Swofford said the major portion of the southern end of Seminole County is underwater. County Commissioners termed e two-day flood condition "critical" and Commission chairman John Krider has called an emergency meeting with the county drainage committee for 2 p. m.

Friday. As of 11 a. m. today, nearly eight inches of rain had been reported in the south end of the county and six inches in the Sanford area.

The heavy rains have caused floodings, washouls of primary roads and drainage to homes, mostly in the southwest area. "Something must be done about this problem right now," Swotford emphasized.

MIAMI (UPI) - The Weather Bureau at Miami issued the following all-clear tornado report at 11:30 a. m.t.

"The threat of tornadoes has ended for Central Florida. While showers and thunder storms con-tinue over Control Finish it mppears from station reports and radar observations that most of the severe activity has ended. There still exists the possibility of strong winds in the area from Paim Beach to Lake Obsoche-bee to Vero Beach."

Swofford said that every lake the south end is everflowing and singled out Lake Seminary, Lake Orienta, Bear Lake and Lake Brantley oceating special hazards.

He said the downpours have left water which is threatening lake front homes around Lake Seminary and if the rain continues for another day these
