Anti-Semitism 'Denied'

A paradox afflicts us in the late decades of the 20th century.

We have developed an astonishing tolerance of human frailty as it exhibits itself in individual private lives even when that frailty leads to the commission of crime.

But we show surprisingly little tolerance of human mistakes and weakness when they crop up in pub-

Admittedly the standards among our public men are intended to be high. If we are sensible we do not deliberately put in positions of authority our weaklings and misfits.

Yet even men chosen for their evident higher caliber have their flaws. Moreover, they are plunged today into a welter of problems whose size and number are without any shadow of a precedent.

Why should it be assumed, as it evidently is by some, that American officials can — out of the blue quickly master the delicate, difficult business of lending effective military, political and economic aid to a small Asian land like South Viet Nam, a country which has only half

a will to help itself? In our national lifetime, this is an effort totally new.

Why is there such haste to demand great, visible economic improvement in South America, a continent that has languished for conturies in poverty and political imma-

The Russians, using the most crushing dictatorial power ever amassed, have been trying to lift their own millions out of the mire for 45 years and have not succeeded

yet. Their massive farm problem is

Is there any regson we should not make mistakes when, in an unparalleled upsurge, more than 50 new nations auddenly appear on the world scene and we try to cope with them? We have the rough job of nurturing their independence in a world beset by aggressive communism. The guideposts are few.

When, ever before, did we have to figure how to defend a free city like Berlin, totally encompassed by a hostile enemy?

Spin the globe and note such other trouble areas as Korea, Laos, Indonesia, India and, highest in our thoughts now, Cuba. Each raises unique problems. All can be labeled critical — in varying degrees and different ways.





The way Willie McCovey of the San Francisco Giants is pounding the ball during spring training, Orlando Cepeda may not have his first base job when he ends his holdout.

The 25-year-old McCovey, a sensation with the Giants in 1959 but a part-time outfielderfirst baseman ever since, hit two solo home runs Sunday in leading the National League champions to a 10-7 exhibition victory over the Cleveland Indians.

McCovey, who had singled and belted a 400foot ground rule double in Saturday's opener, belted homers in the third and seventh innings Sunday, both landing in the same spot, 380 feet from home plate.

Cepeda said, "The Glants have spent two weeks making all sorts of offers to finally reach last year's salary. If they had started there I

would already be in training camp." Cepeda indicated that he and the club are still far apart on salary terms and said he would not go to camp unless they can get together.
