Storm Slices U.S.

A late winter storm brewed from border-to-border today, unleashing wind storms and a tornado in Texas, bringing heavy snow warnings to the upper Midwest and dropping the temperature below zero in New England.

A tornado that sounded like a "slow roar" sliced through Kaufman, Tex., damaging buildings and homes and uprooting trees. Sheriff H. L. Evans said the Nash Grain Co. was hardest hit. He estimated damage at \$100,000. No casualties were reported. Electric power was cut and

gas escaped from broken lines until it was turned off. A roof was ripped off one home.

Severe storm and tornado warnings were posted to northeast Texas and southeast Oklahoma as a line of heavy thundershowers moved slowly to the northeast. Dallas was hit with large hail.

Snow fell over northeast Kansas and south-central Nebraska. Goodland, Kan., had two inches on the ground.

As the storm moved up the plains, heavy snow warnings were out for parts of Nebraska, Minnesota, South Dakota and Iowa.

Rain and thundershowers

came ahead of the storm along the Gulf Coast and Mississippi Valley into the South Atlantic states.

Showers also moved into the Ohio Valley where the clean-up of last week's flooding was under way. Business was expected to be normal at Fremont, Ohio, as the Sandusky river settled back into its banks.

The Red Cross disaster center at Columbus said most persons affected by the floods have returned to their homes. It said 4,594 families in Ohio, Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Indiana suffered losses and many will apply for help.

Gunman Shoots It Out With Police In Lobby

NEW ORLEANS (UPI) — For a brief moment, Mrs. Patricia Yokum was tempted to laugh at the man who shoved a paper bag at her, but it was no joke.

In a few minutes the huge lobby of International Airport became a shooting gallery.

When it was over, Mrs. Yokum and a deputy marshal lay wounded. Scores of terrified people hid behind counters and pillars and the gunman being dragged away, mechanically squeezed the trigger finger of his now-empty left hand.

The slim man later identified as Robert F. Northrup, 35, of Miami, Fla., seemed placid as he walked up to the Tele-Trip Co. flight insurance counter at the gleaming modern airport yesterday morning.

He handed a paper bag to Mrs. Yokum, of La Place, La.

"What do you want me to do with this?" the 35-year-old woman asked.

"Fill it," the man replied.

"With what?"

"Money," he snapped.

Mrs. Yokum began to laugh. A co-worker, Mrs. Kate Ritter of New Orleans, said Northrup slowly unbuttoned his jacket and drew a large nickel-plated revolver from his belt.

"You're not going to shoot me?" Mrs. Yokum said half quizzically, as though she could not believe her eyes.

Northrup fired. Mrs. Yokum fell to the floor with a 44 caliber magnum bullet in her shoulder.

Police came charging as the gunshot echoed in the lobby. Northrup spun to face them.

He fired and Deputy Eno St. Pierre, 52, of Kenner, La., fell with a wound in his right leg.

Police and Northrup blazed away. About 100 bystanders either froze in fear or fled for shelter.

At least 11 shots were exchanged. Each echoed like a cannon roar and bullets ricocheted.

Northrup's revolver clicked empty. He whirled around and dove down onto the marble floor.

When the shooting ended, the insurance counter, the lobby ceiling, the columns in the waiting room, glass doors, ticket counters and an elevator bore bullet holes, nicks or scars.

Deputy Marshal Anthony Cerabara rushed up and kicked the weapon from Northrup's hand.

Police slipped Northrup onto his back. There was "a little smile on his face," a witness said, "and he was working the trigger finger of his left hand."

All Northrup would say was "I don't know, I don't know," over and over.

Mrs. Yokum and St. Pierre were rushed to Ochsner Foundation Hospital. Both were listed in satisfactory condition. Northrup was not wounded.

Police said Northrup was a former mental patient who had spent 15 years in a Miami Veterans Administration Hospital and had a record of arrest for larceny.

He was charged with attempted murder, armed robbery and aggravated assault.

FEA Plans Awards Attack

The 40,000-member Florida Education Association, the state's largest organization, is expected to launch an all-out assault on competence awards in Jacksonville this week.

Other problems and issues in the field of education will come under scrutiny by FEA at its annual convention starting Wednesday. The anticipated 10,000 delegates may split apart on some issues, but the competence-award issue is expected to inspire a solid front.

Mrs. Lavin Dies Saturday

Mrs. Frances Sarah Lavin, mother of Mrs. Eileen Connelly, 131 N. Cortez, North Orlando, died Saturday at her daughter's residence while here on a visit.

The body was sent to Gouffrey Funeral Home, Salem Depot, N. H. Services will be held Wednesday followed by burial in Fitchburg, Mass.

Gramkow Funeral Home was in charge of local arrangements.

Most of their remarks will be addressed to the 1963 Florida Legislature, since the competence award scheme is a creature of the 1961 Legislature.

A good barometer of FEA sentiment is the preliminary report of the association's program action committee. Issued in November, the report said this about competence awards:

"The competence award statute . . . is not accomplishing its avowed purpose — the improvement of instruction through incentive.

"Its objectionable features are that it (1) is based upon a poor foundation of low salaries; (2) denies salary increases to most of our competent teachers; (3) provides awards inadequate in terms of the program's intent; (4) requires that a career teacher, to be eligible for the award, must take a test that does not measure teacher competence; and (5) increases noticeably the difficulty of employing new teachers since most of Florida's teachers are prepared out of the state.

"Therefore the statute should be repealed."

Regarding objection No. 4, one Duval County school principal has said the determining test was taken by all 24 of her teachers and that the highest scoring of them all

was among the state's lowest.

"We have three teachers who are considered to be master teachers," the principal said, "and none of them scored well enough on the test to become eligible for the 'competence' award."

Mr. Sipes was born May 13, 1896, in Jackson, Tenn. A retired farmer, he had lived in Sanford for the past 68 years, making his home at 1413 S. Oak Ave. He formerly had been employed by Standard Oil Co. He was a member of the West Side Missionary Baptist Church.

Survivors are his wife, Mrs. Eunice Sipes and six children, Sonny Sipes, Mrs. Marie Carpenter, Mrs. Katherine Grady, Mrs. Louise Hamilton, James Sipes and Donald L. Sipes, all of Sanford and two brothers in California.

None In Seminole

Primary Vote Slated Tuesday

TALLAHASSEE—Three Republican and 30 Democratic second primary contests for vacant seats in the state legislature will be decided by voters in 16 Florida counties tomorrow.

There was little to suggest that the runoff candidates for their party's nominations had any more luck impressing the voters than did the huge

fields that jumped into the first primary Feb. 26 when the voter turnout averaged less than 22 per cent.

But given decent weather—which wasn't the case last time—the turnout tomorrow may be higher. Metropolitan newspapers have urged voters to show more interest in filling the legislative posts they won by reapportionment.

Gov. Farris Bryant became a central issue in at least one house race. In the Group 7 contest in Duval County, one of Bryant's appointees to the Jacksonville Express way, Fred Schultz, who resigned to make the race, was tabbed as "the governor's man" by his opponent, Harry Mahon.

The runoff contestants include three Negroes, seeking

house seats in Escambia, Duval and Dade counties; two women, running for Dade County house seats, and a former Monroe County political leader, Bernie Papy, seeking a political comeback as a state senator after 28 years in the house. He was defeated for a new house term last year. Papy's Democratic opponent is the Monroe County

sheriff, John Spottswood.

The party nominees for many of the 40 vacant seats resulting from reapportionment and resignations were chosen in the first primary, or else had no opposition. The final election, at which party nominees will oppose each other, will be held March 26—one week before the 1963 legislature convenes in its regular session.

Dirksen Upholds Blockade Stand

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Senate Republican leader Everett M. Dirksen, Ill., agreed Sunday with President Kennedy that a complete U. S. blockade of Cuba would be an act of war and very risky.

At the same time, Dirksen agreed with a television interviewer that the four American fliers killed in the 1961 Bay of Pigs invasion were "recruited" under a policy laid down by the Eisenhower administration.

The implication left was that the men had been employed by the government. Just last Wednesday, President Kennedy side-stepped a question as to whether they were employees of the government or the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA).

On the blockade question, Dirksen said on the program that there "could be a selective blockade or quarantine" that might cut off oil shipments to Cuba without the onset of a warlike action under international law.

But, he said, "Nobody wants to take the chance of plunging his country into war if he can help it."

The GOP leader made the statement when asked about former Vice President Richard M. Nixon's suggestion last week that the United States enforce a "partial blockade" to shut off Cuba's oil supply lines. Nixon also called for a "complete quarantine . . . a political, diplomatic, economic and military quarantine of Cuba."

The question of the four fliers was posed by correspondent William H. Lawrence. At one point, he asked Dirksen: "Were you aware that these men were recruited under a policy approved in the Eisenhower administration in July, 1960?"

Without hesitation, Dirksen replied: "Oh, very definitely."

At his Wednesday news conference, the President declined to go into detail about the fliers on grounds that it would not be helpful to the interests of the United States.

But he said the men were saving their country on a "volunteer flight."

At that conference, the President also said the administration was not considering a new blockade of Cuba because such action would constitute an act of war.

"At this time," the President added, "We do not believe that war in the Caribbean is to the national advantage."

Dirksen agreed with the President on the risks of a blockade.

Backstairs At The White House

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Backstairs at the White House:

The extent to which true and stout-hearted New Frontiersmen will go to maintain and prove their physical fitness begin to make the era of Teddy Roosevelt seem almost delicate.

Two of President Kennedy's brothers, Atty. Gen. Robert and Sen. Edward, gave a blow-out the other night as muscular as an evening at the YMCA. There was nothing YMCA about the setting, however.

They chose the highly conservative Chevy Chase Club in Maryland, just across the District of Columbia line, as the scene of an ice-skating party which started at 7:30 p. m. and went on until after midnight.

Joining the younger Kennedys and their wives as hosts were other shining lights of the New Frontier such as Peace Corps Director R. Sargent Shriver, who is married to the President's sister, Eunice, and Paul Fay, the Navy undersecretary and close friend of the Kennedy family.

First, they ate—not a lot of sissy cocktail chow, but fat hamburgers and French fried potatoes. Their keener menu, however, did not go so far as malted and shakes. They made one concession to adulthood—cocktails and beer.

Tummies full, the Frontier people, most of them gaily clad in skiing or skating costumes, swarmed over the large outdoor rink at the club. The Chevy Chase, incidentally is a somewhat unusual place for leaders of this administration to entertain.

The place is highly conservative and membership regulations are exceedingly strict. Members in recent years have been known to receive rather chiding letters from club officials for having invited the wrong sort of lunch or dinner guests.

In fact, inquiries were made of the club manager's office prior to the Kennedy party, asking whether the attorney general would be entertaining there. A man in the manager's office told at least one caller that it was quite doubtful the attorney general was acting as host since he was not a member. This apparently was a detailed easily handled by someone.

The skating activity was furiously energetic. The attorney general and the junior senator from Massachusetts headed up one hockey team.

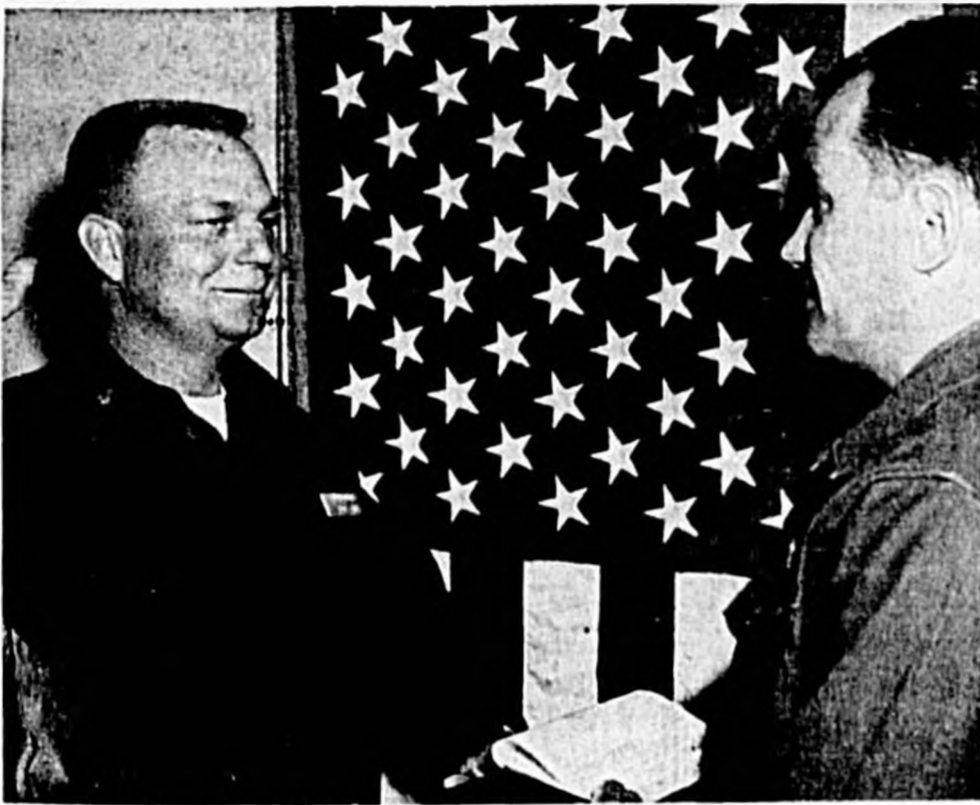
There was a relay race of sorts and this involved much loud cheering and bumping.

One highlight of the evening was the expert appearance of Sandy Cuberton, a beautiful and promising young actress who for several seasons was one of the stars of the famous Ice Capades. She got up show skating after last season to concentrate on her dramatic career.

Sandy performed solo for the New Frontier party, and assisted with their games on ice. Afterward, she was more fatigued than she could recall even after a matinee and evening performance with a professional ice show. As this highly trained and conditioned professional skater wearily removed her skates, there still were Kennedys skating across the ice.

Sandy came to the party through the efforts of Carol Rosenblum, owner of the Baltimore Colts professional football team.
