the U.S. market since the season began.

Inspectors have examined 20,500 cases without finding any additional poisoned fruit.

Errazuriz and Chilean Agriculture Minister Jaime de la Sotta met with Secretary of State James Baker to press for a prompt resolution. Afterward, the men released a statement which said the countries agreed "to continue to work together on an urgent basis to resolve this problem."

"The goal is to swiftly return the situation to normal in a manner which serves the interests of both the producer and consumers in re-establishing the safety and reliability of food trade," the statement said.

During the meeting, the Chilean officials described vast economic disruptions to the fruit industry if the situation is not settled. Baker stated his concern for the Impact in Chile but also pointed to the impact in America.

The halt in exports rocked Chile's fruit industry, prompting bitter criticism and some anti-American protests. President Augusto Pinochet, who came to power in a 1973 military coup. visited apple and grape processing plants, where he pulled a bunch of grapes out of a crate and ate several.

Pinochet told workers that U.S. actions were similar to killing "a fly with a tank."

Chilean officials have estimated their fruit export industry has lost \$100 million because of the scare, which came during one of Chile's peak months for exports. It also struck at a time with the U.S. food industry depends heavily on imported produce.

The Central Committee, the main legislative and administrative branch of the Communist Party, decided that a major goal of reform is to greatly reduce the Soviet Union's reliance on imported food and grain by the mid-1990s.

Greek leader asks cabinet to resign

ATHENS, Greece — Greek Prime Minister Andreas Papandreou asked his Cabinet to resign so he can reshuffle his government amid political maneuvering before general elections in June.

The premier, whose government is embroiled in a corruption scandal and is under attack from the conservative opposition and from far left parties, made the move Thursday, two days after surviving a censure motion in Parliament.



Middle Tennessee State sends FSU home early

NASHVILLE, Tenn. - In perhaps the most astonishing comeback in NCAA Tournament history, Middle Tennessee State scored the game's final 21 points Thursday night and rode the startling play of freshman Mike Buck to a 97-83 upset of 16th ranked Florida State in an opening-round game of the Southeast Regional.

Buck, a 6-foot-5 guard averaging 5.6 points per game, poured in 23 of his 26 points in the second half — including a spurt of 15 straight after Florida State took an 83-76 advantage with 5:22 left. The Seminoles never scored again as a raucous crowd at Memorial Gym stomped their approval for the Blue Raiders, who play just 35 miles away in Murfreesboro.

Middle Tennessee State, which trailed by 17 points with 16:06 left, improved to 23-7 and advanced to Saturday's second round against Virginia. Florida State, which dropped six of its last nine games, finished 22-10.

Brad Johnson's free throw put the Seminoles ahead 83-76 before Buck simply took over the game. He triggered the Blue Raiders' shocking run with a 3-pointer, then added a breakaway layup and another 3-pointer to put Middle Tennessee State ahead 84-83 with 3:32 left.

But that was just a teaser for Buck, who sank another 3-pointer and four free throws to open a 91-83 advantage. By the time Buck left the game with 15 seconds remaining, half the Blue Raider bench met him on the court as a roaring crowd

Randy Henry added 26 points for Middle Tennessee State while Tony Dawson paced the Seminoles with 21. Tharon Mayes added 20 for Florida State, but Metro Conference Player of the Year George McCloud did not score after intermission and finished with just 12 points.

With some strong crowd support, the Blue Raiders dominated the opening minutes, grabbing a 10-5 advantage. Trailing 24-19, the Seminoles reeled off 14 consecutive points during a six-minute stretch as Mayes scored seven points and Dawson four.

Dawson missed just three of his 12 shots and scored 19 points before intermission. McCloud, a certain first-round pick in the NBA draft, started heating up with three 3-pointers in a threeminute span.

"Timacuan's a little more demanding and I find myself not going for broke here. I play smarter," said Dawson, who won a Spalding Spacecoast Tour event here last month with a two-round total of nine-under-

Dawson romped around the sweeping layout by hitting 16 greens in regulation. His longest of seven birdle putts came from 20 feet with the rest coming from 10 feet or less. The highlight of his round came when he holed a bunker shot on the picturesque parthree No. 13.

His secret to success isn't some mechanical formula. Or just his lengthy drives. Ills is a no-frills, no-nonsense lifestyle. He's in bed at 10 p.m. each night, up at 6 a.m. No alarm clock is needed. He's driven by a desire to excel, often hitting balls five hours a day. He's on the practice tee every with the exception of a monsoon or other atmospheric disturbance.

Four years ago. Dawson worked one month in a restaurant, but decided it wasn't worth it. He quit, got a \$1,000 start from his dad and promptly won \$2,400 and first place in his initial mini-tour tournament. Dawson, who helped Florida Southern College capture the NCAA Division II national title in 1982 and 1985, has come close to qualifying for the PGA Tour. In December of 1987, Dawson breezed through the first two legs of the three-leg qualifying school, but missed qualifying by one shot in the third stage.



Seminary trustees pick new dean over faculty objection

WAKE FOREST, N.C. - The Rev. L. Russ Bush III will become academic dean at Southeastern Baptist Seminary despite unanimous opposition of

the school's faculty.
On a 22-98 vote Tuesday, the trustees of the embattled seminary agreed to appoint Bush.

Bush, on a sabatical from Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth, Tex., accepted the posttion despite reservations he expressed in a memorandum to the trustees several weeks ago.

The school has been embroiled in a dispute for more than a year. Moderate and conservative Baptists have struggled for control of the board of trustees, which is now dominated by the conservative faction.

The conservatives have vowed to fill the faculty with incr-rantists, those who believe the Bible is literally true. Moderates, who believe the scriptures are subject to interpretation, have resisted the move.

Moderate trustee Mark Caldwell said Bush's appointment had divided the seminary and further jeopardized the school's endangered accred-

The school, one of six operated by the Southern Baptist Convention, has been chastised by its two accrediting agencies because President Lewis Drummond ignored the faculty's input into policy decisions.

In a memo to the trustees, Bush said he was concerned that the faculty members were "so bitter and negative at this time that they could easily make a working relationship with them

He also said that because most of the moderate faculty members opposed him and the conservative agenda of the trustees. "It is absolutely essential that a conservative majority on the faculty be achieved as soon as posalble."

Bush Tuesday said he may not have worded his memo in the best way.

Mary shows us that if we remember Jesus, he will live

This Easter story begins with the Christmas story.

I belong to a Bible class that has just begun a study of the Gospel of Luke. In the early verses Luke tells of the birth of Jesus and the appearance of the angel to the shepherds in the fields near Bethlehem - and the singing of the angel choirs.

When the shepherds went to Bethlehem and passed the word around about these miraculous happenings, everybody "marveled," Luke says. But Jesus' mother does not appear to have been caught up in the lovous occasion.

Instead of participating in the general rejoicing. Mary was unusually introspective and withdrawn. While those around her were ecstatic over the news. 'Mary kept all these things and pondered them in her heart."

One member of our study group, an English teacher, said if a student of his had composed the Christmas story and inserted that line about Mary, he would have asked the student to explain. It doesn't fit with the rest of the story.

Yet the secret of the Christmas message is found more in Mary's reaction than in the reaction of the shepherds who went back to their fields "glorifying and praising God." That is the last we hear of them. They were entrusted with a momentous announcement which filled them with great joy. Then they fade from the picture.

They are like many in the crowds that fill our churches on Christmas Eve to hear the same loyous announcement the shepherds received but who are not heard from again till the next Christmas Eve and who never ponder the meaning of Christmas.

The secret of Easter is like that. It can never be understood

by those who come to church only on Eastern morning to hear the momentous announcement that Christ has risen and then forget him till another Easter rolls around.

To believe - or even to know - that Jesus is alive today is not enough. He is truly alive only if we remember him.

In Maeterlinck's lovely fantasy 'The Blue Bird." two little children. Mytyl and Tyltyl, are transported by the fairy into the Land of Memory where they once again see their grandfather and grandmother.

The children are surprised that their grandparents are not dead. When Mytyl mentions this to her grandmother. Granny Tyl tells her. "As long as you remembér me, l'am alive.

This is the real Easter message. It is the message to those who believe that Christ rose physically from the dead, as well as to those who have their doubts about that but who believe that Christ is alive today just as surely as he was when he walked the dusty roads of Galtlee with his disciples.

We might go further and say that he is more truly alive to those who remember him and love him - no matter what they believe happened on that first Easter morning, or even if they believe nothing happened than lie is to those who unquestioningly accept the Easter miracle but who never think of Jesus or remember him as they would a dear and loving friend.

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Vaginal infections need organic balance

DEAR DR. GOTT: My doctor treated my urinary tract infec-tion with Bactrim-DS and it cleared up. Now I have a yeast infection. Vaginal inserts and cleared up. Now I have a yeast balance by simultaneously infection. Vaginal inserts and loading their systems with creams have not worked. What

can you advise?

DEAR READER: The normal vagina contains harmless bacteria and yeasts. Ordinarily, these microorganisms compete with one another, thereby preventing any overgrowth. This is a delicate balance in which infection with one agent is normally inhibited by the other. Therefore, most women aren't even aware that they are carrying these perfectly innocuous vaginal inhabitants.

Problems develop when factors disrupt this balance. For example, diabetics are more prone to vaginal yeast infection because high tissue-fluid sugar provides a rich source of nutrition for yeasts, which grow, eventually outstrip the bacterial competition and cause symptoms. Likewise, antibiotics
— such as Bactrim — upset the
balance by selectively killing off
millions of bacteria; this enables the yeasts to grow unimpeded by bacterial restraints.

Yeast vaginitis is exceedingly common in women who take antibiotics for more than several days. People often mistake this overgrowth as an allergic reaction to the antibiotic. It isn't.

Because antibiotics destroy bacteria elsewhere in the body. yeast infection can also erupt in other sites; for instance, the mouth, throat, rectum and penis (in men) — anywhere that yeasts normally exist.

Treatment involves reestablishing the bacteria/yeast balance. Anti-yeast drugs, such as nystatin, can be applied locally, taken in mouthwash form or used as vaginal creams or tablets. This medicine de-stroys the excess yeast organisms (without affecting the bacteria) and permits the bacteria to achieve parity once Some patients on antibiotics have discovered that they can maintain their bacterial/yeast
