WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—(AP)—House Judiciary committee suggested by President Roosevelt that it choose Representative Sumners, a Texas Democrat, chairman of the committee, to succeed Associate Justice George Sutherland who decided to retire on Jan. 15. Members of the committee, meeting without Sumners, sent a letter to the President urging the appointment of its chairman.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—(AP)—The House Appropriations Committee began an economy drive today by recommending the appropriation of \$1,414,618,515 to finance more than 80 independent governmental agencies for the coming fiscal year—a saving of \$118,536,800 compared with the current year.

The measure, the first of the regular annual supply bills, slashed \$2,723,000 off the Budget Bureau's estimate, most of the cut being made by the Tennessee Valley Authority.

See City Clerk For Home Exemption

City Clerk Frank S. Lamson today reminded Sanford homeowners that in addition to applying for exemption of State and County taxes, applications must also be filed with the City Assessor before Apr. 1 if exemption of City taxes on homesites up to \$5,000 are to be allowed.

The applications must be filed annually. Mr. Lamson asserted that the homeowner waived his right to exemption if the applications were not filed before Apr. 1.

Because of this exemption, homes in Sanford are not entirely exempted of taxes, the City Clerk advised, adding that the first service billage is levied on all Sanford property.

County Tax Assessor Sanford Doudney reported that approximately 40 persons have approved the initial call to file their applications for exemption from State and County taxes.

Over \$13,000 Is Seminole School Collected Here Children Invited On Auto Licenses To Orlando Fair

971 Seminole Citizens Purchased Tags Since December 1

Up to the close of business Wednesday evening 971 auto license tags of various kinds had been issued and an amount of \$13,477.35 had been collected and forwarded to the Motor Vehicle Commissioner in Tallahassee, Seminole County Tax Collector Jno. D. Jenkins reported today.

The sum which has been collected, Mr. Jenkins stated, represents this County's contribution to the State School fund for the month of December and five days in January.

The Tax Collector also urged auto owners of the County to purchase their tags as early as possible to avoid the last minute rush which, he said, "is bound to occur as the deadline of Jan. 15 draws near."

All applicants for auto licenses should bring the last registration card and title certificate, if available, but in cases where they are not available, furnish the number on the old license tag if the vehicle was licensed in Seminole County in 1937, Mr. Jenkins stated.

The Tax Collector also reminded truck owners, that under the instructions from the Motor Vehicle Department, new weight certificates are required for all trucks and trailers, that owners of such vehicles are requested to have them re-weighed on the platform scales at the Sanford State Market and present the weight certificates when applying for the tags.

Duval Plans New Bridge Over River

Contract Is Signed For \$1,460,000 Span Over St. Johns River At Jacksonville

JACKSONVILLE, Jan. 6.—(AP)—Duval county and the State Road Department signed a contract today calling for the construction of a second bridge across the St. Johns River here and the lifting of toll charges on the present bridge as soon as the new span is opened to traffic.

The new bridge will cost about \$1,460,000. Duval county will pay half of the cost and the state Road Department will pay the rest with federal highway funds.

The State Road Department will supervise the construction and maintain both bridges. The new bridge will extend from the foot of Main Street here to a point on the south side of the river, the route now used by the ferry.

The court recently ordered the county to pay the ferry company \$50,000 for the route and franchise. The county will discontinue the ferry service so the revenue on the present toll bridge will be greater until the tolls are lifted.

U. S. Labor Board Lauds Newspapers For Fair Reporting

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—(AP)—The labor relations board commended the newspapers yesterday for their recent handling of labor news.

In its annual report to Congress, the board said "adequate reporting of labor disputes" had been "chronic for decades" before 1935.

Before that year, the board said, "the great mass of the public drew its opinion on strikes from scare headlines and blow-by-blow descriptions of strike violence."

Since 1935, the board added, "labor news is no longer an unwanted orphan in the city room."

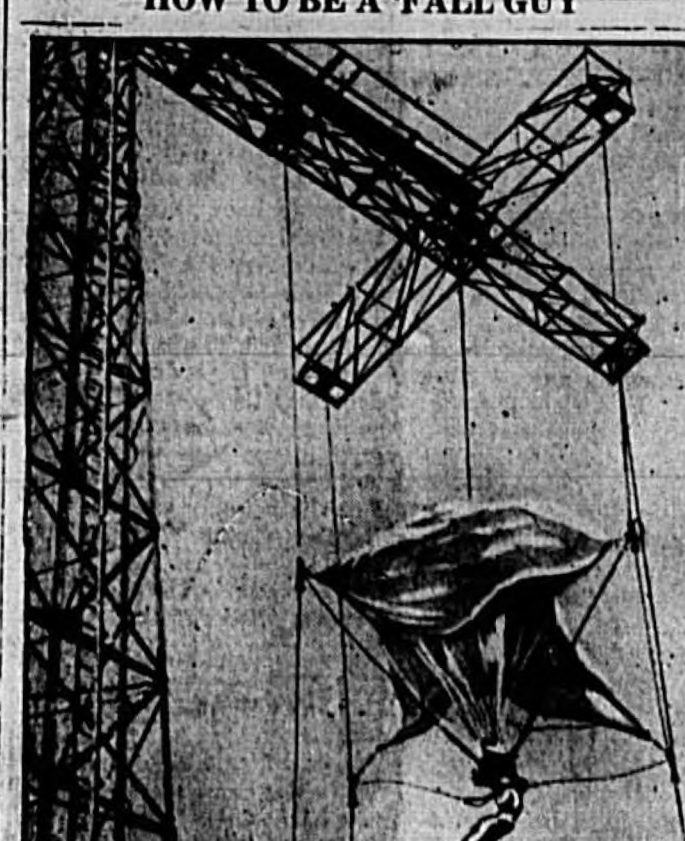
"Instead of assigning strike stories to any reporter free at the moment for duty, the coverage is given to trained men," the board said.

"Many of these have been led to probe beneath the exterior dramatics of strikes to the conscientious study of the complicated social dilemma involved in every labor dispute, however small."

"The press, more than any other agency, can banish the misunderstandings which still disturb the relations between American employers and American workmen."

The board reported that the number of cases it had to handle had increased 1000 percent since the supreme court upheld the Wagner labor dispute act, and that the struggle between the American Federation of Labor and the CIO had added to its troubles.

China Mobilizes Entire Man Power To Battle Japan

HANKOW, Jan. 6.—(AP)—The man power of this nation of 400,000,000 persons is being recruited on a national mobilization basis for unrelenting war against Japan. All cities and towns outside the Japanese-occupied areas swarmed with troops.

In some cities recruits outnumbered the civilians. By Spring China expects to have 80 full divisions in the field. Guiding the mobilization of men, munitions, and munitions is Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek.

Meanwhile Chinese commandos declared heavy fighting is in progress near Hangchow, the capital of Chekiang province. The Japanese countered with assertions that all was quiet there. The Japanese said their troops were continuing to "mop up" an area of ready conquest.

A Shanghai dispatch said the naval yard Isabel arrived to receive the new headquarters for Admiral Harry E. Yarnell, commander of the United States Asiatic Fleet, and that his flagship, the Augusta, would sail Thursday for Manila.

The Chinese government dispatched memorandums to the United States, Great Britain and France protesting against the proclamation issued January 1 by the Shanghai municipal council, the body governing the Shanghai International Settlement, in which the council said any person committing an offense against armed foreign forces in the Settlement would be handed over to the forces concerned.

Captain Scott has been in active service with the local Detachment of Florida National Guards for the past 2 years. He is a prominent local physician and is secretary of the Sanford Medical Society. He and his wife came here from Chicago, Ill.

Knudsen Says Confidence Is What Is Needed

General Motors Head Insists Doubt About Future Brings Drop In Consumer Buying

Fails To Approve Planned Economy

Says Average Man Believes "Work Is Going To Be Slack"

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6.—(AP)—President William S. Knudsen of General Motors, appearing before the Senate's special unemployment committee, said his "one hope" for the immediate stabilization of work was that the "people generally will feel a little more confident of future."

"We need more assurance all the way down line about this year and year after," said the President of the corporation which laid off 30,000 men on Jan. 1 because of a sales decline during November and December.

Knudsen declared the decline was the severest in the company's history. He blamed it not on car prices but on the view held by the "average man" that "work is going to be slack."

"Even if he has means the average man won't perk himself up under such circumstances," the motor magnate said.

While he was testifying the White House announced that Knudsen and John D. Biggers, director of the recently made unemployment census, would lunch with President Roosevelt.

On the stand Knudsen declined to approve, as far as its effect (Continued On Page Five)

Trouble In World Is Attributed To Decline Of Faith

Wars, vice and crime, strife between capital and labor, riots and bloodshed all were attributed to the lack of man's faith in God by Rev. John W. Spraul, Chicago soldier evangelist in his sermon in the Sanford Gospel Tabernacle, where he is holding a healing campaign.

"Much of the teaching of religion, modernism, especially its efforts to soften down the stern warnings of God's Word, comes through the desire of modernists to please every one and offend none," Rev. Spraul said.

"What the human race needs today, more than anything else, is a revival of the right sort of preaching, preaching that will give God's messages rather than man's guesses to the people. The source of all the disorder of today, the wars, the vice and crime, the strife between capital and labor, the riots and the bloodshed, all these things have come about because men have lost faith in God and His truth."

In his services tomorrow night, Rev. Spraul will tell of his own divine healing after he was gunned while in service with the Army during the World War.

Carter Glass, now eighty, says he would like to be forty. Though he has led a full life and doubtless would be ready for a long rest under ordinary circumstances, he doesn't feel like one who has summed against profligate government spending from the first and is anxious to stir around just to see how it all turns out.

Officials say it may be some time before actual work begins on Sanford's recently approved Municipal Park, but it should be started before the current season ends so that visitors through this part of the state at least will know what they have to look forward to next winter. It certainly should be started before another sewer project gets under way.

Binns made the best advance Tuesday in many weeks showing that large numbers of investors viewed President Roosevelt's address to Congress with approval. To discover that not all business is wretched, only a small minority is encouraging in this day of sorrows. Almost everyone admits that some business men are bad, just as some workmen, some farmers, some lawyers, some plumbers, are bad.

The unemployment census taken a few weeks ago shows nearly eight million persons, totally without work of any kind except for seasonal relief work. Furthermore, on a double check, the figures were shown to be not particularly accurate, and unemployment totals may be as high as ten or twelve millions. Only about two million of them have WPA jobs; the rest are on straight relief. Not a very encouraging commentary on the richest nation on earth.

President Roosevelt's Supreme Court bill was defeated, but the President seems destined to get his way anyway. Justice Brandeis, one of the four conservative justices who retired last year, was the only one who was at all liberal. Another conservative, Chief Justice Charles Evans Hughes, was the only one who was not at all liberal.

Real Tax Reduction

With the Federal budget hopelessly out of balance in spite of drastically higher taxation, and the general fund of the State government running so far behind that regular State employees are wondering where their next meal is coming from, it is encouraging to note that Seminole County is in a good financial condition and has actually been able to effect a reduction in taxation.

While taxpayers are pleased to find a reduction of 1 5-8 mills in the rate on their tax bills this year, there was actually a cut of 4 3-4 mills in the millage assessed by the County Commissioners. An increase of 1 1-8 in the state millage and an increase of 2 in the School millage, absorbed 3 1-8 of the County's savings, resulting in a net tax reduction of 1 5-8 mills.

Had it not been for the savings effected by the County Commissioners there would have been an actual increase of 3 1-8 mills in the total tax rate, instead of a net reduction of 1 5-8. So the taxpayer can figure that he is really 4 3-4 mills better off than he would have been if the Commissioners, forgetting their pledge of economy, had not found a way to save the County's funds without interrupting any of the services which it renders.

At a time like this when other taxes of all kinds are cutting more and more into the workman's income, while higher prices for everything we have to buy makes even the former taxes more burdensome, it is a welcome relief to find one tax bill which is actually lower. And to the men who are responsible, the County Commissioners, we offer our congratulations.

We feel sure that every taxpayer in the County will join with us in expressing appreciation for the Commissioners' good work.

American Business

Speaking of the importance of capital, a local automobile dealer told us the other day that more than 90 percent of the automobiles being sold in Sanford were financed with other people's money. Think of it! More than 90 percent of the people of Sanford riding on other people's money. And it would be safe to say that most of them would be walking if they had to pay cash for their cars.

What business does for the average person is frequently lost sight of, particularly by those who are not directly connected with business, according to John W. O'Leary, in a recent address before the Michigan Manufacturers Association. The average person does not see the hundreds of thousands of investors who had to put up billions of dollars for the construction of factories, before the automobiles, radios, bathtubs, and whatnot, which he uses daily, could be made.

The Average person also forgets, Mr. O'Leary pointed out, that American business during the four years from 1930 to 1934 paid out over eighteen billion dollars more than it took in.

He forgets that one branch of business alone, insurance, paid to policyholders and their beneficiaries, from 1929 to 1934, eighteen and a half billion dollars—the equivalent of half the national debt!

He forgets that business voluntarily established private old-age pension systems covering more than 4,000,000 workers before government stepped into this field, and the number was rapidly increasing.

He forgets that of the 2,009,000 business concerns in the United States last year, only 0.8 percent had a net worth of more than \$75,000.

He forgets that of the 529,898 corporations making income tax returns for 1934, 824,000 had no net income and their aggregate deficit was \$4,181,000,000.

He forgets that the American workman receives in "real" wages—that is, wages measured by purchasing power—five times as much as the Italian, nearly three times as much as the German, and twice as much as the British.

He forgets that, if he were one of the 42,396,718 savings bank depositors in 1933, his savings were a part of the aggregate deposits of \$23,463,585,000—a substantial part of the capital which sustains business enterprise.

He forgets that as one of the 64,000,000 life insurance policyholders, he is also a capitalist, and has a stake in the insurance assets of more than \$25,000,000,000, which also sustains business enterprise.

He forgets that of the 1,653,981 retail stores in the United States in 1935, 1,474,149 were independently owned and operated—by the John Joneses and Tom Smiths of Main Street, who are a part of business.

He forgets that the 577,000 service establishments, the barber shops, shoe repair shops and plumbing shops, owned by 577,181 proprietors, are also business.

Woman Who Gave Russians Cosmetics Will Now Try Them Out On Ice Cream

MOSCOW, Jan. 6.—Mrs. Paulina Karpovskaya Zhemchuzhina, who built up the Soviet government's business in perfumes, soaps and lipsticks, is perhaps the only woman in the world entitled to sit with her husband in cabinet meetings.

Madame Zhemchuzhina, whose name would be Paulina Pearl in English, is the wife of Premier Vyacheslav Molotov in private life. She is vice commissar of food industry, in which post she is assistant to Anatas Mikoyan, Armenian head of one of the largest food producing and distributing organizations in the world.

Now in her middle thirties, Paulina Zhemchuzhina has been married to the 47-year-old premier about ten years. During that time she bore a child, now about seven years old, and developed the Soviet cosmetics industry into one of the most successful enterprises in the national economy.

Much of her success is attributed to visits abroad, particularly to the United States, where she was the guest of Mrs. Franklin D. Roosevelt at the White House in 1936. From the United States, Madame Molotov brought machinery and beauty shop technique for the manufacture and application of cosmetics for her fair comrades.

Promoted from manager of the Tasha perfume trust of Moscow to head of the whole cosmetics industry, she put both American machinery and technique to work to provide Soviet women with beautifying products, which Madame Molotov regards as necessities.

Beauty shops, which Madame Molotov describes as "artistic," have been opened in Moscow and the larger cities in the provinces. Some of those in Moscow, in architectural attractiveness and luxury, reflect ideas she gained in America.

Scents Popular The cosmetics trust now produces more than 100 kinds of soap where there were only six in the early days of the Soviet regime and turns out more than 9,000,000 bottles of eau de Cologne annually.

Citrus Board Is Planning To Push Sales In Canada

Competition With Japan Is Said To Be Hurting This State

LAKELAND, Fla., Jan. 6.—(AP)—The Florida citrus commission is seeking to interest shippers in pushing orange and tangerine sales in eastern and central Canada, believing that a potentially valuable market virtually is being overlooked.

Florida oranges and tangerines are admitted free of duty the first six months of the year, the commission reported, yet figures show that California supplies 98.7 percent of all oranges sent to Canada by the United States.

Japan is pushing its mandarin sales in western Canada, and the commission inferred that Nippon subsidizes its producers. Officials said that canned Japanese mandarins can be bought even in some Polk county stores, in the heart of the state's citrus belt.

A trade report shows that neither Florida nor Texas have made as serious effort to boost Canadian sales, the commission reported, although California carries on an extensive advertising campaign in the Dominion and has sales organizations in the consuming centers.

Figures announced by the commission show that between 1932 and 1936, Canadians consumed 2,288,920 boxes of oranges or about 50 boxes per capita, indicating that the market is well worth cultivating.

The commission is NOT scheduled to meet again until after Jan. 10 when Chairman John Macey and Secretary R. E. Bates will attend a freight rate hearing in New Orleans. The commission, Bates said, is preparing to present the strongest possible case against a proposed increase of 15 cents a hundred pounds on fruit and vegetables. Officers and managers of the largest shipper and grower organizations will present testimony which increases.

Continued From Page One on automobile industry is concerned, Roosevelt's current suggestion for planned industrial production as a way of keeping the level of employment reasonably steady.

Yesterday Virgil Jordan, president of the national industrial conference board, testified that employment had reached a peak last November that was comparable with the highest recorded in 1929. The business recession since then has reduced employment sharply, he said.

Jordan said 5,000,000 persons "working force" by population had been added to the nation's gains since 1929. Not counting these, employment equaled the 1929 figure in November.

There were at that time about 2,500,000 persons out of jobs because of temporary factors, as in 1929. The addition of 5,000,000 workers, however, brought the total unemployment last November to approximately 7,000,000, he said.

Altmyer told the committee that unemployment insurance was no cure for business depression, that all that could do was cushion the shock to workers who lost their jobs.

He estimated that if the present amount of unemployment continues through 1938, approximately \$225,000,000 will be paid out in benefits to the jobless in states which have funds in operation.

Continued From Page One New York, of the house rules committee, said he regretted "very much to see this irreducible minimum of a requirement of at least \$7,000,000,000 for federal expenses."

"The government," he said, "has got to that point only once. There certainly should be some cutting, but one place there shouldn't be is necessary relief."

Other comment:

Representative Knudsen, republican, Minnesota: "The president deserves full cooperation of congress in any effort he makes to bring federal expenditures somewhere near receipts."

Representative Taber, republican, New York: "It presents some elimination of non-recurrent items but generally there is an increase in administrative expenses which is absolutely unnecessary. His statement that the deficit for the fiscal year 1937 was \$2,800,000,000 can only be confirmed by judging figures."

Representative Fuller, democrat, Arkansas: "I'm for more economy than the message recommends."

Representative Starnes, democrat, Alabama: "As a member of the house appropriations committee, I favor reducing the amount recommended and feel sure the house will do so."

Representative Rich, republican, Pennsylvania: "It presents a deplorable situation."

Worried About Relief

Senator Schwelienbeck, democrat, Washington: "I do not see how relief expenditures can be reduced."

Senator McClellan, republican, Missouri: "I found bodies of 103 of 'the generals' in an area nine miles long. All had been healthy just before they died, apparently of poison."

The only symptom was a "rather blind wandering toward water," McClellan said.

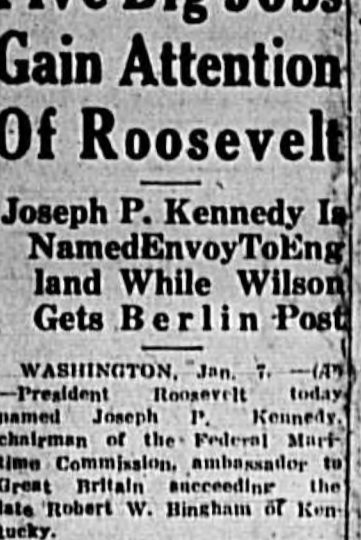
