I'm 5 foot 9 at 133 pounds and really enjoy life. I hold an executive position of responsibility but for the past 15 years I've been on 25 milligrams of Librium every day. County Commissioner Sandra Glenn went to Longwood Monday night to attend a meeting on the issue of county participation in sidewalk construction on County Road 427. When she finished, the City Commission voted 4-1 to build the sidewalks at the city limits and ran along County Road 427 to Milwee, through an unincorporated area.

Mrs. Glenn told the Longwood Commission it was against county commission policy to construct sidewalks in a municipal area if not included in their budget.

She said that although the state has turned over maintenance of 427 to the county it is "curb to curb" and the city owns the right-of-way all the way to the railroad crossing in front of the school.

The city had hoped through cooperation of the city, the school board and the county a sidewalk could be built from the existing one at Lake Street in Longwood to one previously

constructed by the county south of Milwee. Mrs. Glenn denied a previous statement by City Commissioner William Mitchell regarding the latter link.

Mitchell has been quoted as saying "If the county did it for Altamonte, they should do it for us," but Mrs. Glenn pointed out the sidewalk was not in Altamonte's jurisdiction.

"The county can not construct sidewalks on city right-of-way," said Mrs. Glenn. She said sidewalks for school children were "essentially a school board problem."

Ex-Shah Of Iran Ill... Cancer Is Suspected

NEW YORK (UPI)—The exiled shah of Iran flew from Mexico to New York City Monday night to undergo "extensive medical examinations" at the New York Hospital-Cornell Medical Center. A spokesman for the deposed monarch said today.

Private security guards ringed the three rooms that he, his family and his staff members were occupying in the George F. Baker Pavilion that is used for patients paying for private rooms. Robert F. Arno, senior adviser to the shah, said in a statement the shah "has come to the United States to undergo extensive medical examinations at New York Hospital."

"I'm under the clear impression," Passage said, "that there's been a significant deterioration in the shah's health in recent days..." The Iranian government has information the exiled shah is suffering from terminal cancer, the Foreign Ministry said today. A shah aide promptly denied the claim.

He did not say how the government received its information. There was no immediate confirmation from other sources and a spokesman for the shah in New York denied the report. "I can make a safe guess that they have gotten the information from an unreliable source," she said.

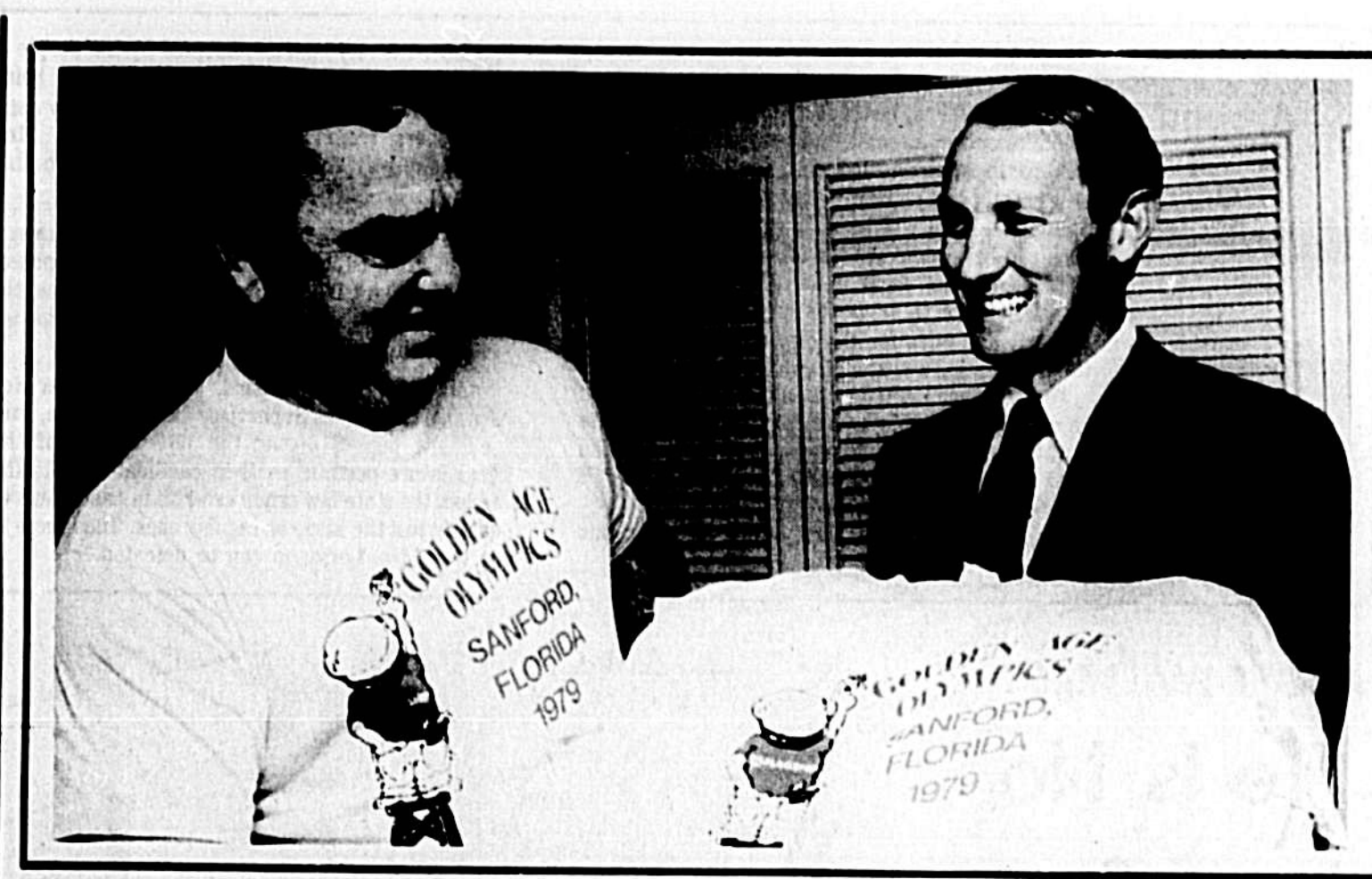

Black-Jewish Reconciliation

As is often the case with friends who patch up their differences, the reconciliation between the black and Jewish communities in this country could lead to bonds between them even closer than those that have existed traditionally.

Friendship must sometimes be placed in jeopardy before it is properly cherished. Although there were some subterranean and largely ignored tensions between the two groups the open rift did not come until U.N. Ambassador Andrew Young was forced out of office last August for unauthorized discussions with the Palestine Liberation Organization and for his being less than honest about this with the administration.

At the time, it served President Carter's purpose to let black Americans, who felt betrayed, believed Ambassador Young had been sacrificed because of Israeli and Jewish pressure. During the ensuing uproar, some black leaders led by the Rev. Jesse Jackson, who heads People United To Save Humanity (PUSH), and the Rev. Joseph Lowery of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, raised a hue and cry against Israel and rushed to the Middle East to embrace the PLO terrorists.

Wisely, Israel's leaders and the American Jewish community assumed an aloof, Olympian posture against these provocations in the hope that responsible blacks would provide an appropriate antidote. And that's what happened.

To their great credit black leaders have done two things: They have repudiated Jackson's voice of vengeance and they have made positive moves toward a reconciliation with their old Jewish friends, who have been quick to respond.

Vernon Jordan Jr., president of the Influential National Urban League, openly denounced the Jackson mission. "Black-Jewish relations should not be endangered by ill-considered flirtations with terrorist groups devoted to the extermination of Israel," he said. And Bayard Rustin, president of the A. Philip Randolph Institute, has led a distinguished black delegation to Israel to reassure the Israelis that there is no "mass movement in the United States to support the PLO."

Meanwhile, Benjamin Hooks, executive director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, warned against black overtures to the PLO and moved his organization to the forefront in addressing tensions between blacks and Jews that the Young resignation had served as a catalyst to expose.

The emerging reality is that American blacks and Jews have come to realize anew how they share more goals and common interests than animosities. The ventilation of suppressed differences has been therapeutic because it has helped to redress real or imagined wrongs by both groups.

Another significant thing the Andrew Young episode and its aftermath have produced is positive proof of a more mature society now in this country. Sensationalist radical leaders can still make headlines but they no longer command the respect or results which crowned their disruptions during the 1960s.

Meanwhile, Ray Leibesperger, the former street superintendent and one-term commissioner-declined not to try for election again.

ANGLE-WALTERS He Is No Long-Er Invulnerable

BATON ROUGE, La. (NEA) — In the annals of American politics, Sen Russell B. Long, D-La., is the scion of the family that has dominated Louisiana politics for more than a half century.

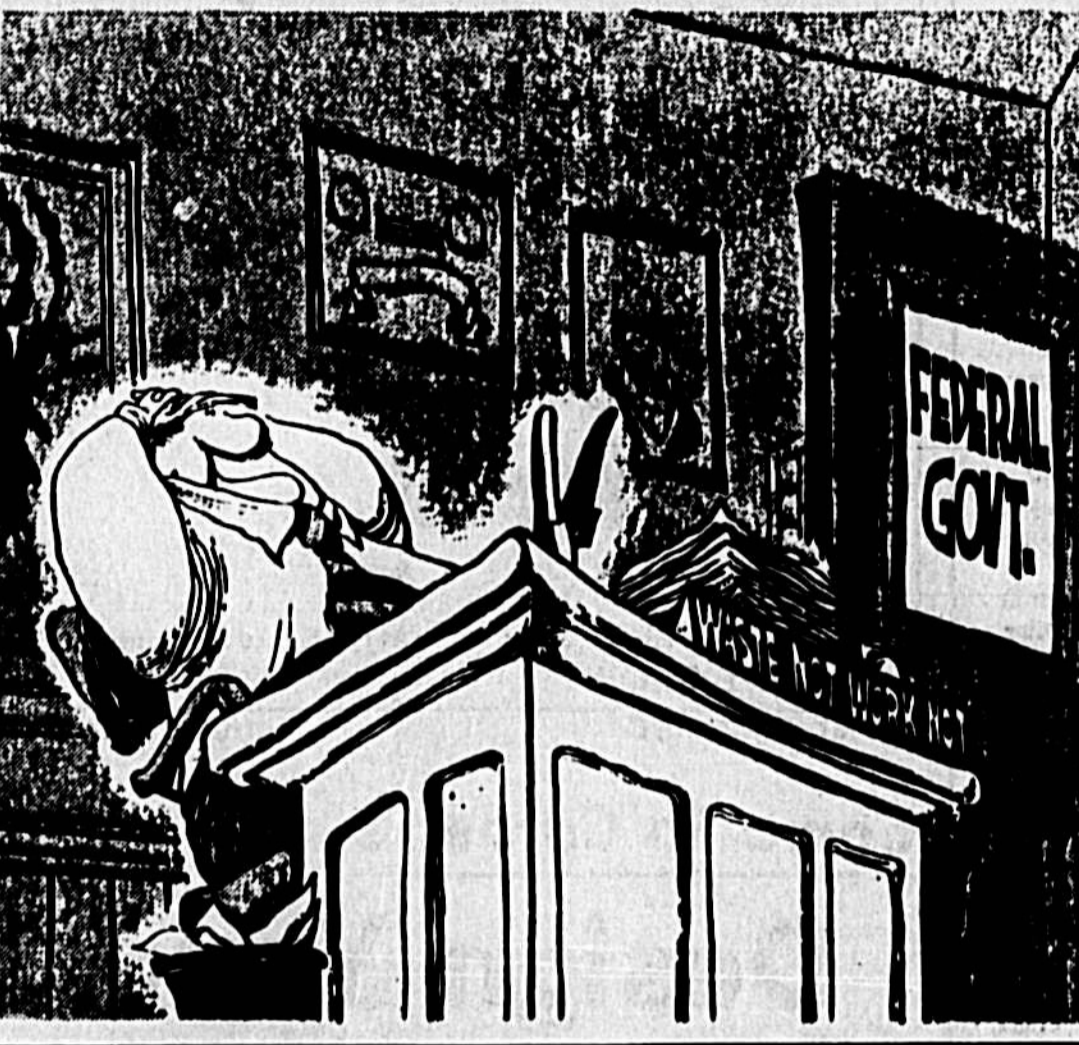
In Washington, Long is viewed with awe as the wily legislative craftsman who chairs the Senate Finance Committee and holds the unofficial but universally bestowed title of "the most powerful man in the United States Senate."

But back home — among the Louisiana voters who must decide next year whether to return him to the Senate for a sixth consecutive term — Long is in trouble.

That characterization requires a special definition — "in trouble" because, as one politician here notes, "when Louisianians talk about a member of the Long family having problems, it means only that he's a little less popular than the Lord."

Yet it's significant when insiders in both this state capital and Washington begin talking, as they have been in recent months, about weakness on the part of one of the country's most influential politicians.

In Long's case, that talk has special importance because he is the son and political heir of "The Kingfish" — the late, legendary Flyer P. Long Jr., who parlayed a unique blend of populism and demagoguery into almost dictatorial control of the state in the late 1920s and early 1930s.



BUSINESS WORLD Changes In Exporting

By LEROY POPE, UPI Business Writer NEW YORK (UPI) — Many American businessmen are finding the only way to expand is to export, but they will have to change their way of doing business, says one who has been successful at it.

Declan McCourt is a Harvard-educated dynamo who runs TMG, Ltd., an Irish conglomerate whose sales have grown from \$7 million in 1974 to over \$67 million in 1978 and is projected to reach \$100 million this year.

TMG, Ireland's eighth-largest public company, produces structural steel, farm and industrial machinery and equipment, medical equipment and waterford cutlery. It also imports and manufactures Japanese Detonax for distribution in Ireland.

The firm's growth came partly from acquisitions of troubled companies (it acquired Massey-Ferguson (Ire) Ltd. earlier this year) but its successful export policy played a big part in the sales gains.

McCourt believes many American companies fail in export markets because of a wrongheaded attempt to follow U.S. ideas and business customs in other countries.

Well, it's here. And the Dallas emporium is usual more than lives up to its reputation of offering its customers a variety of ingeniously expensive answers to the question of what to get someone who has everything of practical purpose.

This year's possibilities range from \$100.00 for coats and similar utilities in luxury through the expected oddball (colichinid-bourbon-flavored toothpaste, \$10 for a box of four tubes — and be sure to roll from the bottom to get every last squeeze out of that price) to the surprisingly prosaic (a shoeborn).

Not, of course, just any shoeborn. This one is brass, from Italy, with collapsible handle and its own drawing suede bag (\$9).

Tribe Returns Four Starters In '79 Seminoles Out To Scalp 5 Star Crown

By JOE DESANTIS Herald Sports Editor Second in A Series If Seminole High basketball fans listen to any of the local radio stations it's a sure bet they've heard "Two Out of Three Ain't Bad" by Mastodon.

If that's the case then Tribe basketball coach Bill Payne is one up on the podgy rock star, he's singing 4-out-of-five ain't bad either.

That's how many starters the Fighting Seminoles return for the 1979-80 prep basketball season. The familiar faces of Whitney, Thomas, McCray and Butler will once again take the floor for the Seminoles who pose a solid threat to the 5 Star Conference basketball crown.

In addition to those four starters, Payne also has another pair of returning letterman from last season's 14-14, third place squad. Here's a look at the players who will shape the destiny of the 1979-80 Fighting Seminoles.

Guards The Tribe returns one senior starter at guard in 5-8 Keith Whitney. As a junior Whitney averaged just under 10 points a game while shooting 67 percent from the floor.

Transfer Glen Stambaugh, no stranger to Seminole County basketball coaches looks to be the other starting guard for the Seminoles. Last year while at Lyman Stambaugh displayed a deadly outside shot, and is an excellent ball handler.

"Glen should make us really tough in the backcourt," says Payne. Providing depth at the guard spot will be 7-3 Sam Thomas. After missing most of the first half of the season with an ankle injury, Thomas earned enough playing time to grab a varsity letter in basketball.

Combined with two-time Burger King Player of the Week Bruce McCray, the Seminoles should be strong under the boards. McCray brings a healthy 15-4 per game scoring average back in his senior year and can contribute in both rebounding and assists when he averaged six and nine respectively in '78.

Here again Payne has good depth with returning letterman Casey Jones at 6-8 in his senior year along with a pair of good sized juniors in 6-4 Stephen Grace and 6-5 Willie White.

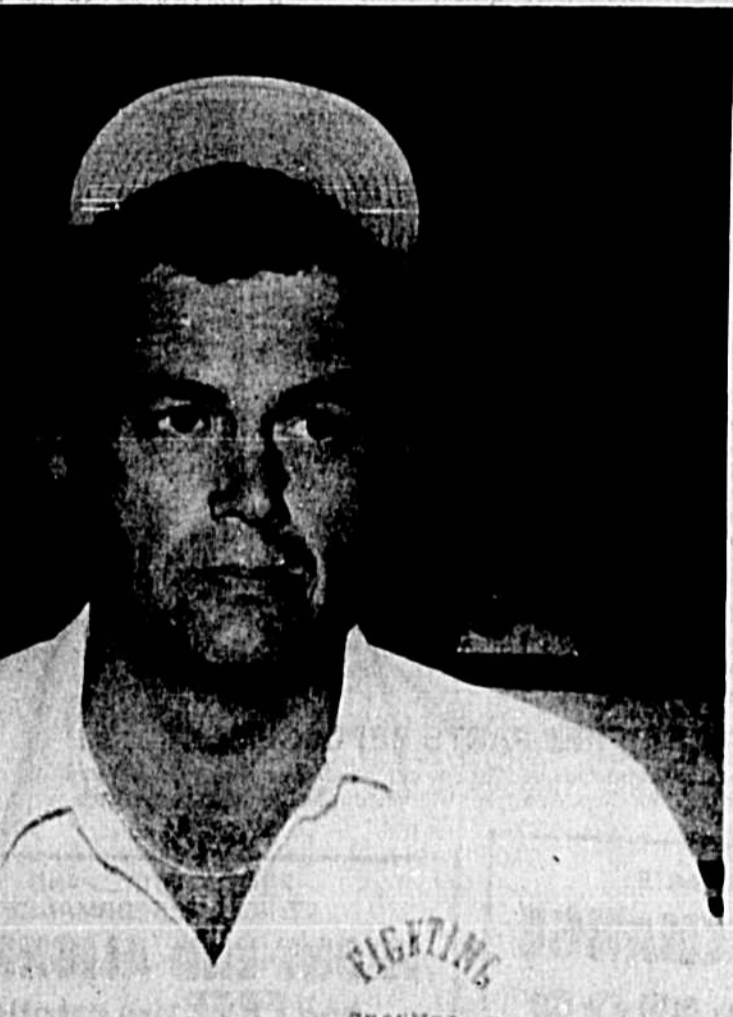
Colts Moving To Memphis?
